SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO ESTABLISH A WORKING GROUP ON LOWERING THE LEGAL LIMIT OF BLOOD ALCOHOL CONCENTRATION TO 0.05 GRAMS OF ALCOHOL PER ONE HUNDRED MILLILITERS OF BLOOD WITH THE INTENT OF PRIORITIZING SAFETY AND SAVING LIVES ON HAWAII'S ROADS.

WHEREAS, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety 1 Commission, about thirty-seven people in the United States die 2 in drunk-driving crashes every day; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, that number equates to one person dying every thirty-nine minutes; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, in 2022, 13,524 people died in alcohol-impaired driving traffic deaths across the United States; and 9 10 11 WHEREAS, from 2011 to 2022, at least forty percent of traffic fatalities in Hawaii involved alcohol; and 12 13 i4 WHEREAS, research published in the Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs in 2012 shows that if a person's blood alcohol 15 concentration (BAC) is between 0.05 and 0.08 percent, their 16 chances of being killed in a crash where only the person's 17 vehicle is involved are at least seven times higher than if the 18 person had not been drinking at all; and 19 20 WHEREAS, reducing the legal BAC limit to 0.05 percent would 21 likely lead to fewer instances of impaired driving and its 22 23 consequences; and 24 25 WHEREAS, a 0.05 percent BAC limit would serve as a general deterrent to impaired driving and affects all would-be drinking 26 27 drivers; and 28 WHEREAS, more than one hundred countries have reduced their 29 30 legal BAC levels to 0.05 percent or lower, including Australia, Austria, France, Germany, Italy, and Spain; now, therefore, 31
