RELATING TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

2		department in achieving its established goals and
3		objectives;
4	(3)	Provide recommendations to improve the financial aid
5		and operational efficiency of the department,
6		including suggestions for best practices, corrective
7		actions, and allocation of resources;
8	(4)	Examine and inspect all accounts, books, files,
9		reports, and other documents of the department,
10		including subsidiaries, agencies, commissions, or
11		other affiliated programs, as necessary to conduct
12		audits;
13	(5)	Examine and inspect facilities, operations, and
14		resources under the jurisdiction of the department;
15	(6)	Administer oaths, take testimony, and compel the
16		production of documents as part of audit
17		investigations; and
18	(7)	Engage independent consultants or experts, as needed,
19		to perform specialized evaluations in support of audit
20		objectives.

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1	(c) The audit office shall be headed by an auditor. The
2	auditor shall oversee the appointment of staff, who shall have
3	expertise in auditing, accounting, or other relevant fields.
4	Staff members shall be exempt from chapter 76, and their
5	salaries and costs shall be included in the budget of the board.
6	(d) All audits conducted by the audit office shall conform
7	to government auditing standards as prescribed by the
8	Comptroller General of the United States.
9	(e) The audit office shall operate in accordance with the
10	principles of independence and transparency. The audit office
11	shall not be subject to the direction or control of any other
12	agency or department in the execution of its duties.
13	(f) The audit office shall submit annual reports of its
14	findings and recommendations relative to the expenditures made
15	and financial transactions by the different school complex
16	areas, including any proposed legislation, to the board,
17	superintendent, and legislature no later than twenty days prior
18	to the convening of each regular session; provided that the
19	reports shall include audits and examinations conducted by the
20	auditor for the immediately preceding school year and all other
21	audits and examinations conducted by the auditor during the



1 current school year. Reports shall be available for public 2 inspection. (g) The audit office shall send certified copies of audits 3 4 and examinations made by the auditor to the governor and 5 director of finance. Copies of the audits may also be submitted 6 to the legislature upon request of any member of the senate or 7 house of representatives." SECTION 2. Section 76-16, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 9 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows: 10 "(b) The civil service to which this chapter applies shall comprise all positions in the State now existing or hereafter 11 12 established and embrace all personal services performed for the 13 State, except the following: 14 (1) Commissioned and enlisted personnel of the Hawaii National Guard and positions in the Hawaii National 15 16 Guard that are required by state or federal laws or 17 regulations or orders of the National Guard to be 18 filled from those commissioned or enlisted personnel; 19 (2) Positions filled by persons employed by contract where 20 the director of human resources development has 21 certified that the service is special or unique or is



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1		essential to the public interest and that, because of
2		circumstances surrounding its fulfillment, personnel
3		to perform the service cannot be obtained through
4		normal civil service recruitment procedures. Any
5		contract may be for any period not exceeding one year;
6	(3)	Positions that must be filled without delay to comply
7		with a court order or decree if the director
8		determines that recruitment through normal recruitment
9		civil service procedures would result in delay or
10		noncompliance, such as the Felix-Cayetano consent
11		decree;
12	(4)	Positions filled by the legislature or by either house
13		or any committee thereof;
14	(5)	Employees in the office of the governor and office of
15		the lieutenant governor, and household employees at
16		Washington Place;
17	(6)	Positions filled by popular vote;
18	(7)	Department heads, officers, and members of any board,
19		commission, or other state agency whose appointments
20		are made by the governor or are required by law to be
21		confirmed by the senate;

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
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1	(8)	Judges, referees, receivers, masters, jurors, notaries
2		public, land court examiners, court commissioners, and
3		attorneys appointed by a state court for a special
4		temporary service;
5	(9)	One bailiff for the chief justice of the supreme court
6		who shall have the powers and duties of a court
7		officer and bailiff under section 606-14; one
8		secretary or clerk for each justice of the supreme
9		court, each judge of the intermediate appellate court,
10		and each judge of the circuit court; one secretary for
11		the judicial council; one deputy administrative
12		director of the courts; three law clerks for the chief
13		justice of the supreme court, two law clerks for each
14		associate justice of the supreme court and each judge
15		of the intermediate appellate court, one law clerk for
16		each judge of the circuit court, two additional law
17		clerks for the civil administrative judge of the
18		circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law
19		clerks for the criminal administrative judge of the
20		circuit court of the first circuit, one additional law
21		clerk for the senior judge of the family court of the

