A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that under existing law,
- 2 individuals under the age of fifteen are able to legally ride
- 3 high-speed electric bicycles, which has led to numerous safety
- 4 and other issues. Under existing statute, electric bicycles are
- 5 defined as devices capable of speeds of up to twenty miles per
- 6 hour, even though modern federal definitions allow for speeds of
- 7 up to twenty-eight miles per hour, and the vast majority of
- 8 electric bicycles on the market today are capable of reaching
- 9 those speeds. This means a five-year-old is legally able to
- 10 ride a new electric bicycle and law enforcement can do little
- about it. 11
- 12 The legislature further finds that due to increasingly
- expensive fossil fuels and a lack of cheaper transit options, 13
- 14 Hawaii residents already pay among the highest costs to commute
- 15 in the country. A 2020 analysis studied all of the direct and
- indirect costs of car ownership and use in Hawaii and found that 16
- 17 local taxpaying families pay about \$24,400 per year, but could



- 1 reduce that cost significantly by switching from three cars per
- 2 family to two, or two cars to one, and replacing short trips for
- 3 those family members who are able with electric bicycles or
- 4 similar mobility devices.
- 5 The legislature also finds that the current electric
- 6 bicycle and moped rebate program, even with minimal promotion
- 7 and low subsidy, has helped almost three hundred Hawaii families
- 8 access electric bikes since its inception. However, its reach
- 9 and effectiveness has been limited by complicated restrictions
- 10 and a lower rebate than other successful programs.
- In 2022, Denver's electric bike rebate program, which
- 12 provided families with up to a \$1,200 rebate, led to
- 13 considerable cost savings for Denver families, and replaced many
- 14 trips by car with trips by electric bicycle which helped reduce
- 15 vehicular traffic on crowded roads by over one hundred thousand
- 16 vehicular miles weekly. Ninety-six per cent of respondents said
- 17 the availability of the rebate made the difference when deciding
- 18 to buy an electric bike.
- 19 The legislature further finds that updates to the law
- 20 regarding the use of helmets and operation of electric bicycles

I	are neces	sary to enhance road safety for the entire community,
2	and parti	cularly for youths.
3	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
4	(1)	Prohibit individuals under the age of fifteen from
5		riding electric bicycles;
6	(2)	Help reduce the cost of transportation and traffic on
7		Hawaii's roads by addressing barriers in the existing
8		electric bicycle and moped rebate program to enable
9		the purchase and use of adaptive electric bicycles for
10		those with disabilities and expand eligibility and
11		rebates for electric bicycles to mirror similar proven
12		successful programs more closely;
13	(3)	Clarify the source of funding for the electric
14		<pre>mobility rebate program;</pre>
15	(4)	Allow for registration of class 3 electric bicycles
16		with wheels smaller than twenty inches that are
17		intended for adult use;
18	(5)	Change the age for helmet requirements statewide from
19		sixteen to eighteen years of age;
20	(6)	Allow electric bicycles on public sidewalks, subject
21		to certain conditions;

1	(7)	Authorize rather than require that mopeds use bicycle
2		lanes;
3	(8)	Change the term "motor scooter" to "motor-driven
4		vehicle"; and
5	(9)	Require electric bicycle operators on public streets
6		to follow certain safe riding behavior.
7	SECT	ION 2. Section 196-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended b	y adding three new definitions to be appropriately
9	inserted	and to read as follows:
10	" <u>"</u> Ad	aptive electric bicycle" means any bicycle that is
11	modified	to fit the needs of an individual rider who is unable
12	to use a	standard electric bicycle.
13	<u>"Ele</u>	ctric bicycle" means a bicycle equipped with fully
14	operable	pedals, a saddle or seat for the rider, and an electric
15	motor not	to exceed seven hundred and fifty watts that meets the
16	requireme	nts of one of the following three classes:
17	(1)	Class 1 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle
18		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only
19		when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide
20		assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of
21		twenty miles per hour;



1	(2)	Class 2 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle					
2		equipped with a motor that may be used exclusively to					
3		propel the bicycle, and that is not capable of					
4	providing assistance when the bicycle reaches the						
5	speed of twenty miles per hour; or						
6	(3)	Class 3 electric bicycle, which is an electric bicycle					
7		equipped with a motor that provides assistance only					
8		when the rider is pedaling, and that ceases to provide					
9		assistance when the bicycle reaches the speed of					
10		twenty-eight miles per hour.					
11	<u>"Ele</u>	ctric micro-mobility device" means any ground					
12	transport	ation device, such as a standing scooter or similar					
13	device, t	hat is powered either exclusively by electricity from a					
14	battery c	harged from an external source, or by electricity from					
15	a battery charged from an external source in addition to human						
16	power, which is designed to transport a single person, with a						
17	range not	less than fifteen miles and maximum speed of twenty-					
18	eight mil	es per hour, on which a person may reasonably commute					
19	to and fr	om regular destinations."					
20	SECT	TION 3. Section 198-7.8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
21	amended t	o read as follows:					



