The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) supports SB2580, which modernizes Hawai'i's film and television production tax credit to ensure the State remains competitive in the rapidly evolving global production market.

Film and television production is no longer simply a creative industry, it is a globally mobile economic sector driven by incentive policy, infrastructure readiness, and workforce capacity. As outlined in the State's Film Hawai'i strategic framework, more than 90 countries now offer film rebates ranging from 25%–40%, and U.S. states are escalating their programs with higher rates, uplifts, and expanded eligibility to attract productions. The global production landscape is in an "incentives and infrastructure arms race," where jurisdictions compete not just on scenery, but on cost structure and certainty.

Hawai'i currently offers a 22–27% credit with a \$17 million per-production cap and \$50 million annual cap. These limits place Hawai'i below competing jurisdictions in both scale and flexibility. Recent years have shown the consequences: recurring series have left, large-scale productions have relocated to countries like New Zealand, and overall production spend has declined sharply since 2022. The State has world-class locations but lacks a competitive incentive structure aligned with today's production economics.

Since the last structural adjustment to Hawai‘i’s production credit, the economics of production have shifted dramatically:

- Labor, insurance, freight, and equipment costs have increased nationwide.
- Studios report tighter budgets and place tax incentives among their top cost-control measures.
- Productions now prioritize locations offering higher base credits, labor uplifts, and uncapped or higher-cap programs.

These market pressures mean Hawai‘i’s current credit rate no longer offsets the State’s higher logistical and geographic costs. Without adjustment, productions will continue to choose jurisdictions where incentives better balance rising production expenses.

SB2580 implements targeted adjustments aligned with industry trends and the State’s Film Hawai‘i strategy:

Increase credit to 27% (O‘ahu) 32% (Neighbor Islands)	Restores Hawai‘i to a competitive range relative to peer markets offering 30–40% incentives
Waiver of the \$17M cap for productions spending \$60M+	Enables Hawai‘i to compete for large-scale studio and streaming productions that bring sustained employment
Increase annual program cap to \$60M	Reflects market demand and prevents program bottlenecks
Extension of the sunset to 2038	Provides long-term certainty required for studio investment decisions
Modernized reporting and certification	Strengthens accountability and data transparency

These updates reflect the strategy presented in the Film Hawai‘i blueprint, which identifies incentive modernization as the immediate lever needed to stabilize the industry while the State builds long-term workforce and facility capacity.

Film production delivers direct spending across local vendors, small businesses, transportation, lodging, food services, and skilled trades. It also creates career pathways in creative technology, post-production, digital media, and skilled technical occupations.

Recent State analysis shows that film production generates tax revenues, workforce training contributions, and internship investments that support industry development. However, without policy alignment to current market conditions, Hawai‘i risks losing both economic activity and workforce continuity.

The Film Hawai‘i plan identifies three immediate priorities:

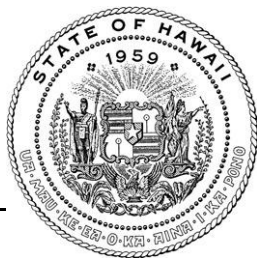
1. Modernize incentives to remain globally competitive
2. Stabilize production volume to sustain local workforce pipelines
3. Position Hawai'i as a Pacific creative hub for streaming-era content

SB2580 directly advances Priority #1 and enables the ecosystem growth outlined in the State's long-term strategy. Incentives are the entry point, once productions choose Hawai'i, infrastructure, workforce programs, and post-production capacity can scale.

SB2580 is not an expansion of policy direction; it is a necessary recalibration to market reality. Without these updates, Hawai'i will continue to fall behind in the competition for production activity. With them, the State can retain and grow a high-value creative sector that supports jobs, small businesses, and economic diversification.

For these reasons, we respectfully urge the Committee to pass SB2580.

Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai, and members of the Committee. The Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) supports SB2580, which advances comprehensive reforms to Hawai'i's Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit program to improve competitiveness, workforce development, and long-term industry business attraction stability.

SB2580 aligns closely with DBEDT's administrative measures, SB3088 and HB2269, which modernizes the tax credit framework through increased incentive rates, expanded eligibility for streaming productions, stronger compliance verification, and long-term program extension. Raising the base credit rates to 27% and 32% to incentivize increase in production business for the state, increasing the annual cap to \$60 million, and setting a benchmark for exempting series and large-budget productions from the per-production cap.

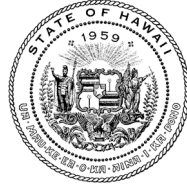
The measure also extends the sunset date to 2038 which strengthens Hawai'i's market position and provide greater certainty for production planning.

DBEDT recognizes that these enhancements increase fiscal exposure and administrative demands. However, these risks are mitigated through enhanced reporting, verification, audit authority, and oversight mechanisms established under SB2580. DBEDT supports this measure and respectfully urges the committee to pass this measure.

The Department of Taxation (DOTAX) offers the following comments
regarding S.B. 2580 for your consideration.

SB 2580 makes multiple amendments to section 235-17, Hawaii Revised
Statutes (HRS) as follows:

- Increases the credit amount which can be claimed for qualified production costs incurred in a county with a population of over 700,000 (Oahu) from 22 per cent to 27 per cent;
- Increases the credit amount which can be claimed for qualified production costs incurred in a county with a population of 700,000 or less (Neighbor Islands) from 27 per cent to 32 per cent;
- Adds a subsection requiring third party independent CPA certification, while repealing the similar provision in Act 143, SLH 2017;

- Increases the allowable credit amount per year from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000, and removes the \$17,000,000 per production limit cap if qualified costs meet or exceed the new \$60,000,000 cap;
- Extends from December 31, 2032, to December 31, 2037, the taxpayer ability to carry forward excess claims not processed because the yearly cap has been met;
- Makes clarifying amendments to the definition of a “qualifying production” regarding broadcast versus streaming productions and the minimum qualifying number of per season episodes;
- Defines “streaming platform” as online providers of content delivered via the internet as a paid subscription service.

Section 2 of the measure extends the sunset of Act 88, SLH 2006, as amended, to apply to costs incurred before January 1, 2038.

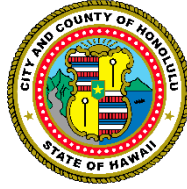
DOTAX recommends that section 5 of the bill be amended to state that section 1 shall apply to “costs incurred after December 31, 2025, rather than the current language stating “taxable years beginning after. . .”

Dear Chair DeCoite, Vice-chair Wakai and members of the committees:

The Honolulu Film Office would like to thank the Legislature and in particular this committee for its collaboration and long-standing support of Hawai'i's Film Industry. **We are at a crucial juncture** with our industry and the industry-supporting proposals this Legislative Session **are vital for the industry to address market changes and remain competitive.**

We strongly support the portions of this measure that:

- Update the film tax credit percentages to answer shifts in the market,
- Support attracting more of a production to film in Hawai'i which will allow the industry base to grow and develop infrastructure,
- Address technical issues that will streamline the tax filing process for both the State and Filers by using a Third Party Audit.

We offer these friendly amendments to take under advisement:

- Restore the Third Party language as discussed last session which would **exclude productions under \$1 million from the requirement.** Third Party Audits make sense for larger productions but can be cost-prohibitive for smaller productions, which would largely adversely affect our local filmmakers,
- Update and modernize a portion of the credit by deleting item (3) on line 7 of page 5 which currently excludes advertising messages for internet-only distribution. It is an outdated definition of a 'commercial' **and would inadvertently restrict commercials made for streaming platforms that allow advertising,** a strong growth-trend for that market segment.

Mahalo to the Chair and members of this committee who have been so supportive over the years, investing your time and mana'o to gain insights and an understanding of the needs of the industry and the significant economic benefits that the film industry brings to Hawai'i.

SUBJECT: INCOME, Increase Motion Picture Production Credit and Raise Annual Caps

BILL NUMBER: SB 2580

INTRODUCED BY: DECOITE, CHANG, FUKUNAGA, LAMOSAO, MCKELVEY,
MORIWAKI, SAN BUENAVENTURA, Elefante

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Increases the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit to 27 per cent of qualified production costs in counties with a population of over seven hundred thousand and 32 per cent in counties with a population of seven hundred thousand or less. Requires each taxpayer claiming the tax credit to submit an independent third-party certification verifying certain information to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism. Excludes qualified productions that incur at least \$60 million of qualified production costs from the per-production total tax credit cap of \$17 million. Increases the total amount of tax credits allowed to be claimed annually to \$60 million. Defines "streaming platform" and amends the definition of "qualified production" to include certain streaming productions. Extends the sunset date of the tax credit to 1/1/2038.

SYNOPSIS: Amends section 235-17(a), HRS, to increase the creditable percentages by 5 percentage points to 27% of qualified production costs in Honolulu and 32% in other counties.

Amends section 235-17(h), HRS, to require submission of a certification by an independent CPA verifying the information in the application using procedures prescribed by DBEDT. The new language replaces an uncodified law section (Act 143, SLH 2017, section 6) that annually required such certifications.

Amends section 235-17(l), HRS, to exclude from the per-production tax credit limit any production incurring at least \$60 million of qualified production costs.

