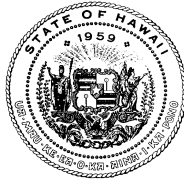
Chair San Buenaventura and Members of the Committee:

My name is Christopher Fernandez, Executive Officer of the Board of Pharmacy (Board). While the Board appreciates the intent of this measure, it has not yet had the opportunity to meet and take a formal position. The Board offers the following comments.

This bill authorizes certain pregnant persons to receive abortion medication with labeling that excludes their name and other identifying information.

The Board has concerns regarding consumer safety and the implementation of this measure at pharmacies, particularly with respect to existing equipment and operational limitations.

1 **Fiscal Implications:** None.

2 **Department Position:** The Department of Health ("Department") offers comments on this
3 measure.

4 **Department Testimony:** The Environmental Health Services Division, Food and Drug Branch
5 ("EHSD-FDB") provides the following testimony on behalf of the Department:

6 SB2038 authorizes the dispensing of abortion care medication with a label that does not
7 provide identifying information, including the name of the patient and the name of the
8 practitioner or seller dispensing the medication. SB2038 also prohibits the Department from
9 inspecting practitioner records of patients receiving these medications without a subpoena.

10 The mission of the Department is to protect and improve the health and environment
11 for all people in Hawaii. Removing potential barriers and facilitating the public's access to
12 approved medication supports the Department's mission.

13 The Department notes that requiring a subpoena to inspect practitioner records may
14 affect the Department's ability to effectively investigate an adverse event and prevent a
15 potential illness outbreak. In the rare event where a patient becomes ill due to taking

1 contaminated medication, either by improper manufacturing practices, storage, handling, or
2 other related factors, the Department's efforts to investigate will be hampered. In 2025, there
3 were approximately thirty national drug recalls issued by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration
4 due to label errors, fungal contamination, microbial contamination, and other issues. Time is of
5 the essence for the Department to identify the manufacturer of the medication, the
6 distributors, specific lot numbers, and other relevant information to issue a recall notice and
7 ensure that other patients prescribed the same medication are informed of the potential harm.
8 It may take over two weeks to obtain a subpoena, and other patients may be exposed to harm
9 during the delay.

10 The Department respectfully requests that an exemption to the subpoena requirement,
11 specifically in the instance of investigating an illness or adverse event, be incorporated into this
12 measure.

13 **Offered Amendments:** Additions appear as underlined.

14 "(C) The records described in subparagraph (B) shall be subject to the inspection of the
15 department or its agents at all times; provided that the inspection of records for medication
16 abortion care shall require a subpoena issued by a court of competent jurisdiction, unless the
17 department is investigating an illness or adverse event;"

Testimony in SUPPORT

The Hawai'i Civil Rights Commission (HCRC) carries out the Hawai'i constitutional mandate that no person shall be discriminated against in the exercise of their civil rights. Art. I, Sec. 5. HCRC has enforcement jurisdiction over Hawai'i's laws prohibiting discrimination in employment (Chapter 378, Part I, HRS), housing (Chapter 515, HRS), public accommodations (Chapter 489, HRS), and access to state and state-funded services (HRS § 368-1.5).

Senate Bil 2038 Protects the identity/name of medical practitioners dispensing medication abortion care and the identity/name of the person for whom the drug was prescribed.

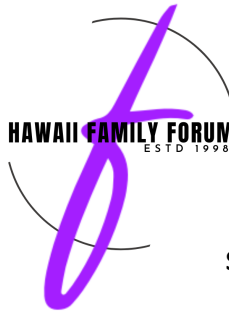
This bill aligns with Article 1, Section 6 of the Hawai'i Constitution which contains one of the strongest explicit privacy protections in the United States. Article 1 Section 6 establishes an individual right to privacy and requires the government to justify any intrusion.

HCRC supports this bill as HCRC has jurisdiction over protecting employees from adverse actions based on the employee's reproductive health decisions, as well as tenants from gender discrimination from their landlords in this context. While the HCRC does not have jurisdiction over medication labeling, this bill extends protection into the workplace and housing. Treating reproductive-health information as sensitive data adds an extra layer of protection in situations where an employer or landlord may inadvertently encounter such medication and take adverse action because of what is on the label. This law not only applies in isolation in medical settings, but to any situation where this information may be exposed such as a pill bottle label visible in a workplace or apartment. Landlords often see medication labels during maintenance visits and shared trash areas. It is not farfetched for coworkers or supervisors to visit an employee's cubicle and find sensitive information there.

