## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ATTORNEY GENERAL TO PRODUCE AND PROVIDE A LIST OF STATE LANDS CURRENTLY LEASED TO THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA OR ANY FEDERAL AGENCY.

WHEREAS, article XI, section 1, of the Hawaii State Constitution provides that "the State and its political subdivisions shall conserve and protect Hawaii's natural beauty and all natural resources . . . and shall promote the development and utilization of these resources in a manner consistent with their conservation and in furtherance of the self-sufficiency of the State"; and

9 WHEREAS, the State currently leases tens of thousands of 10 acres of state land to the federal government, including various 11 sites which have been leased to the United States military for 12 the past sixty years at the price of one dollar; and 13

14 WHEREAS, the military has proven to be an unreliable 15 steward of the State's land and waters, as demonstrated by the 16 Red Hill water contamination crisis on O'ahu, the indiscriminate 17 bombing of Kaho'olawe and subsequent incomplete cleanup of 18 unexploded ordinance, and many other incidents; and

20 WHEREAS, the United States Army itself has acknowledged 21 that "continued loss of 'āina represents a disproportionate and a 22 long term, significant, adverse impact on communities with 23 environmental justice concerns"; and

WHEREAS, the Trump administration has taken actions that further endanger the State's natural resources, including by asserting that national parks and public lands are assets on "the nation's balance sheet," by indicating that public lands may be sold off to raise money for a new "sovereign wealth fund," and by issuing an executive order calling for the "immediate expansion" of timber production on federal lands; and 32



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WHEREAS, these policies have had an immediate negative 1 effect on precious state lands and resources, including by 2 eliminating funding for critical environmental and agricultural 3 programs across the State, and by eliminating staff and 4 caretakers at federally-owned properties within the State; and 5 6 WHEREAS, these policies are poised to do further harm to 7 8 the State, including as a result of the Secretary of the 9 Interior's order requiring federal agencies to assess the feasibility of fracking, drilling, and mining across all public 10 lands and waters, such as Papahānaumokuākea Marine National 11 12 Monument; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the federal government has thus demonstrated a clear unwillingness or inability to responsibly steward state 15 16 lands entrusted to it as a lessee; and 17 18 WHEREAS, the current administration's actions and stated intentions represent a clear and present danger to the 19 20 conservation and protection of the State's natural beauty and natural resources; now, therefore, 21 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 23 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, 24 25 that the Attorney General is requested to produce and provide a list of state lands currently leased to the United States of 26 27 America or any federal agency; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Attorney General is requested to determine whether there are any state 30 31 constitutional or other legal impediments to continued leasing to the federal government or offering new leases, noting 32 particularly whether leasing for nominal amounts is violative of 33 34 any state constitutional or statutory provisions; and 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any lessor of state land to the 36 federal government is requested to furnish information to the 37 Attorney General as necessary to assist with the tasks requested 38 by this Resolution; and 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this 41 42 Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General.