Amends section 235-17(n), HRS, to raise the aggregate cap statewide from \$50 million to \$60 million, and to extend the sunset date of the credit by five years to 1/1/2038.

Amends section 235-17(o), HRS, to amend the qualified production definitions to allow streaming platform series to qualify.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Taxable years beginning after December 31, 2025.

STAFF COMMENTS: The production credit in HRS section 235-17 was enacted as Act 107, SLH 1997, as a percentage of the costs incurred in the State in the production of motion picture or television films. As enacted, the credit was 4% of regular production costs plus 6% of transient accommodations, mirroring the GET and TAT rates at the time. Act 156, SLH 1988, raised the TAT credit to 7.25% while also raising the TAT rate to 7.25%.

After a period where this credit took a back seat to the qualified high tech business program enacted by Act 221, SLH 2001, this credit was next amended by Act 88, SLH 2006, which added credits for digital media and replaced the GET and TAT bifurcation with a unified credit of 15% of qualified production costs incurred in the C&C of Honolulu and 20% in any other county. The act added a per-production cap of \$8 million and sunset the credit on Jan. 1, 2016.

Act 89, SLH 2013, changed the credit percentages to 20% in Honolulu and 25% in any other county; raised the per-production limit to \$15 million; and extended the sunset date to Jan. 1, 2019.

Act 143, SLH 2017, extended the sunset date for the credit to Jan. 1, 2026, and first imposed an aggregate cap of \$35 million. Act 275, SLH 2019, raised the aggregate cap to \$50 million.

Act 217, SLH 2022, increased the credit percentages to 22% in Honolulu and 27% in any other county and extended the sunset date to January 1, 2033.

This bill yet again is proposing an increase to the aggregate credit cap from \$50 million to \$60 million and extending the sunset date for another 5 years to January 1, 2038.

We in Hawaii have had our production credit since 1997, so it's been more than twenty years. Have there been any studies about what the program has done for Hawaii's economy or Hawaii's tax revenue? None were cited to the Legislature when the Hawaii production tax credit was increased in 2013. Maybe we don't care as much about the hard dollars as we do about other intangible effects like local jobs, the development of a skilled workforce, or robust media education programs that simply weren't around at the turn of the century. Even if so, lawmakers should have data on these intangibles, and other cost-benefit information, so they can make rational decisions on this matter.

Certainly, the film industry promises increased opportunities. Some of them certainly have materialized. But chasing these opportunities needs to be balanced against the cold hard reality of solving the problems at hand. Lawmakers need to ask whether production tax credits create sustainable economic development. It's well known that most productions shoot for a while and then wrap; the crew that supports the production then jumps to the next one. A case may be made for the production credits if they keep the productions rolling in and contributing to the economy. But the people need to see that case to justify continued redirection of resources to these credits while those resources could instead lower the overall tax burden not only for families but for the businesses that provide long-term employment for Hawaii's people.

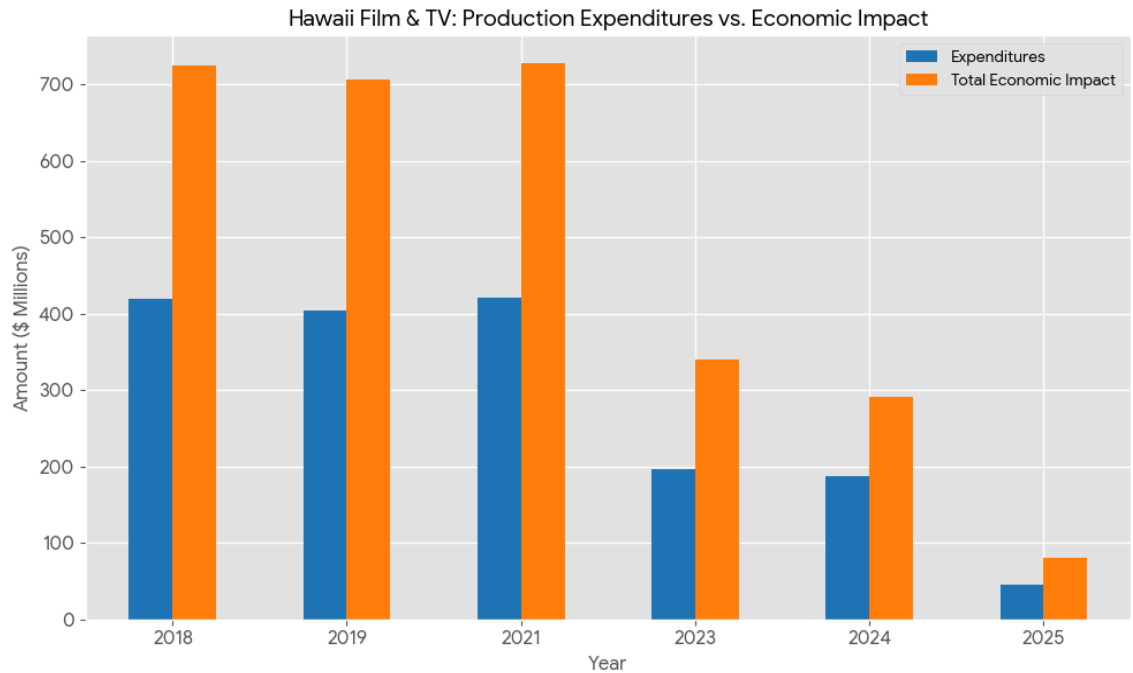

Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee,

Mahalo for hearing our concerns over the past several months and for introducing SB 2580 as a result of those conversations. The Hawai'i Film Alliance (HFA) submits this testimony in strong support of **SB 2580**.

HFA is a member-based organization comprised of over 600 Hawai'i film and television professionals, entertainment union members, creative workers, production companies, small businesses, and allied industry partners who live and work in the State of Hawai'i. Our members span the full spectrum of the production ecosystem, including crew, talent, independent filmmakers and support services that enable films to operate locally.

Long-term film projects have been non-existent these past two years, and SB 2580 has key components that will immediately **strengthen Hawai'i's film-friendly reputation**:

- **Removes the per production cap for films over \$60M.** This is an akamai game-changer to entice large format films.
- **Adds streaming language** to embrace the digital platforms of distribution that make Hawai'i competitive. Films that go directly to streaming are now welcome to film in Hawai'i.
- **Raises the overall film production cap to \$60 million dollars.** The increase to the tax credit signals to the world that the State of Hawai'i supports film. It has not gone unnoticed in this economic climate.
- **Raises the base points** to 27% for Oahu-based filming and 32% for neighbor-island filming. Getting over the 30% threshold across the state has been a goal of ours, so seeing this begin on the neighbor islands is a huge step in the right direction.



SB 2580 supports **economic diversification** at a time when Hawai'i must reduce overreliance on a single sector. Film and creative media production brings **outside capital** into the state, **circulates dollars locally for at least 18 months before the credit is paid out**, and enhances Hawai'i's global visibility in a way that aligns with cultural storytelling, place-based identity, and community pride.

The film industry generates high-quality jobs across a wide range of skill levels, from production crews and post-production professionals to construction, transportation, hospitality, and local vendors. These are high-paying, project-based opportunities that provide pathways into creative and technical careers for Hawai'i residents.

With the loss of Hawai'i residents to out-of-state locales, **graduates of the School of Cinematic Arts program at UH Mānoa and the Academy of Creative Media program at UH-West 'Oahu** need a **vibrant film industry** that allow them to **work at home in the islands**. Having them stay home to raise families and nurture relationships with Aloha is part of what makes the Hawaiian culture so attractive and unique.

HFA recognizes that a strong incentive framework encourages productions to commit to Hawai'i for the long term. Our film history shows that two television series filming simultaneously build careers, **stabilizes families**, provides upward **departmental promotion**, promotes **infrastructure growth**, and **deepens partnerships** with local professionals and businesses. These outcomes are essential to building a resilient industry that benefits residents first.

The film tax credit does not just provide jobs for local residents. It is a **reliable tax revenue source** for the state. In 2022, **tourists** who came to Hawai'i because of a film they saw **spent \$1 Billion dollars** which generated **\$121 Million in state tax revenue**¹. Couple that with state taxes paid by film workers and supporting businesses, and you have a tax incentive that more than pays for itself year after year.

Mahalo for the opportunity to provide testimony and for your continued support of Hawai'i's film and creative media community. **Please pass SB 2580.**

Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai and Members of the Committee:

We **SUPPORT** SB2580 with the following comments and suggested changes:

- **Recognition of Independent Third-Party Certificates/Exemption:** We support the requirement of the Independent Third-Party Certificate but only if the certificates are recognized by DBEDT and DoTax, both of which have disregarded these certificates in the past and have proceeded with their own internal audits of every tax credit claim irrespective of evidence of non-compliance with the statute. Given the cost to obtain such certificates, qualified productions with less than

\$1,000,000 in qualified spend should be exempt from the requirement as they have been in the past.

- **Classification by Distribution Platform:** It should not matter whether a qualified production is distributed via streaming, broadcast or the internet, provided that the requisite amount of qualified expenditures are made in the state. The distinction between “streaming” and “broadcast” is also ambiguous since some qualified productions are distributed on both streaming and broadcast platforms. For the same reason, the exclusion of commercials that “include an advertising message with internet-only distribution” should also be eliminated.

