
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that at the
2 Constitutional Convention of Hawaii of 1978, the committee on
3 Hawaiian affairs proposed the constitutional amendment that is
4 now enshrined in article XV, section 4, of the Hawaii State
5 Constitution, which establishes Hawaiian as an official language
6 of the State. The committee felt it necessary to include this
7 amendment in the constitution "to give full recognition and
8 honor to the rich cultural inheritance that Hawaiians have given
9 to all ethnic groups of the State".

10 The legislature further finds that passage of this Act
11 would contribute to the growing international movement for the
12 protection of the rights of the world's indigenous peoples. In
13 2007, the United Nations adopted the United Nations Declaration
14 on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. In 2011, the United States
15 became a signatory on the Declaration. Article 13 of the
16 Declaration states:



1 "1. Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use,
2 develop and transmit to future generations their
3 histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies,
4 writing systems and literatures, and to designate and
5 retain their own names for communities, places and
6 persons.

7 2. States shall take effective measures to ensure that
8 this right is protected and also to ensure that
9 indigenous peoples can understand and be understood in
10 political, legal and administrative proceedings, where
11 necessary through the provision of interpretation or
12 by other appropriate means".

13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require that the
14 Hawaiian version of a law be held binding if the law in question
15 was originally drafted in Hawaiian, or if the law was originally
16 drafted in English and if the law was subsequently amended,
17 codified, recodified, or reenacted in Hawaiian, and meets
18 certain criteria.

19 SECTION 2. Section 1-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20 amended to read as follows:



1 "§1-13 Official languages. English and Hawaiian are the
2 official languages of Hawaii. Whenever there is found to exist
3 any radical and irreconcilable difference between the English
4 and Hawaiian version of any of the laws of the State, the
5 English version shall be held binding[-]; provided that if the
6 law in question was originally drafted in Hawaiian and the
7 English version was translated based on the Hawaiian version,
8 and if the law has not been later amended, codified, recodified,
9 or reenacted in English, or if the law in question was
10 originally drafted in English and if the law was subsequently
11 amended, codified, recodified, or reenacted in Hawaiian, the
12 Hawaiian version shall be held binding. Hawaiian shall not be
13 required for public acts and transactions."

14 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
