II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Founded in 1954 by parents and community advocates, Arc of Maui County began as the only organization offering services to children with developmental disabilities. Today, it has grown into a collaborative effort involving individuals with disabilities, families, staff, and community partners dedicated to ensuring people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) can live full, meaningful lives.

Our mission is to promote and protect the human rights of individuals with I/DD and support their full inclusion in the community. We focus on each person's strengths and abilities while meeting the growing needs of Maui County's underserved disability population. Arc of Maui County provides a coordinated continuum of services available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including residential supports, Adult Day Health programs, community-based one-on-one services, and vocational/employment supports.

Residential Services

Arc of Maui County owns and operates five state-licensed group homes. Three Intermediate Care Facilities (ICF) on Maui and two Domiciliary (DOM) homes one on Maui and one on Molokai. ICF services provide ongoing supervision, active treatment and access to specialized health and therapeutic services while DOM services are less intensive and for individuals who are able to live more independently with assistance. We are the largest residential provider in Maui County and the only DOM provider on Molokai. Homes are staffed around the clock and meet all state and federal regulatory standards. Support includes personal care, health and safety monitoring, medication administration, behavioral supports, meal preparation, household tasks, and transportation. Residents are encouraged to develop daily living skills, make choices, and participate in community life to achieve their highest level of independence.

Adult Day Health (ADH) Programs

Our Adult Day Health program operates two locations on Maui, in Wailuku and Kihei, for individuals eligible through the Department of Health. Our adult day health program provides a structured, supportive daytime setting where participants build social and life skills, receive personal care and health monitoring, and engage in meaningful community activities. Services focus on safety, communication, money management, and other individualized goals outlined in each participant's service plan.

One-on-One Community Services

Home and Community-Based Services (H&CBS) are provided across Maui County and offer personalized support to individuals in their homes and communities. Trained staff work one-on-one to help individuals meet goals identified by their "circle of support" which include family, guardians, and other important people in their lives. Services emphasize skill-building, independence, self-advocacy, and participation in activities aligned with each person's interests and abilities.

Vocational and Employment Services

Arc of Maui County supports individuals in pursuing competitive, integrated employment. Services are tailored to each participant's interests and strengths and may include career exploration, job skills training, interview preparation, job readiness, resume and application assistance, and on-the-job coaching. Our Employment Specialist collaborates with local businesses to expand job opportunities and educate employers about the benefits of hiring individuals with disabilities. Employment services help participants gain confidence, build independence, and become active contributors in their community.

Across all programs, we assist individuals with daily living skills, personal care, medication management, nursing supports, behavioral services, household tasks, transportation, and community engagement.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goals and objectives of this request is to strengthen the safety, accessibility, sustainability and emergency preparedness of our primary service facility so it can continue to effectively serve individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities through our Adult Day Health program, one-on-one community services, vocational/employment services and administrative operations and as an emergency shelter for our residential group home participants.

Goal 1: Equip main building to function as fully operational emergency shelter for Arc of Maui County's residential group home programs.

- Installation of photovoltaic solar panels with battery backup system to ensure uninterrupted power during emergencies and maintain essential services such as refrigeration, lighting, medical equipment and communication systems.
- Strengthen facility security to protect vulnerable population by developing secure access controls including the installation of an electronic entry gate and upgraded camera system to maintain safe shelter operations during emergencies, to improve monitoring, deter unauthorized access and enhance incident response.
- Purchase and deploy 6 Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) for use in our 5 group homes and our Adult Day Health program. AEDs will be maintained onsite and made fully portable for use during off-site activities, evacuations and emergency sheltering situations to support rapid, life-saving response when needed.

Goal 2: Improve accessibility and inclusion for individuals with disabilities.

