II. Background and Summary

Project Vision Hawai'i is a locally grown nonprofit organization that works in partnership with the people of Hawai'i to promote health, happiness and dignity for all. Our success in reaching vulnerable populations comes largely because of two unique components: (1) we bring health and human services directly to access-challenged communities; and (2) services are always free of charge to uninsured participants.

Project Vision recently acquired the free dental clinic previously operated by Aloha Medical Mission. The organization is honored to continue and expand the purpose of this dental program, which is to increase access to dental healthcare for underserved people in Hawai'i and beyond.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

With the acquisition of the dental clinic in Kalihi, previously operated by Aloha Medical Mission, Project Vision will increase access to care via three powerful objectives:

- Launch Better Smiles for Keiki, providing in-school dental screenings and education, provided in partnership with the Hawai'i Department of Education and partner organizations. We plan to serve 4,000 keiki in the upcoming fiscal year.
- Continue Welcome Smiles, a free restorative dental program serving 40 low-income women annually. Participants are women who have experienced substance dependency, incarceration, and/or domestic violence.
- Provide preventative and restorative dental treatment to 700 individuals at our dental clinic and 260 individuals via street outreach. We recently acquired a mobile dental clinic to bring critical oral health care out to communities in need.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Many Hawai'i residents face barriers to accessing essential dental care due to financial hardship, lack of insurance, and limited availability of affordable providers. Low-income individuals and families often cannot afford routine dental check-ups, preventative care, or necessary treatments, which can lead to untreated dental issues and worsening overall health. The high cost of living in Hawai'i further exacerbates these challenges, making dental care an unaffordable luxury for many who are already struggling to meet basic needs.

Indicators of lack of access to dental care in Hawai'i are evident across multiple populations, particularly among Native Hawaiians, low-income individuals, women with children, and children from underserved communities. Data show that Native Hawaiians experience higher rates of untreated dental decay and tooth loss compared to the statewide average. For example, the Hawai'i Department of Health has reported that Native Hawaiian children are significantly more likely to have cavities—over 70% of Native Hawaiian third graders have experienced tooth decay, compared to approximately 60% of their peers from other backgrounds. Similarly, low-income families face disproportionate barriers: nearly 40% of adults living below the federal poverty level in Hawai'i have not visited a dentist in the past year, often due to cost and lack of insurance.

Women with children, especially single mothers, are also affected by limited access to affordable dental care. Children from low-income households are less likely to receive preventive dental services, resulting in higher rates of untreated oral disease. In rural and neighbor island areas,

provider shortages further exacerbate disparities, making it difficult for many residents to find a dentist within a reasonable distance.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target populations to be served are:

- Elementary and middle school children in Title I public schools.
- Low-income women who have survived domestic violence, spent time in prison, and/or experienced houselessness.
- Other low-income individuals who face barriers to accessing healthcare.

Free dental services are crucial for these underserved communities, as they help prevent serious dental conditions that can impact one's ability to eat, speak, work, and attend school. By providing no-cost dental care, Project Vision helps reduce health disparities and improve the quality of life for vulnerable residents of Hawai'i. The need for these services remains pressing, as oral health is closely tied to general well-being, and timely intervention can prevent more severe and costly health problems in the future.

Regarding school outreach, keiki from low-income families often do not have routine dental care, leaving them vulnerable to untreated oral health issues. Through school-based screenings and preventative services, we will intervene early to identify problems before they become severe, reduce absenteeism due to dental pain, and promote overall well-being and academic success. By bringing dental care directly to schools, Project Vision will bridge gaps in access, ensuring that all children—regardless of their financial situation—will maintain healthy smiles and avoid long-term health complications.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The dental clinic is located in Kalihi, at 200 N. Vineyard Boulevard, serving residents from various parts of the island. School outreach will be focused on O'ahu in its first year, and expanding to neighbor islands in the future.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The pilot project of Better Smiles for Keiki is planned for the 2026-27 school year. Following the model of our longstanding vision program, Project Vision will establish an MOU with the

Department of Education and then work directly with local schools to provide schoolwide screenings and follow-up care. For in-school services, we have partnered with the Hawai'i Keiki Nurses since 2018. In January 2026, the State Plan Amendment will be submitted from Hawai'i Med-QUEST to the Centers of Medicare and Medicaid Services to cover dental screenings and oral health education services offered to Title I students. This amendment will support the pilot in 2026-27, with Hawai'i Keiki Nurses focusing on elementary students and Project Vision serving both middle and high school students.

We recently licensed the clinic's first pediatric dentist, which is the first in Hawai'i to be licensed using the community service license for mobile public health programs. She will also provide in-clinic pediatric care, which will be the first time the clinic has offered a peds specialist.

While delivering free dental care through the clinic and outreach models, Project Vision will pursue program sustainability through medical billing and charitable support. For the upcoming calendar year, we project \$40,000 per month in billing revenue, and our goal is to be financially self-sufficient within five years. The organization will continue to pursue philanthropic support to expand dental resources in Hawai'i and beyond.

