

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background:

Kalihi-Palama Health Center (KPHC) is a 501 (C) (3) non-profit health care agency. KPHC is a Federally Qualified Community Health Center (FQHC) that plays a critical role in the community by providing health care and social services to residents who typically face significant barriers when accessing health care and social services. KPHC is located in the heart of Kalihi-Palama with a satellite in Honolulu's Downtown/Chinatown and a clinic for homeless residents in the Iwilei Punawai Clinic. We have the highest concentration of public housing and tax-subsidized low-income rental units in Hawaii.

KPHC opened its doors in 1975 in response to community concerns regarding both the health and the social determinants of health of poor Native Hawaiians and immigrants from several Asian Countries and the Pacific Islands. In addition to poverty, these residents continue to face tremendous language and cultural barriers that affect their health and their ability to access health care and to

navigate the care delivery systems in this diverse community for over 45 years. In 2024, we served 20,177 patients in 86,916 visits. This does not include the 3,000+ WIC residents we serve.

Due in part to economic and social issues, a portion of the community goes without preventive primary care services. This becomes increasingly difficult for expectant moms. In 2024, there were 525 expectant mothers. Of those, 306 or 58.28% came in for their first trimester prenatal check-up. The national average UDS 2024 is 63.64%. There were 326 babies born in 2024. 22 or 6% had low birth weight and an additional 6 babies or 1.84% had very low birth weight.

KPHC screened 54.30% for cervical cancer and 37.90% for breast cancer. The national average for cervical cancer screenings is 55.37% and for breast cancer 53.96%.

Food insecurity plays a big role in health. According to a recent article, statewide there are 32% of households that have food insecurity. Within the Honolulu District, food insecurity is 25%. Within the Kalihi area, Farrington and McKinley High School Complex there is approximately 70% of the school students at the elementary level qualify for free or reduced lunch. For middle school 65% and high school 43%. KPHC has a high number of patients that suffer from chronic conditions. In our 2024 UDS, 32% of KPHC patients had Hb1AC greater than 9 and 36 % had uncontrolled hypertension. By managing diet, exercise and regular visits to the clinic, we can manage their chronic conditions and avoid more expensive health care.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;
The following are the goals and objectives for the request.
 1. Improve the health and well-being of the most vulnerable in our community by utilizing food, education and community outreach to provide preventive health education to populations that have difficulty with access to health care and social services.
 2. Increase the rate of prenatal care for expected mothers.
 3. Provide preventive health education for populations that have difficulty accessing care.
 4. For the community to teach health professionals about best practices to be culturally proficient.
 5. Provide 50 boxes of food a week which include fresh fruits, vegetables and protein to Hawaiian residents a week.
3. The public purpose and need to be served; currently, the health care system needs to improve its delivery of preventive health care services to the community. This results in poor health outcomes and an increase in unnecessary hospitalizations. Areas such as prenatal care, women and men's health, cancer

screenings and other preventive care visits decrease the need for costlier services.

This could potentially save the state millions of dollars in health care costs. Preventive health services provided on an outpatient basis, reduce poor health outcomes, emergency room visits and hospitalizations.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

KPHC's target population is predominantly residents of Asian origin, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Island ethnic minorities. Over 83% of KPHC's patients come from these ethnic minorities. Overall, KPHC serves patients in 17 different languages and cultures, with 52% Asian and 31% Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islanders.

While there are some health care providers in the community, few are proficient in the languages and cultures of the patients KPHC serves.

Poverty, language/cultural barriers, low health literacy and scarcity of health care providers willing and able to serve the target population are significant factors impacting access to care in the target population.

Poverty is a serious barrier. Patients report they do not come for their scheduled visit because they cannot afford it. Even though KPHC emphasizes that services are provided regardless of the patients' ability to pay, patients are hesitant because they cannot pay for specialty care or hospitalization. Often, patients' conditions worsen because they cannot afford to fill their prescriptions.

Our service area includes the highest concentration of densely populated public housing and tax-subsidized low-income rental units in Hawaii.

Multiple ethnicities and languages cause social isolation. Word of mouth plays a significant role in sharing information among the poor and disenfranchised. KPHC has observed that often there is little to no interaction among neighbors of different ethnicities, so people are cut off from a critical source of information.