S.B. 2038 would also incidentally protect reproductive healthcare practitioners, who may be under scrutiny.

Hawai'i has a proud history of supporting equal access to healthcare as the first state in the union to legalize abortion at the request of a pregnant person on March 13, 1970, three years prior to Roe V. Wade. S.B. 2038 continues Hawai'i's history of reproductive autonomy in healthcare decisions.

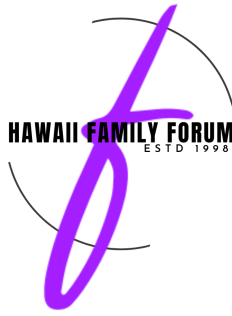

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on SB 2038. Hawai'i Family Forum is a nonprofit, pro-family education organization committed to the well-being of women, families, and communities across our state. While SB 2038 is presented as a technical change to prescription labeling laws, we are concerned that its broader impact could negatively affect patient safety, transparency, and public trust in Hawai'i's healthcare system.

At its core, SB 2038 creates special labeling exemptions for abortion medications that do not apply to other prescription drugs. These exemptions allow abortion drugs to be dispensed without standard identifying information, such as the pharmacy, prescriber, or contact details. Long-standing labeling requirements exist to protect patients and ensure that responsibility is clear when complications arise. Removing these safeguards raises serious concerns, particularly for women who may experience adverse reactions or require emergency care.

Medication abortion is not without medical risks. In emergency situations, doctors and first responders rely on accurate medication information to provide timely and appropriate treatment. When critical details are missing or obscured, emergency care may be delayed, increasing the risk of preventable harm. From a community perspective—especially in rural areas and on neighbor islands where access to emergency services may already be limited—this lack of transparency is deeply concerning.

SB 2038 also limits regulatory oversight by making it more difficult to review abortion-related records. Transparency and accountability are essential components of a trustworthy healthcare system. These principles are not about punishment; they exist to protect patients, support informed policymaking, and maintain public confidence. It is unclear why abortion medications alone should be treated differently from other drugs when it comes to oversight and disclosure.

Beyond the immediate policy concerns, SB 2038 sets a troubling precedent. If standard safeguards can be set aside for one controversial medical practice, it raises questions about whether similar exceptions could be applied elsewhere in the future. Healthcare policy should be guided by consistency, clarity, and a commitment to patient-centered protections.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge the Committee to oppose SB 2038 and instead support policies that prioritize patient safety, transparency, and accountability for the benefit of women, families, and communities across Hawai'i.

Dear Chairperson Senator Joy A. San Buenaventura, Vice Chair Senator Angus L.K. McKelvey, and Members of the Committee on Health and Human Services:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify **IN OPPOSITION to SB2038.**

I am the Executive Director of A Place for Women in Waipio. We offer an abortion recovery program for those healing from abortion-related harm and medical services for women seeking evidence-based information before making a pregnancy decision.

I strongly oppose SB 2038. This bill is more than a labeling tweak—it removes essential patient safeguards, reduces transparency, and prioritizes providers over women.

Key concerns:

Weakens prescription labeling standards. It allows abortion drugs to omit pharmacy, prescriber, and contact details, replacing them with generic placeholders. These identifiers exist to protect patients and ensure accountability. Removing them for one class of medication creates a dangerous exception.

Compromises patient safety. Complete information enables rapid emergency response to complications like severe bleeding or infection. Anonymized labels could delay care, hinder defect tracking, and increase preventable risks.

Creates unequal treatment. Abortion medications receive special exemptions not applied to any other prescription drugs, undermining consistent, fair healthcare regulation.

Erodes accountability and oversight. By limiting access to abortion-related records (requiring subpoenas), the bill shields providers from review, making it harder to investigate harm, coercion, or inadequate screening.

