A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ANIMAL ENDANGERMENT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that every year, hundreds
- 2 of pet animals tragically lose their lives when their owners
- 3 leave them alone in parked vehicles in extreme temperatures.
- Many pet owners are unaware that even on a temperate day, the
- 5 inside of a parked vehicle can reach extreme temperatures within
- 6 minutes. According to the American Veterinary Medical
- 7 Association, the temperature inside a vehicle with all the
- 8 windows closed can hit eighty-nine degrees in just ten minutes.
- 9 On a hot day, the temperature inside a closed vehicle can rise
- 10 as high as one hundred fourteen degrees in the same amount of
- 11 time. While humans can cool themselves by relying on an
- 12 extensive system of sweat glands and evaporation, pet animals
- have a harder time staying cool, leaving them extremely 13
- vulnerable to heat stroke. Therefore, leaving pet animals in 14
- vehicles can cause severe dehydration and even death. 15
- The purpose of this Act is to: 16



1	(1)	Prohibit intentionally leaving or confining pet
2		animals in unattended vehicles; and
3	(2)	Allow certain public officials and private citizens to
4		rescue pet animals in unattended vehicles if certain
5		conditions are met.
6	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 708, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended b	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
8	and to re	ad as follows:
9	" <u>§70</u>	8- Unattended vehicle; pet animal; removal or
10	retrieval	; immunity; criminal liability. (a) An animal control
11	officer,	law enforcement officer, or firefighter who removes or
12	otherwise	retrieves a pet animal from an unattended vehicle
13	pursuant	to section 711- (b), and the agency or county that
14	employs t	he officer or firefighter, shall be immune from
15	criminal	liability that might otherwise result from the removal
16	or retrie	val.
17	(b)	A person who removes or otherwise retrieves an animal
18	from an u	nattended vehicle pursuant to section 711- (e) shall
19	be immune	from criminal liability that might otherwise result
20	from the	removal or retrieval."

1	SECTION 3. Chapter 711, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§711- Confinement of a pet animal in an unattended
5	vehicle; permitted protection and rescue of an animal; penalty.
6	(a) A person shall not intentionally leave or confine a pet
7	animal in an unattended vehicle under conditions that endanger
8	the health, safety, or well-being of the pet animal due to heat;
9	cold; lack of adequate ventilation; lack of food or water; or
10	other circumstances that could reasonably be expected to cause
11	suffering, disability, or death to the pet animal.
12	(b) After making reasonable efforts to locate the
13	unattended vehicle's owner or operator, an animal control
14	officer, law enforcement officer, or firefighter may enter a
15	vehicle by any reasonable means to protect the health, safety,
16	or well-being of a pet animal that is endangered by being left
17	or confined in an unattended vehicle. A law enforcement
18	officer, animal control officer, or firefighter may enter the
19	unattended vehicle for the sole purpose of removing or otherwise
20	retrieving the pet animal and shall not search the vehicle or

1	seize items found in the vehicle, unless otherwise permitted by
2	law.
3	(c) An animal control officer, law enforcement officer, or
4	firefighter who removes or otherwise retrieves a pet animal
5	under this section shall:
6	(1) Leave written notice in a secure and conspicuous
7	location or in the vehicle bearing the officer's or
8	firefighter's name and title and the address of the
9	location at which the pet animal may be retrieved; and
10	(2) Deliver the pet animal to a veterinary hospital or
11	animal clinic for a health screening and treatment.
12	(d) An animal control officer, law enforcement officer, or
13	firefighter who removes or otherwise retrieves a pet animal from
14	an unattended vehicle pursuant to subsections (b) and (c), and
15	the agency or county that employs the officer or firefighter,
16	shall be immune from civil liability that might otherwise result
17	from the removal or retrieval.
18	(e) After making reasonable efforts to locate an
19	unattended vehicle's owner or operator, a person other than an
20	animal control officer, law enforcement officer, or firefighter
21	may enter an unattended vehicle to remove or otherwise retrieve

1	<u>a pet ani</u>	mal to protect the health, safety, or well-being of the
2	pet anima	1; provided that the person:
3	(1)	Determines that the unattended vehicle is locked and
4		there are no reasonable means of egress for the pet
5		animal from the vehicle;
6	(2)	Has a good faith and reasonable belief, based upon
7		known circumstances, that entry into the unattended
8		vehicle is reasonably necessary to prevent imminent
9		danger or harm to the pet animal;
10	<u>(3)</u>	Calls 911 to coordinate the removal or retrieval of
11		the pet animal with law enforcement, animal control,
12		or fire, or, if unable to reach those authorities
13		through a 911 call, otherwise makes reasonable
14		attempts to contact those authorities;
15	(4)	Shall not use more force than reasonably necessary to
16		enter the unattended vehicle and remove or otherwise
17		retrieve the pet animal; and
18	(5)	Remains with the pet animal in a safe location in
19		reasonable proximity to the unattended vehicle until
20		law enforcement or another first responder arrives.

5	(g) The owner of the pet animal may retrieve the pet
6	animal that was removed or otherwise retrieved from the
7	unattended vehicle pursuant to this section only after payment
8	of all charges that have accrued for the maintenance, care,
9	medical treatment, and impoundment of the animal.
10	(h) A violation of subsection (a) shall constitute a
11	misdemeanor under section 711-1109.
12	(i) For the purposes of this section:

(f) A person who removes or otherwise retrieves an animal

- "Heat" means a high temperature, inside or outside a
- 17 vehicle, that could endanger a pet animal's health, safety, or

"Cold" means a low temperature, inside or outside a

vehicle, that could endanger a pet animal's health, safety, or

well-being.

- "Pet animal" shall have the same meaning as defined in
- 20 section 711-1100.

1	"Vehicle" means a car, truck, camper, or other form of
2	transportation in which a pet animal can be transported."
3	SECTION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
4	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
5	begun before its effective date.
6	SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.
7	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.

Report Title:

Animal Endangerment; Pet Animals; Unattended Vehicles; Confinement; Immunity

Description:

Prohibits intentionally leaving or confining pet animals in a vehicle under conditions that endanger their health, safety, or well-being. Allows law enforcement officers, animal control officers, and firefighters to enter an unattended vehicle to protect the health, safety, or well-being of a pet animal that is endangered by being left or confined in an unattended vehicle. Allows private citizens to rescue a pet animal that has been left in an unattended vehicle under certain circumstances.
