R2R will provide ongoing support by pairing participants with trained volunteers who offer guidance, accountability, and encouragement, helping individuals stay on track toward sustainable living and preventing them from falling through the cracks.

II. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

For the past 40 years, River of Life Mission (ROLM) has been serving the suffering with meals, ministry and pathways to overcoming brokenness and marginalization. Since our establishment in 1985, River of Life Mission has served nearly 10 million free meals to those in need, currently averaging about 200,000 meals each year.

As the pandemic reshaped the landscape in Hawaii, ROLM made the decision to close its doors to public feeding at our Chinatown facility in April 2022 and move toward a new mobile model of service delivery grounded in local communities – HUBs. Resembling mobile community service fairs, HUB Events leverage partnerships to collectively tackle social determinants of homelessness through sustainable strategies. What began as one service location and a few hundred volunteers has grown to encompass over 240 monthly mobile HUB Events throughout Oahu, leveraging partnerships and mobilizing thousands of volunteers to bring transformation to people in housing crisis, one life at a time.

From 2022 – 2024, ROLM helped transition 280 individuals off the streets in collaboration with ministry and social services partners, celebrating an additional 105 individuals transitioning from street homelessness into safe and stable environments to date in 2025 alone. These outcomes include placements in detox programs, faith-based recovery centers, emergency shelters, veteran housing, and the State-supported Kauhale villages. Several individuals have also been reunited with family on the mainland, and we were honored to assist in arranging travel so they could begin the next chapter of their journey surrounded by the support of loved ones. In 2025, ROLM distributed 188,191 meals and bags of food to an average of more than 2,000 individuals experiencing housing instability each month.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Individuals in housing crisis are at high risk of slipping through the cracks as they transition off the streets unless they receive consistent, coordinated support, something too often missing in short-term interactions with this vulnerable population. The overall **GOAL** of this project is to strengthen the effectiveness of existing HUB Events across Oahu, providing meals, ministry, and wraparound services that help guide individuals in housing crisis transition away from the streets and along pathways toward stability.

Objectives over 12 months

- 1) Guide people in housing crisis along four essential phases of support: a) Meals & Ministry; b) Assistance and Basic Care; c) Treatment and Transition; and d) Shelter and Stability in collaboration with volunteers and partners.
- 2) Deliver meals, ministry and wraparound services to individuals of all ages in housing crisis over 180 operational days through HUB Events and the Road to Redemption Program.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Homelessness on Oahu is not just a statistic. It is a crisis that touches every corner of our island.

In 2024, nearly 4,500 people experienced homelessness on Oahu, with almost two-thirds unsheltered. Over the past decade, the number of homeless individuals has nearly doubled, with many surviving on sidewalks, in tents, cars, or along the beaches. Rather than faceless strangers, these are aunties, uncles and kupuna who deserve dignity, veterans who once served our country and even young people aging out of foster care who need support as they step into adulthood.

For many, homelessness begins with a health crisis, the loss of a job, or years of trauma that spirals out of control, leaving individuals without a safety net and pushing them into a cycle of instability that is incredibly difficult to escape. Hawaii's cost of living and housing market are among the highest in the nation, with even full-time working families just one crisis away from losing their homes. When a job is lost, a medical emergency arises or unresolved trauma resurfaces, the result can be a rapid downward spiral into homelessness. For individuals experiencing mental illness, substance use disorders or chronic health conditions, the pathway back to stability becomes even more difficult, requiring support outside the traditional homeless system.

Many individuals in housing crisis have faced repeated disappointment, rejection or negative encounters with service systems, leaving them reluctant to engage with programs that feel impersonal or transactional, ultimately deepening the cycle of homelessness. Building trust through consistent, person-centered relationships is essential to breaking down these barriers and fostering engagement, opening the door to services that can truly change lives.

What makes this issue urgent is that homelessness not only devastates those living it but is a costly strain on public systems for all. Med-Quest estimates that Hawaii averaged a staggering \$8.6 billion per month in healthcare spending for individuals experiencing homelessness between Jan 2010 – Sep 2017. The costs of arrests and incarceration days translates to \$51,000 per person per year for each chronically homeless individual remaining unsheltered in Hawaii. By comparison, the cost of providing housing and wraparound care is a fraction of that amount, resulting in a 76% savings in healthcare costs and a 61% drop in arrests and incarceration days.

Unfortunately, cuts to Medicaid and further reductions to SNAP under the "*Big Beautiful Bill*" could significantly increase homelessness on Oahu. Many individuals and families already struggling to remain housed rely heavily on these critical safety net programs to meet their basic healthcare and nutritional needs. Loss of Medicaid coverage would mean reduced access to essential services such as behavioral health, addiction treatment and chronic care coordination, making it even harder for vulnerable populations to maintain employment, stability, and housing. Similarly, cuts to SNAP are intensifying food insecurity, forcing families to make impossible choices between paying

for rent, groceries, or medical bills. New federal SNAP work requirements that took effect November 2025 will exacerbate this crisis, as thousands of homeless individuals, veterans, and struggling families are projected to lose access to essential food assistance.