In the 12-month grant period, Project Vision will continue the established in-clinic services, expand outreach, and develop the program to offer dental services in schools.

Fall 2026

- Formalize MOU with HDOE to provide dental services in schools
- Develop calendar for in-school dental screening
- Coordinate with schools to plan for each screening event
- Conduct school screenings and process results
- Work directly with the clinic and partners to provide follow-up care
- Provide mobile dental outreach events in community
- Recruit and serve women in need with Welcome Smiles
- Ongoing clinic operations providing dental services for low-income people

Spring 2026

- Review progress toward deliverables, adjust systems to ensure compliance
- Manage participant data and audit privacy practices
- Submit dental screening documentation to CHIP for reimbursement
- Conduct school screenings and process results
- Work directly with clinic and partners to provide follow-up care
- Plan for sustainability, including earned income through contracts and insurance reimbursement
- Finalize project and analyze cumulative data
- Complete project and submit final report

Project Vision has policies and guidelines for in-school health services, which will be updated to include dental outreach. The organization follows quality assurance guidelines set by the Department of Education as well as data management and privacy regulations for in-school programming. We collect feedback from school administrators, health service staff members, teachers, and family members to ensure that children are served with excellence and a high quality of care.

The in-clinic operations and mobile outreach will operate under guidance from the Dental Hui and oversight from the Aloha Medical Mission board. This clinic has a proven track record with decades of experience and input from national consultants. Additionally, Project Vision incorporates best practices from our partners, including federal qualified health centers and Hawai'i Keiki Nurses.

Participant data is managed in a HIPAA-compliant database, which allows Project Vision to track and evaluate projects and generate HIPAA-compliant reports.

Since 1995, Aloha Medical Mission operated a free dental clinic in Honolulu, serving hundreds of uninsured and low-income residents every year. In 2024, the Aloha Medical Mission board reached out to Project Vision Hawai'i, sharing that they were looking for a new operator for the clinic. Through exploration of the program and its financials, Project Vision determined that the clinic has value for this community and has the potential for sustainability. We assumed clinic operations last summer and expect to finalize the acquisition by March of 2026.

Project Vision Hawai'i is honored to continue and expand upon the Aloha Medical Mission legacy, which aligns with our mission to increase access to health and social services for the people of Hawai'i. We will ensure the longevity and sustainability of this venture by establishing viable revenue through third party billing for dental services. The organization has a proven track record of supporting charitable programs with medical billing. As an example, our in-school vision program serving 20,000 Hawai'i keiki annually, is largely supported by the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

Project Vision has experience bringing free health services to underserved communities through a mobile outreach approach. The organization is well-networked in education, human service and healthcare areas, having collaborated extensively with public and private organizations throughout the state. Recent accomplishments include growth of our mobile hygiene programs, bringing hot showers and resources to people experiencing homelessness on O'ahu, Kaua'i and Hawai'i Island. Project Vision provides more than 5,000 showers at outreach events annually, while expanding services to include case management, street medicine, and assistance with SNAP and Med-QUEST enrollment.

The Dental Clinic is located at 200 N. Vineyard Boulevard, Honolulu, HI 96817, operating under a lease agreement with Aloha United Way, Inc. The clinic is 1,347 square feet of clinical and office space, with access to shared conference rooms. Patients are supported with three dental chairs and a panoramic dental x-ray unit.

The Mobile Dental Clinic is a 2007 Chevy C5500 mobile unit, retrofitted with two dental chairs, four provider stools, a generator, and a wall-mounted x-rays unit. The unit includes a lab/sterilization area, bathroom, and wheelchair lift.

Project Vision requests a Grant-In-Aid to support this first year of program operations. The organization is investing in medical billing to achieve long-term sustainability, so the clinic will be less reliant on public and private grants in the future.

To achieve program sustainability through medical billing, we are expanding the billing infrastructure to ensure that dental services are accurately documented and billed to insurance providers, Medicaid, and other third-party payers. Project Vision is investing in staff training to

improve coding and claims submission, which will minimize denials and expedite reimbursements.

Over this past year, Project Vision upgraded the clinic's office management software, brought on four new dentists, credentialed and started billing, and maintained HRSA free clinic status two days a week. Additionally, we assisted with state plan amendment negotiations with Med-QUEST, in collaboration with Hawai'i Keiki and the Department of Health.

In January 2026, Project Vision began billing insurance and charging a sliding fee schedule on non-HRSA free clinic days. Through this process, we are training an in-house biller and in-house staff to reconcile payments with program data. In the latter part of the year, we will focus on training in credentialing, so this aspect of billing can be done in-house. This approach will facilitate the efficient onboarding of new volunteer providers. We will continue to steward relationships with insurers, regularly reviewing fee schedules to maximize reimbursement rates. Billing revenue will support staff salaries and operations, allowing the organization to expand outreach efforts and reduce reliance on philanthropic funding.