- Improve building safety and livability standards by replacing older doors with automated, ADA compliant doors, converting non-opening windows to operable windows to improve ventilation and emergency egress. Replace aging air conditioning units to ensure safe, climate-controlled environment for medically fragile individuals.
- Upgrade the facility to fully meet ADA accessibility standards for both the upstairs and downstairs Adult Day Health program space and administrative offices with ADA compliant entryways.
- Increase accessible transportation options for program participants by purchasing two to three new wheelchair accessible vehicles to support daily program transportation, medical appointments, community integrations and emergency evacuations.

Goal 3: Promote long-term sustainability and operational efficiency and increase overall emergency preparedness.

- Reduce long-term operational costs by transitioning to renewable energy through photovoltaic panels and battery backups to lower utility expenses and reduce reliance on the electrical grid.
- Extend the usable life of the facility by replacing outdated infrastructure components including air conditioning systems, windows and doors. Reducing maintenance costs and preventing service disruptions to our participants.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Arc of Maui County serves one of the most vulnerable and underserved populations in Maui County, individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities ranging from mild, moderate, severe to profound.

The primary facility addressed in this proposal functions as the hub for our Adult Day Health program, one-on-one community services, vocational/employment services and administrative headquarters are central to delivering essential services, coordinating care and ensuring safety for individuals who rely on daily supervision and support, personal care, medical oversight, skill development and community integration. The public purpose of this project is to ensure that people with disabilities have a safe, accessible and disaster ready facility that protects their health, dignity and quality of life.

Maintaining a safe, accessible, and resilient facility is critical to ensuring continuity of services for a population that is particularly vulnerable during emergencies and service disruptions. While the facility continues to operate, key components, such as non-automated doors, limited ADA accessibility, outdated air conditioning systems, non-operable windows and insufficient security infrastructure, creates barriers to full participation, increase safety risks and limits the building's ability to function as an emergency shelter. These limitations disproportionately affect individuals with mobility challenges, medical vulnerabilities, behaviors and sensory sensitivities. All requiring stable, climate-controlled and secure environments.

Enhanced parking lot security is a critical component of this request due to ongoing safety concerns impacting participants, staff and organizational assets. Arc of Maui County has experience repeated incidents of vandalism to company vehicles, destruction of building property and unsafe activity occurring on site after hours. In addition, drug use in the parking area has resulted in the presence of discarded needles, creating serious health and safety risks for participants. These conditions pose a heightened risk to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, many of whom are unable to independently recognize or avoid hazardous situations. Strengthening security through controlled access, improved lighting and upgraded camera systems will help deter criminal activity, protect assets, reduce safety hazards and ensure a safe environment for daily operations and emergency shelter use.

Recent disasters have clearly demonstrated these vulnerabilities. During the Maui wildfires, Arc of Maui County was forced to evacuate two of our residential group homes for multiple nights, creating significant hardship for the individuals we support. Overcrowded temporary spaces, the need for accessible accommodations, behavioral concerns, and challenges with sleeping arrangements all underscored the lack of an appropriate emergency shelter equipped for individuals with I/DD. Similarly, during a statewide tsunami warning, two other group homes were required to evacuate, again highlighting the urgent need for a centralized, safe, and accessible sheltering location specifically designed to meet the medical, mobility, and behavioral needs of the people we serve. These events reaffirm the necessity of establishing our main building as a reliable emergency operations and shelter site.

The disability community faces ongoing challenges, including limited accessible facilities, vulnerable housing infrastructure and heightened risk during natural disasters. The need for a resilient and fully accessible building has become even more urgent following recent statewide emergencies which highlighted critical gaps. Upgrading Arc of Maui County's main building will directly serve the public by:

- Ensuring a safe and accessible environment for participants in our Adult Day Health program, one-on-one community services and vocational/employment services. Many of our participants have mobility limitations, medical conditions and behavioral support needs.
- Providing designated emergency shelter for residents of our four group homes on Maui, individuals who can not safely shelter in general population emergency facilities due to complex medical, behavioral or mobility needs.
- Improving energy resilience and continuity of care through photovoltaic panels and battery backups.
- Enhancing public safety and security through upgraded gate systems, cameras and secure building access.
- Expanding transportation capacity with wheelchair accessible vehicles to ensure safe evacuations and maintain continuity in daily services.
- Creating ADA compliant access that allows individuals with physical disabilities to move safely and independently throughout the facility and community.

