A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TOURISM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
3	"(b)	The civil service to which this chapter applies shall
4	comprise	all positions in the State now existing or hereafter
5	establish	ed and embrace all personal services performed for the
6	State, ex	cept the following:
7	(1)	Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii
8		National Guard and positions in the Hawaii National
9		Guard that are required by state or federal laws or
10		regulations or orders of the National Guard to be
11		filled from those commissioned or enlisted personnel;
12	(2)	Positions filled by persons employed by contract where
13		the director of human resources development has
14		certified that the service is special or unique or is
15		essential to the public interest and that, because of
16		circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel

to perform the service cannot be obtained through

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1		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any
2		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
3	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
4		with a court order or decree if the director
5		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
6		civil service procedures would result in delay or
7		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
8		decree;
9	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
10		or any committee thereof;
11	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
12		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
13		Washington Place;
14	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;

17		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
18		confirmed by the senate;
