#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO JOURNALISM.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in today's rapidly
- 2 evolving media landscape, the need for ethical standards in
- 3 journalism has never been more urgent. The rise of social
- 4 media, deepfake technologies, and generative AI has amplified
- 5 the spread of misinformation, posing new challenges for
- 6 journalism and public trust. Pew Research data shows a
- 7 significant decline in public confidence in media, underscoring
- 8 the importance of fostering transparency and accountability
- 9 through ethical journalistic practices. Traditional journalism,
- 10 though valuable, often falls short in addressing the ethical
- 11 dilemmas presented by emerging technologies. The legislature
- 12 believes that strengthening ethical standards for media outlets
- 13 will enable the State to combat misinformation, rebuild trust,
- 14 protect the privacy of citizens, and equip them with the
- 15 necessary tools to adapt to the digital age.

This chapter shall apply to all 2 news media outlets operating within the State, including 3 traditional print, broadcast, and digital media; provided that independent journalists and bloggers with a readership of fewer than 10,000 per month shall be exempt from this chapter. 5 6 -2 Definitions. As used in this chapter: "Board" or "review board" means the journalistic ethics 7 8 review board. 9 "Commission" means the journalistic ethics commission. 10 "Department" means the department of commerce and consumer 11 affairs. "Journalistic code of ethics" means the code of ethics and 12 13 other standards of conduct described in section 14 "Small news media outlet" means a news media outlet: 15 Headquartered in the State; (1) Doing business in the State for not less 16 (2) 17 than years; and 18 Employing or more residents with income subject (3) 19 to taxation pursuant to chapter 235.

composition; duties. (a) There is established within the

- 1 department a journalistic ethics commission. The commission
- 2 shall consist of members to be appointed or removed by the
- 3 governor as provided in section 26-34; provided that the
- 4 commission shall include at least:
- 5 (1) One member who is a professor of journalism from the
- 6 university of Hawaii school of communication and
- 7 information;
- 8 (2) One member representing print media;
- 9 (3) One member representing broadcast television;

- 9 be responsible for determining the news, opinion, feature, and

3	SECTION 3. (a) The board of regents shall conduct an
4	analysis of the degree requirements for a bachelor of arts in
5	journalism at the university of Hawaii at Manoa college of
6	social sciences to determine:
7	(1) The validity and effectiveness of the credit hours of
8	ethics currently required for one to earn a bachelor
9	of arts in journalism; and
10	(2) Whether more credit hours of ethics should be
11	required.
12	(b) The board of regents shall submit a report of its
13	findings and recommendations regarding their analysis, including
14	any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than
15	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of
16	2026.

#### Report Title:

#### Description:

Establishes a Journalistic Ethics Commission within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Establishes a Journalistic Code of Ethics. Requires news media outlets to provide training in the ethics of journalism to journalists and editors in their employ. Establishes a Journalistic Ethics Review Board to be administratively attached to the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs. Requires the Journalistic Ethics Review Board to handle complaints and appeals regarding violations of the Journalistic Code of Ethics. Requires the Journalistic Ethics Commission to submit annual reports to the Legislature. Establishes penalties for violations. Requires the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii to conduct an analysis of the journalism program at the University of Hawaii at Manoa College of Social Sciences. Requires the Board of Regents to report to the Legislature.

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