We **PROPOSE** the following changes:

- **Distribution of Credit Proposed Language:**

Distributions of the tax credit shall be made in accordance with subchapter J, K, or S, or any other relevant pass-through entity allocation provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, to which the State conforms, except that section 704(b)(2) shall not apply.

Basis for Proposed Language: The distribution of the tax credit is currently determined by administrative rule and requires that the tax credit can only be claimed by an investor in an amount related to its investment. For example, if three investors each invest \$100,000 in a film project, each investor can only claim a tax credit on its \$100,000 investment. In some situations, however, the investors may have different appetites for risk and wish to reallocate the tax credits that may be claimed. For example, investors 1 and 2 may agree to allocate their tax credits to investor 3, reducing investor 3’s investment risk, in exchange for investor 3 giving up some of its upside in the film project should it be financially successful.

Allowing investors to reallocate tax credits does not increase the cost to the state but makes it easier to attract investment for local film productions.

- **Studio Facilities Proposed Language:**

Proposed Language:

“Qualified Production”:

(2) Means a studio facility located on property owned by the state or any county.

“Qualified production costs” means...

(12) Development and construction costs relating to a studio facility.

Basis for Proposed Language: The inclusion of Studio Facilities as a Qualified Production will allow for much needed infrastructure support while providing ongoing revenue to the state and/or county. At the same time, the necessary approval of the governmental entity for the use of such property will allow for the flexibility of different facilities without restrictive statutory requirements.

My name is Kiran Polk, and I am the Executive Director & CEO of the Kapolei Chamber of Commerce. The Kapolei Chamber of Commerce is an advocate for businesses in the Kapolei region including Waipahu, Kapolei, 'Ewa Beach, Nānakūli, Wai'anae, and Mākaha. We work on behalf of our members and the broader business community to improve the regional and State economic climate and to help West O'ahu businesses thrive.

The Kapolei Chamber of Commerce is in **strong support for SB 2580**, which proposes targeted updates to Hawai'i's film incentive program to restore competitiveness, strengthen accountability, and support long-term industry growth. Specifically, this measure increases the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit to 27 percent of qualified production costs in counties with populations over 700,000 and 32 percent in counties with populations of 700,000 or less; requires independent third-party certification of claimed credits; increases the annual statewide tax credit cap to \$60 million; excludes productions incurring at least \$60 million in qualified costs from the per-production \$17 million cap; clarifies eligibility for certain streaming productions; and extends the sunset date of the tax credit to January 1, 2038.

For decades, television series such as *Magnum P.I.*, *Hawai'i Five-O*, and *NCIS: Hawai'i* filmed in West O'ahu, generating consistent demand for local restaurants, food vendors, transportation companies, equipment suppliers, cleaning services, and other small businesses. These productions provided more than short-term activity, they created steady revenue streams and sustained jobs that allowed local businesses and workers to remain rooted in our communities.

Today, for the first time in decades, Hawai'i does not have a television series filming in the state. This absence has been felt acutely in West O'ahu, where small businesses have lost customers and workers and lost income that supports their families. At the same time, **productions are increasingly choosing to film in other states and countries that offer more competitive and predictable incentive programs.**

This trend underscores that Hawai'i's current incentive structure is no longer keeping pace in an increasingly competitive global market. **Without meaningful updates, the state risks continued erosion of film-related economic activity, particularly in regions like West O'ahu that have demonstrated the capacity to support large-scale productions and associated workforce needs.**

Strengthening Hawai'i's film incentives through SB 2580 will help bring productions back, restore business activity for small businesses, and reestablish stable employment opportunities for local workers. **This is especially important as a film studio is planned for West O'ahu, positioning the region to become a significant hub for creative industry growth if the policy environment supports it.**

SB 2580 represents an important opportunity to reaffirm Hawai'i's commitment to supporting small businesses, retaining local jobs, and ensuring that West O'ahu remains an active and competitive participant in the State's economic development strategy.

For these reasons, the Kapolei Chamber of Commerce **supports HB 1694** and respectfully urges the Committee to pass this measure.

I write in support of SB2580. Very grateful to Chair Lynn DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai and members of the committee for bringing forth this bill focusing on major film initiatives that could help move Hawaii's film industry to the limelight. Last year, you all visited the set of Wrecking Crew and saw what an impact a show like this had on local hiring of cast and crew, vendors, businesses, and not to mention the release of this feature is a "free campaign" for our beautiful state on a global scale (streaming on Amazon prime). Look at the final product - Hawaii is a character - textures of Hawaii in story (pidgin, local cast, diversity) and in values (Ohana first) are showcased. This was just 12 days of shooting on Oahu vs 43 days in NZ. We put over 400 people to work in a short time, just imagine if we had these incentives in place then. Millions more could've been pumped into Hawaii's economy, sustaining work force development for our local talent. Being one of the producers on Wrecking Crew and Chief of War, time and time again we've faced these challenges with the bigger budgeted productions as they're limited by the per project and overall cap. Plus, our 22% Oahu incentive is too low compared to most states and countries when Hawaii is already considered one of the most expensive places to live in and shoot on location. These big shows hit the cap too quickly and are forced to go to other places where the money will go much farther. Why focus on the bigger budgeted shows for the lifting of the cap? Because these shows put hundreds of locals to work for several months (sometimes thousands like Chief of War), allows for internships, many local casting roles and money is spent on local hotels, restaurants, shopping, etc. - circular economy goes immediately into effect. Currently I'm on the Netflix film, "Protecting Jared" and it is 100% shooting in Hawaii - and that comes from Jason Momoa himself who basically put his foot down and said no more moving locations. BTW, this is the 3rd project he's brought to Hawaii because he's loyal and he cares and there will be more.

As Co-Founder of ICAN, we focus on elevating NHPI in our industry by providing high level training, work force development opportunities, creating pathways into the industry and most importantly, building communities that never existed before for our talent. When productions are here, we're able to bring access to industry professionals to our ICAN community.

These new incentives are overdue and I'm very excited to see it all come to fruition.

'Ohina Labs strongly supports **SB2580**, which modernizes, strengthens, and extends Hawai'i's Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit. This bill represents a thoughtful, forward-looking investment in one of Hawai'i's most scalable, high-impact industries.

SB2580 strengthens Hawai'i's competitiveness. In a time where we are not just competing with other states but the rest of the world, we need the tools to compete.

SB2580 reflects today's production landscape.

By defining "streaming platform" and explicitly including certain streaming productions as qualified productions, the bill recognizes the reality of how content is now made and distributed. These large-scale productions bring long-term infrastructure development, workforce upskilling, and global visibility that benefit local creators and small businesses alike.

Extending the sunset provides stability.

Extending the program to **January 1, 2038** gives producers, studios, and local organizations the certainty needed to plan multi-year investments. Stability is critical for workforce development, infrastructure growth, and the long-term success of local talent pipelines like 'Ohina Labs.

For 'Ohina Labs, this bill is not an abstract policy, it directly impacts whether local filmmakers can build careers here, whether young people can see a future in the creative industries, and whether Hawai'i continues to tell its own stories rather than simply hosting productions that pass through.

My name is Antonio Jeremiah Agosto. I am a 33-year-old filmmaker, MBA student at Chaminade University, and the founder of Visionize Media, based in 'Ewa Beach. I am writing to express my strong support for SB 2580. This bill is not just about tax numbers; it is about the survival and growth of our local creative community.

1. Proof of Concept: The Visionize Masterclass

Last year, we launched "The Art of Music Media Masterclass" in partnership with UH West O'ahu. We proved that when you give local creatives practical, real-world solutions—like shooting live at the Holo Holo Music Festival alongside professionals—they don't just learn; they thrive. We had students from across the UH system learning technical lighting, workflow, and backstage etiquette. The success of this masterclass shows that the talent is here, the drive is here, and the "practical solutions" are ready to be put on set.

2. Building at Home to Keep Our Talent

I created these programs because I know what it feels like to grow up in Hawai'i wanting to learn a craft that no one was teaching locally. We must be able to groom our own creatives and build our future *at home*. If we provide more sets here through the incentives in SB 2580, our youth won't feel forced to move to the mainland to pursue their dreams. By increasing the annual cap to \$60 million and raising the credit percentages, we create a "sustainable creative economy" where local families can make a living.

3. The Impact of Lost Productions

We have seen what happens when productions leave. When a show like *NCIS: Hawai'i* is canceled or chooses another location, it isn't just "glitz and glam" that disappears—it is the income for over 800 local businesses and 710 cast and crew members. For every 100 residents directly employed by a production, another 59 local jobs are stimulated. SB 2580 helps keep these jobs here by making Hawai'i competitive again while ensuring the state benefits from real, documented economic activity.

4. Remaining Competitive: "Raise or Retire"

The reality is that our current 22% and 27% incentives have become "bottom-of-the-barrel" numbers compared to other jurisdictions. Without the raise to 27% and 32%

proposed in this bill, we are effectively "out of the game". Major productions are already looking outside of Hawai'i for locations. We must modernize our incentives—including adding streaming platforms—to reflect the 2026 industry landscape.

