
Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2161 that amends Section 205-4.5(a) to authorize rodeos and rodeo activities on lands within the State Agricultural District, agricultural lands controlled by the Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity (Department) or the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR), and lands encumbered by the Department and DLNR. The bill defines the term "rodeo and rodeo activities." The Department offers comments.

The Department is concerned that enacting the language amending Section 205-4.5 would open the door to other uses and activities seeking equal treatment. We recommend that approval of rodeos and associated uses and activities follow the long-established special permit process described in Section 205-6.

Senate Bill 2161 proposes to permit rodeos and rodeo activities on lands within agricultural districts that have a soil classification productivity rating of class A or B and defines the term “rodeo and rodeo activities”. **The Department supports the intent of the bill and offers the following comments.**

The Department recognizes the educational, cultural, and ceremonial importance of rodeos and rodeo activities associated with the State’s paniolo history. The Department also recognizes that it controls lands within agricultural districts, which primarily are used for pasture purposes. The Department’s current pasture leases strictly limit these lands to “pastoral” use. This is a concern as this measure does not provide as to whether “rodeo and rodeo activities” are considered pastoral uses.

The Department’s lands are subject to Chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), which provides authority for the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) to review and approve events on its lands. We note that any activity on the Department’s lands requires an environmental review pursuant to Chapter 343, HRS, and Hawaii Administrative Rules 11-200.1. Accordingly, any “rodeo and rodeo activities” will need to be properly reviewed and approved by the Board prior to the event occurring. We recommend that long-term dispositions be sought so that the Department’s limited resources are not further taxed and to ensure an appraisal is done to appropriately compensate the Department.

The Hawaii Cattlemen's Council **strongly supports SB2161** which authorizes rodeos and rodeo activities on lands that are zoned for agricultural use and defines the term "rodeo and rodeo activities".

Rodeo values and skills are closely intertwined with paniolo cattle production. The skills learned in rodeo develop horse and livestock handling skills which is paramount to workforce development for the cattle industry.

These community events bring together all ages and teach the participants responsibility and love of the land, while providing spectators with a way to connect more closely to the hard work that goes into producing the food on their plate. These rodeos also often serve as fundraising events for the community. Especially when paired with educational, cultural, and ceremonial activities, rodeos are integral to maintaining support for agricultural production in Hawaii. It is a way to reach those who do not normally have a connection to agriculture, allowing them to appreciate and learn the paniolo culture and values.

We are writing in support of allowing rodeos and related rodeo activities to be conducted on lands zoned for agricultural use. Rodeos are fundamentally connected to livestock production, ranching operations, and agricultural skills, and when properly managed, they represent a compatible and beneficial use of agricultural lands.

They also create opportunities for value-added activities such as agricultural education events, local food sales, agritourism, and community gatherings that strengthen rural economies.

Allowing rodeos on agricultural lands provides land managers with a flexible tool to generate supplemental revenue that can be reinvested into land stewardship, infrastructure maintenance, and ongoing agricultural operations. This diversification supports the long-term financial sustainability of agricultural lands while keeping them in active agricultural use.

Rodeos play an important role in engaging youth and introducing the next generation to livestock, horsemanship, and agricultural careers. Rodeo activities provide hands-on learning experiences that build responsibility, work ethic, and practical skills associated with animal care and land management. These experiences can spark early interest in ranching, veterinary science, agricultural trades, and other careers critical to Hawai‘i’s food system.

Creating spaces where young people can safely and appropriately interact with livestock helps ensure the continuity of agricultural knowledge and skills. Rodeos offer an accessible entry point for youth who may not otherwise have exposure to working lands or livestock-based agriculture.

When conducted with appropriate safeguards, rodeos and rodeo-related activities are compatible with agricultural zoning and support the intent of keeping lands productive, economically viable, and culturally relevant. Clear operating standards, coordination with land managers, and respect for surrounding agricultural activities can ensure that rodeos enhance—rather than detract from—the primary agricultural purpose of these lands.

In summary, allowing rodeos and rodeo activities on agricultural lands supports ranching operations, preserves Hawai‘i’s paniolo heritage, generates economic activity, and creates meaningful pathways for youth engagement in agriculture. We respectfully encourage continued support for rodeos as a legitimate and valuable agricultural use that contributes to the vitality of Hawai‘i’s rural communities and food system.

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 2161, which authorizes rodeos and rodeo activities on lands that are zoned for agricultural use.

HFB believes that rodeos are a legitimate agricultural activity that is closely connected to livestock management, ranching operations, and Hawai'i's paniolo tradition.

