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## HOUSE RESOLUTION

REAFFIRMING THE STATE'S OBLIGATION TO UPHOLD THE CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS OF ITS PEOPLE BY RECOGNIZING THE CRITICAL ROLE OF FRESHWATER IN MAINTAINING HEALTHY NEARSHORE MARINE ECOSYSTEMS.

WHEREAS, Hawaii is renowned for its pristine beaches, 1 2 vibrant coral reefs, and diverse marine ecosystems; and 3 4 WHEREAS, these nearshore marine habitats provide essential ecosystem services, including food security, coastal protection, 5 recreational opportunities, and economic functions; and 6 7 WHEREAS, freshwater entering the ocean from rivers, 8 9 streams, springs, and groundwater is vital to the health and productivity of nearshore marine ecosystems, influencing water 10 11 quality, nutrient cycling, and habitat suitability for marine organisms; and 12 13 WHEREAS, freshwater in the nearshore marine ecosystem plays 14 15 a critical role in the health and abundance of native limu (algae and seaweed), which serve key ecological functions, 16 including preventing erosion and coral breakage, creating 17 oxygen, producing sand, serving as food and shelter for marine 18 animals, mitigating global warming through carbon sequestration, 19 20 and acting as the base of the food web on which fisheries and traditional and customary Native Hawaiian practices rely; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, amphidromous species, such as the Hawaiian endemic and indigenous goby fish 'o'opu nākea (Awaous quamensis), 'o'opu 24 25 'alamo'o (Lentipes concolor), 'o'opu naniha (Stenogobius hawaiiensis), 'o'opu nopili (Sicyopterus stimpsoni), and 'o'opu 26 akupa (Eleotris sandwicensis), as well as the Hawaiian endemic 27 28 prawn 'opae 'oeaha'a (Macrobrachium grandimanus), Hawaiian endemic shrimp 'opae kala'ole (Atyoida bisulcata), and Hawaiian endemic 29 mollusks hīhīwai (Neritina granosa) and hapawai (Neritina 30 31 vespertina), rely on freshwater streams, the nearshore marine

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1 ecosystem, and the connection between the two in order to successfully complete their lifecycle; and 2 3 WHEREAS, alterations to freshwater sources, such as 4 excessive groundwater extraction, streamflow diversion, and 5 pollution, adversely affect nearshore marine habitats, leading 6 to coral bleaching, invasive algal blooms, loss of biodiversity, 7 and loss of Native Hawaiian cultural resources; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, providing a healthy marine ecosystem is essential to the perpetuation of traditional and customary Native Hawaiian 11 practices that depend upon Hawaii's natural environment as the 12 source of Native Hawaiian cultural values; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Supreme Court, in Ka Pa'akai O Ka 'Āina v. Land Use Commission, 94 Hawaii 31, 7 P.3d 1068 (2000), 16 required state and county agencies to conduct a Ka Pa'akai 17 analysis on matters that may impact Native Hawaiian traditional 18 19 and customary rights; and 20 WHEREAS, article XI, section 1, of the Hawaii State 21 22 Constitution provides, "For the benefit of present and future generations, the State and its political subdivisions shall 23 24 conserve and protect Hawaii's natural beauty and all natural 25 resources, including land, water, air, minerals and energy 26 sources, and shall promote the development and utilization of 27 these resources in a manner consistent with their conservation 28 and in furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the State."; and 29 30 WHEREAS, article XI, section 7, of the Hawaii State Constitution provides, "The State has an obligation to protect, 31 control and regulate the use of Hawaii's water resources for the 32 33 benefit of its people."; and 34 35 WHEREAS, it is imperative to protect and restore freshwater flows to ensure the long-term health and resilience of Hawaii's 36 nearshore marine ecosystems; now, therefore, 37 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 40 of 2025, that this body reaffirms the State's obligation to 41 uphold the constitutional rights of its people by recognizing 42

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1 the critical role of freshwater in maintaining healthy nearshore 2 marine ecosystems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State and counties are strongly urged to prioritize the protection and restoration of freshwater flows to nearshore marine ecosystems by developing and implementing comprehensive water resource management plans and adopting policies that balance human needs with environmental sustainability; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State and counties are requested to work with relevant stakeholders to identify and implement strategies to protect and restore freshwater flows to nearshore marine ecosystems by providing education and outreach efforts to raise awareness about the importance of freshwater to nearshore marine ecosystems within government and among the public; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor,
Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, and
Mayor of each county.