Conclusion

Visionize Media and the entire Hawaii Film Alliance are ready to work, but we need the legislative infrastructure to stay in the fight. SB 2580 is the key to ensuring that the next generation of storytellers can build their careers right here on O'ahu and across the neighbor islands.

I urge the committee to Pass SB 2580. Mahalo for your time and for supporting our local film industry.

The global visibility created by films and television series shot in Hawai‘i promotes the State as a destination while supporting community-based economic activity beyond traditional visitor spending. Unlike short-term tourism surges, film productions often operate for months, providing stable income for local workers and businesses.

Additionally, the industry supports local creative professionals while remaining distinct from other creative sectors, allowing targeted investment without diverting resources from small businesses, cultural practitioners, or emerging industries. I am writing in strong support of SB2580, relating to the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit.

Hawai'i's film and digital media industry is not a luxury sector. It is a critical economic engine that supports thousands of local workers across multiple trades, including production crews, construction, transportation, hospitality, post-production, food services, and creative professionals. SB2580 strengthens Hawai'i's competitiveness while ensuring fiscal responsibility and transparency.

The proposed increase in the tax credit rate recognizes the real and rising costs of production in Hawai'i, particularly in counties with smaller populations where film activity has an outsized economic impact. Increasing the credit to 27 percent in larger counties and 32 percent in smaller counties helps level the playing field against mainland and international jurisdictions that aggressively court productions with higher incentives.

Transparency strengthens the program and ensures its long-term sustainability.

Excluding large-scale productions with at least \$60 million in qualified production costs from the per-production cap recognizes the substantial workforce demand and economic return these projects generate. At the same time, raising the annual statewide cap to \$60 million allows Hawai'i to remain competitive without crowding out smaller productions that also support local jobs and talent development.

Including eligible streaming productions reflects the realities of today's media landscape. Streaming platforms now drive a significant share of global production, and updating the statute ensures Hawai'i does not lose opportunities simply due to outdated definitions.

Finally, extending the sunset date to January 1, 2038, provides the stability and predictability that productions, investors, and local workers need. Film projects are planned years in advance. A stable incentive framework allows Hawai'i residents to build long-term careers rather than rely on intermittent, uncertain work.

My name is Tyler Young. I am a Creative Producer, Line Producer, and Unit Production Manager based here in Honolulu, Hawaii. In the last 25 years I have produced over 450 different productions for the film & television industry worldwide. As a producer, I am responsible for building and managing budgets, hiring local crew and vendors, and bidding projects to studios, television networks, streamers, and productions companies. I am writing in great support of SB2580.

Hawaii's current film tax incentive is relatively good, but not competitive enough to attract larger film and television productions to the state. The current base credits and caps are too limiting, and prevent large scale productions from choosing Hawaii to spend their higher budget dollars. Productions are turning to other locations with more competitive film tax incentives, taking millions of dollars elsewhere, and leaving Hawaii with a weaker economy.

With tighter film production budgets, the business of our industry has become extremely competitive where each individual line item and potential cost savings factors into the larger decision of where in the world to film. If productions choose to film in locations outside of Hawaii, our state will lose millions and millions of dollars in revenue, and will slowly crush our film and television industry. We also risk cultural misrepresentation, with productions depicting Hawaii's stories and characters without local cultural guidance and authenticity.

SB2580 proposes to increase the film tax base credit to 27%/32%, which is a small increase from the current base credits. However, this small increase will make a huge difference in how competitive Hawaii can be in attracting larger film productions to the state.

Passing SB2580 is crucial to supporting a more sustainable film and television production industry in Hawaii. Studios, networks, streamers, and producers like me will be able to hire more local people and vendors, spend more of our budget dollars in the state, and create a more robust career path for our keiki. I urge you to pass SB2580 to encourage more film and television production, and to supercharge our local economies where everyone benefits from a robust film and television industry.

Aloha Chair and Members of the Committee,

My name is Keala Kekaulua, and I serve as an Outreach Ambassador in Hilo dedicated to aligning our community with sustainable career opportunities. I am testifying today in strong support of SB2580. Our community faces a critical choice: we can either continue to export our talent and stories, or we can build the infrastructure necessary to let Hawai‘i tell its own stories, right here in Hilo.

The Cost of Inaction: The Chief of War Warning

We need look no further than Jason Momoa’s epic series, Chief of War, to see the direct result of our current geographic and financial disparities.

- A Lost Opportunity: Despite being a deeply personal Hawaiian saga co-created by Momoa as an "homage to his people," approximately 80% of the production was filmed in New Zealand rather than Hawai‘i.
- Economic Flight: New Zealand’s more competitive tax incentives and lower production costs meant that millions of dollars in wages and hundreds of jobs were diverted away from our local economy.
- The Talent Drain: When major productions set in Hawai‘i are forced to film elsewhere for "budgetary reasons," our local actors and crew in Hilo are the first to suffer. They are

left with the immense stress of either funding expensive travel to Honolulu for smaller roles or watching from the sidelines as our stories are filmed on foreign soil.

How SB2580 Corrects the Course

SB2580 is the specific policy tool we need to ensure this doesn't happen again. By offering a 32% tax credit for production costs in counties under 700,000 residents, this bill provides a powerful incentive for creators like Momoa to keep their projects—and our jobs—on the Neighbor Islands.

- **Decentralizing the Industry:** A 5% "Neighbor Island Bonus" directly offsets the logistical costs that currently drive productions toward the "Honolulu Monopoly".
- **Alleviating Workforce Stress:** Bringing productions to Hilo removes the financial and emotional strain on local talent who are currently forced to choose between their homes and their careers.
- **Empowering Community Vision:** This bill aligns with our community's strategic goal to "foster creativity and workforce development," turning Hilo into a hub for "future media" rather than just a backdrop.

Conclusion

It is time to let Hawai‘i tell the stories of Hawai‘i. We must stop forcing our best talent to choose between their roots and their profession. Passing SB2580 will ensure that the next great Hawaiian epic is filmed where it belongs: in our own communities, with our own people.

I urge the committee to pass SB2580. Mahalo for your time and for the opportunity to testify.

I support the intent and current language contained within SB 2580. The film industry is one of the strongest mechanisms that improves the overall economic activity, which directly affects the velocity of money (how many times a dollar circulates within the economy) through the local economy.

These tax credits are not without guardrails. SB2580, in its current form, requires each taxpayer claiming the tax credit to submit an independent third-party certification verifying certain information to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism. In prior practice, only an affidavit was needed by a producer or production company promising to adhere to the conditions of the tax credit. This oversight measure contained within the bill will ensure that the tax credits are used properly and give peace of mind to taxpayers who are against tax credits for tax credits' sake.

In addition, SB2580 increases the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit to 27 per cent of qualified production costs in counties with a population of over seven hundred thousand and 32 per cent in counties with a population of seven hundred thousand or less. Furthermore, SB2580 creates a codified definition for "streaming platform". Streaming Platforms are becoming popular, and we should have a policy created on how to address this new sub-industry within the entertainment industry.

In summary, the passage of this measure will help to solidify Hawaii in the global film industry. Therefore, I recommend that SB2580 be passed by this committee. I hope all changes to this bill will be in keeping with the intent. The passage of this bill will increase the standard of living for all workers in Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to submit my testimony.

My name is Aubrey Lee Staley, and I submit this testimony in strong support of SB 2580.

I am a Hawai‘i-based talent agent, manager, producer, and small business owner. I am the founder of ALA Hawai‘i, representing over 200 local actors, models, and creatives, and a co-founder of the Hawai‘i Film Alliance, a nonprofit organization dedicated to advocacy, education, and workforce development for Hawai‘i’s film and television industry. I am also a Hawai‘i resident raising my family here and building businesses rooted in our local economy. As someone who has worked in New York, North Carolina, Oklahoma and Los Angeles, all previously positive film hubs, I have seen economic value of a thriving film industry. My time in the industry since moving back has also proven the value when giving local/Native Hawaiians a voice, representation, opportunities and space in this field only accumulate and give our people and islands growth to tell our stories.

SB 2580 is critical because it strengthens Hawai‘i’s competitiveness as a film and television production hub while directly supporting local workers, local businesses, and long-term economic stability.

The motion picture and digital media industry in Hawai‘i is not abstract or “Hollywood-only.” It is made up of local crew members, Native Hawaiian and local actors, small vendors, family-run businesses, students, and entrepreneurs who rely on consistent production activity to remain in Hawai‘i. When productions leave due to an uncompetitive incentive structure, it is local people who lose jobs and representation—not studios.

SB 2580 modernizes Hawai‘i’s tax credit in a way that reflects today’s production realities. By increasing the base credit and adjusting caps for large-scale qualified productions, this bill helps ensure Hawai‘i can attract projects that employ hundreds of local workers at a time while still maintaining safeguards and long-term oversight. These productions generate significant downstream economic impact with hotels, restaurants, transportation, construction, post-production, and tourism visibility, benefits that extend well beyond the set.

As someone who works directly with local talent, I see firsthand how these opportunities change lives. Film and television projects provide union-qualifying work, health benefits, pension

contributions, and career-sustaining wages. They also allow Native Hawaiian and local stories to be told by people from this place, rather than exported elsewhere.