Collectively, these improvements serve a clear public purpose: advancing accessibility, safety, sustainability and emergency preparedness. This ensures they have a safe, equitable access to essential services and a secure, resilient shelter during emergencies. Strengthening the community's overall capacity to care for its most vulnerable members. Funding this project will ensure that essential services remain uninterrupted, inclusive, and resilient, both in daily operations and during times of crisis.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target population served by this project are individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities residing in Maui County. Individuals supported by Arc of Maui County experience a wide range of disabilities such as autism spectrum disorder, cerebral palsy, down syndrome, fetal alcohol spectrum disorder, traumatic brain injury,

sensory processing disorders, communication disorders, physical disabilities and other lifelong conditions that require ongoing support, supervision and specialized services.

Many individuals within this population have significant medical, mobility and behavioral support needs including limited mobility requiring wheelchairs, walkers or other assistive devices, chronic health conditions, communication challenges, and sensory sensitivities. As a result, they are among the most vulnerable members of the community, particularly during natural disasters, power outages, or other emergency situations.

The project directly serves:

- **Residential group home participants**, who rely on 24-hour care and cannot safely access general population emergency shelters due to medical, accessibility, or behavioral needs.
- **Adults enrolled in the Adult Day Health (ADH) program**, who require structured daytime services including personal care, health monitoring, medication support, and social engagement.
- **Individuals receiving one-on-one Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS)**, who depend on safe, accessible facilities and reliable transportation for daily activities.
- **Individuals pursuing vocational and employment services**, who benefit from uninterrupted program operations and safe transportation.
- **Direct care staff and essential personnel**, whose ability to respond effectively during emergencies is critical to maintaining health, safety, and continuity of care for participants.

Most individuals served are **low-income and reliant on Medicaid or state-funded services**, further limiting their ability to access private emergency resources, transportation options, or accessible evacuation shelters. Many also lack family support systems capable of providing emergency housing or specialized care during crises.

Facility and infrastructure improvements, including ADA accessibility upgrades, emergency power systems, security enhancements, and accessible transportation, are essential to ensuring this population can safely access services, maintain dignity, and receive uninterrupted support during both routine operations and emergency events. By strengthening the accessibility and resilience of Arc of Maui County's main facility, this project will significantly improve outcomes for individuals with I/DD who depend on consistent, specialized care to live safely within their communities.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Arc of Maui County provides essential services to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities across Maui County, including Maui and Molokai.

Our programs are designed to ensure participants throughout the county have access to the care, supports, and opportunities necessary to live safe, meaningful, and engaged lives.

Services offered countywide include residential group homes, Adult Day Health programs, one-on-one community-based services, and vocational/employment supports. Our residential group homes on Maui are located in Kihei, Lahaina, and Kahului (two homes). In addition, we operate a group home in Maunaloa on Molokai, expanding access to residential services in a rural and historically underserved area.

Across all locations, Arc of Maui County provides safe, supportive, and nurturing environments that promote independence, community integration, and improved quality of life. We are committed to serving individuals wherever they reside within Maui County and to addressing service gaps by delivering essential programs in both urban and rural communities.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Arc of Maui County's proposed project will strengthen the safety, accessibility, and emergency preparedness of its primary Adult Day Health, one-on-one community services, vocational/employment services and administrative facility while expanding emergency sheltering and transportation capacity for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD). The scope of work includes facility upgrades, energy resilience improvements, security enhancements and transportation acquisition. All coordinated to ensure continuity of services during both daily operations and emergency events.

1. Facility Accessibility and Safety Improvements

Arc of Maui County will complete upgrades to ensure the building meets ADA accessibility standards and supports safe, independent movement for individuals with mobility, sensory, and cognitive disabilities.

