A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that access to high
- 2 quality health care that is accessible, affordable, and
- 3 equitable is of paramount importance to public health and
- 4 wellness. The legislature finds however, presently,
- 5 approximately five hundred pregnant persons and four thousand
- 6 income-qualified children in the State are denied access to
- 7 affordable health care through medicaid, the children's health
- 8 insurance program, and health insurance exchanges established
- 9 under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Public Law
- 10 111-148, solely due to their immigration status. The
- 11 legislature further finds that evidence-based studies determined
- 12 that low-income immigrants without prenatal care are seven times
- 13 more likely to give birth prematurely and five times more likely
- 14 to experience neonatal death. These findings demonstrate that
- 15 limited access to health care for pregnant persons and their
- 16 newborn children significantly increases the risk of exposure to
- 17 life-threatening situations.

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1 As of May 2024, twenty-two states and the District of 2 Columbia provide medicaid coverage to all income-qualified 3 pregnant residents regardless of their immigration status. For 4 Hawaii, with the current cost of an average neonatal intensive care unit stay being between \$7,000 and \$8,000 per day, the 5 6 department of human services estimates the cost of providing 7 income-qualified pregnant persons with health insurance coverage 8 and twelve months of post-partum care at \$1,364,000 annually. 9 The legislature also finds that providing greater access to 10 health insurance coverage for income-qualified pregnant persons 11 will help lower barriers and increase access to health care for 12 resident immigrant populations in the State. 13 Similarly, low-income immigrant children without access to 14 health care services experience a higher rate of preventable hospitalizations during childhood. Without appropriate medical 15 16 management, chronic conditions such as asthma and diabetes may 17 lead to life-threatening medical emergencies. Additionally, 18 inadequate access to preventative care such as immunizations and well-being visits may aggravate various health conditions, 19 20 increasing the occurrence of acute and chronic conditions, and

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- 1 can leave developmental health conditions undiagnosed and
- 2 untreated.
- 3 As of June 2024, twelve states and the District of Columbia
- 4 provide medicaid coverage to income-eligible children regardless
- 5 of immigration status. For Hawaii, the department of human
- 6 services estimates the cost of providing income-qualified
- 7 children with health insurance coverage under the federal health
- 8 services initiative program at \$2,976,000, with a wholly funded
- 9 state program estimated at \$9,600,000. The legislature
- 10 additionally finds that increasing access to health insurance
- 11 coverage for income-qualified children will improve health care
- 12 outcomes for all keiki, regardless of immigration status.
- Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
- 14 funds to the department of human services to authorize medicaid
- 15 coverage to income-qualified pregnant persons and children
- 16 regardless of immigration status.
- 17 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 18 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 19 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 20 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 21 year 2026-2027 to provide medicaid coverage through the

- pregnant persons who are otherwise ineligible due to their 2
- immigration status. 3
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 6
- revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 7 or so
- much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and 8
- the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 9
- year 2026-2027 to provide medicaid coverage through the 10
- 11 children's health insurance program for income-qualified
- 12 children who are otherwise ineligible due to their immigration
- 13 status.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 14
- of human services for the purposes of this Act. 15
- 16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
