A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL MEALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's working families face significant economic challenges, including the 2 3 rising cost of living, inflation, and limited affordable options for basic needs. Access to nutritious meals is essential for 4 the overall well-being of Hawaii's people. Further, for 5 6 students, access to healthy meals is critical to academic 7 success and achievement. However, for some students, school 8 meals may be their only consistent source of food.

9 The legislature also finds that Aloha United Way released the asset limited, income constrained, employed (ALICE) report 10 in January 2025, which identified that, while twelve per cent of 11 12 households in the State are below the poverty line, twenty-nine 13 per cent are identified as ALICE households. ALICE households are defined as households with incomes above the federal poverty 14 15 level but continue to struggle with the bare-minimum costs of 16 basic necessities such as housing, childcare, food,

17 transportation, health care, and a smartphone plan, plus taxes.

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1 The report also found that forty-six per cent of ALICE 2 households experience consistent food insecurity. 3 The legislature further finds that subsidizing the meal 4 costs for students whose family income is no more than three 5 hundred per cent of the federal poverty level will have the 6 benefit of providing support to families in need. Additionally, 7 subsidized meal costs for students will allow students to focus 8 on their academic careers, extracurricular activities, and life 9 goals. Meal subsidies at department of education schools will 10 allow more students to achieve a high-quality education while 11 ensuring adequate nutrition for physical development and mental 12 well-being. 13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to: 14 Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, expand free (1) school meal coverage to students who currently qualify 15

17 (2) Beginning with the 2026-2027 school year, expand free
18 school meal coverage to students whose family income
19 is no more than three hundred per cent of the federal

5	SECTION 2. Section 302A-404, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

7	"\$302A-404 School meals. (a) School meals shall be made		
8	available under the school meals program in every school where		
9	the students are required to eat meals at school.		
10	(b) Beginning with the 2025-2026 school year, students who		
11	qualify for reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch		
12	Program shall receive free school meals.		
13	(c) Beginning with the 2026-2027 school year, free school		
14	meals shall be provided to every student enrolled in a		
15	department school whose family income is no more than three		
16	hundred per cent of the federal poverty level, regardless of a		
17	student's eligibility for participation in the federal school		
18	meals program.		
19	[(b)] <u>(d)</u> No student shall be denied a meal solely for

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1 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 2 education for the purposes of this Act. 3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2026-2027 for 6 meal subsidies for students at department of education schools 7 whose family income is no more than three hundred per cent of 8 the federal poverty level. 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 10 education for the purposes of this Act. 11 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 13 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