Tasks include:

- Installing automated, ADA-compliant entry doors to the facility to support safe and independent access.
- Upgrading exterior pathways to enhance accessibility and safety.
- Replacing aging air conditioning systems with energy-efficient units to maintain appropriate indoor temperatures for medically fragile individuals.
- Replacing non-operable windows with operable, energy-efficient windows to improve ventilation and emergency egress.

Responsibilities:

- Arc of Maui County leadership will oversee planning, permitting, and contractor selection.
- Licensed contractors will complete all construction and mechanical upgrades in compliance with all applicable regulations.

2. Security and Controlled Access Enhancements

To protect participants, staff, and visitors, particularly during emergency shelter operations, Arc of Maui County will strengthen facility security systems.

Tasks include:

- Installation of an electronic gate access system to control entry to the facility.
- Upgrading security camera systems to improve visibility, monitoring, and response capability.
- Integrating security systems into existing emergency response protocols.

Responsibilities:

- Administrative leadership will coordinate vendor selection and system integration.
- Staff will receive training on use of upgraded security systems.

3. Accessible Transportation Expansion

To ensure safe evacuation and continuity of services, Arc of Maui County will expand its transportation capacity.

Tasks include:

- Purchase of two to three wheelchair-accessible vans that are no more than two years old. Prices to include shipping to Maui from the mainland.
- Equipping vehicles for emergency and daily service use.

Responsibilities:

- Administrative staff will manage procurement and vehicle readiness.
- Drivers and support staff will be trained in emergency transportation procedures and safe mobility assistance.

4. Emergency Power and Energy Resilience

The project will equip the facility with reliable, sustainable power sources to maintain critical services during power outages and disasters.

Tasks include:

- Installation of photovoltaic (PV) solar panels.
- Installation of battery backup systems to power essential functions including lighting, refrigeration for medications, communications, and assistive equipment.

Responsibilities:

- Arc of Maui County will manage system design and installation with qualified renewable energy providers.
- Maintenance plans will be established to ensure long-term system reliability.

5. Emergency Shelter and Medical Readiness

The facility will be fully equipped to function as an emergency shelter for residents evacuated from Arc of Maui County's residential group homes.

Tasks include:

- Preparing designated shelter areas within the facility that accommodate medical, behavioral, and mobility needs.
- Purchase and deployment of six Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) for the five residential group homes and Adult Day Health program.
- Integrating shelter procedures into agency emergency response and continuity-of-operations plans.
- Coordinating shelter use with residential program staff and leadership.

Responsibilities:

- Program management staff will update emergency response plans and coordinate shelter operations.
- Administrative staff will manage procurement and maintenance schedule while program leadership will ensure staff are trained in AED use and emergency response protocol.
- Direct care and administrative staff will participate in emergency preparedness training.

This coordinated scope of work will significantly improve Arc of Maui County's ability to deliver uninterrupted, accessible services while strengthening emergency preparedness for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, their families, and the broader community.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

Arc of Maui County will complete the proposed facility improvements, emergency preparedness enhancements, and transportation expansion within a 12-month grant period. Activities will be phased to ensure minimal service disruption while achieving all intended outcomes.

Months 1–2: Project Planning and Mobilization**Activities:**

- Finalize detailed project work plan and implementation schedule.
- Complete architectural, engineering, and accessibility assessments.
- Secure required permits and approvals.
- Solicit bids and select licensed contractors and vendors.
- Initiate procurement process for two to three wheelchair-accessible vans, including shipping to Maui.

Outcomes:

- Contracts executed and project schedule established.
- Permits approved and vendors secured.
- Transportation procurement underway.

Months 3–7: Facility Accessibility, Safety, and Security Improvements**Activities:**

- Replace non-operable windows with operable, energy-efficient windows.
- Install automated ADA-compliant entry doors.
- Purchase and deployment of automated external defibrillators (AEDs) for five residential group homes and Adult Day Health program.
- Replace aging air conditioning units with energy-efficient systems.
- Install electronic gate access and upgraded security camera systems.