River of Life Mission fills the gap through a proven model that is building bridges to create healthier, stronger communities and lasting change. As more residents face hunger, job insecurity, and mental health struggles, ROLM's collaborative model will become increasingly crucial, serving as a consistent point of care that links outreach, compassion, and recovery for those in transition. With chronic homelessness on Oahu rising nearly 12% from 2023 to 2024 and \$500 million in potential federal cuts looming, the strain on shelters, housing programs, and emergency systems will only intensify, leaving more people unsheltered and increasing public costs.

Children are unable to thrive in school when they are living in cars and women remain trapped in cycles of violence unless they can find hope apart from the streets. Seniors face declining health, isolation, and heightened vulnerability when left without stable housing, forced to choose between medical care and survival on the streets. By partnering with River of Life Mission to address homelessness directly, communities on Oahu will be empowered to lift individuals off the streets, while protecting families, restoring homes and building a safer, healthier Oahu for generations to come.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

With HUB Events operating throughout Oahu monthly, ROLM currently serves an average of over 2,000 individuals of all ages in housing crisis. Through these monthly HUB Events, ROLM directly benefits Oahu's homeless populations, as well as the unemployed, underemployed, near-houseless, seniors, disabled individuals, women and children, increasing equity, accessibility and ensuring no one is turned away.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The R2R Program is in perfect alignment with Statewide and City and County of Honolulu efforts to combat homelessness throughout Oahu's 7 regions that represent the outreach boundaries for homeless service providers. ROLM currently has monthly HUB Events operating in each of the following 7 regions: Region 1 (Downtown Honolulu); Region 2 (East Honolulu); Region 3 (Central Oahu); Region 4 (Lower Windward); Region 5 (Central Oahu); Region 6 (Upper Windward); and Region 7 (Waianae Coast).

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

As part of this project, ROLM will expand partnerships with nonprofits and other agencies to provide wraparound services, including mental health care, case management, legal aid, SNAP support, and basic health and hygiene. A central focus will be strengthening the Road to Redemption (R2R) Program launched in 2025 at existing HUBs, pairing individuals with guides who serve as liaisons to transitional shelters, residential programs, or detox facilities as they move from HUB to Home. Following its launch, ROLM identified that HUBs need greater support to help individuals in housing crisis navigate behavioral health intake, access transportation, and connect with other HUB leaders to improve regional implementation. With a goal of transitioning 100 individuals off the streets over 12 months, ROLM will contract Regional Coordinators to lead geographic zones across Oahu, modeling the R2R pathway, building partnerships, coaching HUB leaders, and enhancing behavioral health processes. Since each region faces unique challenges, regional collaboration strengthens community response and builds shared culture among leaders.

ROLM will also convene Regional Roundtables throughout the year, uniting HUB leaders and outreach partners from across Oahu to share insights, align strategies, and reinforce a coordinated system of care. These efforts ensure that those in housing crisis receive consistent support, preventing them from slipping through the cracks and providing a sustainable path to recovery and stability.

Homelessness on Oahu remains one of our most urgent challenges, affecting public health, safety, and economic stability. Many programs address immediate needs like shelter or food, but these short-term solutions rarely reach the deeper issues like untreated trauma, mental illness, substance use, and mistrust of institutions built over years. Without consistent, relational support that builds trust and walks with individuals toward stability, people often return to the streets. True change requires ongoing care, connection, and accountability that help individuals rebuild their lives and transition out of homelessness for good. River of Life Mission's HUB model and Road to Redemption Program prove that locally rooted, trust-based relationships are key to closing service gaps and preventing homelessness on Oahu from escalating further.

Scope of Work over 12 Months

1. Provide meals, ministry, and wraparound services to an average of 2,000 adults or more experiencing homelessness through over 240 monthly HUB Events held across the island.
2. Deepen collaboration with a minimum of 50 community partners, including churches, nonprofits, agencies and organizations to enhance delivery of wraparound and transitional services within HUB Events operating along the Leeward Coast, Windward Oahu, North Shore, Central Oahu, and the urban core of Honolulu.

3. Deploy three Regional Coordinators in geographic regions beset with chronic homelessness to equip HUB Leaders with tools and resources specific to their regions, improving participants' access to housing, healthcare and mental health support.
 4. Support up to 100 individuals transitioning from unsheltered homelessness to recovery, such as through shelter placements, treatment programs, permanent housing or reunification with family.
2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

Upon receiving the Notice to Proceed, ROLM will enhance the Road to Redemption Program at existing HUBs by employing Regional Contractors, scheduling Regional Roundtables and providing support to HUB leaders, volunteers and partners as we collectively work to transition individuals in housing crisis off the streets during the project period of 7/1/26 – 6/30/27.

