## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 5	SECTION	1.	Chapter	264,	Hawaii	Revised	Statutes,	is
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- 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 3 and to read as follows:
- 4 "§264- National Association of City Transportation
- 5 Officials' standards; American Association of State Highway and
- 6 Transportation Officials' standards. (a) When planning and
- 7 managing state highways, in areas where state highways bisect
- 8 communities with residential areas and commercial areas
- 9 immediately along a highway, design features and speeds shall be
- 10 determined by the National Association of City Transportation
- 11 Officials' standards, which are better suited for lower speed
- 12 urban and rural communities.
- 13 (b) In areas where state highways do not bisect
- 14 communities with residential areas and commercial areas
- 15 immediately along a highway, design features and speeds shall be
- 16 determined by American Association of State Highway and

3	SECTION 2. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
4	amended by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately					
5	designated and to read as follows:

15		and injuries on the State's roadways;				
16	<u>(3)</u>	Examine vehicle weight, registration, and other				
17		related taxes or fees throughout the United States;				
18	(4)	Examine and identify communities and areas where there				
19		is a single ingress or egress, or otherwise limited				
20		access, that may create risk to communities during				
21		emergencies;				

I	<u>(5)</u>	Develop proposals for minimal emergency ingress and
2		egress routes that shall be accessible to vehicles as
3		one-way exit routes during emergencies or extreme
4		congestion where emergency services may be jeopardized
5		but may be available for pedestrian, bicycle, or
6		similar access;
7	(6)	Prioritize proposals for emergency egress routes in
8		areas with significant populations of Asset Limited,
9		Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE) households, as
10		well as communities and households experiencing high
11		levels of poverty. Consideration shall be given to
12		data from sources such as the United Way ALICE report;
13		United States Census Bureau American Community Survey;
14		Hawaii household data from the United States
15		Department of Housing and Urban Development and
16		department of business, economic development, and
17		tourism; tax and social services data; geographic
18		information system mapping; economic studies; and any
19		other relevant data sources; and

- 16 SECTION 3. Chapter 291C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended as follows:
- 18 1. By adding a new section to part I to be appropriately

- 20 "§291C-A Safe routes to school advisory committee;
- 21 automated speed enforcement systems; school zones. (a) The



- 1 safe routes to school advisory committee, in coordination with
- 2 the department of transportation, shall identify ten of the
- 3 most-dangerous school zones in the State based on fatality,
- 4 injury, and crash data since January 1, 2014, and any outreach
- 5 and complaints from schools and the surrounding community, where
- 6 feasible on an annual basis.
- 7 (b) The department of transportation or county
- 8 transportation agencies may install additional automated speed
- 9 enforcement systems pursuant to chapter 291L, at school zone
- 10 locations that the safe routes to school advisory committee
- 11 identifies as dangerous; provided that any enforcement system
- 12 shall be positioned no more than two hundred feet from the

- 14 citations shall not be issued for any automated speed

1 SECTION 5. Chapter 291L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "\$291L- Expansion of program; impact on courts. Any 5 expansion of the automated speed enforcement systems program 6 shall account for its impact on the district courts statewide 7 and provide up to twelve months from the time an area is 8 selected for installation of an automated speed enforcement 9 system pursuant to section 291C-A for the judiciary to 10 collaborate with the department before implementing any 11 expansion of the program." 12 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 13 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and 14 15 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 16 year 2026-2027 for the department of transportation to coordinate with the metropolitan planning organizations for 17 18 training and education for all levels of government focused on 19 traffic safety, multimodal and pedestrian infrastructure, and 20 other priorities as may be appropriate.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 6 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 7 year 2026-2027 for the department of transportation to
- 8 effectuate the purposes of this Act.
- 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 10 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 13 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 14 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 15 year 2026-2027 to update the judiciary's information management
- 16 system to pull data from law enforcement traffic citations and
- 17 transfer the data into court records.
- 18 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the judiciary
- 19 for the purposes of this Act.
- 20 SECTION 9. If any provision of this Act, or the
- 21 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held

- 1 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
- 2 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
- 3 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
- 4 of this Act are severable.
- 5 SECTION 10. This Act does not affect rights and duties
- 6 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
- 7 were begun before its effective date.
- 8 SECTION 11. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 9 3 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 10 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 11 the new sections in this Act.
- 12 SECTION 12. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 13. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

## Report Title:

DOT; State Highway Safety and Modernization Council; Safe Routes to Schools Advisory Committee; Annual Reports; District Courts; Appropriations

## Description:

Requires, when planning and managing state highways, in certain areas to be determined by certain national standards. Establishes requirements for the State Highway Safety and Modernization Council. Authorizes the State Highway Safety and Modernization Council to select potential areas for the Department of Transportation to install additional photo red light imaging detector systems. Prohibits any vehicles from blocking marked crosswalks. Authorizes the Department of Transportation to implement additional automated speed enforcement systems in school zones as designated by the Safe Routes to School Advisory Committee. Requires annual reports. Requires the Department of Transportation to collaborate with the Judiciary before any expansion of the photo red light imaging detector and automated speed enforcement systems. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD3)