Importantly, SB 2580 is about retention, not just attraction. Without a competitive and predictable incentive, Hawai'i risks losing an entire generation of skilled workers to the mainland. Once that workforce is gone, it is extraordinarily difficult and costly to rebuild. We currently have non-profit groups like Lil'uokalani Trust offering programs within the film industry to our next generation keiki. How disheartening it would be for them to find their passion within the industry if only to become another displaced Hawaiian.

This bill represents an investment in Hawai'i's people, culture, and economy. It supports an industry that brings outside dollars into the state while keeping local talent employed at home. For these reasons, I respectfully urge the committee to pass SB 2580.

WRITTEN TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB2580, WITH AMENDMENTS

Relating to the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit

Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

I submit this testimony in support of SB2580, with amendments, based on direct experience in Hawai‘i’s film and television industry and the framework outlined in my A Smarter Blueprint for Hawai‘i’s Film Industry.

SB2580 correctly recognizes that Hawai‘i’s current film incentive structure is not delivering consistent jobs, infrastructure growth, or long-term stability. However, raising caps or adjusting percentages alone will not improve return on investment. What matters is how effectively each public dollar is deployed.

Recommended Amendments**1. Performance-Based Incentive (20%–40%)**

Establish a 20% base credit, with productions earning up to an additional 20% only by meeting measurable local investment benchmarks:

- +4% for hiring 80% local crew (or +3% for 70%)
- +4% for using certified Hawai‘i sound stages or post-production facilities
- +4% for hiring Hawai‘i-based key creatives and principal actors

- +4% for spending 70% or more of the budget in-state
- +4% for completing post-production, VFX, or AI work with Hawai‘i vendors

Maximum incentive: 40% — earned, not automatic.

This structure raises the State’s ROI and increases the dollar-for-dollar economic return by tying incentives directly to local wages, vendor spending, and infrastructure use.

2. \$20 Million Per-Production Cap

Adopt a hard \$20 million cap per production to prevent any single project from absorbing a disproportionate share of public funds.

3. Separate \$20 Million Major Film Fund

Instead of increasing the general incentive pool to \$60 million, create a separate \$20 million Major Film Fund for large-budget productions that commit to extended shoots, large local crews, and significant in-state spending.

This allows Hawai‘i to attract major productions without diluting ROI or crowding out mid-sized and local projects.

4. Semiannual Credit Payments

Replace long audit delays with predictable payments every six months, improving cash flow for workers and vendors while preserving fiscal oversight.

5. GE Tax Parity for Local Rental Vendors

Address General Excise Tax pyramiding on locally owned film equipment so local vendors are not structurally disadvantaged, further improving in-state spend efficiency.

Conclusion

These amendments focus the incentive on outcomes, not volume. They increase return on investment, improve dollar-for-dollar impact, protect taxpayers, and build lasting local capacity.

I respectfully urge you to pass SB2580 with these amendments.

My name is Brian Patrick Wallace. I am a Hawai‘i-based film and television professional with over 17 years of experience working in this industry, a Vice President of IATSE Local 665, and a leader with the Hawai‘i Film Alliance.

I am writing in strong support of SB 2580, which modernizes Hawai‘i’s film tax credit by raising the base credit to 27% on O‘ahu and 32% on the Neighbor Islands, increasing the annual cap to \$60 million, and adjusting the per-production cap for large-scale projects.

Hawai‘i’s film industry has historically been a powerful economic engine for the state, creating thousands of local jobs and driving spending across hotels, restaurants, rental houses, construction, transportation, and small businesses. However, in recent years, Hawai‘i has lost work to competing jurisdictions that offer clearer, more competitive, and more predictable incentive structures.

to leave the state for work. When productions choose Hawai‘i, local residents are hired, local businesses benefit, and tax revenue circulates back into our communities.

The Hawai‘i Film Alliance has identified SB 2580 as one of the key bills needed this session to strengthen and retain our local film industry . Passing this bill sends a clear message that Hawai‘i values its local workforce and is serious about keeping film and television production here at home.

Relating to the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committees on Economic Development & Technology and Ways and Means,

My name is Marie Hathaway, and I submit this testimony in strong support of SB 2580, relating to the Motion Picture, Digital Media, and Film Production Income Tax Credit.

I am a Hawai'i-based creative professional, actor, producer, and author as well as a former City and County Paramedic Supervisor. Today, my work spans film, television, live events, and community-based storytelling. I am also a parent who raised a local child here in Hawai'i, and I care deeply about whether creative professionals can realistically build stable, middle-class lives in this state.

SB 2580 is critical because it recognizes the current realities of the film and digital media industry and responds with thoughtful, accountable, and future-focused policy.

This measure increases the tax credit to 27 percent of qualified production costs in counties with populations over 700,000 and 32 percent in counties with populations of 700,000 or less, ensuring statewide competitiveness while supporting productions across all islands. It raises the annual statewide cap to \$60 million, excludes productions that spend \$60 million or more from the per-production cap, and extends the sunset date to January 1, 2038—providing the long-term predictability that studios and investors require to commit to Hawai'i.

Importantly, SB 2580 also defines and includes streaming platforms within the definition of qualified production. Streaming is no longer an emerging sector—it is the dominant model for film and television production. If Hawai'i does not explicitly include streaming projects, we will continue to lose work to other states and regions that have already adapted.

The bill's requirement for independent third-party certification submitted to the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism adds an important layer of transparency and accountability. This ensures that public investment is verified, responsible, and aligned with the Legislature's intent.

From the ground level, I can say this clearly: our film and digital media industry is a workforce, not a luxury. It supports electricians, drivers, medics, carpenters, caterers, editors, accountants, costume designers, small vendors, and countless other local professionals. These are skilled, middle-class jobs that allow people to stay in Hawai'i, raise families, and contribute to our local economy.

Without long-term certainty, we see talent leave—not because they want to, but because they have no choice. SB 2580 directly addresses that instability. It allows Hawai'i to compete fairly, attract larger and longer-term productions, and provide consistent employment for local crews rather than short bursts of work followed by long gaps.

Just as importantly, it helps ensure that Hawai'i stories can be told by people who live here, respect this place, and are invested in its future.

For these reasons, I strongly urge your support of SB 2580.

My name is **Kulani Watson**, and I am a Hawai'i-based writer and creative storyteller.

Before I begin, I would like to invite you to take a brief moment and think of one of your favorite films or television shows set here in Hawai'i. Just one. I will bring this up later.

Mahalo for the opportunity to share my testimony in strong support of bills dedicated to strengthening and investing in our film, television, and broader creative industry here in Hawai'i.

For many people around the globe, their first introduction to Hawai'i didn't come from stepping off a plane. It came from a screen. When many of us think of Hawai'i on screen, a flood of iconic images and stories come to mind. From classics like **"Blue Hawaii"** and **"Diamond Head,"** to modern favorites like **"Forgetting Sarah Marshall," "50 First Dates," "Blue Crush," "Jurassic Park," "Godzilla," "Tropic Thunder,"** and television phenomenons like **"Lost," "Hawaii Five-0," "Magnum P.I.,"** Hawai'i has long been a backdrop for stories that reached the entire world.

Now let me ask, what film or television show you were thinking of? Chances are, someone from our community had a hand in bringing that story to life. A local writer, a camera operator, a production assistant, a costume designer, a location scout, a driver, a small-business owner providing meals, or a resident opening their space for filming. Behind every scene you remember, every line you quote, and every landscape shot that stayed with you, there were real people from these islands contributing their talent, time, and heart to make it possible.

I stand here as one of many people in our community trying to become a professional storyteller for Hawai'i, not just for entertainment, but for representation, culture, and identity. I have written multiple short films and feature-length screenplays that aim to show Hawai'i in a fuller, more authentic light. Stories that go beyond the surface level images often associated with our islands. Stories that reflect our humor, our struggles, our families, our modern realities, and the depth of our culture. Stories that show the world there is far more to Hawai'i than hula skirts, luaus, and surfers.

But I want to be honest about the journey. Writing and creating in general can be an incredibly lonely ordeal. You sit at your computer staring at a blinking cursor for thirty minutes, sometimes an hour, mentally drained and asking yourself: Is this funny? Is this relatable? Will anyone understand this? Will an audience in Hawai'i connect with it? Will an audience across the world? And then there is the larger question that quietly lingers in the back of your mind, the one that makes you pause and wonder why you're even writing at all:

If I finally get the opportunity to pitch this story to a major studio or streaming platform, and they see that it's based in Hawai'i... will their first thought be to pass on it because our incentives and tax credits can't compete?

That question is not rooted in ego. It's rooted in reality. I fully understand that the global film industry does not revolve around me or any single individual. But this issue does revolve around **us**, the writers, directors, crew members, designers, actors, editors, technicians, and countless unseen professionals who make productions possible. It revolves around local businesses that provide catering, transportation, lodging, construction materials, and services. It revolves around our keiki who dream of creative careers but feel they must leave home to pursue them. It revolves around the economic ripple effect that a thriving creative industry brings to our communities.

