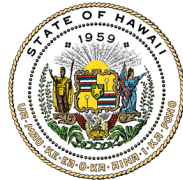

**SENATE BILL NO. 2097  
RELATING TO SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEMS**

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2097 that establishes the Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program within the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity and appropriates funds. The Department supports this bill.

A sustainable food system begins with supporting the farmers and ranchers that produce the food. Food producers have challenges at the production and regulatory levels that they know how to overcome but lack the resources to do so. This bill provides access to solutions to scale up or obtain a certification to expand, such as special-purpose equipment, new technology, personnel, training expenses or goods and services that add value to the food they produce in the food system through a grant program. This bill mitigates risk to the farmer, rancher or producer to overcome the specific challenges impacting their operations.

Department support of this measure considers feedback from producers about the high cost of equipment as a major barrier to expanding operations. The Department administered the USDA Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure program (RFSI) that provided \$2.6 million in funding for middle-of-the-supply-chain infrastructure. The Department received 104 applications, 17 of which were funded, leaving 87 proposals unfunded. The USDA will not be offering the RFSI for a second round and these unfunded projects could be considered along with new applications.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) 2022 Census of Agriculture reported that Hawaii has 780+ farms reporting value of sales between \$50,000 - \$499,000 that this bill identifies as the middle-of-the-supply chain with the potential to

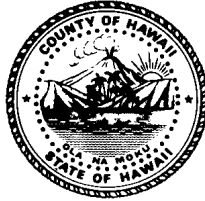

### TESTIMONY ON SB 2097 Relating to Sustainable Food Systems


Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards and Members of the Committee,

I am Benson Medina, Director of the Department of Research and Development, County of Hawai'i. One of the agricultural objectives of this department is to "support research, development, control, and education that improves agricultural production, quality, resilience, and producer viability." The County of Hawai'i provides written testimony in **SUPPORT of SB2097**, to establish the Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program within the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity.

Producers are motivated to overcome challenges to meet statewide goals to at least double local food production yet require assistance in the form of grants and infrastructure. In fact, 2 out of 3 (66.9%) of producers in Hawai'i with at least \$50,000 in estimated gross production expressed interest in expanding operations within 6-9 months, and more advanced farm equipment was the most needed technology cited by these farms to increase productivity (NASS, 2021). Additionally, in 2024, the County of Hawai'i supported Hawai'i Department of Agriculture in launching a statewide survey on economic viability, in which equipment costs were identified as the third highest-ranking issue impacting producer economic viability statewide. The proposed Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program supports producers in expanding operations and building climate resiliency to increase food production.

Thank you for championing agriculture in Hawai'i and for the opportunity to provide testimony in **SUPPORT** of SB2097.

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice-Chair Richards, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

**The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 2097**, which establishes the Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program within the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity. This program will provide essential resources to help Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers adapt to the increasing challenges posed by climate change while strengthening local food production and food security.

Hawai'i's agricultural sector faces growing threats from climate-related factors, including extreme weather events, prolonged droughts, rising temperatures, and shifting pest and disease patterns. These challenges threaten both short-term crop yields and long-term farm viability. A climate-resilient food systems grant program will allow farmers and ranchers to implement innovative practices and infrastructure improvements that mitigate these risks and ensure the stability of Hawai'i's local food supply.

The intent of the program is to provide grants to agricultural producers for the acquisition of special-purpose equipment and technology, as well as ancillary costs. These funds will help farmers invest in tools and infrastructure that directly improve their ability to respond to climate-related challenges. Special-purpose equipment, such as advanced irrigation systems, soil-monitoring technology, pest- and disease-management tools, and renewable energy systems, can enhance farm efficiency and sustainability.

Agriculture, like all businesses, requires capital investment. The cost of operating a farm or ranch in Hawai'i can be significant. Many of Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers are struggling to secure the financial support necessary to build capacity and invest in

climate-resilient infrastructure. A climate-resilient food systems grant program can provide critical support, helping agricultural operations remain viable amid increasing environmental pressures. By ensuring that farmers and ranchers have access to grants for climate-smart investments, the state can support local agriculture while also addressing the broader goal of increasing food security and self-sufficiency.

To maximize the success of this program, we encourage the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity to work closely with local farmers, ranchers, agricultural researchers, and industry stakeholders to develop the grant criteria and funding ranges. This collaboration will ensure that funding is accessible and targeted toward practical solutions that address the real challenges faced by food producers in Hawai'i.

