A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 386, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is									
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated									
3	and to read as follows:									
4	"§386- Compensation for first responders suffering from									
5	post-trau	matic stress disorder. (a) Notwithstanding any law to								
6	the contr	ary, a claim of post-traumatic stress disorder suffered								
7	by a firs	t responder shall be compensable under this chapter if:								
8	(1)	The post-traumatic stress disorder is demonstrated by								
9		clear and convincing evidence;								
10	(2)	The post-traumatic stress disorder resulted from the								
11		first responder acting within the course and scope of								
12		the first responder's employment; and								
13	(3)	The first responder is examined and subsequently								
14		diagnosed with post-traumatic stress disorder by a								
15		psychiatrist licensed under chapter 453 or a								
16		psychologist, and the psychiatrist or psychologist								

1	<u>dete</u> :	determines that the post-traumatic stress disorder is									
2	due 1	due to one or more of the following:									
3	(A)	Seeing for oneself a deceased minor;									
4	<u>(B)</u>	Directly witnessing the death of a minor;									
5	<u>(C)</u>	Directly witnessing an injury to a minor who									
6		subsequently died before or upon arrival at a									
7		hospital emergency department;									
8	(D)	Participating in the physical treatment of an									
9		injured minor who subsequently died before or									
10		upon arrival at a hospital emergency department;									
11	(E)	Manually transporting an injured minor who									
12		subsequently died before or upon arrival at a									
13		hospital emergency department;									
14	<u>(F)</u>	Seeing for oneself a decedent whose death									
15		involved grievous bodily harm of a nature that									
16		shocks the conscience;									
17	<u>(G)</u>	Directly witnessing a death, including suicide,									
18		that involved grievous bodily harm of a nature									
19		that shocks the conscience;									

1	<u>(H)</u>	Directly witnessing the killing of one person by						
2		another, regardless of whether the act was						
3		criminal or excusable, including:						
4		(i) A mass killing as defined in 28 U.S.C.						
5		section 530C(b)(1)(M); and						
6		(ii) Murder in the first degree, murder in the						
7		second degree, manslaughter, negligent						
8		homicide in the first degree, and negligent						
9		homicide in the second degree, as those						
10	,	crimes are defined in chapter 707;						
11	<u>(I)</u>	Directly witnessing an injury, including by						
12		attempted suicide, to a person who subsequently						
13		died before or upon arrival at a hospital						
14		emergency department if the person was injured by						
15		grievous bodily harm of a nature that shocks the						
16		conscience;						
17	<u>(J)</u>	Participating in the physical treatment of an						
18		injury, including by attempted suicide, to a						
19		person who subsequently died before or upon						
20		arrival at a hospital emergency department if the						



1			person was injured by grievous bodily harm of a				
2			nature that shocks the conscience; or				
3		(K)	Manually transporting a person who was injured,				
4			including by attempted suicide, and who				
5	,		subsequently died before or upon arrival at a				
6			hospital emergency department if the person was				
7			injured by grievous bodily harm of a nature that				
8			shocks the conscience.				
9	(b)	Elig	ibility for benefits for a first responder under				
10	this sect	ion s	hall not require a physical injury to the first				
11	responder.						
12	<u>(c)</u>	For	the purpose of subsection (a)(2), a first				
13	responder	is n	ot acting in the course and scope of the first				
14	responder	's em	ployment if the first responder is:				
15	<u>(1)</u>	Off	duty; or				
16	(2)	Outs	ide the jurisdiction of the first responder's				
17		empl	oyer.				
18	(d)	An a	gency that employs a first responder, including a				
19	first res	ponde	r who serves as a volunteer, shall provide				
20	education	al tr	aining related to the awareness, prevention,				
21	mitigatio	n, an	d treatment of mental health issues.				

