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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that fifty years ago, 1 Act 82, Session Laws of Hawaii 1975, established an educational 2 non-profit public corporation to administer and operate what is 3 4 today known as the East-West center. The mission of the 5 East-West center is to benefit local residents and the State's international partners by strengthening the State's international 6 7 ties and advancing cooperation across the Pacific. It has been 8 an invaluable partner that is well suited to continuing to assist 9 the State in building partnerships, expanding economic development and education, and collaborating abroad. 10

11 The legislature further finds that strong sister-state, 12 sister-school, and similar relationships benefit the State's 13 businesses and economy, improve access to flights and 14 transportation, expand high school and college student 15 educational exchanges, broaden access to Pacific culture and 16 arts, preserve the State's relationships to the places of origin 17 of its immigrant communities, and spur sub-national government

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collaborations to address common priorities, including the 1 2 eradication of invasive species, promotion of economic development, advancement of clean energy, and preservation of 3 peace between nations. Further, it is appropriate for the State 4 to explore and take advantage of additional ways that Hawaii can 5 benefit from international partnerships, including generating 6 revenue abroad similar to many other jurisdictions. For example, 7 hosting facilities abroad for local farmers and retailers to more 8 9 easily sell Hawaii products in key markets, or investing in projects that generate a return. This enables direct financial 10 benefit that can create revenue to support Hawaii programs and 11 12 services without additional expense to local taxpayers.

13 The legislature also finds that international relations between East and West across the Pacific have been rapidly 14 changing. Additionally, previous generations of the State's key 15 16 community, business, and government leaders who have carefully 17 fostered and maintained these important relationships are 18 retiring or passing on. If local residents are going to 19 continue to benefit from the State's international ties, and if 20 Hawaii is going to take advantage of international business and 21 revenue opportunities abroad as so many other jurisdictions

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currently do, it is critical that the State adjust its engagement
 strategy, ensure continuity with its sister-state communities and
 partners, and plan for the future.

4 Therefore, the legislature finds that in celebration of the 5 fiftieth anniversary of the legislature's establishment of the 6 East-West center, the State must update its international 7 engagement strategy, and reaffirm its commitment to building and 8 maintaining the international partnerships that have benefitted 9 the State over the years, so they can continue to benefit local 10 residents for generations to come.

11 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:

12 (1) Engage local leaders with strong relationships abroad13 to support the governor and legislature in

14 strengthening international partnerships, by

15 redesignating the Hawaii sister-state committee as the

16 Hawaii sister-state and international partnerships

17 commission;

18 (2) Enable the East-West center to better help and
19 maintain the State's international relationships,

20 programs, and partnerships; and

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1 (3) Enable the State to more easily generate revenue from 2 international partnerships and investment as other 3 jurisdictions do, where appropriate. SECTION 2. Chapter 201, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 amended by adding two new sections to part I to be appropriately 6 designated and to read as follows: 7 "**§201- East-West center.** (a) The official designation 8 of the East-West center shall be the center for cultural and 9 technical interchange between East and West, Inc. 10 (b) The qualifying standards and conditions related to the 11 receipt of funds under chapter 42F shall not apply to funds received by the East-West center; provided that if the East-West 12 13 center contracts with a recipient or provider, then the 14 qualifying standards, conditions, and other provisions of 15 chapter 42F shall apply to the recipient or provider and the 16 contract. 17 (c) To receive state funds, the center for cultural and 18 technical interchange between East and West, Inc. shall: 19 (1) Be licensed or accredited, in accordance with federal, 20 state, or county statutes, rules, or ordinances, to

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1		conduct the activities or provide the services for
2		which state funds are appropriated;
3	(2)	Comply with all applicable federal and state laws
4		prohibiting discrimination against any person on the
5		basis of race, color, national origin, religion,
6		creed, sex, age, sexual orientation, or disability;
7	(3)	Agree not to use the funds for entertainment or
8		lobbying activities;
9	(4)	Be incorporated under the laws of the State;
10	(5)	Have bylaws or policies that describe the manner in
11		which the activities or services for which a grant is
12		awarded shall be conducted or provided;
13	(6)	Have been determined and designated to be a tax-exempt
14		organization by the Internal Revenue Service; and
15	(7)	Have a governing board whose members shall have no
16		material conflict of interest and serve without
17		compensation.
18	(d)	The comptroller and state auditor may examine the use
19	of funds	appropriated to the center for cultural and technical
20	interchan	ge between East and West, Inc.