Investing in Hawai'i's film and television infrastructure is not simply about entertainment. It is about **economic development, workforce opportunity, cultural preservation, and global visibility**. Stronger support and competitive incentives allow productions to choose Hawai'i not only for its beauty, but for its viability. When we build this industry locally, we are not only inviting outside productions in, we are empowering our own residents to create from within.

It is my firm belief that **this is Hawai'i's time to tell its own stories**. We have the landscapes. We have the talent. We have the culture. What we need is the structural support that allows those elements to meet opportunity. When we invest in creative industries, we invest in voices that might otherwise go unheard. We invest in jobs that keep families together instead of forcing them to relocate. We invest in a future where Hawai'i is not only a filming location, but a **storytelling powerhouse**.

Allow us the opportunity to be storytellers, and we will show you what we can do, not only for the film industry, but for tourism, for small businesses, for cultural education, and for the pride of our people. The stories born here have the power to travel the world, just as the world has long traveled here through stories.

I write in full support of SB2580, as well as SB 3088 and companion bill HB 2269. Thank you, Senators, for listening to our concerns and for addressing specific issues related to Hawai'i film production.

I am a member of the Directors Guild of America and was the unit production manager on Doogie Kamealoha, MD and Red One, and production supervisor on Moana. Currently, I am the unit production manager on Protecting Jared, a Netflix film that will begin shooting later this month.

Hawai'i's film tax incentive has been a huge success in the past, but has fallen behind in the past two years. Most other states with thriving film production have incentives above 30%. My community is now suffering because in 2025, there was nearly zero production work on the Islands.

These bill help address four major concerns for film workers: **increasing the overall percentages, allowing larger projects to have a larger per-production cap, increasing the over all cap, and increasing the sunset date.**

Increasing the base rate to 27%/32% is the single best move we can make to bring mainland production spending into our economy. The studios have departments dedicated to judging incentives against one another. Hawai'i is often overlooked from the start because of its current 22% base rate. This increase will help all productions, but will mostly help smaller local production or shorter jobs coming from the mainland that do reach the production cap.

Allowing productions that spend more than 60 million to exceed the per-production cap is exactly what is needed to bring larger and long-term productions. Long-term television series and big-budget studio features will be able to shoot exclusively in Hawai'i rather than the current standard - where shows shoot exteriors for a couple of weeks, then shoot another location that passes for Hawai'i.

Increasing the overall cap is a commitment to finding success in this plan. The current \$50 million cap has not increased in several years. Raising it to \$60 million is a modest increase in line with inflation since the last increase. These bills are not about giving a handout to corporate studios; they enable the state and production companies to work as investment partners, adding to the local economy.

Extending the sunset date on the tax incentive is a strong message to producers and studios that Hawai'i is a committed investment partner. Television series have been the true stimulus in building the film community on Island. Television series producers need to know that they can create multi-year productions before committing to shoot in Hawai'i.

These bills will help bring mainland production money to the islands and distribute it to local vendors and workers; that's why they have my support. If enacted in conjunction with the other bills focused on improving the terms of our film tax incentives, they send a strong message that Hawai'i is a film-friendly state.

I support 2580 reinstate and increase Hawai‘i’s income tax credit for film production with graduated levels depending on county population size and investment with the suggestion that this legislative body works to be sure this tax break incentivize investment in our own community industry.

I write in my capacity as a citizen. I currently have no major monetary interest in the film industry. However, as a creative person, it is an industry I have always felt could be a unique driver for our economy, not just because of our unique cultural circumstances, outlook and place in the world but also for the overall creativity of our community and the lessened impact this industry versus our current options (tourism and military) have on our natural and cultural environment.

On many levels a strong film industry in Hawai‘i could be a great contributor to our economic and socio-cultural economy **if we attract more investment that incentivized to invest in building our own industry, and training and hiring our own community members.** This includes telling our stories too.

When I was in law school a focus of my interest was particularly in entertainment and sports law. It is something I wanted to do. But I did not want to live in Los Angeles, New York or Tennessee. I came home to find most opportunities in this industry comprised of outside investors leveraging our community’s uniqueness to further their business beyond our shores.

Opportunities to practice in the field of entertainment law and industry were minimal for someone who wanted to stay home. Most contracts and issues were led by industry professionals flown here, business aspects were negotiated by outside council and when culture was utilized it leveraged our community outlook to generate profits outside of our home. This is not all bad, of course some of it is just the nature of business, but it has always lacked reciprocity. And yet, despite this lack of reciprocity Hawai‘i has always punched over our weight for the short end of the bargain. This equation must be corrected.

Hawai'i has the talent to tap into and train at all levels of the film industry. Investors in our home dating back to 1893 and before have always taken more than they give. I think in this new world we can welcome investment and require them to give back and help us build what we want for Hawai'i. My name is Milo Magno, and I respectfully submit this testimony in strong support of SB 2580.

I am a medically retired, disabled, combat-wounded veteran living in Hawai‘i after serving 12 years in the U.S. Army as an infantryman. Like many veterans, I continue to live with the lasting effects of my service, including PTSD and significant orthopedic injuries. Transitioning back to civilian life has not always been easy, and finding healthy, meaningful ways to cope and heal has been an ongoing journey.

While living in Hawai‘i, I discovered acting—something I never expected would become such an important part of my recovery. Acting has become both an escape and a newfound passion for me. When I am creating or portraying a character, I am no longer the veteran managing PTSD or physical injuries. For that time, I am simply immersed in the work. That experience has been deeply therapeutic and has played a meaningful role in my recovery and overall mental health. I would hate to have to move to the continent—yet another family leaving the ‘āina—to pursue something that has helped me heal and rebuild my life.

SB 2580 is important because it helps create an environment that encourages more film and television productions in Hawai‘i. More productions mean more opportunities—not just for large studios, but for local actors, crew members, and creatives who are trying to build sustainable lives and careers here. For veterans and individuals with disabilities, these opportunities can be truly life-changing.

I have personally helped connect disabled veterans—some of whom rarely leave their homes—to work on local productions. For example, veterans I met through a Wounded Warrior Project Regatta in Waikīkī were able to paddle canoes on *Chief of War*, and an amputee veteran was hired as background talent on *NCIS: Hawai‘i*. These experiences provided not just income, but confidence, connection, and purpose.

This bill represents more than economic development. It represents access, inclusion, and healing. By supporting SB 2580, the Legislature helps open doors for residents who are working to rebuild their lives, contribute to their communities, and pursue meaningful work in Hawai‘i’s growing creative industry.

I would be honored to speak in person with any lawmakers or staff members who would like to learn more about my experience and how opportunities created by SB 2580 can positively impact veterans and individuals recovering from trauma.

I am testifying in strong support of SB2580 because this bill is essential to revitalizing and sustaining Hawai‘i’s film, TV, digital media, and streaming production industry, which provides good-paying jobs, boosts local businesses, and showcases our islands to the world.

Hawai‘i’s current film tax credit has been a success in attracting productions, but competition from other states and countries (with higher incentives) has reduced activity here in recent years. Many productions bypass Hawai‘i for places like Georgia, New Mexico, or Canada, taking jobs and economic benefits with them. SB2580 addresses this by:

- Raising the credit to 27% on O‘ahu and 32% on neighbor islands, making us more competitive while rewarding productions that film in less-populated areas (spreading economic benefits statewide).
- Increasing the annual cap to \$60 million, allowing more projects to qualify without turning away viable productions due to exhausted funds.
- Removing barriers for large-scale productions (over \$60 million in costs) by lifting the per-project cap, which could attract major streaming series, blockbusters, or high-impact projects that create hundreds of local jobs.
- Strengthening accountability through required reporting on local hires and third-party certification, ensuring the program benefits Hawai‘i residents first.

The film industry supports thousands of jobs across trades like construction, catering, transportation, hospitality, security, and creative roles—many union and family-wage positions. Productions also spend millions at local stores, hotels, restaurants, and vendors, providing an immediate economic multiplier during filming and long-term tourism promotion.

As a Hawai‘i resident, I see the value in diversifying our economy beyond tourism, especially post-pandemic. SB2580 will help retain and grow this clean, high-value industry without major new state spending—it’s an investment that pays back through taxes, jobs, and visitor spending.

I urge the Committee to pass SB2580 to keep Hawai'i competitive, create opportunities for our people (especially on the neighbor islands), and support creative industries that celebrate our culture and landscapes.

Written Testimony In Support of SB 2580

To the Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

I submit this testimony in support of this bill based on direct experience working in Hawai'i's film and television industry. Mahalo to Senator Decoite for addressing this specific issue that has been a major issue to Hawai'i's film production.

Since moving to Hawai'i in 2016 I have had the opportunity to work on a number of various film and television series like HAWAI'I FIVE-0, MAGNUM, P.I., TRIPLE FRONTIER, and NCIS: HAWAI'I. I have been able to make a career working in film production and was able to join my union, the Directors Guild of America, in 2021. I have directly benefited by the constant stream of film productions coming to Hawai'i. However, things changed starting in 2024. After the last two television series filming here regularly were canceled, work has significantly dried up since.