1 "[{]\$196-7.8[}] Electric [bicycle and electric moped] 2 mobility rebate program; third-party administrator; special 3 fund. (a) The department of transportation shall administer a rebate program that incentivizes the purchase of new electric 5 [bicycles and new electric mopeds] mobility devices and may 6 contract with a third-party administrator pursuant to subsection 7 $\left[\frac{(i)}{(i)}\right]$ (k) to operate and manage the rebate program. 8 Each eligible purchase of a new electric bicycle [or (b) 9 new], electric moped, adaptive electric bicycle, or electric 10 micro-mobility device shall receive a rebate of [either twenty 11 per cent of the retail cost or \$500, whichever amount is lower; 12 either fifty per cent of the retail cost or \$750; whichever is 13 lower; provided that no individual shall receive more than 14 [\$500] \$750 in total rebates each fiscal year $[\cdot]$ unless also 15 qualifying for the additional assistance rebate pursuant to 16 subsection (i), in which case no individual shall receive more 17 than \$1,500 in total rebates each fiscal year. 18 (c) The department of transportation shall not issue more 19 than [\$700,000] \$2,000,000 in total rebates under this section 20 each fiscal year; provided that the electric [bicycle and 21 electric moped] mobility subaccount within the highway

16	buyer and individual responsible for the sale on
17	behalf of a retail store at the time of sale, a copy
18	of valid government issued photo identification of the

name and address of the retail store, verification of

eligibility, and any other documentation necessary to

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1		demonstrate the legitimate purchase of a new electric

5	(e)	This section shall apply to new:
6	(1)	Electric bicycles [capable of speeds of no more than
7		twenty-eight miles per hour; and];
8	(2)	Electric mopeds[7];
9	(3)	Adaptive electric bicycles; and
10	(4)	Electric micro-mobility devices,
11	purchased	at a retail store after July 1, 2022.
12	(f)	Applicants shall submit an application to the
13	departmen	t of transportation within twelve months of the date of
14	purchase	to claim a rebate from the electric [bicycle and
15	electric 	moped] mobility rebate program. Failure to apply
16	within two	elve months of the date of purchase shall constitute a
17	waiver of	the right to claim the rebate.
18	(g)	Nothing in this section shall alter taxes due on the
19	original p	purchase. Any rebate received pursuant to this section
20	shall not	be considered income for the purposes of state or
21	county tax	xes.



1	(h) In administering the electric mobility rebate program,								
2	the department of transportation shall provide rebates to								
3	persons who are residents of the State and fifteen years or								
4	older, who purchase a new qualifying electric bicycle, electric								
5	moped, adaptive electric bicycle, or electric micro-mobility								
6	device.								
7	[(h)] <u>(i)</u> In administering the electric [bicycle and								
8	electric moped] mobility rebate program, the department of								
9	transportation shall provide [rebates] an assistance rebate in								
10	addition to the rebate in subsection (b). The additional								
11	assistance rebate shall be \$750 or the full retail amount,								
12	whichever amount is lower, to persons [eighteen] fifteen years								
13	or older who:								
14	(1) Are eligible for:								
15	(A) The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program;								
16	(B) The free and reduced price lunch program;								
17	(C) Section 8 of the United States Housing Act of								
18	1937, as amended; or								
19	(D) Similar low-income assistance programs identified								
20	by the department of transportation;								

1	(2)	Do not own a registered motor vehicle with four or
2		more wheels, as demonstrated by an affidavit signed by
3		the applicant at the time of sale of the new electric
4		bicycle [or], electric moped, adaptive electric
5		bicycle, or electric micro-mobility device, which may
6		be audited by the department of transportation; or
7	(3)	Are enrolled in school, community college, or
8		university;
9	provided	that parental or guardian permission shall be required
10	if a pers	on is under the age of eighteen.
11	[(i)	-] <u>(j)</u> The department of transportation may contract
12	with a th	ird-party administrator to operate and manage the
13	electric	[bicycle and electric moped] mobility rebate program.
14	The third	-party administrator shall not be deemed to be a
15	"governme	ental body" as defined in section 103D-104; provided
16	that all	moneys transferred to the third-party administrator
17	shall hav	e been appropriated by the legislature or shall be from
18	moneys pr	ovided by the federal government or private funding
19	sources.	The third-party administrator [shall not expend more
20	than ten	per cent of the amounts appropriated for the rebate
21	program,	or any other reasonable percentage determined by the



