Kids Hurt Too Hawai'i (Kids Hurt Too) is a community-rooted nonprofit with over two decades of experience providing youth-centered mental health services in Hawai'i. Our mission is to strengthen connections to the community by bringing together children, teens, and their parents impacted by grief and trauma in safe and healing ways. We support children and families who have lost a loved one or who have experienced trauma, including divorce, incarceration, deployment, involvement with Child Welfare

Services, loss of housing due to homelessness or natural disasters, or have experienced other traumatic events.

We provide culturally grounded community outreach and mental health wellness programs for youth ages 3–24, including Healing Young Hearts peer support groups, community-based mentoring and outreach, crisis intervention, and individual therapy. Our services are available through our offices on O‘ahu and Maui, via mobile trauma units that travel statewide, through our call line, and at schools, shelters, and community settings on O‘ahu, Maui, and Kauai.

Rooted in the Strengthening Families Framework and adapted from the National Center for Grieving Children and Families, our trauma-informed, best-practice approach to mental health wellness integrates cultural healing and peer support. In 2024, KHTH served over 1,500 children, youth, and family members through peer groups and community outreach programs. All participants lived below Hawai‘i’s median household income, and 87.5% identified as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, populations disproportionately impacted by grief, trauma, homelessness, historical inequities, and limited access to mental health care.

Through our programming, KHTH is strengthening protective factors among youth and families, reducing the long-term impacts of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), and increasing emotional and social stability for families across the state.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Kids Hurt Too requests State Grant-in-Aid funding to **expand our 24/7 Call Line for Youth and Families**, helping those experiencing grief and trauma receive timely, trauma-informed support to build their protective factors, reduce ACEs impacts, and improve emotional and social skills.

To accomplish this, we will:

Staff the 24/7 Call Line with trained mental health professionals who can provide real-time crisis support, emotional stabilization, and referrals to appropriate services.

Develop the systems, tools, and protocols required to operate the call line year-round.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Kids Hurt Too offers timely, trauma-informed support to children, youth, and their families who have suffered the loss of a loved one or are facing trauma. This includes divorce, incarceration, deployment, involvement with Child Welfare Services, loss of housing due to homelessness or natural disasters, or having experienced identity-based trauma.

In Hawai‘i, one in 14 children will encounter the death of a parent or sibling before turning 18 (Childhood Bereavement Estimation Model, 2025). Last year, an average of

1,959 children were in foster care, and 5,073 children were reported as victims of abuse or neglect (Annual Progress and Services Report, State of Hawaii Department of Human Services). According to the Hawaii State Teachers Association, nearly 5,300 students are identified in unstable housing across the state, with 477 individuals in 133 families identified as homeless on neighbor islands (Bridging the Gap Point-in-Time Count, 2024) and 1,123 individuals in 276 families experiencing homelessness on O‘ahu (Partners in Care Point-in-Time Count, 2024). Youth who identify as m̄hū or LGBTQ+ also experience disproportionate mental health risks and are significantly more likely to report mental health challenges than their peers (National Alliance on Mental Illness).

During urgent, real-time crises that often occur outside traditional service hours, youth and families need access to emotional support. In response to federal funding cuts to suicide prevention services for LGBTQ+ youth on the national 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, Kids Hurt Too launched a 24/7 referral and crisis line for queer youth and families during the 2025 holiday season, a period when crisis incidents are elevated. Since launching in December 2025, 48 youth ages 14–24 have accessed mental health resources through the line. Due to the early success and demonstrated demand, with funding from the State Legislature, Kids Hurt Too will expand this service to provide year-round support for all children, youth, and families experiencing crisis related to grief and trauma.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Through the 24/7 Call Line for Youth and Families, Kids Hurt Too will serve youth ages 14–24 statewide and their families who are experiencing grief and trauma. All services will be offered at no cost to participants. Last year, 87.5% of those we served identified as Native Hawaiian or Pacific Islander, all lived below the state’s median household income, and 26% of youth clients self-identified as LGBTQ+.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The 24/7 Call Line for Youth and Families will be available statewide.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Kids Hurt Too will run a 24/7 Call Line for Youth and Families to provide immediate support, including crisis response and warm referrals, for youth and families experiencing grief, trauma, and related life stressors. The Call Line will serve individuals

statewide, with a focus on timely access to a trusted helper at any time of day. Tasks and responsibilities include:

- Operating a 24/7 statewide call line, with a rotating staff/intern schedule for ongoing coverage.
- Providing real-time support and triage, including screening for urgent safety concerns and identifying the caller's needs (grief support, trauma response, family stress, housing instability, food insecurity, etc.).
- Callers in active crisis will be connected to a warm line, where a trained mental health professional provides real-time support, de-escalation, safety planning, and appropriate next steps.
- For non-crisis needs, staff will provide warm referrals and connections to community-based supports (mental health counseling, grief support groups, housing, food, school supports, and other essential services).
- Staff will follow up with callers, as appropriate, to provide continued support.

