

II. Background and Summary

1. Applicant Background

Hawai'i Farmers Union Foundation (HFUF) is a statewide nonprofit organization affiliated with Hawai'i Farmers Union (HFU), supporting more than 900 farmers, fishers, ranchers, and producers across Hawai'i Island, Maui, Lāna'i, Moloka'i, O'ahu, and Kaua'i. HFUF provides funding, education, technical assistance, and coordination to strengthen local food production and agricultural resilience statewide. The organization works in close partnership with public agencies, research institutions, and community organizations to deliver farmer education, convenings, and direct support across all counties. HFUF has the demonstrated experience, administrative capacity, and on-the-ground relationships necessary to manage public funding and deliver statewide agricultural programs effectively.

2. Goals and Objectives

The goal of this request is to support a statewide Farmer Education and Outreach program that improves access to timely information, training, and coordination for Hawai'i's farmers and producers. Objectives include:

- Hosting the HFU statewide annual convention, "Mahi'ai Makahiki," in partnership with the University of Hawai'i College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) for 500 attendees at the Waimānalo Learning Center.
- Delivering monthly online webinars (12), alternating between agricultural and legislative education topics.
- Providing direct outreach, technical assistance, and support to 900+ HFU members via phone, text, and email.
- Ensuring farmers statewide have access to reliable, up-to-date information on programs, funding, resources, and policy issues impacting agriculture.

3. Public Purpose and Need

Hawai'i's agricultural producers operate in one of the most challenging food production environments in the nation due to geographic isolation, high input and shipping costs, limited land access, and rapidly changing regulatory and program requirements. According to the 2022 USDA Census of Agriculture, Hawai'i has 6,569 farms, a 10% decrease since 2017, and 1.053 million acres dedicated to farming, with significant acreage loss over the same period. The state's farm landscape is dominated by small operations, with 4,231 farms between one and nine acres, making consistent access to technical information, program navigation, and peer learning especially important for farm viability.

Hawai'i's producers are also aging. The average age of farmers in the state is approximately 60.8 years, with 44% over age 65 and roughly 14% over age 75. This increases the urgency of education, knowledge transfer, and coordinated support for both existing and emerging producers. At the same time, Hawai'i remains heavily reliant on imported food, estimated at approximately 85-90%, leaving the state vulnerable to supply chain disruptions and underscoring the public value of strengthening local food production capacity.

This project serves a clear public purpose by strengthening statewide agricultural education and outreach infrastructure. The program connects agricultural producers to practical knowledge and regenerative best practices, improves access to state and federal programs, and provides timely legislative and regulatory education so producers can adapt to policy changes affecting their operations. By delivering a statewide convention in partnership with CTAHR and a year-round educational webinar program accessible across islands, HFUF reduces information barriers that disproportionately impact small and geographically isolated producers and supports a more resilient agricultural economy for Hawai'i.

In addition to the convention and webinars, HFU members will have direct access to HFUF's outreach team via phone, email, and text to receive timely assistance, be notified of educational opportunities and events, and obtain quick guidance connecting them to relevant programs, funding opportunities, resources, and technical support.

4. Target Population

The target population includes farmers, fishers, and ranchers statewide, with a focus on HFU members and other producers seeking education and connection to agricultural programs and services. All webinars and educational resources will be open to the public and made available online post-event to ensure broad access.

5. Geographic Coverage

The project will serve producers across all counties. Educational programming will be delivered in person at the convention hosted at CTAHR's Waimānalo Learning Center on O'ahu in October 2026, and virtually through online recorded webinars ensuring free access for farmers in rural and remote communities.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The HFU annual convention is the largest farmer-led regenerative and organic agriculture convening in the state and is intentionally grounded in Hawaiian cultural practice. The 2026 convention, hosted in partnership with the University of Hawai'i CTAHR, is expected to bring together approximately 500 farmers, fishers, ranchers, educators, and community partners from across the islands. Centered on the theme "Mahi'ai Makahiki," the convention recognizes agriculture as both an economic and cultural foundation of Hawai'i's communities.

The event will feature farmer-led panels and hands-on workshops focused on land and water access, markets, and regenerative practices, alongside cultural protocol, 'ike kūpuna, and Makahiki traditions that emphasize harvest, stewardship, reflection, and renewal. Food served at the convention will be sourced locally and used as a practical teaching tool to highlight both the strengths and current gaps in Hawai'i's food system, creating space for honest discussion about production, access, and resilience. By convening producers, researchers, public agency partners, and policymakers in one place, the convention strengthens statewide coordination, reinforces pride of place, and supports a more resilient and culturally grounded agricultural economy.

HFUF will also deliver twelve statewide webinars during the grant period, alternating between agricultural education topics (such as USDA programs, food safety certification, organic certification, regenerative practices, etc.) and legislative and regulatory education relevant to farmers and producers. Webinars will be free, conducted virtually, open to the public, recorded, and made available after each session.

