We Are Oceania will use funds for the public purpose of increasing access to cultural and language support for individuals and families from the Compacts of Free Association (COFA) nations, as well as for the social service and medical agencies that respond to their needs.

### **1. A brief description of the applicant's background;**

We Are Oceania (WAO) was founded in 2019 by a group of Micronesians to advocate for the health of individuals and families, empowering them to weave their indigenous skills, knowledge, being, and values with their newly acquired knowledge of their new community in Hawai'i, to reach their full potential and become self-sufficient. The mission of WAO is to empower our community to navigate success while honoring the integrity of our diverse heritage. We envision a world in which indigenous people,

regardless of where they are in the world, are respected, celebrated, and honored as part of the local culture of success. We serve our community through these values: Compassion, Unity, Respect, Empowerment, and Services with Humility.

WAO has quickly become a leader in supporting individuals and families from COFA nations. To date, we have helped more than 15,000 individuals seeking assistance in the areas of Health, Education, Employment, Child Welfare Services, Legal, Public Assistance, Housing, Social Security, Passport and I-94 replacement, Guardianship, Taxes, etc.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The overall goal of this request is to increase access to cultural and language support for individuals and families from COFA nations, as well as for the social service and medical agencies that respond to their needs. To reach this goal, WAO will:

1. Hire four (4) Cultural Navigators; and
2. Provide language and cultural navigation support for individuals and families from COFA nations; and
3. Provide language support and cultural training for social service and medical agencies that respond to the needs of individuals and families from COFA nations; and
4. Uplift and celebrate the lived experiences, cultural wisdom, and leadership of the Micronesian community.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Individuals and families from COFA nations legally come to Hawai'i for access to education, healthcare, and employment. Through an agreement between the United States and three island nations (Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau), COFA citizens have the right to freely travel to, work, and reside in the US indefinitely.

COFA nations consist of diverse geographic and cultural groups. The term Micronesian broadly refers to people from COFA nations, which include distinct cultures and languages like Chuukese, Kosraean, Pohnpeian, Yapese, Marshallese, and Palauan.

Hawai'i is home to the largest population of individuals and families from COFA nations, estimated to be 30,000 to 40,000, including 12,000 students in Hawai'i K-12 schools. Nearly seven in ten (69%) experience a language barrier (Office of Economic Revitalization). While individuals and families have a right to basic health, welfare, and education services, many face barriers due to language access challenges, as well as discrimination, prejudice, and a lack of understanding of the diverse cultures across

COFA nations. These barriers can lead to serious and preventable harm, including missed or delayed care, confusion navigating an unfamiliar healthcare system, inadequate interpretation, and experiences of being treated differently or unfairly because they are Micronesian (National Library of Medicine).

Through this proposal, WAO will increase access to cultural and language support for individuals and families from COFA nations by hiring cultural navigators who speak Chuukese, Marshallese, Kosraean, and Pohnpeian, as these are the top language requests WAO receives.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

This grant will serve individuals and families from COFA nations, as well as the staff at social service and medical agencies that respond to their needs.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

This grant will reach individuals and families from COFA nations, as well as the staff at social service and medical agencies statewide.

### **III. Service Summary and Outcomes**

Through this grant, WAO will hire four Cultural Navigators: two Chuukese, one Marshallese, and one speaking both Kosraean and Pohnpeian, as these are the top language requests WAO receives. Cultural Navigators will provide both translation and cultural navigation services for individuals and families from COFA nations who are accessing social service, educational, or medical resources. Serving as more than translators, they will help clients understand available health and social services, explain how to access and enroll in programs, and address common misconceptions. For example, a Cultural Navigator may accompany a family to a housing intake appointment to ensure accurate communication and prevent missed eligibility steps, or debrief with a client after a medical visit to clarify care instructions, support follow-up scheduling, and reduce the risk of unmet needs due to language barriers as these are issues that research shows can contribute to serious misunderstandings and preventable harm.

