A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE COCONUT TREE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that coconut palms, cocos
- 2 nucifera, or niu in Hawaiian, are a significant and
- 3 underutilized natural resource in Hawaii. The species has grown
- 4 in Hawaii for thousands of years and is considered a naturalized
- 5 Polynesian canoe plant.
- 6 The legislature further finds that the coconut palm is one
- 7 of the most useful plants in the world. Early Hawaiians were
- 8 able to repurpose almost every part of the tree, including using
- 9 it for food and emergency drinking water, using the oil from the
- 10 meat as cosmetics for skin and hair, and using the shells to
- 11 make kitchenware, like spoons, cups, bowls, and containers.
- 12 Additionally, leaves and husks were used to create cordage,
- 13 baskets, and roofing thatch, among other goods. The trunks were
- 14 also used for house construction, canoe building, and drums.
- The legislature notes that pursuant to section 226-7,
- 16 Hawaii Revised Statutes, it is the policy of the State to
- 17 encourage agriculture by making the best use of natural



- 1 resources, enhance agricultural growth by providing public
- 2 incentives and encouraging private initiatives, and promote
- 3 economically competitive activities that increase Hawaii's
- 4 agricultural self-sufficiency. Additionally, the legislature
- 5 believes that increased food security and self-sufficiency are
- 6 priorities for the State. However, the legislature finds that
- 7 many of the coconut palm's edible products, including its water
- 8 and meat, are not being maximized for food security and local
- 9 food systems, nor is the coconut palm being maximized for
- 10 agricultural production. As a result, there is limited
- 11 promotion of the coconut palm for public health, agricultural
- 12 policies, and food assistance programs.
- 13 The legislature recognizes that categorizing coconut palms
- 14 as a sustainable staple food source could encourage local
- 15 agricultural production and cultivation. Formal recognition as
- 16 a food source is also an important first step in maximizing the
- 17 coconut palm's utilization as a natural resource.
- 18 The legislature also finds that coconut palms thrive in
- 19 Hawaii's tropical climate and are abundant, providing an
- 20 excellent opportunity for economic development in the State.
- 21 Recognizing the coconut palm as a food source will support local

- 1 coconut farmers, processors, and businesses and encourage the
- 2 growth of new industries and markets for coconut-based products.
- 3 The legislature further finds that the coconut palm is an
- 4 enduring symbol of Native Hawaiian culture, deeply embedded in
- 5 traditional practices, language, and community life.
- 6 Historically, the coconut palm provided essential materials for
- 7 shelter, tools, and weaving, and was revered for its spiritual
- 8 significance in Native Hawaiian traditions. Beyond its
- 9 practical uses, the coconut tree represents resilience and
- 10 sustainability, preserves cultural heritage, revitalizes
- 11 indigenous knowledge, and reinforces Hawaii's sense of place.
- 12 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to recognize the
- 13 coconut palm as a culturally significant plant and sustainable
- 14 staple food source in Hawaii.
- 15 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 16 adding a new chapter to title 12, subtitle 6, to be
- 17 appropriately designated and to read as follows:
- 18 "CHAPTER
- 19 COCONUT PALM
- 20 § -1 Coconut palm; cultural significance. The coconut
- 21 palm (cocos nucifera), or niu in Hawaiian, is established,

- 1 designated, and recognized as a culturally significant plant in
- 2 the State."
- 3 SECTION 3. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 5 and to read as follows:
- 6 "S141- Coconut palm; sustainable staple food source.
- 7 The coconut palm (cocos nucifera), or niu in Hawaiian, is
- 8 established, designated, and recognized as a sustainable staple
- 9 food source in the State."
- 10 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