Rodeos are rooted in the practical skills used by ranchers, including horsemanship, roping, and animal handling. These activities reflect real-world agricultural practices and serve as an extension of working ranch operations rather than a departure from them. Rodeos also provide opportunities for agricultural education, skill development, and community engagement centered on livestock and working ranch lands.

Clarifying that rodeos are an agricultural activity provides important land-use certainty for ranchers, agricultural organizations, and communities. Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and Members of the Committee,

We **support the intent of SB2161**, which seeks to honor the State's rich ranching and paniolo culture by authorizing rodeos on agricultural lands. We recognize that these activities can provide a **viable new source of income** for both the agricultural and tourism sectors.

However, because these events involve dangerous sports and take place on land primarily intended for food production, we urge the committee to adopt the following standards:

Establishing Rodeo Welfare and Safety Standards. To ensure the safety of both participants and animals, the State should establish a **Rodeo Board** to enforce safety and welfare protocols, including things like veterinary oversight and humane handling.

Protecting Agricultural Land and Resource Value. Since this land is originally slated for agricultural purposes, it is vital that rodeo activities **do not adversely impact agricultural land** or other agricultural uses in the vicinity. To maintain its long-term value, we recommend:

- **Scale and Frequency Caps:** Implementing a **cap on the scale or frequency** of these events to prevent long-term degradation.
- **Environmental Safeguards:** Adding requirements to mitigate **erosion, waste, and excessive water use**. This should include protecting tree root zones from soil compaction and utilizing protective matting in high-traffic areas.
- **Post-Event Restoration:** Mandating that organizers restore the "**disturbed earth**" to substantially the same physical condition as existed before the event.

By incorporating these safeguards, **SB2161** will ensure that Hawai'i's ranching traditions grow in a way that is safe, humane, and respectful of our precious agricultural resources.

I am writing in support of SB2161. In short, rodeo absolutely belongs on agricultural lands. Rodeo began as a way for cowboys to show off their ranching skills. It celebrates and perpetuates the Paniolo heritage. We, Paniolo and the community alike deserve designated spaces to ride our horses and compete. While it is accurate to say not all ag lands should hold arenas and host events, it is essential to allow the opportunity for such events to happen within those spaces.

It broke my heart seeing event organizers for the Rope for Wishes rodeo, a benefit for the Hawai'i Make a Wish Foundation, call for petition and testimony to share at a Kailua Community Board Association meeting as complaints had been received by non-local property managers that having a rodeo at Kualoa Ranch was inappropriate. How ridiculous. If not for ag lands, where else should we ride? We have limited to no public trails available, or county owned arenas.

Meanwhile, I also live on an agriculture designated land with my horse, cows and poultry, amongst neighbors who rent out several housing "units" that somehow got approved with a single flower bed. My name is Naheana Brenneman Aguiar, and I am a fourth-generation paniolo. My children are now the fifth generation of our family continuing this proud tradition. I am writing to express my support for allowing ACTRA team roping events to be held on state lands in Hawai'i at the AMPAC arena in Pa'uilo on the Big Island.

Team roping is more than a sport—it is a vital part of our paniolo heritage. These events preserve our culture, teach discipline, responsibility, and horsemanship, and create opportunities for future generations to carry forward our traditions.

Personally, the opportunity to participate in ACTRA team ropings has had a profound impact on my family. As a single mother, I relied on this community to support my children. Through their participation in team roping, my children were able to earn scholarships and attend college, which would have been difficult otherwise. The ACTRA system makes this possible because events are affordable and accessible, and the support of this team roping community is AMAZING!

Hosting events at the AMPAC facility is ideal. It is quiet, with no homes nearby, and the grounds are safe—unlike the current county facility, which requires frequent watering because residents often complain about the dust, creating a very hard and unsafe condition unless a tractor and arena drag are hauled with every use (which is unaffordable). At AMPAC, there is no cattle hauling required, the cattle are less stressed, natural shade provides comfort for both horses and participants, and families would be able to bring their kids to work on their skills. The current arena is always locked and inaccessible, which limits opportunities for youth and community involvement.

Allowing ACTRA team roping at the AMPAC arena helps families learn a meaningful skill, strengthens our cultural identity, and opens doors for future opportunities. It is a safe, structured, and supportive environment that nurtures both our traditions and our youth. All ACTRA members are covered by the ACTRA insurance when the membership is purchased, which is mandatory to participate.

I respectfully ask for your support in allowing ACTRA team roping events to resume on state lands, so that our paniolo culture can thrive for generations to come.