Over 12 months, ROLM staff and volunteers will utilize a customized database through Airtable to maintain data on the following metrics:

 - 2) Number of operational days per month over which meals and wraparound services are delivered;
 - 3) List of partners mobilized to provide wraparound services to individuals in housing crisis;
 - 4) Number of Regional Coordinators contracted to provide assistance to existing HUBs, including geographic regions served;
 - 5) Summary of Regional Roundtable meetings; and
 - 6) Number of individuals transitioning off the streets.

While many programs provide short-term assistance for Oahu's chronically homeless, ROLM's HUBs and Road to Redemption Program close critical service gaps with sustained support, helping vulnerable individuals in housing crisis move toward stability, independence, and life off the streets.

ROLM has established a strong and sustainable record of impact over 40 years, grounded in its commitment to serving Oahu's most vulnerable residents. In 2022, ROLM transitioned to a community-embedded service model in response to the island's escalating homeless crisis. This shift has strengthened existing partnerships and fostered new collaborations with churches, businesses, nonprofits, social service agencies, and community organizations. Through HUB Events, ROLM mobilizes a consistent network of volunteers who support individuals in housing crisis as they take steps toward stability and long-term hope. HUB Events operate as an intentional access point where participants can connect directly with partner organizations providing medical care, legal assistance, and case management.

Strategic partnerships with healthcare and social service providers ensure that at-risk individuals are connected to essential supports they may otherwise struggle to reach. The outcomes demonstrate the effectiveness of this model. A record 385 individuals have begun a new life away from the streets since HUBs were launched four years ago, and more than 50 individuals who once faced housing crisis now serve in the very Hubs that helped transform their lives.

Our volunteer base is a cornerstone of program delivery. Each year, thousands of individuals and groups contribute their time, skills, and compassion, helping us serve meals and creating safe, welcoming environments where trust is built. This robust volunteer network reduces staffing costs while increasing our ability to scale services, ensuring consistent and personalized support for individuals in housing crisis. By leveraging volunteers and strengthening partnerships, ROLM will continue to advance its mission of guiding individuals from crisis to stability and independence through a

sustainable model that benefits the entire community by reducing chronic homelessness, easing the burden on emergency services, and fostering healthier, more resilient neighborhoods.

2. Facilities

ROLM's programs operate out of the main facility located at 101 N. Pauahi Street in the heart of Chinatown, a three-story building that spans approximately 12,000 square feet. Currently, hot meals are prepared at the Chinatown facility, then distributed to weekly HUB Events throughout the City and County of Honolulu. 100% of HUB Events are mobile and are located within local communities in collaboration with churches, businesses, community organizations, private properties and homeless camps.

Before joining ROLM, she was Director of Business Development at Navian Hawaii, where she advanced patient and ohana care while strengthening relationships with physicians, hospitals, skilled nursing facilities, and community partners. Keali'i holds a Bachelor of Science in Finance from Rutgers University, equipping her with a strategic approach to organizational growth and sustainability.

Blake Spinak serves as the **HUB and Ministry Director**, overseeing the launch and operations at HUB Events throughout Oahu and the new "Road to Redemption" Program. Blake holds an associate degree in missions and has experience conducting school outreach and medical support services to impoverished communities internationally. Growing up a latchkey kid and child of multiple divorces, Blake is leveraging lived experiences to connect vulnerable populations with resources that result in life-changing impact.

ROLM's commitment to operational excellence and innovation further strengthens its capacity. With an MBA in Information Technology Project Management and a Bachelor's degree in Computer Science and Software Engineering, **Director of**

Business and Finance Eddie Habal Jr. is developing a customized Airtable platform to improve data tracking and project management, enabling partners to access resources in real time.

Stephen “Rolo” Bright, Food Service Director at ROLM, brings over 18 years of food service experience and an Associate’s Degree in Culinary Arts from Kapiolani Community College. Skilled in food safety, menu planning, and team leadership, he oversees kitchen operations, manages volunteers, and ensures efficient, high-quality meal service that strengthens community partnerships, preparing an average of 500 – 600 hot meals per day and delivering hundreds of food boxes and bags twice a month.

State Grant-in-Aid funding will support the strengthening of HUBs across 7 geographic regions of Oahu in 2026 - 2027, ensuring greater access to sustained care. At a time when the “Big Beautiful Bill” has significantly reduced funding for programs serving individuals in housing crisis, ROLM’s role in bridging these service gaps is more crucial than ever. Our proven track record, coupled with strong infrastructure and community investment will ensures our programs pick up where government support has diminished, well beyond the life of this grant opportunity.
