HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO PERFORM A COMPREHENSIVE PERFORMANCE, MANAGEMENT, AND FINANCIAL AUDIT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION AND DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTING AND GENERAL SERVICES REGARDING SPENDING RELATED TO THE PLANNING, DESIGN, FINANCING, CONSTRUCTION, AND MAINTENANCE OF A NEW JAIL TO REPLACE THE OAHU COMMUNITY CORRECTIONAL CENTER.

WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation
 oversees eight correctional facilities throughout the State:
 Halawa Correctional Facility, Hawaii Community Correctional
 Center, Kauai Community Correctional Center, Kulani Correctional
 Facility, Maui Community Correctional Center, Oahu Community
 Correctional Center, Waiawa Correctional Facility, and Women's
 Community Correctional Center; and

9 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation
10 contracts with CoreCivic to transfer and incarcerate nine
11 hundred thirty-eight males at Saguaro Correctional Center in
12 Arizona, despite the availability of open beds at Waiawa
13 Correctional Facility and Kulani Correctional Facility in
14 Hawai'i; and

16 WHEREAS, some correctional facilities throughout the State 17 face issues of overcrowding and understaffing, which impacts the 18 safety and well-being of incarcerated individuals and 19 corrections staff; and

21 WHEREAS, as of December 2024, there were nine hundred 22 forty-seven individuals incarcerated at the Oahu Community 23 Correctional Center; and

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25 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation 26 reported that from 2021 to 2023, approximately thirty to forty 27 percent of inmates incarcerated in the State's correctional



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1 facilities were homeless immediately before entry, and an even 2 larger percentage exit to homelessness; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Correctional System Oversight 5 Commission reported that eighty-six percent of the inmate 6 population needs substance abuse treatment at some level, Native 7 Hawaiians are disproportionately incarcerated, and many in the State's correctional facilities need mental health services; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, with the support of the Department of Accounting and General 11 Services, is proposing to construct a new, expanded one thousand 12 three hundred bed jail to replace the Oahu Community 13 14 Correctional Center through a public-private partnership; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the estimated cost to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center, according to the Department of Corrections 17 18 and Rehabilitation's plans for expansion and construction, is 19 \$1,000,000,000; and 20 WHEREAS, this proposed new jail would make it the single 21 largest public works project in state history and does not 22 23 include the recurring costs of operation; and 24 25 WHEREAS, to date, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation has expended approximately \$25,000,000 on 26 27 planning consultants, including public relations professionals, 28 on this proposed project; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the expenditure of taxpayer dollars on this 31 proposed project is proceeding even though the Department of 32 Corrections and Rehabilitation has made no discernable effort to 33 maintain and repair existing facilities, including at the Oahu 34 Community Correctional Center; and 35 36 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation 37 has not immediately implemented actionable changes at the Oahu 38 Community Correctional Center that do not require new 39 construction, despite requests by the Hawaii Correctional System 40 Oversight Commission; and 41



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WHEREAS, existing efforts, such as recommendations made by the University of Hawaii Community Design Center, are advisory 2 in nature only and do not represent a commitment by the 3 Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to an improved 4 model of carceral justice; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation 8 should work collaboratively with justice system partners, beginning on Oahu, to increase diversion infrastructure to 9 substantially reduce incarceration levels in the State's jails, 10 address the root causes of individuals' involvement with the 11 criminal legal system, and decrease pre-trial detention times to 12 six months or less; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation has also not provided a full accounting of how past funding 16 relating to the proposed project has been spent; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation 20 is proceeding with this project without a current comprehensive 21 system-wide approach to master planning; and 22 WHEREAS, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation 23 is requesting another \$30,000,000 to issue a request for 24 proposals to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center even 25 though the Department's last ten-year master plan update was 26 completed in 2003; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, the last report lacked an analysis of data-driven systems strategies to significantly reduce the number of 30 individuals who hold pretrial status in the State's jails and 31 32 divert those who are houseless, poor, and in need of mental 33 health care or substance use treatment to the appropriate 34 service providers; now, therefore, 35 36 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 37 38 of 2025, that the Auditor is requested to perform a comprehensive performance, management and financial audit of the 39 40 Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and Department of 41 Accounting and General Services regarding spending related to 42 the planning, design, financing, construction, and maintenance

14 15 16 17 18 19	(2)	An analysis of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's budget and whether the expenditure of funds related to the planning, design, financing, construction, and maintenance of a new jail to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center is in accordance with the funding's original purpose;
20 21 22 23 24 25 26	(3)	An examination of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's and Department of Accounting and General Services' compliance with procurement laws related to the planning, design, financing, construction, and maintenance of a new jail to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center;
27 28 29 30 31 32 33	(4)	A list of all contractors and subcontractors, the dates of the contractors' and subcontractors' duties, and the completion of the contractors' and subcontractors' duties related to the proposed construction of a new jail to replace the Oahu Community Correctional Center; and
34 35 36 37	(5)	Any other matters that the Auditor deems necessary or appropriate; and
38 39 40 41 42	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation and Department of Accounting and General Services are urged to fully cooperate with and provide any necessary assistance requested by the Auditor with respect to the comprehensive performance, management and financial audit	



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1 and respond promptly to all requests from the Auditor, including 2 providing records and other information that may be requested during the course of the audit; and 3 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to submit a report of the findings of the comprehensive 6 performance, management and financial audit and recommendations, 7 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 8 9 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and 10 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 13 Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor, Director of 14 Corrections and Rehabilitation, and Comptroller. 15 16 17
