SENATE RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE REACTIVATION OF, AND URGING THE GOVERNOR TO APPOINT MEMBERS TO, THE HAWAII HEALTH AUTHORITY TO PLAN FOR A TRANSITION TO A MAXIMALLY COST-EFFECTIVE SINGLE-PAYER HEALTH CARE SYSTEM FOR THE STATE, TO BE IMPLEMENTED AS SOON AS POSSIBLE AFTER WAIVERS HAVE BEEN OBTAINED TO CAPTURE ALL MAJOR SOURCES OF FEDERAL FUNDING FLOWING TO THE STATE THROUGH MEDICARE, MEDICAID, AND TRICARE.

1 2 3 4	WHEREAS, the Trump administration and the Republican majority in the United States Congress are threatening deep cuts to federal Medicaid funding; and
5 6 7 8	WHEREAS, Hawaii may soon be in urgent need for a more cost- effective health care financing system if cuts to Medicaid are implemented; and
9 10 11 12	WHEREAS, a Hawaii single-payer health care financing system could achieve large savings from reduced administrative costs without cuts to care delivery by doctors and hospitals; and
12 13 14 15 16	WHEREAS, global budgets based on the cost of operations could eliminate about fifteen percent of total hospital budgets that would otherwise be apportioned for billing and collection costs; and
17 18 19 20 21 22 23	WHEREAS, independent doctors paid with simplified, standardized fee-for-service based on time and required training for a given procedure, rather than assigning a relative value to each of thousands of procedure codes, could markedly reduce billing and collections costs that now consume around fifteen percent of physician practice revenue; and
24 25 26 27 28	WHEREAS, similar savings in the fifteen percent range could be achieved from reduced administrative cost for a Hawaii single-payer administrator; and

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1 WHEREAS, some of these savings could be used to fund 2 community-based programs for high-risk and special needs 3 patients and specialist consultations to primary care to save 4 the cost of preventable emergency room visits and 5 hospitalizations; and 6 WHEREAS, some of these savings could be used to improve 7 8 take-home pay for primary care specialties and psychiatry so 9 that doctors in under-paid specialties could afford Hawaii's 10 high cost of living, reversing the State's severe physician shortage; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, health care costs for Medicaid and state and 14 county employee and retiree benefits now consume around thirty 15 percent of the total state budget; and 16 17 WHEREAS, all the above administrative cost savings could add up to a reduction in Hawaii health care costs in the range 18 19 of thirty percent or more, reducing the total state budget by 20 around nine percent; and 21 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Health Authority is already established 22 in state law with a mission of planning for a universal health 23 care system covering all residents of the State, but the 24 Authority is currently inactive; now, therefore, 25 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 28 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, that this body supports the reactivation of, and the Governor is 29 30 urged to appoint members to, the Hawaii Health Authority to plan for a transition to a maximally cost-effective single-payer 31 health care system for the State, to be implemented as soon as 32 possible after waivers have been obtained to capture all major 33 34 sources of federal funding flowing to the State through 35 Medicare, Medicaid, and Tricare; and 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Health Authority is 37 requested to submit a report of its progress and 38 39 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 40 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2026; and 41 42

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director of Finance, and Director of Human Services. 4 5 2 0 0 0 1