The HFUF outreach team will provide ongoing direct support to HFU members, with a minimum of 1,500 direct connections via phone or text over the grant period. Members will have direct access to outreach staff by phone, email, and text to get questions answered, receive assistance connecting to programs and resources, and stay informed about upcoming trainings and events.

HFUF will provide program oversight and required reporting to ensure activities are delivered as proposed and in compliance with the State's requirements.

- Provide follow-up education and resources informed by convention feedback

Quarter 4 (April – June)

- Deliver three statewide webinars
- Review participation, trends, and outcomes from education activities
- Provide ongoing direct outreach and member support
- Complete required reporting for each deliverable and compile lessons learned

Participation at the annual convention in October will be tracked through online registration and attendance. Participant feedback will be collected via an online survey within 30 days following the event to inform follow-up education and future convention planning.

Each webinar will track online registrations and event attendance. Brief post-webinar surveys will be used to assess topic relevance and usefulness, and results will inform adjustments to future webinar topics, timing, or format.

Direct outreach activity will be tracked on an ongoing basis. Outreach staff will make notes regarding each member conversation and/or inquiry in HFU's CRM, Neon, and will review the notes monthly to identify trends in community needs. Common information requests can be addressed through future education or outreach.

Program staff will conduct quarterly internal reviews to confirm activities are delivered as planned and to make any necessary adjustments during the grant period.

V. Experience and Capability

1. Necessary Skills and Experience

Hawai'i Farmers Union Foundation has organized and hosted 13 annual statewide HFU conventions, most recently convening more than 300 participants on Hawai'i Island at Kahalu'u Ma Kai in Kona with participation from farmers, ranchers, fishers, and producers across all islands, federal and state legislators, agricultural educators, and public agency partners. These events reflect HFUF's deep relationships with Native Hawaiian cultural practitioners, regenerative and organic agriculture leaders, and community partners, and demonstrate the organization's capacity to convene large, culturally grounded, statewide agricultural gatherings.

HFUF delivers year-round farmer education through webinars, technical assistance, and direct outreach. Through the Transition to Organic Partnership Program (TOPP), HFUF provides statewide webinars, mentorship, and one-on-one technical assistance. In the most recent reporting quarter, HFUF hosted four webinars with over 150 participants, provided direct technical assistance to more than 70 producers, and supported an active mentorship program serving 33 mentees and 6 mentors. In addition, the HFUF Outreach Team conducted more than 1,000 member texts and calls in the past six months, with feedback directly informing the development of the 2026 Q1 webinars focused on USDA program changes and current funding opportunities for farmers.

HFUF also administers farmer-facing funding programs that require outreach, coordination, and reporting. This year in partnership with Hawai'i Green Growth (HGG) and 'Āina Aloha Economic Futures (AAEF), HFUF administered \$100,000 in trust-based grant funding directly to agricultural producers, and in 2024 distributed more than \$200,000 directly to Hawai'i farmers. HFUF additionally administers targeted subsidy and recovery programs, including the I'a Bux pilot in Hāna, which generated more than \$25,000 in direct sales for Native Hawaiian fishers in 2025 while expanding affordable access to locally caught fish for local families. HFUF also leads programming at the Ku'ia Agricultural Education Center (KAEC), supporting culturally grounded agricultural education, regenerative grazing, and reforestation efforts across previously fallow agricultural lands in the ahupua'a of Ku'ia mauka Lahaina, Maui.

HFUF delivers statewide education webinars via Zoom, allowing farmers from all islands to participate, with recordings posted publicly on Youtube. The 2026 annual convention will be hosted at the University of Hawai'i CTAHR Waimānalo Learning Center on O'ahu, which can accommodate the estimated 500 attendees.



Implementation and team management will be overseen by the Outreach Director, with administrative supervision and fiscal oversight provided by HFUF's CEO, COO, and CFO, who collectively bring decades of management experience and direct experience as farmers and agricultural workers. A Convention Coordinator with relevant experience will be contracted with to support the planning, promotion, and on-site execution of the annual convention.

JUSTIFICATION/COMMENTS: Personnel costs support the delivery of statewide farmer education and outreach services funded through this request. The Outreach Director allocates 45% of their time to helping support the statewide convention, overseeing outreach staff, developing educational programming, and ensuring timely reporting. Two part-time Membership Coordinators each allocate 30% of their time to direct member support, webinar coordination, farmer communications, and logistical support for statewide education activities. The Social Media Coordinator allocates 40% of their time to promoting educational programming, disseminating webinar content, sharing legislative education resources, and ensuring farmers statewide are informed of available trainings and services. All allocations reflect actual staff time dedicated to implementing the proposed scope of work.
