SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING EACH BRANCH OF THE UNITED STATES MILITARY IN THE STATE TO PROVIDE SHELTERS THAT CAN WITHSTAND HURRICANES WITH WINDS OF OVER TWO HUNDRED MILES-PER-HOUR FOR ALL OF THEIR ACTIVE AND RETIRED PERSONNEL AND FAMILIES LIVING IN THE STATE.

WHEREAS, seas further north have begun to warm due to
 climate change, causing the spawning area for hurricanes near
 Mexico to expand north; and

5 WHEREAS, these new, warmer northern seas have caused 6 hurricanes that previously would have missed the State to travel 7 toward the State; and

9 WHEREAS, warmer seas increase the prevalence, strength, and 10 breadth of category three, four, and five hurricanes; and

12 WHEREAS, warmer seas caused by climate change have given 13 rise to "super" category five hurricanes, which are hurricanes 14 with winds exceeding two hundred miles-per-hour; and

16 WHEREAS, research estimates that, with existing ocean 17 temperatures, the world will experience one super category five 18 hurricane every eight years, but by 2080 the world is projected 19 to see one super category five hurricane every year, with the 20 northern Pacific Ocean expected to experience the most super 21 category five hurricanes; and

WHEREAS, the State was previously protected by cooler
surrounding seas, which would cause hurricanes to dissipate as
they approached, but rising global ocean temperatures have
caused these protective seas to dissipate; and

28 WHEREAS, historically, trade winds approaching the State at 29 lower levels and strong winds in the opposite direction at 30 higher levels would tear approaching hurricanes apart; and 31

32 WHEREAS, the State has lost two days of trade winds each 33 year for fifty years, resulting in wind-shear protection for

less than half of the days of the year and leaving the State 1 more vulnerable to approaching hurricanes during the other half 2 of the year; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the State is not allowed to call its places of refuge "hurricane shelters" because they do not reach the 6 7 necessary standards, and few of the State's refuge areas are capable of withstanding even a category two hurricane; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, the State currently only has thirty-two refuge areas that are capable of holding a total of only one hundred 11 thousand people, despite the Honolulu Department of Emergency 12 Management anticipating that even in the case of a category one 13 14 hurricane approximately two hundred thousand people will seek shelter; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, the State has no shelters that can withstand a category three, four, or five hurricane, and in the event that a 18 hurricane of this magnitude strikes the State there is no place 19 20 for anyone to go; and 21 22 WHEREAS, there are approximately one hundred eighty-seven thousand wooden homes in the State, most of which will be 23 24 damaged or destroyed in a category one hurricane; and 25 WHEREAS, the State is home to more than two hundred fifty 26 thousand active and retired military personnel and their 27 families, most of whom have no safe place to go during a 28 hurricane; and 29 30 WHEREAS, many of those two hundred fifty thousand active 31 and retired military personnel and their families live in the 32 one hundred eighty-seven thousand wooden homes in the State, 33 which could be strengthened to withstand major hurricanes; and 34 35 WHEREAS, it is the obligation of each branch of the United 36 States military to protect their active and retired personnel 37 and their families; and 38 39 WHEREAS, if each branch of the United States military in 40 the State were to provide shelters that would survive winds of 41 42 over two hundred miles-per-hour for all two hundred fifty

thousand active and retired personnel and their families, it 1 2 would relieve the State of providing shelters for one fifth of the State's residents; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, if each branch of the United States military in the State were to fund the fortifying of all homes owned by 6 7 active and retired military personnel, it would greatly relieve the State when it begins to provide grants or tax breaks to 8 9 citizens fortifying their homes against hurricanes; now, therefore, 10 11 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-third 12 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2025, 13 that each branch of the United States military in the State is 14 requested to provide shelters that can withstand hurricanes with 15 winds of over two hundred miles-per-hour for all of their active 16 and retired personnel and families living in the State; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each branch of the United 20 States military in the State is requested to fund the fortification of all homes owned by active and retired military 21 22 personnel whose homes are deemed able to withstand major 23 hurricanes if strengthened; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 26 Resolution be transmitted to the Chief of Staff of the United States Army, Chief of Naval Operations of the United States 27 Navy, Chief of Staff of the United States Air Force, Commandant 28 of the United States Marine Corps, and Commandant of the United 29 30 States Coast Guard.
