
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LONG-TERM CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that people aged sixty-
2 five and older make up twenty per cent of the state's population
3 and twenty-three per cent of the city and county of Honolulu's
4 total population translating to about two hundred eighty
5 thousand to three hundred thousand people. This figure is
6 expected to increase to twenty-nine per cent by the year 2040.
7 Sixty-six per cent of the State's total adult population live on
8 the island of Oahu alone. According to the executive office on
9 aging, there are 1,790 long-term care facilities with a total of
10 12,942 beds. This report revealed a great disparity between the
11 State's aging population and the available resources of care.
12 Furthermore, many long-term care facilities are experiencing
13 closures across the state. These closures stem from financial
14 difficulties, staff shortages, and regulatory issues. In July
15 2022, a prominent nursing home in Wahiawa closed its doors due
16 to financial shortfalls and infrastructure challenges,
17 displacing sixty residents. Additionally, in 2023, the



1 increased costs from Medicaid reimbursement changes and a
2 statewide labor shortage resulted in a home healthcare provider
3 shutting down. That closure resulted in only eight at-home
4 healthcare providers remaining to serve the entire island with
5 many of these types of facilities having extensive waiting
6 lists.

7 The Healthcare Association of Hawaii stated that the job
8 vacancy rate for kupuna care is at thirty-nine per cent. Labor
9 shortages and increased job vacancies across the state may
10 result in unsafe staffing levels threatening the potential of
11 elder neglect and harm.

12 The purpose of this Act is to provide funding to the
13 Department of Human Services to conduct a study to recommend
14 legislation to address the issue of long-term care facility
15 closures.

16 SECTION 2. (a) The department of human services shall
17 conduct a study and submit a report on the following factors to
18 improve the overall landscape of elderly care in the state:

19 (1) Current rates of Medicaid and Medicare reimbursement;
20 (2) Labor and workforce shortages in the field of elderly
21 care and current wages;



SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2026.