Outcomes:

- Improved building accessibility and safety.
- Enhanced indoor air quality and climate control.
- Strengthened facility security and controlled access.

Months 5–9: Energy Resilience and Emergency Shelter Preparation*(Conducted concurrently with facility upgrades)***Activities:**

- Install photovoltaic (PV) solar panels and battery backup systems.
- Test backup power systems for critical equipment and operations.
- Prepare designated shelter areas to accommodate residents from group homes during emergencies.
- Integrate shelter operations into agency emergency and operations plans.

Outcomes:

- Facility capable of maintaining essential operations during power outages.
- Main building fully outfitted as an emergency shelter for residential programs.

Months 8–10: Transportation Acquisition and Staff Training**Activities:**

- Complete purchase and deployment of two to three wheelchair-accessible vans.
- Train staff on emergency evacuation procedures and safe mobility assistance.
- Train staff on use of new security, access, and energy systems.

Outcomes:

- Expanded emergency and daily transportation capacity.
- Staff prepared to operate upgraded systems and implement emergency protocols.

Months 11–12: Final Integration, Evaluation, and Project Close-Out**Activities:**

- Conduct final inspections and system testing.
- Address any punch-list items or system adjustments.
- Conduct emergency response drills incorporating shelter and evacuation procedures.
- Evaluate project outcomes and document results.
- Update long-term maintenance and emergency preparedness plans.

Outcomes:

- Fully accessible, secure, and disaster-ready facility.
- Verified readiness for emergency shelter activation.
- Sustainable systems and procedures in place beyond the grant period.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

Arc of Maui County will ensure accountability, effectiveness, and continuous improvement for this project by directly aligning evaluation activities with the stated Goals and Objectives. Progress will be monitored through defined performance indicators, documented milestones, staff training records, system testing, and post-implementation reviews. Leadership and program managers will use these data to evaluate outcomes, identify challenges, and make timely adjustments throughout the 12-month grant period.

Monitoring and Oversight

A designated project lead will oversee implementation and ensure alignment with project goals. Monitoring methods include:

- Review of contractor deliverables and inspection approvals
- Verification of installation, functionality, and compliance for all facility, security, energy, and medical equipment upgrades
- Tracking of transportation procurement and deployment
- Documentation of staff training completion and emergency preparedness activities

Monthly progress reviews and quarterly reports will enable early identification of any gaps and support corrective actions as needed.

Evaluation Linked to Goals and Objectives

Evaluation efforts will be structured around the outcomes associated with each project goal. Effectiveness will be assessed using measurable indicators, including completion status, system functionality, staff readiness, and emergency response capability. Results will be reviewed by leadership and incorporated into ongoing quality improvement processes.

Continuous Quality Improvement

Evaluation findings will inform updates to emergency response protocols, facility maintenance plans, and staff training programs. Feedback from participants, families, and staff particularly following drills or emergency events will be used to improve shelter readiness, safety procedures, and operational resilience. All improvements will be documented to ensure sustainability beyond the grant period.

Outcome and Measures of Effectiveness

GOAL 1: EMERGENCY SHELTER

Objective #1:

Install photovoltaic (PV) solar panels with battery backup to support emergency shelter operations.

Expected Outcome:

Continuous power will be available for essential operations during power outages and emergency events.

Measures of Effectiveness:

PV solar and battery systems will be installed, tested, and fully operational. Critical systems—including lighting, refrigeration, and communications—will function during system testing.

Monitoring Method:

Installation records and system testing logs will be maintained and reviewed.

Objective #2:

Strengthen facility security to protect participants during routine operations and emergencies.

Expected Outcome:

Improved monitoring and controlled access throughout the facility.

Measures of Effectiveness:

Electronic gate access and upgraded camera systems will be installed and fully operational.

Monitoring Method:

Vendor verification and internal system testing will be conducted and documented.

Objective #3:

Purchase and deploy Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) across programs.