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1	(e) The allocation of state support shall not impinge on
2	the autonomy of the center for cultural and technical
3	interchange between East and West, Inc., nor imply state control
4	over its programs or policies, except as provided in this
5	section.
6	(f) The center for cultural and technical interchange
7	between East and West, Inc. shall submit to the legislature an
8	annual report no later than twenty days prior to the convening
9	of each regular session, which shall include an explanation of
10	the facility maintenance and other functions accomplished by
11	state fund expenditures in the previous fiscal year."
12	SECTION 3. Section 201-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
14	"(b) The office shall:
15	(1) Develop policies that promote and strengthen relations
16	with other countries in the areas of international
17	business, economy, culture, and the arts;
18	(2) Develop policies that promote transportation between,
19	and tourism with, other countries;
20	(3) Develop and promote international telecommunications
21	and high technology exchanges;

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1	(4)	Encourage the development of international sister-city
2		programs, pairing Hawaii cities with cities around the
3		globe for artistic, cultural, economic, educational,
4		and faith-based exchanges;
5	(5)	Develop and promote Hawaii as the economic, trade,
6		commerce, transportation, banking, and tourism hub of
7		the Pacific;
8	(6)	Develop an international affairs and peace education
9		curriculum that includes studies of international
10		affairs and peace initiatives and takes a proactive,
11		strategic approach to the development of policies that
12		promote the prevention of national and international
13		conflict, nonviolent intervention, mediation, peaceful
14		resolution of conflict, and structured mediation of
15		conflict; [and]
16	(7)	Provide for exchanges of individuals between Hawaii
17		and other nations to develop international and
18		<pre>peace-based initiatives[+]; and</pre>
19	(8)	Provide support to the Hawaii sister-state and
20		international partnerships commission."

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1	SECTI	ION 4. Section 201-81, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to	o read as follows:
3	"§201	-81 Establishment of out-of-state offices; purposes.
4	The depart	ment of business, economic development, and tourism
5	may establ	ish and operate offices and facilities in out-of-state
6	locations,	including foreign nations, to effectuate the
7	following	purposes:
8	(1)	Develop programs to reach targeted companies or
9		industries in the respective area and surrounding
10		regions;
11	(2)	Monitor out-of-state government policies and
12		regulations that have an impact on business, markets,
13		sales, tourism, and related activities;
14	(3)	Host government and business officials at conferences,
15		meetings and social occasions, or other events on
16		matters pertaining to business opportunities and
17		attraction of investments for the State;
18	(4)	Develop and conduct advertising efforts, promotional
19		events, media coverage, and educational programs
20		regarding commerce in the State; [and]

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1	(5)	Conduct related operations as needed, [such as]
2		including hiring or contracting for consultants[+];
3	(6)	Support sister-state, -province, and other
4		partnerships that promote and enrich the people,
5		cultures, environments, and economies of the State and
6		its international partners; and
7	(7)	Generate revenue for the State."
8	SECT	ION 5. Section 201-82, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended t	o read as follows:
10	"§20	1-82 Powers of the department. The department,
11	subject t	o the approval of the director of budget and finance,
12	shall hav	e the following general powers to operate out-of-state
13	offices <u>a</u>	nd facilities established:
14	(1)	To enter into contracts, leases, or cooperative
15		agreements, or perform other transactions with any
16		person, firm, partnership, association, company,
17		corporation, or foreign nation, as may be necessary in
18		the conduct of its business and on [such] <u>any</u> terms as
19		the department may deem appropriate, using competitive
20		procurement practices, to the extent practicable, in
21		accordance with rules adopted by the policy board;

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1	(2)	To establish operational bank accounts in out-of-state
2		locations, including foreign denomination accounts, as
3		may be necessary in the conduct of its business,
4		notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 38;
5	(3)	To receive by gifts, grants, devises, bequests, or
6		otherwise from private sources or a foreign nation,
7		any property, real, personal, or mixed, intangible or
8		tangible, absolutely or in trust, to be used and
9		disposed of, either the principal or the income
10		therefrom, in accordance with the conditions under
11		which it was received;
12	(4)	To <u>buy,</u> sell, lease, rent, hold, maintain, use, and
13		operate any property, real, personal, or mixed,
14		tangible or intangible, in accordance with the
15		conditions under which it was received;
16	(5)	To hire such personnel as may be necessary in the
17		conduct of its business and on [such] <u>any</u> terms as the
18		department may deem appropriate; and
19	(6)	To do any or all other acts reasonably necessary to
20		carry out the objects and purposes of this part,
21		provided that the department shall not obligate any