- 1 department of transportation, for may provide administration,
- 2 promotion, and reporting of the electric [bicycle and electric
- 3 moped] mobility rebate program.
- 4 (k) The department of transportation may contract with a
- 5 third-party administrator to administer the electric mobility
- 6 rebate program; provided that the third-party administrator may
- 7 pay rebates to each rebate applicant from moneys transferred
- 8 pursuant to subsection (j) from the electric mobility subaccount
- 9 within the highway development special fund.
- 10 (1) The department of transportation shall provide an
- 11 annual report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 12 to the convening of each regular session that shall detail the
- 13 rebates provided by zip code, amount received, and type of
- 14 rebate."
- 15 SECTION 4. Section 249-14, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
- "(c) An owner of a bicycle or a class 3 electric bicycle
- 18 as defined in section 196-2, intended for adult use, having two
- 19 tandem wheels that are less than twenty inches in diameter is
- 20 not required to register that bicycle, but may do so to
- 21 facilitate the return of recovered stolen bicycles by payment of



- 1 the registration fee. The fee collected shall not be refunded
- 2 or prorated. Upon receipt of the fee, the director of finance
- 3 shall number and register each bicycle for which the fee is
- 4 paid, in the owner's name, and furnish the owner with a metallic
- 5 tag or decal for each bicycle, which shall be attached to the
- 6 bicycle. The decal shall be affixed to a bicycle on the upright
- 7 post attached to the sprocket facing in the forward direction.
- 8 Upon initial registration by an owner or transferee, the
- 9 director of finance shall require proof of ownership and require
- 10 the owner to furnish verification of the serial number and
- 11 description contained in the proof of ownership and application
- 12 for registration. The metallic tags or decals shall be in a
- 13 form as the director of finance shall from time to time
- 14 prescribe. It shall be the duty of the director of finance of
- 15 each county to purchase a sufficient number of these tags or
- 16 decals."
- 17 SECTION 5. Section 264-122, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 18 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 19 "(d) There is established within the highway development
- 20 special fund an electric [bicycle and electric moped] mobility
- 21 subaccount. The department shall expend moneys in the



- 1 subaccount for the purposes of funding the electric [bicycle and
- 2 electric moped] mobility rebate program established pursuant to
- 3 section 196-7.8."
- 4 SECTION 6. Section 291C-139, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 6 "(d) No person under fifteen years of age shall operate an
- 7 electric foot scooter on a highway, street, roadway, or any
- 8 other public property in the State. No person under [sixteen]
- 9 eighteen years of age shall operate an electric foot scooter
- 10 unless the person wears a safety helmet securely fastened with a
- 11 chin strap. The safety helmet shall meet the specifications of
- 12 and requirements for a bicycle helmet as set out in section
- **13** 291C-150."
- 14 SECTION 7. Section 291C-143.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended to read as follows:
- 16 "[+] \$291C-143.5[+ Low-speed electric] Electric bicycles;
- 17 operator age[-]; operation. (a) No person under the age of
- 18 fifteen shall operate [a low-speed] an electric bicycle as
- 19 defined [under title 15 United States Code section 2085.] in
- **20** section 196-2.



1	(b) All electric bicycles shall be operated only with all						
2	wheels on the ground at all times, facing forward, and with the						
3	operator seated with one leg on each side of the seat; provided						
4	that it shall not be a violation of this subsection if the						
5	wheels lose contact with the ground briefly due to the conditio						
6	of the road surface or other circumstances beyond the control o						
7	the operator.						
8	(c) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate an						
9	electric bicycle in an unsafe manner or engage in exhibition						
10	driving on any public street, alley, or other public right of						
11	way provided that this subsection shall not apply to a person						
12	engaging in exhibition riding as part of a parade, tournament,						
13	or other activity permitted by the county.						
14	(d) The following actions while operating an electric						
15	bicycle shall be prohibited:						
16	(1) Standing or kneeling on any seat, riding on any						
17	handlebars, or engaging in any other non-standard						
18	riding position;						
19	(2) Performing a maneuver where one or more wheels are						
20	intentionally_lifted from the ground; and						



