
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHYSICIAN CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that proper nutrition has
2 been shown to reduce the frequency and severity of chronic
3 diseases in the United States.

4 The legislature also finds that nutrition and metabolic
5 health education provides essential knowledge that demonstrates
6 the connection between dietary habits and physical and mental
7 well-being.

8 The legislature further finds that the continuing medical
9 education curriculum for physicians should include training in
10 nutrition and metabolic health. Continuing medical education
11 serves to improve, develop, and expand physician knowledge,
12 skill, and performance to support high-quality medical care.
13 Requiring physicians to receive education in nutrition and
14 metabolic health will equip them with a stronger understanding
15 of dietary principles and metabolic function, enabling them to
16 offer informed recommendations that help prevent and manage
17 chronic diseases.

SECTION 2. Section 453-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

"(c) A physician, osteopathic physician, or surgeon shall meet the category 1 or 1A continuing medical education requirements by obtaining credit hours in a category 1 or 1A continuing medical education program accredited by the American Medical Association or the American Osteopathic Association or in other approved category 1 or 1A continuing medical education as provided in the board's rules~~[-]~~; provided that one hour of continuing medical education shall be on nutrition and metabolic health. To determine compliance, the board may conduct a random audit. A physician, osteopathic physician, or surgeon selected for audit shall be notified by the board. Within sixty days of notification, the physician, osteopathic physician, or surgeon shall provide to the board documentation to verify compliance with the category 1 or 1A continuing medical education requirements."

SECTION 3. No later than December 31, 2026, the Hawaii medical board shall adopt rules to implement section 2 of this Act.

SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

Hawaii Medical Board; Physician; Nutrition; Continuing Medical Education Requirement

Description:

Requires nutrition and metabolic education as part of the physician continuing medical education requirements.

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JUSTIFICATION SHEET

DEPARTMENT: Office of the Governor

TITLE: A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO PHYSICIAN CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION.

PURPOSE: To require nutrition and metabolic health education as part of the physician continuing medical education requirements.

MEANS: Amend section 453-6(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

JUSTIFICATION: Current physician continuing medical education requirements lack sufficient nutrition and metabolic health training. Nutrition education provides essential knowledge about the relationship between dietary habits and overall well-being. A foundational understanding of proper nutrition can serve as a preventive health measure, reducing the incidence and severity of chronic disease. Strengthening preventative health care efforts will also result in cost savings for patients and health care systems, particularly in rural communities where access to medical services may be limited.

This bill is needed to require physicians to complete one hour of nutrition and metabolic health education as part of their continuing medical education obligation.

Impact on the public: The bill serves the public interest by enhancing physician knowledge in nutrition and metabolic health, enabling providers to offer higher quality recommendations and counseling that support the prevention, treatment, and management of chronic diseases. Improved physician competency in these areas will promote better health outcomes and overall community well-being.

Impact on the department and other agencies:

The bill will impact the Hawaii Medical Board and the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division within the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs by amending the continuing medical education associated with physician license renewal, including the adoption of rules.