1 (e) The director shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 2 that specify the injuries that qualify as grievous bodily harm 3 of a nature that shocks the conscience. 4 (f) If any other part of this chapter conflicts with this 5 section, this section shall control. 6 (q) As used in this section: "Directly witness" means to see or hear for oneself. 7 8 "Emergency medical attendant" means a person employed by an 9 emergency ambulance service to provide emergency medical services, including emergency medical service personnel who are 10 licensed under part II of chapter 453. 11 12 "Firefighter" means a person who works for a state or county agency whose principal duties are to prevent and fight 13 fires. "Firefighter" includes a volunteer firefighter as that 14 term is defined in section 386-181(a). 15 16 "First responder" means: 17 (1) A firefighter; (2) A law enforcement officer; 18 19 (3) An emergency medical attendant;

1	(4)	An emergency dispatcher or call taker who is employed
2		by a law enforcement or public safety agency in the
3		State;
4	(5)	A crime scene investigator who is employed by a law
5		enforcement or public safety agency in the State;
6	(6)	A forensic investigator who is employed by a law
7		enforcement or public safety agency in the State; or
8	(7)	A coroner or medical examiner who is employed by a
9		state or county agency.
10	<u>"Law</u>	enforcement officer" means a sheriff or deputy
11	sheriff,	a police officer, an enforcement officer within the
12	division	of conservation and resources enforcement of the
13	departmen	t of land and natural resources, a special agent of the
14	departmen	t of the attorney general, and any other public servant
15	vested by	law with a duty to maintain public order, make arrests
16	for offen	ses, or enforce criminal laws, whether that duty
17	extends t	o all offenses or is limited to a specific class of
18	offenses.	"Law enforcement officer" includes police chaplains,
19	reserve p	olice officers, reserve public safety law enforcement
20	officers,	sheriffs' chaplains, volunteer boating enforcement



- 1 officers, and volunteer conservation and resources enforcement
- 2 officers as those terms are defined in section 386-181(a).
- 3 "Manually transporting" means to perform physical labor to
- 4 move the body of a wounded person for the wounded person's
- 5 safety or medical treatment.
- 6 "Post-traumatic stress disorder" means post-traumatic
- 7 stress disorder as described in the Fifth Edition of the
- 8 Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, published
- 9 by the American Psychiatric Association."
- 10 SECTION 2. Section 386-82, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- 12 "§386-82 Claim for compensation; limitation of time. (a)
- 13 The right to compensation under this chapter shall be barred
- 14 unless a written claim therefor is made to the director of labor
- 15 and industrial relations[+]:[+]
- 16 (1) Within two years after the date at which the effects
- of the injury for which the employee is entitled to
- 18 compensation have become manifest; and
- 19 (2) Within five years after the date of the accident or
- 20 occurrence which caused the injury.

1	<u>(b)</u>	The [foregoing] limitations of time described in								
2	subsection	n (a) shall not apply to a claim for injury [caused]:								
3	(1)	<pre>Caused by compressed air [or due];</pre>								
4	(2)	<u>Due</u> to occupational exposure to, or contact with,								
5		arsenic, asbestos, benzol, beryllium, zirconium,								
6	cadmium, chrome, lead, fluorine, or other mineral or									
7	substance with carcinogenic properties, as									
8		incorporated in the Hawaii Occupational Safety and								
9		Health Standards[, or];								
10	(3)	Due to exposure to X-rays, radium, ionizing radiation,								
11		or radioactive substances $[\tau]$; or								
12	(4)	Due to post-traumatic stress disorder under section								
13		386- ,								
14	but [such]	the claim shall be barred unless it is made to the								
15	director,	in writing, within two years after knowledge that the								
16	injury or disease was proximately caused by, or resulted from									
17	the nature of, the employment. The claim may be made by the									
18	injured employee or the employee's dependents or by some other									
19	person on	the employee's or their behalf. The claim shall state								
20	in ordina	ry language the time, place, nature, and cause of the								
21	injury."									



1 5	SECTION	3.	This	Act	does	not	affect	rights	and	duties	that
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- 2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 3 begun before its effective date.
- 4 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title:

Workers' Compensation; PTSD; First Responders; Firefighters; Emergency Medical Attendants; Law Enforcement Officers

Description:

Requires claims of post-traumatic stress disorder suffered by first responders to be compensable under workers' compensation under certain conditions if the post-traumatic stress disorder resulted from the first responder acting within the course and scope of the first responder's employment. Defines "first responder." Exempts injuries caused by post-traumatic stress disorder from certain time limitations applicable to workers' compensation claims.

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