Expected Outcome:

Increased capacity for rapid medical response during emergencies and improved staff readiness to respond safely and effectively.

Measures of Effectiveness:

Six AEDs will be purchased and deployed, available both onsite and as portable equipment for evacuations. Staff will be trained in AED use and emergency response protocols.

Monitoring Method:

Equipment inventories, maintenance logs, training attendance records, and drill participation records will be maintained. We have a certified CPR/AED instructor on staff that can complete the AED training.

GOAL 2: IMPROVE ACCESSIBILITY AND COMMUNITY INCLUSION

Objective #1:

Upgrade doors, windows, and AC systems to improve facility accessibility and comfort.

Expected Outcome:

A safe, accessible, and climate-controlled environment for program participants, staff, and visitors.

Measures of Effectiveness:

ADA-compliant automated doors will be installed, operable windows will be functional, and new air conditioning systems will be operational.

Monitoring Method:

Final inspections and compliance verification will be completed and documented.

Objective #2:

Expand emergency transportation capacity.

Expected Outcome:

Improved evacuation capability and reliable transportation for individuals with mobility needs.

Measures of Effectiveness:

Two to three wheelchair-accessible vans will be purchased and placed into service.

Monitoring Method:

Procurement records and routine vehicle readiness checks will be maintained.

GOAL 3: LONG-TERM SUSTAINABILITY AND EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Objective #1:

Reduce long-term operational costs and increase energy resilience.

Expected Outcome:

Lower utility expenses and increased energy independence.

Measures of Effectiveness:

Annual electricity costs will be reduced, and reliance on the electrical grid will decrease following installation of renewable energy systems.

Monitoring Method:

Utility billing reviews and financial reports will be used to track cost savings and energy performance.

Objective #2:

Replace outdated air conditioning systems and convert non-operable windows.

Expected Outcome:

Improved indoor comfort, safety, reliability, ventilation, and accessibility.

Measures of Effectiveness:

New energy-efficient windows and air conditioning systems will be installed. Equipment failures and emergency maintenance calls will decrease, resulting in fewer service disruptions.

Monitoring Method:

Maintenance cost analysis, incident reports, and service disruption logs will be reviewed regularly.

Arc of Maui County will maintain detailed documentation of all outcomes, inspections, and training activities. These records will be used to meet grant reporting requirements and demonstrate measurable progress toward stated goals. Final evaluation findings will inform long-term operational planning and emergency preparedness efforts.

Arc of Maui County has secured additional funding sources that are specifically dedicated to emergency preparedness and resilience improvements for our primary building providing services through our Adult Day Health program, one-on-one community services, vocational/employment services and administrative offices.

- County of Maui – Community Development Block Grant (CDBG): \$306,000
- Atherton Family Foundation: \$15,000

All funds are being applied toward building improvements that enhance safety, accessibility, and the facility’s ability to function as an emergency shelter during disasters. Funds will support emergency preparedness and facility resilience improvements. As of January 2026, Arc of Maui County has released the Invitation for Bids (IFB) and is actively proceeding with project execution. These funding sources contribute to, but do not fully fund, the comprehensive emergency preparedness upgrades proposed in this application. Additional resources are required to fully equip the facility with backup power, security enhancements, accessible transportation, emergency medical equipment, and shelter readiness capacity.

Arc of Maui County received Grant-in-Aid funding in Fiscal Year 2024 in the amount of \$345,000 to re-roof three (3) group homes on Maui serving adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Our agency maintains a total of \$3,973,842 in deposits across multiple financial institutions. These funds are classified as unrestricted, reserved or restricted based on their purpose and source.

Unrestricted assets:

- \$139,951 – These funds represent the organization’s only unrestricted assets and are used to support general operating needs. They provide critical flexibility to cover essential expenses during periods of delayed reimbursements or funding gaps. Due to the ongoing disparity between program reimbursement rates and actual operating costs, Arc of Maui County has increasingly relied on these unrestricted funds to meet payroll obligations and maintain continuity of essential services.

