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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAL CANNABIS.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1 SECTION 1. Section 329-123.2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is  
2 repealed.

3 ~~[ "S329-123.2 Qualifying patient medical records;~~

5 inspect a qualifying patient's medical records held by the  
6 physician, advanced practice registered nurse, or hospice

10 issue a written certification for any physician, advanced  
11 practice registered nurse, or hospice provider who refuses  
12 inspection of a qualifying patient's medical records by the

15 issue a written certification for any physician, advanced  
16 practice registered nurse, or hospice provider whose medical  
17 records do not comply with the requirements of this chapter."]~~



1 SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that  
2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were  
3 begun before its effective date.

4 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed  
5 and stricken.

6 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

**Report Title:**

DLE; Medical Cannabis; Medical Records; Inspection; Repeal

**Description:**

Repeals statutory language that currently authorizes the Department of Law Enforcement to: (1) inspect a qualifying medical cannabis patient's medical records held by the health provider who issued a written certification for the qualifying patient; and (2) suspend or revoke a health provider's ability to issue written certification for medical cannabis if the provider refuses the foregoing inspection, or if the medical records do not comply with the medical use of cannabis law.
