

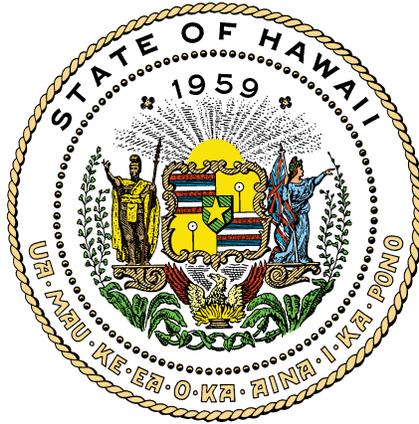

**DECLARATION STATEMENT OF
APPLICANTS FOR GRANTS PURSUANT TO
CHAPTER 42F, HAWAII REVISIED STATUTES**

The undersigned authorized representative of the applicant certifies the following:

- 1) The applicant meets and will comply with all of the following standards for the award of grants pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
 - a) Is licensed or accredited, in accordance with federal, state, or county statutes, rules, or ordinances, to conduct the activities or provide the services for which a grant is awarded;

Gandhi International Institute for Peace (GIIP)



II. Background and Summary

1. Background

Gandhi International Institute for Peace (GIIP) was founded on September 11, 2001, by Dr. Raj Kumar in direct response to the tragic terrorist attacks on the Twin Towers in New York. Out of profound grief emerged a powerful vision: to transform violence, fear, and division into a global movement rooted in nonviolence, compassion, and peace. GIIP was established from the belief that even in humanity's darkest moments, hope can rise through conscious action and moral courage.

GIIP's mission is to educate, inspire, empower individuals and communities to resolve conflicts by nonviolent means. Through education, consultation, training, and community engagement, this Institute works to reduce violence in all its forms and cultivate harmony in families, schools, workplaces, and society at large. At its core, GIIP seeks to awaken the human conscience and inspire a collective commitment to promote peace on earth.

Based in Honolulu, GIIP has served Hawaii and the global community for over two decades. Its work has earned recognition and formal commendations from the Governors, State Legislators, U.S. Senators, and Members of Congress, as well as respected institutions including the Spark M. Matsunaga Peace Institute, East-West Center at the

University of Hawaii, United Nations Association of Hawaii, Pacific Buddhist Academy, and numerous interfaith and community organizations.

- In December 2014, GIIP initiated Senate Bill SB 332 which was unanimously passed by the Senate and House, and signed into Act 5 by former Governor, David Y. Ige on April 9, 2015. This made Hawaii the first state in the nation to proclaim October 2nd as “Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi Day”. GIIP has received Proclamations from Honorable Governors of Hawaii, Dr. Neil Abercrombie, David Y. Ige and Dr. Josh Green. GIIP also has received certificates from the Senate and House for the annual Mahatma Gandhi Day event in the past years.
- In the Twenty- Eight Legislature of the State of Hawaii in 2016, GIIP initiated Resolution SCR 20 to establish a Sister State relationship between the State of Hawaii and Goa, Republic of India. The resolution was adopted by Hawaii legislature unanimously as State Concurrent Resolution 20, SD 1, HD 1- further honoring the legacy of Gandhi, promoting international peace and goodwill among Hawaii and India’s peoples through travel, culture and arts exchange, increased educational opportunities, and economic opportunities. The formal signing ceremony for the Hawai’i-Goa sister state relationship by representatives of the two governments took place at Washington Place in Honolulu on September 28, 2018.
- GIIP initiated a House Bill to the Hawaii Legislature, HB 349, to recognize June 21st of each year as International Yoga Day in Hawaii. The House Bill was signed into Act 102 by former Governor David Y. Ige on June 21, 2019. Hawaii became the first state in the U.S. to pass this bill. Since 2019, GIIP has organized an annual International Yoga Day event to raise awareness about Health and Peace in Hawaii.
- GIIP played a pivotal role in making Hawaii the first State in our nation to officially recognize Mahatma Gandhi Day (October 2) and International Yoga Day (June 21), reinforcing Hawaii’s leadership as a beacon of peace, wellness, and global harmony.

Guided by the timeless philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi, GIIP has consistently promoted *Ahimsa*—nonviolence in thought, words, and actions. Its initiatives have united people across cultures, faiths, and generations through marches for peace, interfaith vigils, youth education, global dialogue, and legislative advocacy.

Through annual Mahatma Gandhi Day celebrations, International Yoga Day events, interfaith gatherings, educational workshops, and international webinars, GIIP has brought together world leaders, scholars, diplomats, spiritual leaders, mental health professionals, and youth voices. These efforts have strengthened Hawaii’s role as a bridge between cultures and a living example of peaceful co-existence.

GIIIP is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, deeply rooted in service, integrity, and community trust.

2. Goals and Objectives

The overarching goal of GIIIP is to raise awareness and foster the practice of world peace through nonviolence. At this critical stage of growth, GIIIP respectfully requests grant support from the Hawaii State Legislature to expand its capacity and meet the growing needs of the community.

With this support, GIIIP plans to:

Rent a space to host classes, events and workshops.

Increase visibility in the community to promote peace education, dialogue, and healing by hosting seminars, workshops, and programs.

