HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE LEGISLATURE TO CONDUCT MANDATORY INQUIRIES INTO ALL FATALITIES AND SERIOUS INJURIES THAT OCCURRED TO CHILDREN INVOLVED IN CHILD WELFARE SERVICES.

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services (DHS), Child 1 Welfare Services Branch has experienced a troubling number of 2 child fatalities and serious injuries resulting from systemic 3 failures, including neglect in foster care placements and unsafe 4 5 reunifications; and 6 7 WHEREAS, nineteen child fatalities or serious injuries have been reported since 1997 and over ten million dollars have been 8 paid out in lawsuits so far; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in the case of Reubyne, who was beaten in 1997 and 11 12 is still in a vegetative state, DHS was sued for negligence and settled for two million dollars; and 13 14 WHEREAS, in the case of Peter Boy Kema, who was murdered in 15 1997 though his body was never found, his family was involved in 16 17 multiple Child Welfare Services cases and ultimately reunified; however, a Special Master's report states that the Department 18 should never have reunified, the father was convicted, and a 19 20 lawsuit is pending; and 21 22 WHEREAS, in 1999 a Waianae family was given permanent 23 guardianship over a group of children, who after reaching adulthood, successfully sued DHS following the parents' 24 conviction for assault and sexual abuse in 2005; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, in the case of Alexis Cabantang, who was left with 28 permanent disabilities after she was beaten and nearly died in 2005, her guardian was sentenced to twenty years in prison and 29 the Department of Education was successfully sued for failure to 30 report her injuries to Child Welfare Services; and 31



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1 WHEREAS, in the case of Cyrus Belt, who was thrown over a 2 freeway overpass in Honolulu in 2008, the responsible party was 3 sentenced to life in prison and DHS settled a lawsuit brought by 4 the father for not intervening despite having been notified six 5 days prior that the mother was using methamphetamine; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, in the case of Braden McVeigh, who was murdered in 2009 after being reunited with his father over the objections of 9 the grandmother, DHS was successfully sued; and 10 11 WHEREAS, in 2012, Zion McKeown was beaten to death at the 12 13 age of four after being reunified with the parents despite multiple warnings against reunification; and 14 15 WHEREAS, in the case of Ronela Pascual, who was critically 16 injured in 2008 after reunification which left her unable to 17 18 communicate until her death in 2013 at the age of eleven; and 19 WHEREAS, in the case of Zachary Durto-Burgess, who was 20 beaten to death after being reunified with his parents in 2010, 21 22 his parents were sentenced to life in prison; and 23 24 WHEREAS, Zack Morris was convicted of sexual abuse and DHS 25 was successfully sued by the boys who were placed in his foster home despite suspicions of child abuse in other states; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Fabian Garcia died in her foster home on Big 28 29 Island due to blunt force trauma and has yet to receive justice; 30 and 31 32 WHEREAS, Shaelyn Stone was withdrawn from public school and 33 died of starvation in 2017; thereafter, her parents and grandparent were all convicted of manslaughter; and 34 35 36 WHEREAS, a seven day old infant died of brain damage at Tripler Hospital after an older sibling similarly died of 37 38 injuries, and the parents were later convicted of murder for both children in 2020; and 39 40

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WHEREAS, in 2020 a lawsuit was filed against DHS for 1 overlooking systemic abuse in a foster home where the eleven 2 adopted children were forced into slave labor, molested, and 3 starved before a teen child ultimately killed the abusive 4 adoptive mother; and 5 6 WHEREAS, Ariel Sellers was murdered in 2021 at the age of 7 8 six after being starved, gagged, and kept in a dog cage by her adoptive parents who are currently in jail awaiting second 9 degree murder charges; and 10 11 WHEREAS, in 2021 an infant was declared deceased after 12 13 Child Welfare Services had been called in to investigate the situation months earlier but decided not to open a case; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, Bula Mahoe was charged with sexual abuse of his parents' foster children; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, Caitano used foster children to conduct an illegal drug ring in 2022, and was ultimately indicted for that offense 20 along with sexual abuse and physical abuse; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, Geanna Bradley was found dead in her home in 2024 after being starved and physically abused by her guardians, who 24 25 are now charged with second degree murder, and another child in the home was found in very serious condition; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, repeated failures to act upon warnings and ensure 29 child safety have resulted in preventable deaths and injuries; 30 and 31 32 WHEREAS, despite a 2005 policy directive (DHS 2005-PA-3) 33 requiring safety concerns to be immediately reported to judges, these warnings have often been ignored; and 34 35 WHEREAS, lawsuits for some of the child fatality and 36 serious injury cases have been successful, but they are complex, 37 38 expensive, and time-consuming, while in the meantime, there is no assurance that preventative measures have been taken by DHS; 39 40 and 41

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1 WHEREAS, Hawaii does have a child death review panel per the federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) 2 requirements, but there is no disclosure to the public or 3 4 assurance that the circumstances of a death or injury have been 5 addressed for future prevention; and 6 7 WHEREAS, unlike Hawaii, states like California, Florida, and Colorado publish detailed information online about such 8 cases and some even mandate these disclosures to ensure 9 10 transparency and accountability, particularly when there has 11 been previous state involvement; and 12 WHEREAS, studies of child deaths over decades have resulted 13 14 in four main causes: 15 16 (1)Failure of communication between staff and agencies; 17 (2)Inexperience and lack of skill of individual social 18 19 workers; 20 (3) Failure to follow established procedures; and 21 22 23 (4) Inadequate resources to meet demands; now, therefore, 24 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 26 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 27 of 2025, that the Senate Committee on Health and Human Services and House Committee on Human Services and Homelessness are urged 28 29 to conduct mandatory inquiries into all fatalities and serious injuries that occurred to children involved in Child Welfare 30 31 Services; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these inquiries must include a 34 comprehensive review of systemic failures, resource allocation, 35 departmental accountability, and the identification of measures 36 to prevent further harm; and 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the goal of these inquiries 39 should be to ensure full transparency, prompt and thorough action, and the establishment of safeguards that prioritize the 40



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safety and well-being of all children under the Department of 1 Human Services' care; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislature is committed to 4 5 enacting laws in response to the results of the mandated inquiries that ensure similar transparency and accountability as 6 seen in other states, such as Colorado, to uphold the public 7 trust and prevent future tragedies; and 8 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Human Services, 11 President of the Senate, Speaker of the House of 12 Representatives, Chair of the Senate Committee on Health and 13 Human Services, and Chair of the House Committee on Human 14 15 Services and Homelessness. 16 Ait 17 18 OFFERED BY:

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