Major films and television series won't come to film in Hawai'i as long as the tax credits remain the same and not reflect the changing industry. Other states, including my own home state of Texas, have increased their tax incentives above 30% and are adding additional bumps if they hire more than a certain percentage of local crew, spending more money locally, or even telling specific stories based in that states history or promote the state in any way. **I believe that Hawai'i needs to raise its tax incentives and add some of these "bumps" that other states have if they want to stay a viable film destination.**

If Hawai'i doesn't change with the times, I fear that not only will we completely fall behind to not just other states, but to other countries as well. Without a large number of films and television series filming each year, Hawai'i will no longer be able to support the thousands of film workers and vendors that live here, and many will either change careers or move out of the state to find film work, which has already started happening.

By **increasing the base rate to 27%/32%** it gives the best chance to kickstart the studios wanting to come back to Hawai'i for longer productions instead of the two to three weeks it has been for the last few years. It's not just about the "location," it's about what is the better option for the studios to choose from, and they will choose the one that offers the better incentives every single time.

We need this bill to pass for everyone's sake. It's not just the film workers that benefit from this, it's their families, the vendors, the restaurants, the food and equipment suppliers, the locations, the local talent and so much more. **Hawai'i needs to stay competitive to be relevant in this game, or we will no longer be a viable filming destination for the studios, and they'll look elsewhere while we are left behind.**

Excluding companies that incur more than \$60 million in qualified expenditures from the "per production" cap will encourage long-term projects towards our islands.

Hawai'i's film industry supports thousands of working families in the state of Hawai'i. These thriving wages are irreplaceable by other industries. When the film tax incentive is empowered, this industry generates significantly to state GDP, earnings, and even visitor spending. When the film tax incentive is restrained, we not only lose the economic benefits of the industry, but we also lose the ability to tell our own stories. To remain competitive in the global market, it is imperative that Hawai'i strengthens and stabilizes the film tax incentive program. SB 2580 will take meaningful steps to empower our film tax incentive program, and will support thousands of working families in Hawai'i.

We have to ask ourselves why are places like London and New Zealand so aggressive with their policy. They aren't stupid for doing this, they know the economics and understand that having a thriving entertainment industry is good for their economies as a whole. Obviously the situation isn't exactly the same, they offer health care for their workers, have weaker labor unions and the exchange rate itself is in favor for the studio producers- this bill is the VERY LEAST we should be doing to even hold a chance to be competitive with these other countries. We've lost a lot of good jobs and production's very recently, like Chief of War and Wrecking crew. Some skilled workers have already been forced to leave the state in search of more stable employment. SB 2580 is a direct and necessary response to this reality.

By raising the annual aggregate cap to **\$60 million**, modernizing eligibility to include **streaming platforms**, and extending the sunset date to **2038**, SB 2580 restores predictability and competitiveness to Hawai‘i’s film incentive program. Producers plan years in advance. Without certainty, Hawai‘i—particularly Neighbor Islands like Maui—loses out to other jurisdictions that have made long-term commitments to their creative industries.

This bill is not a giveaway; it is an **investment in Hawai‘i’s middle-class workforce**. When productions choose Hawai‘i, they invest directly in local people and local businesses. SB 2580 helps ensure that Hawai‘i residents can continue telling Hawai‘i stories while working at home, rather than being forced to relocate elsewhere.

To remain competitive in a global market where other regions are aggressively investing in film, Hawai‘i must strengthen and stabilize its incentive program.

My name is Frances Kealoha, and I am submitting this testimony on behalf of my family and countless others who have built their lives around the film and television industry.

For more than a decade, the majority of my immediate and extended family have worked steadily in this industry. My brother, cousins, their spouses, and even my nephews have held careers across different departments—skilled, professional work that allowed them to support their families, pay mortgages, and contribute to their local economies. These were not temporary or casual jobs. These were long-term careers.

Over the past year, every one of them has been laid off.

This was not due to lack of experience, poor performance, or unwillingness to work. It was the result of industry-wide shutdowns and instability that have left thousands of qualified workers without income. Families who once had reliable paychecks were suddenly forced into survival mode. Parents scrambled to find any available work—often outside their field and at significantly lower wages—just to keep food on the table and avoid losing their homes.

The impact has been devastating. Mortgages are at risk. Savings have been depleted. Health insurance has been lost. Career momentum built over decades has stalled, and in some cases disappeared entirely. The emotional toll—stress, anxiety, and uncertainty—has been immense, not just for the workers themselves but for their spouses and children as well.

The film and television industry is often discussed in terms of entertainment or luxury, but the reality is that it is a labor industry made up of middle-class workers: technicians, craftspeople, drivers, coordinators, editors, and support staff. When the industry shuts down, entire communities feel the consequences—restaurants, small businesses, rental markets, and local tax bases all suffer alongside these families.

I urge this legislature to recognize that what is happening is not temporary discomfort, but a prolonged economic crisis for a skilled workforce that wants to work and has a proven history of doing so.

These workers are not asking for special treatment. They are asking for the opportunity to return to work, to support their families, and to continue contributing to the economy as they have for years.

Thank you for taking the time to hear these voices and for considering the real human impact behind these numbers.

I am an Emmy Award winning (season one, *The White Lotus*) Location Casting Director, a Teamster with Local 996, a long time member of SAG-AFTRA, and one of only two (2) Casting Directors in Hawaii who have been inducted into the Casting Society of America. Prior to my tenure as a Casting Director, I was an actress who made a living in the industry appearing in dozens of commercials, television programs and feature films. My husband and I have lived on Oahu for over 30 years and our only son was born at the Queen's Hospital in October of 2000.

Through my work as a Location Casting Director, and we are just one small department among many on productions such as *The White Lotus*, *Chief of War*, *The Wrecking Crew*, *Protecting Jared*, *Big Eyes*, *Godzilla*, *Jurassic World*, *Jurassic World: Fallen Kingdom*, *Snatched*, *Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle*, *Jungle Cruise*, *Triple Frontier*, *Midway*, *Hobbs & Shaw* and *The Wrong Missy*, to name a few, we have been fortunate to hire thousands of local actors as Principal or Extra talent. Our department has generated dozens of additional jobs for local people as Stand Ins and Production Assistants. Over the years, we have been grateful to see an increase in the scope and number of Principal Roles we are being asked to cast locally rather than flying someone in from LA or NY. This is indicative not only of the growth of the industry here in Hawaii but of the increased quality of the training and experience our local talent is being afforded. The hard work and dedication of many is just now beginning to pay off for us literally and figuratively. As numerous producers and their teams have taken great pains to explain to our administration, this growth will not continue with the current cap in place. The most relevant and personal experience for me has been watching the demise of the film industry in New Orleans where mistakes about a tax cap were clearly made and the incredible boom in Atlanta, where it seems wiser heads prevailed.

There are myriad of examples and statistics to prove how our industry brings in millions of dollars to our local economy directly and indirectly through the catering industry, hotel industry, local shops, etc etc... but for me it's much more personal. The people in my industry are solution oriented and, in general, they are among the most generous people in the world. We all gain when these people come into our communities with fresh ideas and willingness to jump onto community boards, put their kids into our public schools, open up their own businesses, volunteer, make donations to local non profits. I have been privileged to work on all of our islands and whenever a production comes in, they are seeking ways to benefit the community that will host them - sometimes for a year at a time. I was a Girl Scout and these guys follow our motto of always leaving a place better than how they found it.

Lastly, I humbly suggest that we who live and work here in the film and television industry are an asset to our state. My husband is a teacher and a social worker working with our most challenge houseless population. We make efforts to volunteer to make our neighborhood a better and safer place for all. Personally, I don't know anyone in our industry who doesn't put in work

hours that would make most “normal” people collapse while continuing to contribute volunteer time for many projects. We pay taxes, contribute to our community in many ways and understand the gravity of what will happen if we don’t make it more attractive to bring in film productions.

- **Long-Term Project Incentives:** Excluding companies with over \$60 million in qualified expenditures from the "per production" cap will directly encourage the kind of sustained, multi-year projects that provide true stability for working families.
- **Sunset Extension:** This provides the predictability necessary for studios to choose Hawai'i for their long-term production cycles.

On a personal note, I had the privilege of working on **Hawaii Five-0 for ten years**. That single production provided a decade of stable, high-quality employment for myself and hundreds of other local crew members. It allowed us to plan for our futures, support our families, and contribute to our local economy consistently. SB 2580 is vital because it creates the environment necessary to attract more of these multi-year, 'anchor' productions to our islands.

Why this matters for Hawai'i: The film industry supports thousands of local families with wages that are irreplaceable by other sectors. When our film tax incentive is empowered, it generates significant returns in state GDP, local earnings, and visitor spending. Conversely, when these incentives are restrained, we lose not only the economic benefits but also our ability to tell our own stories on a global stage.

To remain competitive, Hawai'i must strengthen and stabilize this program. **SB 2580** is a meaningful step toward that goal.

I strongly support SB 2580 and respectfully urge your committee to pass this measure. Mahalo for your time and for your support of Hawai'i's working families.

Increasing the credit to 27 percent for counties with populations over 700,000 and 32 percent for counties with smaller populations will encourage productions to film across the state. When productions come to Hawai‘i, they create jobs beyond filming, including writers’ rooms, development roles, and long-term creative opportunities for local talent.

