A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENERGY ASSISTANCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's electricity
2	rates are among the highest in the nation, close to three times
3	the national average, and vary based on the availability of
4	renewable resources, power plants, fuel costs, and pricing
5	regulations. The 2022 report commissioned by the Aloha United
6	Way, "ALICE in Hawaii: 2022 Facts and Figures", states that
7	forty-four per cent of households in the State live below the
8	ALICE (asset limited, income constrained, employed) threshold,
9	meaning that almost half of all families in the State are
10	struggling to make ends meet, even though they are employed.
11	The number of electric utility customers in arrears and facing
12	disconnection is higher than before the COVID-19 pandemic, with
13	thousands of customers collectively owing millions of dollars.
14	In addition, electricity needs are expected to increase due to
15	rising climate temperatures and associated home cooling needs.
16	In 2022, the legislature adopted Senate Concurrent
17	Resolution No. 242, S.D. 1 (2022), which requested the public

- 1 utilities commission, in collaboration with the department of
- 2 commerce and consumer affairs' division of consumer advocacy, to
- 3 convene a working group to create a Hawaii low-income home
- 4 energy assistance program (LIHEAP). As noted in a December 2022
- 5 report to the legislature submitted by the public utilities
- 6 commission, the federal LIHEAP administered by the United States
- 7 Department of Health and Human Services, a program designed to
- 8 provide energy assistance to families, served fewer than nine
- 9 thousand households in Hawaii in 2020, or about two per cent of
- 10 the State's population potentially eligible for energy
- 11 assistance based on income. The State received the lowest
- 12 amount of federal funding for federal LIHEAP of all states in
- 13 fiscal year 2021-2022. According to estimates from the National
- 14 Energy and Utility Affordability Coalition, Hawaii received 0.14
- 15 per cent of federal LIHEAP funds in fiscal year 2021-2022,
- 16 roughly half of the next-lowest state. Funding for states is
- 17 based on a formula developed in 1984 that inherently favors
- 18 states with large heating needs and does not consider specific
- 19 electricity prices within states.
- The legislature further finds that, in addition to the
- 21 limited financial assistance available through the United States

2	program,	the public benefits fee administrator of the public	
3	utilities commission plays a vital role in ensuring that all		
4	available	state and federal benefits and rebate programs are	
5	being utilized by providing opportunities and solutions for		
6	Hawaii residents and businesses to save money and energy. The		
7	legislature also finds that the State must commit to providing		
8	assistance to low-income households that are directly impacted		
9	by the high cost of electricity.		
10	Acco	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to:	
11	(1)	Establish a Hawaii home energy assistance program to	
12		allow the department of human services to assist	
13		eligible households with payment costs associated with	
14		meeting an eligible household's home energy needs; and	
15	(2)	Require the public benefits fee administrator of the	
16		public utilities commission to provide valuable	
17		information and assistance to recipients of the Hawaii	
18		home energy assistance program and assist the	
19		recipients with implementation of energy assistance	
20		improvements.	

1	SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
2	amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately	
3	designated and to read as follows:	
4	"§346- Hawaii home energy assistance program;	
5	established. (a) There is established within the department	
6	the Hawaii home energy assistance program. Subject to the	
7	availability of program funds, the program may assist eligible	
8	households with payment of costs associated with meeting an	
9	eligible household's home energy needs.	
10	(b) Any person who is in need of public assistance may	
11	submit an application in a form prescribed by the department	
12	that includes, at a minimum, documentation to prove that the	
13	person:	
14	(1) Is a resident of the State;	
15	(2) Has an active energy utility account in the State; and	
16	(3) Satisfies the income limit and all other eligibility	
17	standards established by the department pursuant to	
18	subsection (d).	
19	(c) The public utilities commission public benefits fee	
20	administrator, in consultation with the department, shall	
21	provide information and technical assistance about available	

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energy efficiency programs to recipients, including an energy 2 audit at the request of a recipient, and assist recipients with 3 implementation of energy efficiency improvements in accordance 4 with section 269-123(b). 5 (d) The department shall adopt rules pursuant to 6 chapter 91 for purposes of this section." 7 SECTION 3. Section 269-123, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 9 "(b) The public benefits fee administrator's duties and 10 responsibilities shall be established by the public utilities 11 commission by rule or order, and may include: 12 (1)Identifying, developing, administering, promoting, 13 implementing, and evaluating programs, methods, and 14 technologies that support energy-efficiency and 15 demand-side management programs; 16 (2) Encouraging the continuance or improvement of 17 efficiencies made in the production, delivery, and use 18 of energy-efficiency and demand-side management 19 programs and services;

2		that have developed or may develop in the State and
3		consulting with state agency experts;
4	(4)	Promoting program initiatives, incentives, and market
5		strategies that address the needs of persons facing
6		the most significant barriers to participation;
7	(5)	Promoting coordinated program delivery, including
8		coordination with electric public utilities regarding
9		the delivery of low-income home energy assistance,
10		other demand-side management or energy-efficiency
11		programs, and any utility programs;
12	(6)	Consideration of innovative approaches to delivering
13		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services,
14		including strategies to encourage third-party
15		financing and customer contributions to the cost of
16		demand-side management and energy-efficiency services;
17	(7)	Submitting, to the public utilities commission for
18		review and approval, a multi-year budget and planning
19		cycle that promotes program improvement, program
20		stability, and maturation of programs and delivery
21		resources; [and]

(3) Using the energy-efficiency expertise and capabilities

1	(8)	Educating and training appliance manufacturers,
2		distributors, and retailers of appliances covered
3		under part VI of chapter 196 about the appliance
4		efficiency standards established under that part to
5		improve compliance[.]; and
6	<u>(9)</u>	Providing information and technical assistance about
7		available energy efficiency programs to recipients of
8		the Hawaii home energy assistance program, including
9		an energy audit if requested by the recipient, and
10		assisting the recipients with implementation of energy
11		efficiency improvements."
12	SECT	ION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
13	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
14	much there	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
15	the same	sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
16	year 2026	-2027 to:
17	(1)	Establish full-time equivalent (FTE)
18		position and full-time equivalent (FTE)
19		temporary positions;
20	(2)	Make system modifications; and
21	(3)	Contract services as may be necessary,

- 2 assistance program established pursuant to section 2 of this

- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.