1	(3) Engaging in any other maneuver that endangers the
2	operator or any person."
3	SECTION 8. Section 291C-145, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending subsection (g) to read as follows:
5	"(g) [No] A person may ride an electric bicycle on public
6	sidewalks; provided that no person shall ride [a] an electric
7	bicycle [equipped with a motor] on any sidewalk located within a
8	business district; provided further that the electric bicycle
9	shall not exceed a speed of ten miles per hour; provided further
10	that the rider shall use safe yielding behavior. The counties
11	may, by ordinance, post bicycle lanes and bicycle paths to
12	prevent persons riding a bicycle equipped with a motor from
13	using them."
14	SECTION 9. Section 291C-150, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
16	"(a) No person under [sixteen] eighteen years of age shall
17	operate a bicycle upon a street, bikeway, or any other public
18	property unless that person is wearing a properly fitted and
19	fastened bicycle helmet that has been tested by a nationally
20	recognized agency such as the National Highway Traffic Safety
21	Administration, the National Safety Council, or the Children's



- 1 Safety Network, and is designed to fit the user and protect
- 2 against head trauma. This requirement also applies to a person
- 3 who rides upon a bicycle while in a restraining seat that is
- 4 attached to the bicycle or who rides in a trailer towed by the
- 5 bicycle.
- **6** (b) A person who provides bicycles for hire shall not rent
- 7 a bicycle to any person unless every person who is under age
- 8 [sixteen] eighteen is wearing a bicycle helmet, as required in
- 9 subsection (a), while operating the rented bicycle, occupying a
- 10 restraining seat that is attached to the rented bicycle, or
- 11 riding in a trailer towed by the rented bicycle."
- 12 SECTION 10. Section 291C-197, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) Wherever bicycle lanes are provided on the roadway,
- 15 moped drivers [shall] may use [such] the bicycle lanes."
- 16 SECTION 11. Sections 249-1, 249-9.2, 286-2, 286-81,
- **17** 286-81.5, 286-102.6, 286-108, 286-109, 286-110, 291-11, 291-22,
- **18** 291-25, 291-31, 291-31.5, 219C-1, 291C-206, 431:10C-304,
- **19** 431:10C-305, 431:10C-408, 431-19G-101, 431:10G-102, 431:10G-103,
- **20** 431:10G-104, 431:10G-105, 431:10G-106, 431:10G-107, 431:10G-108,

- 1 437B-1, 481I-2, and 604A-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended
- 2 by substituting the term "motor-driven cycle" or similar term,
- 3 where the term "motor scooter", or similar term, appears, as the
- 4 context requires.
- 5 SECTION 12. There is appropriated out of the state highway
- 6 fund the sum of \$700,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary
- 7 for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the same sum or so much thereof as
- 8 may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 to be deposited into
- 9 the highway development special fund electric mobility
- 10 subaccount.
- 11 SECTION 13. There is appropriated out of the highway
- 12 development special fund electric mobility subaccount the sum of
- 13 \$700,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 14 2025-2026 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
- 15 necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 for the operations of the
- 16 electric mobility rebate program including the payment of
- 17 rebates and costs of the administrator; provided that the funds
- 18 appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for
- 19 which it was appropriated; provided further that any
- 20 unencumbered funds remaining shall lapse on June 30, 2028.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 14. There is appropriated out of the state highway
- 4 fund the sum of \$700,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary
- 5 for fiscal year 2025-2026 and the same sum or so much thereof as
- 6 may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 to be deposited into
- 7 the highway development special fund electric mobility
- 8 subaccount.
- 9 SECTION 15. There is appropriated out of the highway
- 10 development special fund electric mobility subaccount the sum of
- 11 \$700,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 12 2025-2026 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be
- 13 necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 for the operations of the
- 14 electric mobility rebate program, including the payment of
- 15 rebates and costs of the administrator; provided that the funds
- 16 appropriated shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year for
- 17 which it was appropriated; provided further that any
- 18 unencumbered funds remaining shall lapse on June 30, 2028.
- 19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 20 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.

Department of Transportation; Rebate; Electric Mobility Subaccount; Electric Mobility Rebate Program; Emergency Appropriations

Description:

Renames the Electric Bicycle and Electric Moped Rebate Program to the Electric Mobility Rebate Program. Expands eligibility and amends the maximum rebate amounts. Prohibits individuals under fifteen years of age from riding electric bicycles. Amends the age requirement for helmet use from sixteen to eighteen years of age. Allows use of electric bicycles on public sidewalks, subject to certain conditions. Authorizes rather than requires that mopeds use bicycle lanes. Establishes rules for electric bicycle operation. Changes the term "motor scooter" to "motor-driven vehicle". Appropriates funds.

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
