A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM INCENTIVES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the consumption of 2 fresh fruits and vegetables is an integral part of a healthy 3 diet and central to the prevention of obesity and chronic 4 diseases. The legislature also finds that every community 5 should have access to fresh and healthy dietary options, but the 6 high cost of fresh produce often makes that difficult. This 7 challenge is felt acutely by participants in the federal 8 supplemental nutrition assistance program, which serves a low-9 income population that struggles to afford healthy food.

10 The legislature further finds that according to a report 11 issued in 2023, thirty per cent of households in the State are 12 considered food insecure. Considering the effect of food 13 insecurity on people's health, this translates to over 14 \$800,000,000 in added annual health care costs for the State. 15 Due to the COVID-2019 pandemic and rising inflation, households 16 are also facing increasing food costs. Compared to the rest of

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the nation, households in the State spend one of the highest
 percentages of their annual budgets on food.

3 The legislature further finds that, through the national 4 Double Up Food Bucks Program, Hawaii has the opportunity to 5 expand access to healthy foods for low-income residents who are 6 eligible for supplemental nutrition assistance program benefits. 7 Currently implemented in more than twenty-five states, the 8 Double Up Food Bucks Program provides matching federal grant 9 funds to state programs that incentivize the use of supplemental 10 nutrition assistance program benefits for the purchase of fresh 11 produce. Provided by both the United States Department of 12 Agriculture National Institute of Food and Agriculture and the 13 United States Department of Agriculture food insecurity 14 nutrition incentive grants program, these federal matching funds 15 increase access to healthy dietary options while also 16 invigorating local economies and addressing food insecurity.

Act 153, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, created the Hawaii
healthy food incentive program, now commonly known as the DA BUX
double up food bucks program. The DA BUX double up food bucks
program began with a pilot program in 2012 by Kokua Kalihi
Valley Comprehensive Family Services on the island of Oahu and

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1 The Kohala Center on the island of Hawaii. The program provides 2 a dollar-for-dollar match to supplemental nutrition assistance 3 program beneficiaries who purchase locally grown fruits, 4 vegetables, and proteins at participating farmers' markets, 5 grocery stores, and community-supported agriculture projects. 6 As of 2023, the program was available at close to sixty food 7 retailers across over one hundred market sites and pick-up locations, including grocery stores, farmers' markets, 8 9 community-supported agriculture programs, and other farm direct 10 retailers.

11 DA BUX is referred to as a triple win for the State, as it 12 provides support for local families, local farmers, and the 13 local economy. From 2020 to 2021, DA BUX supported four hundred 14 seventy farm producers and eight distributors. Each dollar 15 reimbursed to participating DA BUX food retailers for their issued discounts on local produce has an economic multiplier of 16 2.1, meaning that each program dollar issued for local produce 17 18 incentives contributes \$2.10 to the State's economy. Additional 19 funding will allow the statewide program coordinator, led by The 20 Food Basket on the island of Hawaii, to obtain matching federal 21 funds for continued support of the program. For example, a

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
1 \$3,000,000 investment by the State in this program would allow 2 for a federal funding match that will contribute over 3 \$12,000,000 to the local economy annually.

4 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate 5 funds to the department of agriculture for the continued 6 administration of the Hawaii healthy food incentive program and 7 to provide matching funds to beneficiaries who participate in 8 the supplemental nutrition assistance program.

9 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 11 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and 12 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 13 year 2026-2027 for the continued administration of the Hawaii 14 healthy food incentive program and to provide matching funds to beneficiaries who participate in the supplemental nutrition 15 16 assistance program.

17 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department of agriculture for the purposes of this Act. 18

SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025. INTRODUCED BY: Mile Althouse