Reserved assets:

- \$2,833,384 – These funds are held across several credit unions and financial institutions and are designated as six months of operating reserves. They are maintained to ensure continuity of services in the event of funding delays, emergencies or other unforeseen disruptions. Maintaining this reserve is consistent with nonprofit financial management best practices and ensures the agency’s ability to meet payroll obligations and sustain essential program services.

- \$150,000 – These funds are reserved to address miscellaneous maintenance needs of our group homes and day programs, any facility repairs/improvements to ensure safety of all our sites, and supporting staff retention. In the context of ongoing staffing shortages and increased overtime demands, this reserve is essential to maintaining workforce stability and ensuring that program facilities remain safe, functional and well maintained for participants.

Restricted assets:

- \$756,405 – These funds are restricted for use exclusively on HUD-regulated group homes and are administered in accordance with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requirements. They are dedicated to capital expenditures, repairs and maintenance.

- \$94,102 – These funds are restricted for use solely in accordance with the terms and conditions of awarded grants. They are designated for specific project-related purposes, including approved programmatic or capital expenditures and may not be used for general operating expenses. All use of grant-restricted funds is subject to the applicable grant agreements, reporting requirements and oversight by the funding agency.

Together, they bring nearly 70 years of combined service to the organization. This team has extensive experience overseeing complex, multi-year projects funded by county, state, federal, and private sources, and has demonstrated a consistent ability to deliver projects on time, within budget, and in full regulatory compliance.

The Chief Executive Officer and Chief Financial Officer have significant expertise in grant implementation, coordination, and fiscal oversight, including income and expense tracking, reporting, and compliance requirements. Together, they have successfully administered projects funded through Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), State Grant-in-Aid (GIA) programs, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding, and private foundations like Nareit Foundation, Fred Baldwin and Atherton Family Foundation.

In addition, the Chief Financial Officer is a HUD Certified Occupancy Specialist, ensuring ongoing compliance with all HUD contractual requirements. This includes oversight of Rent Comparability Studies (RCS), Management Occupancy Reviews (MOR), and Real Estate Assessment Center (REAC) inspections, supporting Arc of Maui County’s continued compliance and eligibility for federal housing funds.

The executive team’s experience is demonstrated through the successful completion and management of the following projects within the past three years:

1. **2024 – State of Hawaii Grant-in-Aid (GIA):** Successfully completed re-roofing projects and installation of hot water solar panels at three Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) group homes.
2. **2023 – Nareit Foundation:** Completed re-roofing and hot water solar panel installation at one Domiciliary (DOM) group home.
3. **2022 – U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD):** Led the installation of a retaining wall at the Lahaina group home, addressing critical infrastructure and safety needs.

This proven leadership, combined with strong financial controls and regulatory expertise, positions Arc of Maui County to successfully manage the proposed project and ensure responsible stewardship of public and private funds.

- Hale Kihei – Operated as Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) home. Owned since July 1988, 6 bed/3 bath, 2,582 sq ft group home.
- Hale Kanaloa – Operated as Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) home. Owned since January 1992, 5 bed/3bath, 2,269 sq ft group home.
- Hale Malaihi – Closed Domiciliary (DOM) home. Owned since January 2013, 4 bed/3 bath, 2,320 sq ft group home.
- Hale Maunaloa – Operated as Domiciliary (DOM) home. Owned since June 2012, 5 bed/4 bath, 2,914 sq ft group home.

Director. This structure leverages existing personnel and does not require additional hires, ensuring cost efficiency and organizational continuity.

- Chief Executive Officer (Project Lead): Provides overall supervision and administrative direction, including contractor oversight, project scheduling, coordination of inspections, approval of invoices, compliance with grant and regulatory requirements, final project acceptance, and submission of required reports to funding agencies.
- Chief Financial Officer: Oversees all fiscal management functions, including accounting, expenditure monitoring, internal controls, recordkeeping, and financial reporting. The CFO ensures compliance with grant conditions and public fund accountability standards.
- Program Director: Serves as the primary operational liaison, supporting project coordination, scheduling of onsite activities, communication with staff and residents, and ensuring that services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities continue with minimal disruption during project activities.

