## **Annual Report on Personnel and Accomplishments of Dementia Programs Pursuant to Act 283, SLH 2025**

### **Summary**

Act 283, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2025, *appropriated funds to the University of Hawaii to establish positions within the University of Hawaii at Manoa John A. Burns School of Medicine's Department of Geriatric Medicine to coordinate and incorporate training on Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia for health care providers into existing University of Hawaii programs; and review, update, and develop a dementia curriculum to be incorporated into existing University of Hawaii programs with the goal of establishing a local, informed dementia workforce. Requires annual reports to the Legislature.* Funding for the biennium ONLY was \$525,000 for two 1.0 FTE. This method of funding (non-recurring, not part of the base budget) resulted in the positions being posted as budgeted temporary positions. Both positions have been advertised, but recruitment has been unsuccessful to date. We are now planning to re-advertise the positions as either full time or part time, which we believe may help in recruitment.

The John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM) recognizes that Alzheimer's disease is a major public health issue affecting millions of Americans, including many residents of Hawai'i. JABSOM has collaborated with the UH Center on Aging (COA) for many years, which is part of the Thompson School of Social Work and Public Health. Collaborations include educating and training students for various health provider roles critical to caring for patients with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Dementias. Additionally, the other UH health professions schools – School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene and the UH Hilo Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy participate with JABSOM medical students and Thompson School social work students in interprofessional training coordinated through the Hawaii Interprofessional Education program.

Education and curriculum related to ADRD also occur in several clinical settings and under the federal grants and programs noted below. Once we can hire the faculty positions, JABSOM will begin the process of providing greater coordination among the various UH programs in delivering appropriate training to a wide variety of caregivers needed for patients and families living with ADRD.

### **(1) Current Dementia Clinical and Education Programs in the State of Hawai'i (partial listing)**

Current and past grants related to dementia education and training in Hawai'i have been conducted in a coordinated manner. Below is a list of prior and current grants, projects, and resources in the state of Hawai'i related to the purpose of Act 283. Closer collaborations and coordination of curriculum between JABSOM, UH Center on Aging (UH Thompson School of Social Work and Public Health), UH College of Pharmacy, UH Cancer Center, UH School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene, Kuakini Health System, Hawai'i Pacific Health, and The Queen's Health Systems could leverage these existing resources to create an infrastructure to enable a more robust curriculum for future healthcare providers in Hawai'i.

## Dementia-Related Clinical Training in JABSOM Academically Affiliated Health Systems

As one of the goals of the GWEP grant, faculty in the Department of Geriatric Medicine at JABSOM have already been conducting curriculum mapping on the topics of Alzheimer's disease and related disorders (ADRD). This includes topics such as risk reduction, early detection, diagnosis and treatment of ADRD. Curriculum mapping has been done for all 4 years of medical school, some of the residency programs, and the geriatrics fellowship program. Preliminary curriculum mapping has also been done for the nursing school and the school of social work. Faculty in geriatrics are now collating the information collected, to determine next steps in curriculum development. The new faculty positions will help accelerate this process and expand it to other schools and healthcare training programs.
