## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE LEGISLATURE TO CONDUCT MANDATORY INQUIRIES INTO ALL FATALITIES AND SERIOUS INJURIES THAT OCCURRED TO CHILDREN INVOLVED IN CHILD WELFARE SERVICES.

WHEREAS, the Department of Human Services (DHS), Child 1 Welfare Services Branch has experienced a troubling number of 2 child fatalities and serious injuries resulting from systemic 3 failures, including neglect in foster care placements and unsafe 4 reunifications; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, nineteen child fatalities or serious injuries have 8 been reported since 1997 and over ten million dollars have been paid out in lawsuits so far; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in the case of Reubyne, who was beaten in 1997 and 11 is still in a vegetative state, DHS was sued for negligence and 12 settled for two million dollars; and 13 14 WHEREAS, in the case of Peter Boy Kema, who was murdered in 15 1997 though his body was never found, his family was involved in 16 multiple Child Welfare Services cases and ultimately reunified; 17 18 however, a Special Master's report states that the Department should never have reunified, the father was convicted, and a 19 lawsuit is pending; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, in 1999 a Waianae family was given permanent 23 guardianship over a group of children, who after reaching adulthood, successfully sued DHS following the parents' 24 conviction for assault and sexual abuse in 2005; and 25 26 WHEREAS, in the case of Alexis Cabantang, who was left with 27 permanent disabilities after she was beaten and nearly died in 28 2005, her guardian was sentenced to twenty years in prison and 29 the Department of Education was successfully sued for failure to 30 report her injuries to Child Welfare Services; and 31

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1 2 WHEREAS, in the case of Cyrus Belt, who was thrown over a freeway overpass in Honolulu in 2008, the responsible party was 3 4 sentenced to life in prison and DHS settled a lawsuit brought by the father for not intervening despite having been notified six 5 days prior that the mother was using methamphetamine; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, in the case of Braden McVeigh, who was murdered in 9 2009 after being reunited with his father over the objections of 10 the grandmother, DHS was successfully sued; and 11 12 WHEREAS, in 2012, Zion McKeown was beaten to death at the age of four after being reunified with the parents despite 13 14 multiple warnings against reunification; and 15 16 WHEREAS, in the case of Ronela Pascual, who was critically injured in 2008 after reunification which left her unable to 17 communicate until her death in 2013 at the age of eleven; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, in the case of Zachary Durto-Burgess, who was beaten to death after being reunified with his parents in 2010, 21 his parents were sentenced to life in prison; and 22 23 WHEREAS, Zack Morris was convicted of sexual abuse and DHS 24 25 was successfully sued by the boys who were placed in his foster home despite suspicions of child abuse in other states; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, Fabian Garcia died in her foster home on Big 29 Island due to blunt force trauma and has yet to receive justice; 30 and 31 32 WHEREAS, Shaelyn Stone was withdrawn from public school and 33 died of starvation in 2017; thereafter, her parents and 34 grandparent were all convicted of manslaughter; and 35 WHEREAS, a seven day old infant died of brain damage at 36 Tripler Hospital after an older sibling similarly died of 37 injuries, and the parents were later convicted of murder for 38 both children in 2020; and 39 40 WHEREAS, in 2020 a lawsuit was filed against DHS for 41 overlooking systemic abuse in a foster home where the eleven 42

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adopted children were forced into slave labor, molested, and 1 2 starved before a teen child ultimately killed the abusive 3 adoptive mother; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Ariel Sellers was murdered in 2021 at the age of six after being starved, gagged, and kept in a dog cage by her 6 7 adoptive parents who are currently in jail awaiting second 8 degree murder charges; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in 2021 an infant was declared deceased after Child Welfare Services had been called in to investigate the 11 12 situation months earlier but decided not to open a case; and 13 WHEREAS, Bula Mahoe was charged with sexual abuse of his 14 parents' foster children; and 15 16 WHEREAS, Caitano used foster children to conduct an illegal 17 18 drug ring in 2022, and was ultimately indicted for that offense 19 along with sexual abuse and physical abuse; and 20 WHEREAS, Geanna Bradley was found dead in her home in 2024 21 22 after being starved and physically abused by her guardians, who are now charged with second degree murder, and another child in 23 24 the home was found in very serious condition; and 25 26 WHEREAS, repeated failures to act upon warnings and ensure child safety have resulted in preventable deaths and injuries; 27 28 and 29 30 WHEREAS, despite a 2005 policy directive (DHS 2005-PA-3) requiring safety concerns to be immediately reported to judges, 31 32 these warnings have often been ignored; and 33 34 WHEREAS, lawsuits for some of the child fatality and serious injury cases have been successful, but they are complex, 35 expensive, and time-consuming, while in the meantime, there is 36 no assurance that preventative measures have been taken by DHS; 37 38 and 39 WHEREAS, Hawaii does have a child death review panel per 40 the federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) 41 42 requirements, but there is no disclosure to the public or

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4 5	WHEREAS, unlike Hawaii, states like California, Florida, and Colorado publish detailed information online about such								
6	cases and some even mandate these disclosures to ensure								
7	transparency and accountability, particularly when there has								
8	been previous state involvement; and

10	WHEREAS, studies of child deaths over decades have resulted								
11	in four main causes:

13	(1)	Failure of communication between staff and agencies;

15	(2)	Inexperience and lack of skill of individual social							
16		workers;							
17	(2)	Encluse to follow established presedures, and							
18 19	(3)	Failure to follow established procedures; and							
20	(4)	Inadequate resources to meet demands; now, therefore,

25	on Health and Human Services and House Committee on Human								
26	Services and Homelessness are urged to conduct mandatory								
27	inquiries into all fatalities and serious injuries that occurred								
28	to children involved in Child Welfare Services; and