Empower individuals to live nonviolently, providing them with practical knowledge and life skills that promote peaceful living which can be shared with future generations.

Expand access to peace education by enabling peace educators and mental health professionals to offer workshops for teachers, students, and organizations on conflict resolution, mediation, stress and anger management, bullying prevention, domestic and workplace violence prevention, and meditation.

Partner with other peace organizations to raise awareness about peace in the community to include Pacific Justice & Reconciliation Center, Iolani Peace Institute, Spark Matsunaga Peace Institute & Conflict Resolution Center, University of Hawaii, Pacific Buddhist Academy and Interfaith Alliances of Hawaii.

3. Public Purpose and need to be served

Hawaii is facing increasing challenges related to stress, violence, bullying, and emotional well-being. GIIIP responds to this urgent need by creating spaces for healing, learning, and collaboration. Political leaders, interfaith teachers, youth groups, peacemakers, artists, healers, mental health professionals, diplomats, and international dignitaries will be invited to Hawaii to share collective wisdom and solutions rooted in compassion and nonviolence.

Through workshops and seminars, GIIIP equips individuals with tools to manage anger, prevent violence, address bullying, and cultivate inner peace. Meditation and self-awareness practices are integral to helping participants regulate emotions, build resilience, and develop healthy coping strategies.

4. Target Population

GIIP serves the entire Hawaii community, including Ohana, Kupuna, youth, educators, peace advocates, healers, mental health professionals, social workers, and residents from all walks of life. Its programs are inclusive, intergenerational, and culturally responsive.

5. Geographic Coverage

GIIP's primary focus is the State of Hawaii. Its programs often bring national and international speakers to the islands, enriching local communities with global perspectives on peace, nonviolence, and human dignity.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Scope of Work

GIIP seeks to strengthen a local institute that encourages Hawaii's Ohana to live in peace and harmony. Grant support will enable GIIP to expand outreach by connecting peace-focused organizations and engaging individuals who may not yet be involved in peace initiatives. Through workshops, seminars, and webinars, GIIP will foster unity, collaboration, and shared purpose across communities.

Tasks & Responsibilities

Teaching stress management and emotional resilience

Training educators and administrators in bullying prevention

Offering mediation services for conflict resolution

Providing lectures on anger management and violence prevention

Educating the public on domestic and workplace violence prevention

Teaching meditation for self-management and emotional balance

2. Projected annual timeline for accomplishing the outcomes of the service

Programs will be offered year-round in schools, organizations, and community settings.

3. Quality Assurance and Evaluation

GIIP will engage a qualified part-time consultant to strengthen evaluation systems, enhance service quality, and support outreach and marketing efforts. Participant feedback will be collected through surveys following each program to assess impact, improve

delivery, and measure real-life application of learned skills. A grant committee will meet regularly to review progress and outcomes.

VI. Organizational Capacity and Staffing



WHEREAS, born on October 2, 1869, Mahatma Gandhi grew up under British colonial rule in his mother country of India; and

WHEREAS, he traveled to England to study law and subsequently moved to South Africa to work and develop his commitment to civil rights and nonviolent resistance; and

WHEREAS, in 1915 he returned to India to lead the movement for independence against the British rule; and

WHEREAS, as the central figure of Indian nationalism, he led the country to independence through use of non-violent civil disobedience during a time when the British dominated India, becoming a renowned world leader for his successful campaign using nonviolent philosophy of passive resistance; and

WHEREAS, his legacy flourishes present day as he remains an inspiration for various political leaders and civic rights movements globally; and

WHEREAS, in Hawai'i, the Gandhi International Institute for Peace commemorates the 156th birthday of Gandhi; and

WHEREAS, in conjunction with Gandhi's birthday, GIIP is celebrating International Day of Nonviolence which has chosen the theme of Global Peace; and

WHEREAS, this is a milestone year as GIIP marks the 20th anniversary of Act 5, a law making Hawai'i the first state in the nation to designate October 2 of each year as Mahatma Gandhi Day; and

WHEREAS, GIIP has been instrumental in its unwavering dedication and commitment to promote peace and understanding for a harmonious and inclusive society;

NOW, THEREFORE I, Josh Green, M.D., Governor of the **State of Hawai'i**, do hereby proclaim October 2, 2025 as

Hawai'i law recognizes October 2 as "**Mahatma Gandhi Day**." In 2015, **Act 5** designated this date in our state calendar, aligning Hawai'i with the U.N. observance of the International Day of Non-Violence observed annually on October 2. Our island tradition is rooted in place: the life-size bronze statue of Mahatma Gandhi, dedicated in **1990** near the Honolulu Zoo, has become a gathering point for these commemorations and a reminder that peace begins with each of us.

Gandhi's example of steadfast nonviolence and truth-telling—satyagraha—helped shape movements for freedom across the globe and continues to guide efforts to resolve conflict with dignity and empathy. By gathering as one 'ohana to learn, sing, serve, and stand for nonviolence, we strengthen the bonds of community that make Hawai'i unique.

The **Senate of the State of Hawai'i** proudly honors and congratulates the Gandhi International Institute for Peace and all participants in the 20th Annual Mahatma Gandhi Day and International Day of Nonviolence. 