Increases vulnerability to abuse. Anonymity can enable exploitation, including by abusive partners or sex traffickers who could procure or administer these drugs without traceable records, reducing opportunities for detection or intervention.

Harms public policy. Obscured data makes it difficult for lawmakers and health officials to evaluate outcomes and ensure policies protect women.

Sets a troubling precedent. Suspending safeguards for one procedure opens the door to similar exceptions elsewhere.

SB 2038 protects profits, not women.

From a health and human services perspective, SB 2038 lowers the standard of care for women in Hawai'i. I urge you to reject it and preserve transparent standards that safeguard all patients equally.

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and honorable Committee Members,

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, Hawai'i Section (ACOG Hawai'i), which represents physicians who are dedicated to safe, accessible abortion and reproductive healthcare throughout our state, would like to express some concerns regarding SB2058. While we greatly appreciate the intentions of the bill and think that protections against persecution for medication abortion for both patients and providers are necessary in the post-Dobbs era, we do not believe that the current bill adequately addresses several issues.

First, we are concerned that the bill as written does not adequately discuss implementation of changing labeling protocols for prescriptions. As it stands, billing and labeling software for prescribed medications is often linked and automatic. In order to ensure that omitting the name of a prescribing provider from a label does not lead to unintended consequences, such as the inability to provide reimbursement to prescribing entities, considerations for existing prescribing and billing practices in medicine ought to be taken.

As it stands, this bill will be crucial in protecting both patients and providers from states where private citizens are able to file lawsuits against persons who receive or provide abortion care, such as Texas and Idaho. Additionally, removing identifying information from prescription labels may also decrease harassment that patients and providers may receive from private citizens. However, simply removing the prescriber's name from label does not prevent law enforcement agencies from being able to track where prescriptions originated from, or from finding the prescribing provider. Additional measures should be placed in order to ensure this is the case, whether this is through the current shield law that is in place for this state (HRS323J), or through an updated version of this current bill.

Mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony and for your continued commitment to advancing equitable, evidence-based health care for the people of Hawai'i.

Aloha Chair and Committee Members,

Thank you for providing the opportunity to offer testimony in opposition of SB 2038.

My name is Jamie Detwiler, a native of Hawaii and a retired healthcare professional with 33 years of dedicated service. I am submitting this testimony based on my extensive experience in both direct patient care and administrative roles concerning patient safety and medical ethics.

This testimony addresses the proposed bill from the perspective of safety and medical ethics. Patient privacy, as protected under HIPAA (Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act), is paramount. HIPAA already protects patient privacy.

Upon review of this bill, its primary objective appears to be safeguarding the privacy of pregnant individuals who receive abortion medication by removing personal and identifying information from prescription labels. The legislation achieves this goal and extends further by omitting the patient's name, seller's name, business address, phone number, and practitioner's name from the prescription label.

Patient Safety

This proposal introduces significant safety concerns. In scenarios where a patient experiences an adverse event resulting in incapacitation, it may become challenging to accurately assess their medical history or contact the practitioner for consultation and treatment. This risk is particularly concerning when considering minors who consent to such care and may encounter adverse events. Emergency physicians will be unable to reach the prescribing practitioner for vital medical history, leaving loved ones with unanswered questions about the adverse event.

Medical Ethics

The principle of non-maleficence, stating "first, do no harm," guides healthcare providers in weighing potential risks and benefits prior to intervention. Practitioners and pharmacists who adopt the practices outlined in this bill may risk violating established medical codes of ethics.

Hawaii Revised Statutes

Under Haw. Rev. Stat. § 577D-2, a "minor without support" defined as at least age 14 and not supervised by a parent, custodian, or legal guardian—may consent to primary medical care and services if the practitioner determines that the minor comprehends the associated benefits and risks and can communicate informed consent. Consent from other individuals is not required by statute. Primary medical care and services are defined as outpatient health services including screening, counseling, immunizations, medication, and standard treatments, excluding invasive procedures beyond injections, laceration care, or simple abscess management.

Final Observation

In summary, while I understand the intent of the bill, I have grave reservations about its implications for patient safety and compliance with medical practice guidelines.

