
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INFRASTRUCTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in 2025, the
2 American Society of Civil Engineers released their
3 infrastructure report card, in which the state received an
4 overall grade of a D+. This grade demonstrates the lack of
5 improvement to Hawaii infrastructure, as the state received the
6 same grade in 2019. Most of Hawaii's infrastructure was built
7 between sixty to one hundred years ago, which was not intended
8 to have lasted this long. These delayed maintenance and
9 improvements are posing a threat and danger to many communities
10 across the state.

11 For communities, such as Wai'anae, who continue to
12 experience growth and developments, there is generated
13 additional demand for water, sewage, recycling, solid water
14 disposal services, communication, electricity, and other utility
15 systems. A lack of infrastructure readiness can hinder new
16 developments and lead to increased costs for emergency repairs.
17 There is a need for information on the utility providers'



1 ability to meet current and future demands. This is essential
2 to proactive maintenance, which can minimize long-term repair
3 costs, extend asset life, and reduce safety risks. It is
4 crucial to have such data publicly available and updated for
5 responsible community planning and dependable utility services.

6 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to require the
7 Public Utility Commission to develop a temporary working group
8 to study the current capacity of utility services, the expected
9 lifespan of existing coastline infrastructure, and the financial
10 implications of necessary expansions.

11 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a temporary working
12 group within the public utility commission to study the current
13 capacity of utility services, the expected lifespan of existing
14 coastline utility infrastructure, and the financial implications
15 of necessary expansions in counties with populations exceeding
16 five hundred thousand. The members of the working group shall
17 include:

18 (1) The chairperson of the public utilities commission, or
19 the chairperson's designee;
20 (2) The president and chief executive officer of Charter
21 Communications, or their designee;




