SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OAHU METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION TO COORDINATE A TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT TRAINING PROGRAM.

WHEREAS, Hawaii has one of the highest costs of 1 transportation per capita in the country and among the highest 2 rates of transportation related fatalities and injuries; and 3 4 WHEREAS, different jurisdictions have tried to utilize a 5 number of different methods to achieve their transportation 6 safety goals and reduce the cost of multimodal and public 7 transit for local families; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, a number of other jurisdictions that struggled to overcome similar challenges as Hawaii have managed to 11 successfully reduce their cost of transportation for residents 12 13 over time, with some having reduced fatalities nearly to zero; and 14

16 WHEREAS, Hawaii can learn from the proven lessons in other 17 jurisdictions and apply these strategies and best practices to 18 reduce the cost of transportation for local residents and 19 improve safety on roads and highways; and

21 WHEREAS, some of the challenges Hawaii faces include a 22 system of transportation governance that involves multiple 23 agencies and levels of government that split the decision-making 24 process amongst a host of different officials; and

26 WHEREAS, joint policy and implementation strategy workshops 27 engaging multiple agencies and levels of government in 28 conversations with those who have successfully achieved progress 29 can help accelerate progress and success across silos; and 30

31 WHEREAS, the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization has 32 been operating a successful transportation project management 33 training program to help state and county decision makers and 34 employees working on transportation issues to meet with and 35 learn from their peers in other jurisdictions since 2023; and 36



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WHEREAS, successful transportation training programs will 1 typically involve peer exchanges and mobile workshops where 2 participants meet and learn from their counterparts in other 3 model jurisdictions employing best practices, gain firsthand 4 experience as both designers and users of innovative 5 transportation infrastructure, and understand the unexpected and 6 7 unplanned for pros and cons of implemented solutions; and 8 9 WHEREAS, state and county decision makers, including employees, department heads, and elected and appointed officials 10 responsible for funding and implementing transit policy and 11 projects, would benefit from training programs involving 12 discussions with their peers in those jurisdictions that have 13 successfully improved transportation safety and cost; now, 14 therefore, 15 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 17 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, 18 that the Oahu Metropolitan Planning Organization is requested to 19 continue transportation management training programs focused on 20 educating key decision makers responsible for transportation 21 policy, planning, funding, and implementation; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the transportation management 24 training programs be designed to help decision makers achieve 25 state and county transportation goals including improving 26 transportation safety and providing a multimodal transportation 27 system that can expand opportunities for residents to lower 28 their transportation costs, among other issues; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the transportation management 31 training programs provide for peer-to-peer learning and 32 collaboration with other jurisdictions that demonstrate 33 implementation of innovative best practices and have achieved 34 successful outcomes; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 37 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director of 38 Transportation, Mayor of the City and County of Honolulu, Mayor 39 of the County of Maui, Mayor of the County of Kauai, Mayor of 40 the County of Hawaii, Director of the Department of 41 Transportation Services, Director of the Maui County Department 42