Scientific literature widely acknowledges that human life begins at conception, a viewpoint held by organizations such as the American College of Pediatricians and supported by peer-reviewed studies and professionals in relevant fields. (See source citation below.)

For these reasons, I respectfully urge Committee members to vote NO on SB 2038, citing the safety risks posed to both adults and minors seeking abortion medication without adherence to proper medical protocols.

Chair and Members of the HHS Committee,

I am Dr. Catherine Wheeler, an Obstetrician Gynecologist with 24 years of practice experience in Utah, including performing abortions. I now reside in Colorado. I testify on-behalf of myself.

What is the purpose of the carefully devised and regulated labeling of medications when dispensed? The primary purpose is for patient safety, and to prevent errors. Labeling also provides clear patient instructions for use, appropriate warnings, clear communication after the individual leaves the pharmacy, and the ability to identify and track medications in case of a recall.

Two of the greatest risks of medications that induce abortion are hemorrhage and infection which can rapidly progress to sepsis. These are also the top reasons women die from abortion.[\[1\]](#) In fact, record-linkage studies, which the U.S. cannot perform due to lack of data reporting and analysis, reveal that 15% of women taking these drugs early in the first trimester will experience hemorrhage.[\[2\]](#) While infection is fortunately far less frequent, it is also can rapidly become a deadly complication. A unique and difficult-to-diagnose infection caused by *Clostridium sordelii* is known to be associated with medication-induced abortion. Early diagnosis and intervention is essential for any hope of survival. The risks of severe complications increase with gestational age.[\[3\]](#) (Note that while this study reported a lower rate of the incidence of hemorrhage, they used an unusual definition of hemorrhage – over 1000 cc of blood loss. Typically, over 500 cc is considered a hemorrhage. 300 cc of blood is equivalent to one unit of blood transfused).

In both of these circumstances, a woman or girl is often found with diminished mental acuity, unconscious, in severe distress, or otherwise unable to communicate well. Family or emergency

personnel will look for evidence of any drugs used that may be contributing to her state. In these life-threatening circumstances, timeliness and an accurate diagnosis are critical for her survival.

An anonymous label hides the provider's name, thus removing the possibility of contacting the prescriber, who is professionally and ethically obligated to provide care for the patient they established a relationship with and responsibility to when they prescribed the drug(s). It hides the name and dose of the drug, thus decreasing the possibility of a rapid diagnosis of the condition and potential risks, limiting the ability of the emergency physician to provide proper and urgent care. Additionally, it hides the identity of the woman for whom the prescription was intended, which may increase the risk of coercion and abuse.

While we may all empathize with a woman who prefers no one knows of her choice, the medical system is obligated to first do no harm, as a first ethical principle, above autonomy. Removing safety standards that apply to all the rest of healthcare intentionally and recklessly disregards women's health, dignity, and safety.

When the 1999 report by the (then) Institute of Medicine, *To Err is Human: Building a Safer Health System*,[\[4\]](#) was released, Americans were alarmed to learn that a top reason of death in the U.S. is from preventable medical error. The report urged that we design systems of safety, to reduce these egregious deaths.

This bill does the opposite in the name of autonomy over patient safety, by removing an essential safeguard that we all recognize is important –as evidenced by the original statute regulating drug labeling. This is unconscionable.

I urge a “no” vote.

Comments:

I speak not from theory, but from lived experience working inside abortion facilities.

I personally witnessed women pass out after taking the abortion pill. Some experienced heavy bleeding. Some collapsed from pain or blood loss. In those moments, paramedics were called. What allowed emergency responders to act quickly was clear documentation of what medication had been taken.

There was no guessing. There was no delay.

When a patient is unconscious or unable to speak, the prescription label matters. It tells first responders exactly what was ingested, the dosage, and the prescribing source. That information can be lifesaving.

Removing identifying information from prescription labels does not protect patient safety. It removes clarity during a medical emergency.

If a woman is hemorrhaging or unconscious, privacy is no longer the primary concern. Survival is.

This bill does not increase care. It creates confusion. It shifts risk onto the patient while shielding the prescriber.

We should never design policy that makes emergency medicine harder.

For these reasons, I urge you to vote NO on SB2038.