Month 1:

- Program Director to finalize staffing plan and rotating coverage schedule for answering the line, as well as mental health professional coverage
- Program Director to train MSW interns on call protocols, crisis triage, documentation, and referrals
- Operations Manager to review and revise all procedures for the line, including updating the referral directory for housing, food, counseling, and other supports
- Executive Director to launch marketing and outreach materials

Month 2 - 12:

- Fully activate 24/7 Call Line operations using new procedures
- Begin routine documentation and tracking of call types, outcomes, and referrals
- Strengthen referral partnerships based on caller needs and trends
- Program Director to review service data monthly (peak call times, repeat callers, referral completion, urgent needs)
- Program Director to provide additional staff training as needed (e.g., suicide risk response, grief support, de-escalation)
- Executive Director to conduct outreach to schools, child welfare partners, and community agencies to inform them of the Call Line
- Operations Manager to compile service outcomes and reports to the expending agency

Quality assurance for the Call Line includes the creation of standard procedures to ensure consistent screening, crisis escalation, and referrals. All calls will be tracked using Kids Hurt Too's call log sheet, including caller information, demographics, needs

identified, actions taken, referrals provided, and feedback on the impact of the call. The Kids Hurt Too Program Director and Operations Manager will conduct monthly data reviews to identify patterns (such as increased call volume during certain times of year), improve staffing, refine referral pathways, and strengthen partnerships.

Kids Hurt Too has delivered peer support and culturally grounded mentoring services for more than twenty years, reaching approximately 2% of the state's children and families. Over the past year alone, Kids Hurt Too served over 1,500 children, youth, and family members through peer groups and mentoring programs.

Kids Hurt Too has a longstanding history of successfully managing government contracts and meeting complex performance requirements. The organization previously administered a Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) grant, providing trauma services to children affected by violence and crime, and is currently funded by the State of Hawaii to operate Multi-Modal Mentoring Services.

In addition, Kids Hurt Too is actively collaborating with the Department of Human Services Family Assessment Centers. Through this partnership, our Healing Young Hearts peer support groups are now embedded directly into contracts with homeless service providers, improving access for families facing housing instability.

The organization also maintains strong relationships with schools, shelters, health care providers, and community organizations across the state. Current partners include multiple DOE schools, Family Assessment Centers, shelters, and nonprofit agencies such as Healthy Mothers Healthy Babies and Hawaii Literacy, who rely on Kids Hurt Too to provide developmentally appropriate, culturally grounded emotional support to children, youth, and families.

Kids Hurt Too leases four office spaces within the Kukui Center (located at 245 N. Kukui St., Honolulu, HI 96817) totaling 3,086 sq feet. We also have an office space with our partners, Catholic Charities Hawaii at Maili Land.

On Maui:

On Maui, we lease space from the Cameron Center in Wailuku.

VI. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

Kids Hurt Too proposes a staffing structure that ensures the viability and sustainability of a 24/7 Call Line for Youth and Families, with clear program oversight, operational leadership, and program accountability. State Grant-in-Aid funds will support a Crisis and Training Manager (1.0 FTE, 100% allocated) to oversee call line operations and provide crisis support; an Operations Manager (1.0 FTE, 50% allocated) to manage scheduling, documentation systems, referral tracking, and reporting infrastructure; and a Program Director (1.0 FTE, 50% allocated) to finalize the staffing plan and rotating coverage schedule, including mental health professional coverage, and will train MSW interns on call protocols, crisis triage, documentation, and referral procedures. This staffing model will support an estimated 600 calls annually (duplicated), including warm

transfers for callers in crisis to immediate mental health support and referrals for non-crisis needs such as grief support, counseling, housing, and food resources. Kids Hurt Too will ensure all personnel are trained in trauma-informed, youth-centered practices, crisis de-escalation, confidentiality, documentation standards, and culturally responsive care, with ongoing supervision and continuous improvement guided by service data and caller feedback.

Kids Hurt Too has developed a comprehensive sustainability plan to ensure continuation and expansion of services beyond the grant period. The organization maintains a diversified funding portfolio that includes private foundations, individual donors, government contracts, and fee-for-service opportunities. Over the next several years, Kids Hurt Too will continue strengthening this portfolio by increasing multi-year foundation support, expanding its individual giving program, and cultivating new partnerships with corporate and philanthropic donors. A key component of this strategy is hiring an external grant writer to grow the organization's capacity to apply for and secure additional funding opportunities.

Kids Hurt Too is also investing in revenue-generating service lines to reduce reliance on grants. The planned addition of a licensed provider will allow the organization to bill for mental health services, enabling us to secure reimbursement for select grief- and trauma-support activities. This will provide long-term financial stability and increase access to services for families with insurance coverage.

In addition, the organization is strengthening its collaborative service model. Kids Hurt Too is actively partnering with schools, healthcare providers, shelters, and community organizations to share costs, braid funding streams, and embed services into partner budgets. A current pilot with the Department of Human Services' Family Assessment Centers demonstrates this model in practice, as Kids Hurt Too's services are now included in contracts held by homeless service providers. Expanding this approach with additional partners will position the organization to sustain and grow its impact well beyond the grant period.