Qualifications and Experience

Arc of Maui County's leadership team brings extensive experience relevant to this request:

- The CEO has over 20 years of experience managing programs for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and has successfully overseen multiple capital and grant-funded projects, including State Grant-in-Aid, Affordable Housing, and Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) initiatives.
- The CFO has more than 25 years of experience administering financial operations for publicly and privately funded grants, ensuring strong fiscal controls, compliance, and transparent reporting.
- The Program Director has nearly 20 years of service with Arc of Maui County and more than 30 years of experience in the developmental disabilities field, providing deep operational expertise and ensuring participant needs are fully integrated into project implementation.

Supervision, Training, and Administrative Direction

Arc of Maui County maintains established systems for supervision, staff training, and administrative oversight. Executive leadership meets regularly to monitor project progress, address issues, and ensure compliance with organizational policies and grant requirements. Contractors and vendors will be supervised directly by the CEO, with operational support from the Program Director.

Staff impacted by project improvements including emergency power systems, safety equipment, AED deployment, and security enhancements will receive appropriate training on system use, safety procedures, and emergency protocols. Training completion will be documented and maintained as part of project records.

Service Capacity and Project Viability

The proposed staffing structure supports uninterrupted service delivery for participants throughout project implementation. Arc of Maui County's demonstrated experience managing similar projects confirms the viability of the request and the organization's ability to complete the project efficiently, responsibly, and in full compliance with funding requirements.

This staffing pattern, combined with experienced leadership and proven administrative systems, confirms Arc of Maui County’s ability to successfully implement the proposed project and responsibly manage public funds.

Arc of Maui County is committed to sustaining the benefits of this project beyond Fiscal Year 2027, even if additional grant funding is not received thereafter. All planned upgrades will be completed within the 12-month grant cycle, significantly improving safety, accessibility, and emergency preparedness. These improvements will reduce future operating costs (e.g., through energy savings from PV systems) and strengthen resilience, ensuring sustainability for years to come.

Arc of Maui County will maintain and operate all improvements through:

- **Existing Operating Budget and Revenue Streams:** Supported by Medicaid reimbursements, program revenues, and other recurring funding sources.
- **Preventive Maintenance and Cost Savings:** Energy-efficient systems and PV panels will reduce utility costs, allowing savings to be reinvested into maintenance and emergency readiness.
- **Additional Funding Sources:** In the current nonprofit landscape, where funding cuts and increased competition for resources are common, these renovations **cannot be completed without grant support**. If this grant is not approved, Arc of Maui County will actively seek alternative funding sources similar to our success in securing **\$306,000 from County of Maui CDBG funds** and **\$15,000 from the Atherton Family Foundation** to complete critical upgrades.
- **Community Partnerships:** Leveraging local partnerships for in-kind support and emergency resources.

Because these improvements are one-time capital investments, sustainability beyond the grant period is achievable through existing resources and strategic planning. However, initial completion of the renovations is only possible through grant funding, given the current nonprofit funding environment and the scale of the required upgrades.







Services to be supported by the grant: **This is a capital investment request:**

- ❖ **Equip the main building to function as fully operational emergency shelter for Arc of Maui County’s residential group home program with by ensuring uninterrupted power with installation of photovoltaic panels and battery backup system, increase safety and access to building with electronic gate system, and purchase and deploy automated external defibrillators (AEDs) to support rapid life saving response.**
- ❖ **Improve accessibility and inclusion for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities by ensuring the building is ADA compliant, conversion of non-operable windows with energy efficient opening windows and replacement of aging air conditioning system to ensure a climate controlled environment.**
- ❖ **Promote long-term sustainability and operational efficiency and increase overall emergency preparedness.**

Target group: **Children and adults with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities within our residential group home program, one-on-one community services, adult day health program and vocational/employment services.**