We urge the committee to pass SB 2097 to establish this climate-resilient food systems grant program, which will help protect and strengthen Hawai'i's agricultural industry in the face of climate change.

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and Members of the Senate Agriculture and Environment Committee,

The Hawai'i Farmers Union is a 501(c)(5) agricultural advocacy nonprofit representing a network of over 2,500 family farmers and their supporters across the Hawaiian Islands. **HFU supports SB2097.**

By prioritizing investment in adaptation strategies and local food infrastructure, SB2097 has the potential to advance both food security and environmental stewardship in our state.

The bill's focus on "climate adaptation" and "resiliency" aligns with critical needs facing Hawaii's agricultural communities. However, to ensure clarity, accountability, and effective allocation of funds, we recommend including definitions for these terms and a more specific list of eligible practices and technologies. Without such clarity, the implementation may risk funding measures not aligned with regenerative or sustainable outcomes.

We offer the following amendments:

**Definitions and Eligible Practices:** Amend to include definitions for "climate adaptation" and "resiliency strategies," and specify qualifying practices.

Proposed amendment to §141- \ \ \ (d):

"(1) A detailed description of eligible climate adaptation technologies or practices, such as precision agriculture systems, renewable energy sources, and water conservation equipment, for which grant moneys will be expended;

**Support for Technical Assistance and Planning:** Expand eligible uses of funds to include essential support services that build project capacity and improve implementation.

Suggested addition to §141- \ \ \ (b):

(4) Costs associated with planning, technical assistance, or consulting services that support project development, implementation, and evaluation.

By adopting these amendments, SB2097 can be more effectively aligned with the strategic goals of enhancing Hawaii's agricultural sustainability and resilience in the face of climate change challenges.

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and Members of the Committee,

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council **supports SB2097** which establishes the Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program within the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity.

We support this measure to support climate adaptation, resiliency, and food system infrastructure through funding to agricultural producers. This concept is similar to the Partnerships for Climate Smart Commodities, a USDA grant that was cancelled in 2025 - the second year of a 5 year contract. While we were not able to finish the program to fully realize the potential of this funding, what we learned is that there is a demonstrated need for this funding to assist producers in purchasing equipment, obtaining technical assistance, and funding practices that help food production and land stewardship.

In our experience, both established ranches as well as new and small ranches could benefit from this support. A program like this is strategically proactive, providing the tools needed for our agricultural producers to continue their work for the community and future generations, improving with better practices.

We appreciate the opportunity to testify on this measure. The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council (HCC) is the Statewide umbrella organization comprised of the four county-level Cattlemen's Associations. Ranchers produce a high-quality protein and are the stewards of almost 750 thousand acres of land in Hawaii, or nearly 20% of the State's total land mass. We represent the interests of Hawaii's cattle producers.

## Comments:

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards, and committee members. I am Austin Martin, Chair of the Libertarian Party of Hawaii, testifying in strong opposition to SB 2097 (Climate-Resilient Food Systems Grant Program).

SB 2097 establishes a grant program distributing taxpayer funds to selected agricultural operations designated as "climate-resilient," allowing government officials to pick winners based on compliance with favored practices rather than market viability.

This subsidy distorts investment signals, breeds dependency, and disadvantages non-subsidized farmers. I recommend rejecting the measure and eliminating all agricultural grant programs to restore neutral market competition.

The reason our agriculture industry is in the tank is because of government interventions, and major failures of the rule of law due to corruption and favoritism toward abusive Big Ag special interests.

If we stop forcing Hawaiians to ask government permission to use their own private property, the agriculture industry would naturally flourish. The problem is central planning and government intervention — every attempt to preserve the controlling policies that created the problem, the worse that market distortions will become.

Give freedom a chance, and let Hawaiians build their farms on their own property — legalize farming and building and property rights. That will go much further toward improving local agriculture than billions of wasted dollars on nepotism and taxpayer-funded incompetence.

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Richards and Members of the Committee,

My name is Megan Fox, and I am the Executive Director of Mālama Kaua'i. We respectfully submit this testimony in strong support of SB2097, relating to Climate-Resilient Grants for Farmers.

Mālama Kaua'i is a Kaua'i-based nonprofit organization dedicated to strengthening local food systems, stewarding 'āina, and supporting farmers, producers, and community members across our island. Our work focuses on increasing local food production, improving access to agricultural land and infrastructure, and building resilient, community-based food economies. We have also acted as the Food Access Coordinator for Kaua'i County since 2018, and worked to create the community-developed 2030 Kaua'i Food Access Plan.

