HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING FEBRUARY 3 AS TOPICAL STEROID WITHDRAWAL SYNDROME AWARENESS DAY. 1 WHEREAS, Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome, also known as Topical Steroid Addiction or Red Skin Syndrome, is a severe, 2 3 debilitating condition that can arise from intentional or 4 unintentional exposure to topical steroids; and 5 WHEREAS, topical steroids are widely prescribed and 6 7 purchased over the counter to treat acute and chronic skin 8 conditions, such as eczema, psoriasis, vitiligo, and alopecia 9 areata; and 10 WHEREAS, Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome is 11 characterized by skin flushing, inflammation, diffuse spreading 12 rashes, profuse skin flaking, burning, and itching worse than 13 the original condition, which typically appear after the use of 14 15 topical steroid treatments, between treatments, or after discontinuing the use of topical steroids; and 16 17 WHEREAS, it can take several months to several years for 18 symptoms to subside, leaving some sufferers of Topical Steroid 19 20 Withdrawal Syndrome bedridden, housebound, and unable to work, 21 care for children, or attend school; and 22 23 WHEREAS, a prolonged withdrawal and recovery period can take a significant toll on patients' mental health as well as 24 25 physical health; and 26 27 WHEREAS, eighty-one percent of adults and fifty-six percent 28 of children who experience Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome report feeling anxious or depressed, and forty-seven percent of 29 adults and eleven percent of children who experience Topical 30 Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome report suicidal ideation; and 31

2 WHEREAS, the prevalence of topical steroid addiction and Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome are unknown due to a 3 4 scarcity of published research, and the paucity of research on Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome impedes efforts to define 5 diagnostic criteria for this condition; understand its causes, 6 mechanics, and effects; develop appropriate treatment protocols; 7 and educate providers and patients about Topical Steroid 8 9 Withdrawal Syndrome and proper steroid stewardship; and 10

11 WHEREAS, a lack of awareness of and education about Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome can lead to misunderstanding and 12 friction between patients and providers, causing patients to 13 question their providers' medical oversight and providers to 14 15 suspect their patients of medication non-compliance and, occasionally, parental neglect; and 16

WHEREAS, all parties would benefit greatly from increased 18 19 awareness of and prevention education on the signs of topical steroid dependence and the risks of Topical Steroid Withdrawal 20 21 Syndrome; now, therefore,

23 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 24 25 of 2025, the Senate concurring, that February 3 is recognized as Topical Steroid Withdrawal Syndrome Awareness Day; and 26 27

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this 28 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor. 29 30