Cultural Navigators will also partner with medical and social service agencies to strengthen service delivery by providing staff training that builds cultural understanding, empathy, and trust. In addition, they will translate client-facing documents for partner

agencies, not just word-for-word, but in culturally appropriate language that is accessible to the community receiving them.

Throughout the grant period, WAO will also develop a fee-for-service model to support long-term sustainability once grant funding ends. WAO is frequently asked to provide these services statewide, but current capacity and funding limit the ability to meet demand at scale. With this grant, WAO will expand staffing and infrastructure to deliver these services more consistently and at higher volume across Hawai'i.

Month 1 - 2:

Vice President of Operations to hire four Cultural Navigators

Vice President of Administration to onboard and train Cultural Navigators

CEO to market the program to social service and medical partners

Month 3 - 12:

Cultural Navigators begin supporting clients directly with an average of 3 clients/day

Cultural Navigators begin hosting trainings with partner agencies

Cultural Navigators begin translating documents for partner agencies

Cultural Navigators to collect feedback from clients and partner agencies on the program impact and work with University of Hawai'i students to conduct a program evaluation

Consultant and CEO draft a fee-for-service payment plan for partner agencies

CEO receives feedback from partner agencies on pricing

Vice President of Operations and Accounting Clerk to provide program and financial reports to the State agency through which grant funds are appropriated

WAO will implement a quality assurance and evaluation process to monitor service delivery, ensure culturally and linguistically appropriate support, and continuously improve outcomes for individuals and families from COFA nations, as well as for the agencies supporting them.

WAO will create and maintain a centralized Request Tracking Sheet for all services provided throughout the grant period. The tracking sheet will document: the type of service provided (translation, cultural navigation, staff training, and document translation), who received the service, which WAO team member provided the service, the language used, and the type of social service or medical setting the request was connected to. This will allow WAO to monitor service volume, response trends, language needs, and capacity across the four Cultural Navigators.

In addition to tracking outputs, WAO will gather feedback from both clients and partner agencies to assess service quality, cultural responsiveness, and satisfaction. WAO will use this feedback to adjust workflows, strengthen training topics, and improve the clarity and cultural accessibility of translated materials. WAO will also partner with University of Hawai'i students to support evaluation activities and analyze patterns in service needs and outcomes across the year.

WAO began as a program under the Partners In Development Foundation and has since become an independent, 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization managing multiple federal, state, and private foundation grants. WAO is led by CEO Josie Howard, a native of Onoun Island in Chuuk. Josie earned her Master's degree in Social Work from the University of Hawai'i and is an alumni of the Omidyar Fellows Hawai'i program. Recently, Josie was selected as one of just 10 leaders in Hawai'i featured in the PBS

series *A Leader's Journey*. In the series, when the interviewer asked what Josie wanted people to know about the Micronesian community, she said, "I want people to know that we are a great asset wherever we go...a lot of [Micronesians] come with a wealth of cultural knowledge and skills. Sometimes that doesn't match or jive with what's marketable here. As long as we are utilized, our strengths are being utilized, we will be great contributing members of this community... When you believe in people and are empowered, the best comes out."

Under Josie's leadership, two Vice Presidents oversee all program staff, including the newly hired Cultural Navigators. Additional partners include accounting, financial management, and tax support from Accumulus and CPA Collective; human resources support from Altres; data security and electronic equipment from Tech Partners Hawaii; and grant management and strategic guidance support from SDC Strategies.

WAO operates a One-Stop Center that provides a range of services to assist Micronesians living in the state, including help with legal documents, education on local laws, pre-employment skills training, housing guidance, language translation, and referrals to other support systems, all aimed at empowering them to navigate life in Hawai'i. The Center is located at 720 North King Street in Honolulu. The location is highly accessible by car and bus. WAO also has staff on neighbor islands, including Kauai and Hawai'i Island.

In addition, WAO has an extensive history of successfully managing state and foundation funding and will continue to pursue new funding opportunities to support this work. WAO is currently working with a contracted grant writer to expand and strengthen its pipeline of public and private grants, helping sustain staffing and program operations beyond the grant period.