SB2097 directly supports one of the goals of our food access plan, which asks for growing government financial support for farmers and food access programs. SB2097 impacts the ability of organizations like Mālama Kaua'i, and the farmers and communities we serve, to advance local food production and 'āina-based livelihoods. This measure would:

- Support farmers in becoming more resilient in coping with changing weather, invasive species, and other challenges they increasingly face
- Increase the ability of our communities' food producers to invest in strategic efforts that will continue the growth of local food availability
- Start a pathway for the State to help farmers prepare for and respond to natural disasters

From our 20 years of on-the-ground experience on Kaua'i, we have responded to many disasters, hand in hand with our farmers. Disasters exacerbate existing land access challenges, infrastructure gaps, and cost barriers our farmers already experience. These realities make the provisions of this bill especially relevant for neighbor islands, where we see less resources and higher costs.

We respectfully urge the Committee to consider how this measure will be implemented across all islands, particularly in rural and neighbor island communities like Kaua'i, where capacity, infrastructure, and staffing are often more limited. Thoughtful implementation will help ensure this measure delivers meaningful, equitable benefits statewide.

For these reasons, Mālama Kaua'i respectfully urges the Committee to pass SB 2097. We appreciate the Legislature's continued commitment to supporting local agriculture, food security, and the stewardship of Hawai'i's 'āina.



For communities like Kaupō—rural, dryland, and highly exposed to climate impacts—resilience is not a theory, it is a daily practice. On behalf of Agriculture Stewardship Hawai'i, we write in support of SB2097, which establishes a climate-resilient food systems grant program to support climate adaptation, resiliency, and food system infrastructure across the State.

Agriculture Stewardship Hawai'i is a nonprofit organization dedicated to improving the viability and sustainability of Hawai'i's agricultural producers and food systems through technical assistance, resource coordination, stewardship-based business education, and policy support. A core part of our work is helping farmers and ranchers access capital and navigate funding opportunities. The Department has an existing micro-grant program for small scale operations. How is this different? Can the programs be appropriately defined to incorporate both needs?

Separately, the Green Infrastructure Authority has possibly similar purposes. How do these relate?

Will the program be housed with DAB specifically, or within the Agribusiness Development Corporation?

Will the grant operations have adequate staffing support, or are there additional positions needed?

In any case, the applicability of the program is weakly defined; far more guidance may be needed for those interested in applying for assistance. And because agriculturalists are burdened with so many challenges, it would stand to reason that applications assistance would be required. What guidance would be provided for such assistance?

My name is De Andre Makakoa, and I am submitting testimony in strong support of SB2097.

Hawai‘i’s food system is fragile. Our communities depend heavily on long-distance supply chains, imported goods, and infrastructure that exists far beyond our islands. When those systems slow down, break down, or become disrupted, access to basic necessities becomes immediately unstable.

We have seen this repeatedly through real events. Floods have wiped out harvests, destroyed equipment, and shut down farms. Fires have cut off access routes, isolated communities, and disrupted transportation and distribution. In each case, we see how the impacts remove local production capacity and weaken food security across entire regions.

When infrastructure is damaged, communities do not experience isolated disruptions, they experience system failure. Food production, storage, processing, and distribution are all affected at once. One event can ripple across the entire food system and leave people dependent on distant supply chains they do not control.

SB2097 is about strengthening local food security systems and reducing Hawai‘i’s dependence on fragile global supply chains. It invests in the practical foundations of resilience: equipment, workforce, training, infrastructure, operational capacity, and food system continuity. These are the real tools that allow local producers and food hubs to survive disruptions and continue serving their communities.

This bill supports not only farms, but the full structure of a functioning food system. Producers, processors, distributors, storage facilities, and resilience hubs. That matters because food security is built through complete systems.

We have to invest in local capacity. The stronger our local food systems are, the less vulnerable our communities become to external disruptions, shipping interruptions, market shocks, and infrastructure failures.

We never know what is around the corner. A random global epidemic, or a climate related crisis happens when we least expect it. It is the job of government to prepare for this and ensure we as a community have our basic essentials taken care of.

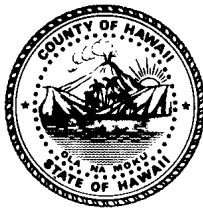