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1 first circuit, two additional law clerks for the civil 2 motions judge of the circuit court of the first circuit, two additional law clerks for the criminal 3 motions judge of the circuit court of the first 4 circuit, and two law clerks for the administrative 5 judge of the district court of the first circuit; and 6 7 one private secretary for the administrative director of the courts, the deputy administrative director of 8 9 the courts, each department head, each deputy or first assistant, and each additional deputy, or assistant 10 11 deputy, or assistant defined in paragraph (16); 12 First deputy and deputy attorneys general, the (10)13 administrative services manager of the department of 14 the attorney general, one secretary for the 15 administrative services manager, an administrator and 16 any support staff for the criminal and juvenile 17 justice resources coordination functions, and law 18 clerks; 19 (11)Teachers, principals, vice-principals, complex (A) 20 area superintendents, deputy and assistant 21 superintendents, other certificated personnel,



1		and no more than twenty noncertificated
2		administrative, professional, and technical
3		personnel not engaged in instructional work;
4	(B)	Effective July 1, 2003, teaching assistants,
5		educational assistants, bilingual or bicultural
6		school-home assistants, school psychologists,
7		psychological examiners, speech pathologists,
8		athletic health care trainers, alternative school
9		work study assistants, alternative school
10		educational or supportive services specialists,
11		alternative school project coordinators, and
12		communications aides in the department of
13		education;
14	(C)	The special assistant to the state librarian and
15		one secretary for the special assistant to the
16		state librarian; and
17	(D)	Members of the faculty of the [University]
18		university of Hawaii, including research workers,
19		extension agents, personnel engaged in
20		instructional work, and administrative,

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1			professional, and technical personnel of the
2			university;
3	(12)	Empl	oyees engaged in special, research, or
4		demo	onstration projects approved by the governor;
5	(13)	(A)	Positions filled by inmates, patients of state
6			institutions, and persons with severe physical or
7			mental disabilities participating in the work
8			experience training programs;
9		(B)	Positions filled with students in accordance with
10			guidelines for established state employment
11			programs; and
12		(C)	Positions that provide work experience training
13			or temporary public service employment that are
14			filled by persons entering the workforce or
15			persons transitioning into other careers under
16			programs such as the federal Workforce Investment
17			Act of 1998, as amended, or the Senior Community
18			Service Employment Program of the Employment and
19			Training Administration of the United States
20			Department of Labor, or under other similar state
21			programs;

4		expire three years after its enactment unless
5		affirmatively extended by an act of the

8		shall be included in the position classification
9		plan;
10	(18)	Positions in the state foster grandparent program and
11		positions for temporary employment of senior citizens
12		in occupations in which there is a severe personnel
13		shortage or in special projects;

16	(20)	Employees in the department of education engaged in
17		the supervision of students during meal periods in the

2		Hawaii public housing authority; provided that no more
3		than twenty-six per cent of the authority's workforce
4		in any housing project maintained or operated by the
5		authority shall be hired under the tenant hire

8		nutrition program of the [University] <u>university</u> of
9		Hawaii that require the hiring of nutrition program
10		assistants who live in the areas they serve;
11	(23)	Positions filled by persons with severe disabilities
12		who are certified by the state vocational
13		rehabilitation office that they are able to perform
14		safely the duties of the positions;
15	(24)	The sheriff;
16	(25)	A gender and other fairness coordinator hired by the
17		judiciary;
18	(26)	Positions in the Hawaii National Guard youth and adult

9	The director shall determine the applicability of this
10	section to specific positions.
11	Nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect the civil
12	service status of any incumbent as it existed on July 1, 1955."
13	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
14	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
15	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2025-2026 and
16	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
17	year 2026-2027 for:
18	(1) The establishment and operation of the audit office
19	established pursuant to section 1 of this Act; and
20	(2) The establishment of full-time equivalent
21	(FTE) positions within the audit office.

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1	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
2	of education for the purposes of this Act.
3	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
4	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
5	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 3000.

BOE; DOE; Audit Office; Established; Reports; Positions; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes an Audit Office within the Board of Education to audit operations and expenditures of the Department of Education. Exempts positions within the Audit Office from civil service law. Requires annual reports to the Governor and Director of Finance. Authorizes the Legislature to request a copy of the annual reports. Establishes positions within the Audit Office. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/1/3000. (HD2)
