A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that access to quality 2 health care that is accessible, affordable, and equitable is of
- 3 paramount importance to public health and wellness. The
- 4 legislature finds however, that presently, approximately five
- 5 hundred pregnant persons and four thousand income-qualified
- 6 children in the state are denied access to affordable health
- 7 care through medicaid, the children's health insurance program,
- 8 and health insurance exchanges established under the Patient
- 9 Protection and Affordable Care Act, Public Law 111-148, solely
- 10 due to their immigration status. Furthermore, evidence-based
- 11 studies determined that low-income immigrants without prenatal
- 12 care are seven times more likely to give birth prematurely and
- 13 five times more likely to experience neonatal death,
- 14 demonstrating that limited access to health care for pregnant
- 15 persons and their newborn children significantly increases risk
- 16 of exposure to life-threatening situations.

1 The legislature further finds that as of 2024, twenty-two 2 states plus the District of Columbia provide medicaid coverage 3 to all income-qualified prequant residents regardless of their 4 immigrant status. For Hawaii, with the current cost of an 5 average neonatal intensive care unit stay being between \$7,000 and \$8,000 per day, the department of human services estimates 6 7 the cost of providing income-qualified pregnant persons with 8 health insurance coverage and twelve months of post-partum care at \$1,364,000 annually. Providing greater access to health 9 10 insurance coverage for income-qualified pregnant persons will 11 help lower barriers and increase access to health care for 12 resident immigrant populations in the State. Similarly, low-income immigrant children without access to 13 14 health care services experience a higher rate of preventable 15 hospitalizations during childhood. Without appropriate medical 16 management, chronic conditions such as asthma and diabetes may 17 lead to life-threatening medical emergencies. Additionally, 18 inadequate access to preventative care such as immunizations and 19 well-being and well-child visits may aggravate various health 20 conditions increasing the occurrence of acute and chronic

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- 1 conditions and can leave developmental health conditions
- 2 undiagnosed and untreated.
- 3 The legislature also finds that as of 2024, twelve states
- 4 and the District of Columbia provide medicaid coverage to
- 5 income-eligible children regardless of immigration status. As
- 6 for Hawaii, the department of human services estimates the cost
- 7 of providing income-qualified children with health insurance
- 8 coverage under the federal health services initiative program at
- 9 \$2,976,000, with a wholly funded state program estimated at
- 10 \$9,600,000. Increasing access to health insurance coverage for
- 11 income-qualified children will improve health care outcomes for
- 12 all keiki, regardless of immigration status.
- 13 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to appropriate
- 14 funds to the department of human services to provide medicaid
- 15 coverage under the children's health insurance program for
- 16 income-qualified pregnant persons and children who are otherwise
- 17 ineligible due to their immigration status.
- 18 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 19 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 20 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 21 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal

- 1 year 2026-2027 to provide medicaid coverage through the
- 2 children's health insurance program for income-qualified
- 3 pregnant persons who are otherwise ineligible due to their
- 4 immigration status.
- 5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 6 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
- 10 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 11 year 2026-2027 to provide medicaid coverage through the
- 12 children's health insurance program for income-qualified
- 13 children who are otherwise ineligible due to their immigration
- 14 status.
- The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 16 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