Besides being short of capacity for the services that are provided, there is a great need for additional services for diabetes, hypertension, kidney disease, obesity, cancer, asthma, tuberculosis, oral disease, behavioral health and low birth weight. Many of KPHC's patients suffer from two or more of these conditions.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

KPHC is located in the heart of Kalihi-Palama, with satellite facilities in Downtown/Chinatown and a clinic for homeless residents in Iwilei Punawai Clinic. The area is densely populated, multiple ethnicities, multiple languages, poor,

urban, inner-city community of Honolulu, Hawaii. The area also has a high percentage of unemployed and uninsured citizens. It includes Census Tracts 51 through 60 and the contiguous areas. The area is designated as a Medically Underserved Population (MUP) and a Medical, Mental Health, and Dental Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) by Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA).

It is important to note that our linguistic and cultural proficiency draws patients from all over Oahu. About 60% of the patients served at KPHC reside outside our geographic service area.

KPHC will accomplish the project with the following:

KPHC has a quality committee led by our Quality/Compliance Officer Dr. Keith Larson, our Dental Director, and Medical Director Dr. Leanna Gordon. The

committee includes departmental representation and meets quarterly to review quality initiatives and program outcomes. Quality Improvement results/progress are reported to our Board of Directors Quality Assurance Committee, which meets quarterly to review KPHC's Quality metrics and reports.

KPHC utilizes the Plan Do Study Act (PDSA) method of change for quality improvement. This method starts to change at its smallest level, i.e. one patient, doctor or, for this project, a community member. We trial a strategy to engage and educate, implement the action, we assess what worked, what did not and make improvements and test again. Once all the processes and challenges have been worked out, and quality improvements are recognized, the implementation spreads to a wider group within KPHC. The goal is to implement the changes at small steps until the entire agency has adopted the change/improvement.

KPHC was founded by historic Kaumakapili Church as Hale Ho'ola Hou – House of New Life – because of community concern over the health of its poverty-stricken residents. In 1975, KPHC was incorporated as an independent 501(c)(3) non-profit organization bearing its current legal name of Kalihi Palama Health Center.

KPHC provides primary care and social services to those who are “in-need.” KPHC is distinguished by providing language and culturally appropriate care to those who face significant barriers to accessing such care. KPHC is located in what is considered to be Honolulu, Hawaii’s inner city with a satellite clinic in Downtown/Chinatown. The Kalihi-Palama area is a densely populated poor, urban community of Honolulu that has the highest concentration of public housing and low-income rental units in Hawaii, as well as the largest homeless shelter in the state.

Last year, per Uniform Data System or (UDS), KPHC saw 20,796 patients in 104,415 visits. This does not include the 3,000+ WIC residents we serve. These services are provided to people regardless of ability to pay, in 17 distinct languages and cultures from all over the island, which is the characteristic that makes KPHC unique.

Diabetes, cardiovascular and chronic kidney disease, cancer, and asthma are among the major health care needs for KPHC’s patient population. In addition, there are challenges that accompany poverty, illiteracy, health illiteracy, language, and cultural

differences, and what patients consider to be an “alien” health care and social services delivery system, creating overwhelming barriers to health and social services for KPHC’s patients. These are significant contributing factors to poor health and account for numerous poverty-stricken residents who, because of these barriers, find themselves among the homeless ranks.

KPHC’s mission is to provide quality, integrated health and social services to its community and all others in need of health care. The organizational focus is on preventative and primary health care, provided in a respectful, caring, and culturally sensitive environment.

KPHC’s Healthcare for the Homeless Program is one of the most comprehensive in the State. It is composed of outreach services for those who are homeless, living on the streets, in parks and empty buildings; housing for disabled homeless residents; walk-in health clinics at homeless shelters for men and women; and assist with temporary housing for homeless residents who are discharged but do not have a place to recover from hospitalization. Recently, KPHC opened Punawai Clinic, which provides Primary Care to homeless residents. In addition, we have built our 89 South King Street, KPHC Downtown, 952 King Street, and our 710 North King Street sites.

KPHC has 9 sites in total. At the following sites, we provide clinical services, including medical, dental and behavioral health services: 915 N. King Street, 952 N. King Street, 710 N. King Street and 89 S. King Street. Our Dojo site houses administration staff, Optometry, and Social Services. Our Kohou site houses our Healthcare for the Homeless program. We also have 2 additional sites that serves the homeless population. One is located at the IHS Women and Children’s shelter, the second is our Punawai Clinic, which opened in January. Our Austin Lane site houses some administrative staff.

KPHC has long-term leases on all the sites except for 952 which KPHC owns the land.




