A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's climate,
- 2 with a year-round growing season and ample rain in many areas,
- 3 has several potential advantages for growing plant-based
- 4 materials that can be processed into structural building
- 5 materials. For example, with sufficient water, there are types
- 6 of clumping bamboo that can grow very rapidly and be processed
- 7 into building materials that are stronger, more flexible, and
- 8 lighter than timber or steel and can be made more fire- and
- 9 termite-resistant than wood. "Hempcrete" developed from
- 10 industrial hemp can substitute for building blocks.
- 11 "Biocements" produced from cyanobacteria (blue-green algae or
- 12 "pond scum") can substitute for Portland cement.
- 13 The legislature further finds that these and other
- 14 plant-based building materials could bring green agriculture
- 15 jobs to Hawaii and help the State meet its net negative carbon
- 16 and greenhouse gas goals, as these plant-based building
- 17 materials sequester carbon, whereas production of traditional

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- building materials such as timber, steel, and cement emit verylarge amounts of greenhouse gases.
- 3 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish a
- 4 working group to study how best to grow plants, develop plant-
- 5 based building materials in Hawaii, and provide green jobs,
- 6 while sequestering carbon and other greenhouse gases to help
- 7 reach the State's climate target.
- 8 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a plant-based
- 9 building materials working group to study how best to grow
- 10 plants for development of plant-based building materials in
- 11 Hawaii and provide green agricultural jobs while sequestering
- 12 carbon and other greenhouse gases to help achieve the State's
- 13 climate target.
- 14 (b) The working group shall consist of the following:
- 15 (1) The dean and director of the university of Hawaii at
- 16 Manoa college of tropical agriculture and human
- 17 resources or their designee, who shall serve as
- 18 chairperson;
- 19 (2) Four individuals who have expertise in growing or
- 20 producing plant-based building materials, to be
- invited by the chairperson;

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1	(3)	The director of the university of Hawaii at Hilo
2		college of agriculture, forestry, and natural resource
3		management, or their designee;
4	(4)	The chairperson of the board of agriculture, or their
5		designee;
6	(5)	The coordinator of the Hawaii climate change
7		mitigation and adaptation commission;
8	(6)	An expert in building materials, who the chairperson
9		shall invite in consultation with the General
10		Contractors Association of Hawaii; and
11	(7)	Additional members with appropriate specialized
12		expertise, as recommended by the members of the
13		working group, at the discretion of the chairperson.
14	(c)	Members of the working group shall serve without
15	compensati	ion, but shall be reimbursed for reasonable expenses
16	incurred,	including travel expenses. No member of the working
17	group sha	ll be made subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised
18	Statutes,	solely because of that member's participation as a
19	member of	the working group.
20	(d)	The working group shall submit a report of its
21	findings	and recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to

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- 1 the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening
- 2 of the regular session of 2027.
- 3 (e) The working group shall be dissolved on January 14,
- 4 2027.
- 5 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