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1	funds of the State not appropriated to the

3	SECTION 6. Section 229-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
4	amended to read as follows:		
5	"[[]§229-2[]] Hawaii sister-state [committee] <u>and</u>		
6	international partnerships commission. [{(a)}- There shall be		
7	established the Hawaii sister-state committee, to be placed		
8	within the department of business, economic development, and		
9	tourism for administrative purposes only, consisting of five		
10	members appointed by the governor as provided in section 26-34.		
11	The purpose of the committee shall be to advise the		
12	governor and the legislature on matters relating to sister-state		
13	or province relations and relations, in general, between the		
14	State and the states or provinces of foreign countries.		
15	{ (b) } The governor shall appoint five members, one member		
16	from each of five lists of nominees submitted respectively by		
17	the following:		
18	(1) Speaker of the house of representatives;		
19	(2) President of the senate;		
20	(3) Native-Hawaiian-cultural-organization;		
21	(4) East-West Center; and		

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1	-(5) Hawaii State Association of Counties.
2	A chair and vice chair of the committee shall be appointed
3	by the committee members from among themselves. Members shall
4	serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses,
5	including travel expenses, necessary for the performance of
6	their duties.]
7	(a) There is established within the department of
8	business, economic development, and tourism for administrative
9	purposes only the Hawaii sister-state and international
10	partnerships commission.
11	(b) The commission shall support the governor,
12	legislature, and office of international affairs in building and
13	maintaining strategic long-term sister-state, -province, and
14	other partnerships that promote and enrich the people, cultures,
15	environments, and economies of the State and its international
16	partners.
17	(c) The commission shall consist of the following members:
18	(1) Three members appointed by the governor, with the
19	advice and consent of the Senate; provided that two of
20	the three members appointed by the governor shall be

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1		from a list of at least three nominees submitted
2		respectively by the:
3		(A) Office of Hawaiian affairs; and
4		(B) East-West center;
5	(2)	One member appointed by the president of the senate;
6	(3)	One member appointed by the speaker of the house of
7		representatives; and
8	(4)	The chairs of the respective senate and house
9		committees with jurisdiction over international
10		affairs who shall serve as ex-officio, non-voting
11		members of the commission.
12	(d)	The commission shall elect from among its members a
13	chairpers	on and vice-chairperson.
14	<u>(e)</u>	Members of the commission shall serve without
15	compensat	ion but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including
16	travel ex	penses, necessary for the performance of their duties."
17	SECT	ION 7. Section 229-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18	amended t	o read as follows:
19	"[+]	§229-3[]] Initiating sister-state relationships . The
20	Hawaii si	ster-state [committee] and international partnerships
21	<u>commissio</u>	${\tt \underline{n}}$ shall evaluate and develop recommendations for the



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1 initiation of all sister-state or province relationships and 2 forward its recommendation to the legislature. The legislature, 3 if it so chooses, shall implement the recommendation to initiate 4 a sister-state or province relationship by either adopting a 5 concurrent resolution or by enacting session law to that 6 effect."

7 SECTION 8. Section 229-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is8 amended to read as follows:

9 "[f]§229-4[f] Maintaining sister-state relationships. The
10 Hawaii sister-state [committee] and international partnerships
11 commission shall periodically evaluate established sister-state
12 relationships and forward its recommendations on maintaining
13 sister-state relationships to the governor and to the
14 legislature."

15 SECTION 9. Section 229-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended to read as follows:

17 "[f]\$229-5[f] Dissolving sister-state relationships. The 18 Hawaii sister-state [committee] and international partnerships 19 commission may make a recommendation to terminate a sister-state 20 relationship it deems to be defunct, moribund, or not beneficial 21 and forward its recommendation to the legislature. The

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legislature, if it so chooses, shall implement the
 recommendation to terminate a sister-state relationship either
 by adopting a concurrent resolution or by enacting session law
 to that effect."

SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general
revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
year 2026-2027 for the office of international affairs to
develop an:

11 (1) Updated strategy for the State's international 12 engagement in the twenty-first century; and

13 (2) Analysis of potential investment and revenue14 generation abroad.

15 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 16 of business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes 17 of this Act.

18 SECTION 11. There is appropriated out of the general 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and 21 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal

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year 2026-2027 for the East-West center to assist in the 1 2 development and maintenance of the State's international relationships, programs, and partnerships. 3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the university 4 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act. 5 6 SECTION 12. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 7 8 SECTION 13. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
