The applicant specifies that the grant will be used for a public purpose pursuant to Section 42F-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, by supporting food security and strengthening local agricultural capacity through construction of an essential agricultural support building at the Hawaii Island Agriculture Innovation Park and Food Systems Campus (AIPFSC). This CIP request will provide emergency food storage overflow and enable the secure operation of agricultural lands and related community farm programming that supports food access, education, and long-term resiliency in Hawai'i County.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Food Basket Inc., Hawai'i Island's Food Bank's mission is to end hunger in Hawai'i. Serving 70,000+ low-income Hawai'i Island residents/month, immediate needs are addressed through our Emergency Food Program which includes Partner Agency Distribution, Emergency Food Boxes, Keiki Backpacks and School Pantries, Kupuna Pantry for low-income seniors, and 'Ohana Food Distributions. Our Healthy Food Access Programs include SNAP Outreach, DA

BOX Community Supported Agriculture, DA BUX Double Up Food Bucks (a statewide nutrition program offering a 50% discount to SNAP recipients buying local produce from participating retailers), Kōkua Harvest (community gleaning), and Mālama Da Farmer (a central information hub for local farmers).

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

This request will support the construction of a 4,000 square foot agricultural support building at the AIPFSC. Project goals include:

- Support temporary emergency food storage overflow from the main warehouse
- Strengthen local agricultural operations capacity through secure and functional on-site infrastructure
- Support consistent community farm operations and agriculture education activities
- Enable leased farm plots consistent with the AIPFSC master plan
- Improve protection of farm equipment and prevent operational disruptions caused by theft and inadequate storage
- Support long-term food systems resilience and local food production capacity in Hawai'i County

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Food insecurity remains one of the most urgent challenges facing Hawai'i County. According to the State of Food Insecurity in Hawai'i 2024–2025 report, 43% of Hawai'i County households are food insecure, representing approximately 90,000 individuals, while 32% of households statewide experience food insecurity—underscoring the widespread and persistent need for food support services across Hawai'i. The Food Basket anticipates serving over 70,000+ low-income residents per month, reflecting the scale of need and the importance of expanding local capacity to provide consistent food assistance and emergency meal support.

At the same time, Hawai'i Island's long-term food security is directly impacted by challenges facing the local agricultural sector, including limited farm infrastructure, high input costs, geographic barriers, and continued dependence on food imported from thousands of miles away. These vulnerabilities create risk during emergencies and supply disruptions and reinforce the need to strengthen local food production capacity.

This CIP request supports an agriculture support building that will directly enable the farm lands component of the AIPFSC project by providing secure infrastructure necessary for reliable farm operations, community education, and leased farm plots. The building will provide protected storage for essential equipment and supplies and reduce operational disruptions caused by repeated theft and break-ins at the AIPFSC site. By improving operational readiness and

continuity, this project will support local agriculture activity and increase long-term resilience in Hawai'i County's food system.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target population includes Hawai'i County community members who will benefit from expanded local agriculture education and participation opportunities, including individuals and families interested in small-scale farming, backyard food production, and youth agriculture engagement through demonstration farms, gardens, and ongoing community training efforts. Over time, these efforts are anticipated to strengthen Hawai'i County's agricultural ecosystem and local food systems network by increasing community capacity, participation, and resilience.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The project will serve Hawai'i County, with operations based at the AIPFSC site and benefits extending island-wide through improved agricultural capacity, education, and food systems resilience.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Grant funds will support the construction and site preparation required to complete a 4,000 sq ft enclosed agricultural support building at the AIPFSC site. The scope of work includes project coordination, contractor procurement, permitting and compliance activities, and final closeout to place the facility into service. Specific tasks and responsibilities include:

- Permitting and required inspection coordination to ensure code compliance
- Site preparation, grading, and base work necessary for building placement
- Construction of a basic enclosed agricultural support building with a concrete floor
- Installation of full enclosure and security features, including lockable access points and enclosed bays for equipment storage
- Basic electrical service to support industrial lighting and essential power needs
- Utility planning and coordination for future connections, as applicable
- Final inspections, punch list completion, and project closeout

Facility Use / Space Breakdown (4,000 sq ft total):

The facility will provide secure, enclosed space to support community farm operations, including equipment storage, operational staging, and program support needs. The project budget of \$106.63 per square foot represents a basic, non-insulated pole barn structure with a concrete floor, industrial lighting, and basic electrical service.

Quarter 1: Vendor selection, site preparation and grading

Quarter 2: Concrete slab installation. Begin building framing

Quarter 3: Framing/Roofing, electrical trenching, and utility hookups

Quarter 4: Complete construction, final inspections, operational readiness, move-in of equipment and supplies

The Food Basket will ensure quality assurance through construction oversight, contractor management, compliance with permitting requirements, and required inspections. After completion, the organization will evaluate effectiveness through operational tracking related to agricultural lands readiness, reduced equipment loss, and improved ability to deliver consistent community farm operations and education activities.

Budget Summary

Grant funds will support the construction and site preparation required to complete a 4,000 sq ft enclosed agricultural support building at the AIPFSC site. The facility will be a basic enclosed pole barn structure with a concrete floor, designed to provide secure storage for farm equipment, tools, supplies, and operational workspace.

Scope includes:

- Site preparation and grading
- Construction of a basic enclosed pole barn structure with concrete slab
- Permitting and required inspections
- Budget Summary / Cost Breakdown

The project cost is based on a basic pole barn building with no insulation and minimal interior buildout:

- Building construction (4,000 sq ft × \$100/sq ft): \$400,000
(includes basic enclosed structure, concrete slab, and basic lighting/electrical)
- Site grading: \$25,000
- Permitting and inspections: \$1,500

Total Estimated Project Cost: **\$426,500** (\$106.63/sqft)



The Food Basket has the experience and operational capacity to implement this project and deliver food access services across Hawai'i County, including during major emergencies and disruptions such as the COVID-19 pandemic, Hurricane Lane, the 2018 Kīlauea eruption, and periods of economic instability. In 2025, The Food Basket distributed over 3.5 million pounds of food while coordinating large-scale emergency food distribution, disaster response, and community partnerships across Hawai'i Island. The Food Basket is positioned to successfully deploy and operate expanded meal preparation capacity, ensure compliance with applicable requirements, and integrate prepared and emergency meal production into existing distribution systems to support consistent service delivery for communities in need.

2. Facilities

The Food Basket operates three warehouses in Hilo and Kona totaling approximately 25,000 square feet of space that support food storage, distribution, and program administration across Hawai'i County. The proposed Agricultural Support Building will be located at the Hawai'i Island Agriculture Innovation Center and Food Systems Campus (AIPFSC), a 24.5-acre parcel in Hilo that will serve as the future home of The Food Basket's headquarters and is currently vacant land undergoing grading and infrastructure preparation. The building will provide secure, enclosed space to support safe and efficient agricultural operations, including equipment and supply storage, workspace, and essential program support functions aligned with the long-term development of the site.



Upon completion, the agricultural support building will be utilized by the Ho'olako Farm Manager and program staff to support community farm operations, agricultural education programming, and leased plot coordination, with facilities support provided by The Food Basket's operations team, which manages more than 25,000 square feet of facilities across Hawai'i County.