Including streaming platforms as qualified productions is essential. Many of today’s most impactful projects are developed for streaming, and this update allows Hawai‘i to compete for those productions.

Raising the annual cap to \$60 million and excluding productions with at least \$60 million in qualified costs from the per-production cap provides the predictability needed for projects to move forward. Writers are often attached early in development, and stable incentives help keep projects based in Hawai‘i.

The requirement for independent third-party certification strengthens transparency and public trust while maintaining program integrity.

Extending the sunset date to January 1, 2038 provides long-term certainty. Creative projects take years to develop, and stability allows writers and producers to build lasting relationships and invest locally.

This measure supports a sustainable creative economy, strengthens Hawai‘i’s workforce, and ensures local stories can be developed and produced here.

I write in full support of SB2580, as well as SB 3088 and companion bill HB 2269. Thank you, Senators, for listening to our concerns and for addressing specific issues related to Hawai'i film production.

I am a member of the Directors Guild of America and was the unit production manager on Doogie Kamealoha, MD and Red One, and production supervisor on Moana. Currently, I am the unit production manager on Protecting Jared, a Netflix film that will begin shooting later this month.

Hawai'i's film tax incentive has been a huge success in the past, but has fallen behind in the past two years. Most other states with thriving film production have incentives above 30%. My community is now suffering because in 2025, there was nearly zero production work on the Islands.

These bill help address four major concerns for film workers: **increasing the overall percentages, allowing larger projects to have a larger per-production cap, increasing the over all cap, and increasing the sunset date.**

Increasing the base rate to 27%/32% is the single best move we can make to bring mainland production spending into our economy. The studios have departments dedicated to judging incentives against one another. Hawai'i is often overlooked from the start because of its current 22% base rate. This increase will help all productions, but will mostly help smaller local production or shorter jobs coming from the mainland that do reach the production cap.

Allowing productions that spend more than 60 million to exceed the per-production cap is exactly what is needed to bring larger and long-term productions. Long-term television series and big-budget studio features will be able to shoot exclusively in Hawai'i rather than the current

standard - where shows shoot exteriors for a couple of weeks, then shoot another location that passes for Hawai'i.

Increasing the overall cap is a commitment to finding success in this plan. The current \$50 million cap has not increased in several years. Raising it to \$60 million is a modest increase in line with inflation since the last increase. These bills are not about giving a handout to corporate studios; they enable the state and production companies to work as investment partners, adding to the local economy.

Extending the sunset date on the tax incentive is a strong message to producers and studios that Hawai'i is a committed investment partner. Television series have been the true stimulus in building the film community on Island. Television series producers need to know that they can create multi-year productions before committing to shoot in Hawai'i.

These bills will help bring mainland production money to the islands and distribute it to local vendors and workers; that's why they have my support. If enacted in conjunction with the other bills focused on improving the terms of our film tax incentives, they send a strong message that Hawai'i is a film-friendly state.

With SB2580, we could breathe much needed life into an industry that can support the locals as well as the local economy. With the ever changing landscape of traditional content consumption, we need to be able to pivot and provide incentives for productions to want to film here. After the cancellation of Rescue: HI Surf, we were, for the first time in literal decades, a state with not large productions. The reason for this is because we simply do not offer to financial incentives that would entice production companies to even want to film here. Aloha Senators and The Legislature,

I write in full support of SB2580, as well as SB 3088 and companion bill HB 2269. Thank you, Senators, for listening to our concerns and for addressing specific issues related to Hawai'i film production.

I am a member of the Directors Guild of America and was the Key 2nd Assistant Director on Lilo and Stitch. I am currently the Key 2nd AD on the Netflix film Protecting Jared starring Jason Momoa and Andy Samberg.

Hawai'i's film tax incentive has been a huge success in the past, but has fallen behind in the past two years. Most other states with thriving film production have incentives above 30%. My community is now suffering because in 2025, there was nearly zero production work on the Islands.

These bill help address four major concerns for film workers: **increasing the overall percentages, allowing larger projects to have a larger per-production cap, increasing the over all cap, and increasing the sunset date.**

Increasing the base rate to 27%/32% is the single best move we can make to bring mainland production spending into our economy. The studios have departments dedicated to judging incentives against one another. Hawai'i is often overlooked from the start because of its current 22% base rate. This increase will help all productions, but will mostly help smaller local production or shorter jobs coming from the mainland that do reach the production cap.

Allowing productions that spend more than 60 million to exceed the per-production cap is exactly what is needed to bring larger and long-term productions. Long-term television series and big-budget studio features will be able to shoot exclusively in Hawai'i rather than the current standard - where shows shoot exteriors for a couple of weeks, then shoot another location that passes for Hawai'i.

Increasing the overall cap is a commitment to finding success in this plan. The current \$50 million cap has not increased in several years. Raising it to \$60 million is a modest increase in line with inflation since the last increase. These bills are not about giving a handout to corporate

studios; they enable the state and production companies to work as investment partners, adding to the local economy.

Extending the sunset date on the tax incentive is a strong message to producers and studios that Hawai'i is a committed investment partner. Television series have been the true stimulus in building the film community on Island. Television series producers need to know that they can create multi-year productions before committing to shoot in Hawai'i.

These bills will help bring mainland production money to the islands and distribute it to local vendors and workers; that's why they have my support. If enacted in conjunction with the other bills focused on improving the terms of our film tax incentives, they send a strong message that Hawai'i is a film-friendly state.

Hawaii Film Tax incentive TESTIMONY - SB2580

Aloha Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee,

Hawai‘i’s film and television incentive should be understood not as a stand-alone industry program, but as a tourism and economic resilience strategy.

Raising Hawai‘i’s film tax incentive base rate to 27 % statewide and 32 % for the outer islands could make the state far more competitive with other U.S. and global production locations, attract more large-scale film and television projects, support local jobs, and increase spending across hospitality, services, and creative sectors. Hawai‘i trails other markets that offer 30 %+ credits, contributing to a decline in productions in recent years.

According to DBEDT’s own analysis, film and television exposure drives approximately one billion dollars annually in visitor spending - about five percent of all tourism spending in the state. This kind of exposure extends Hawai‘i’s global marketing reach far beyond traditional advertising and generates additional revenue across lodging, food service, retail, and tours. Increasing the incentive could therefore not only keep productions here but amplify this film tourism market, stimulating broader economic growth.

What’s especially important is that film tourism has a long tail. The credit is a one-time cost, but the tourism it generates continues for years — often decades — as content circulates globally through streaming and international distribution. DBEDT’s data shows today’s film-motivated visitors are responding to productions filmed many years ago.

We also saw the value of this sector during COVID.

When tourism collapsed by more than seventy percent, film and television production was one of the few private industries still operating, injecting nearly two hundred million dollars into the local economy in 2020, employing local workers, supporting vendors, and reducing unemployment and Medicaid costs.

Employing just one hundred workers can avoid over one million dollars in unemployment payments and save the State approximately two hundred fifty thousand dollars annually in Medicaid costs through employer-sponsored health coverage.

In short, Hawai'i's film incentive delivers recurring tourism revenue, fiscal stability, and economic diversification at a relatively modest cost. It is not just an arts policy - it is a sound economic and budgetary investment.

Aloha Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai, and Members of the Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to share my testimony in strong support of SB 2580.

As you know, long-term film projects have been non-existent these past two years, and SB 2580 has key components that will immediately strengthen Hawai'i's film-friendly reputation:

- Removes the per production cap for films over \$60M. This is a necessity to incentivize large format films.
- Adds streaming language to embrace the digital platforms of distribution that make Hawai'i competitive. Films that go directly to streaming are now welcome to film in Hawai'i.
- Raises the overall film production cap to \$60 million dollars. The increase to the tax credit signals to the world that the State of Hawai'i supports film.
- Raises the base points to 27% for Oahu-based filming and 32% for neighbor-island filming. Getting over the 30% threshold across the state has been a goal of ours, so seeing this begin on the neighbor islands is a huge step in the right direction.

SB 2580 supports economic diversification at a time when Hawai'i must reduce overreliance on a single sector. Film and creative media production brings outside capital into the state, circulates dollars locally for at least 18 months before the credit is paid out, and enhances Hawai'i's global visibility in a way that aligns with cultural storytelling, place-based identity, and community pride.

My partner and I are both in the film and television industry here in Hawaii and our financial situation has been severely impacted over the last couple of years. I've had to seek employment in other states, leaving the State for long periods of time to support our family.

Our film history shows that two television series filming simultaneously build careers, stabilizes families, provides upward departmental promotion, promotes infrastructure growth, and deepens partnerships with local professionals and businesses.

These outcomes are essential to building a resilient industry that benefits residents first. The film tax credit does not just provide jobs for local residents. - Economic diversification, reducing reliance on tourism alone
- Workforce retention, allowing skilled local talent to remain in Hawai‘i rather than relocating to the mainland
- Long-term economic return, as film incentives generate significant in-state spending well beyond the credit itself

Importantly, film production incentives are performance-based—the state only provides credits after spending has already occurred locally. Raising the cap and credit rate does not guarantee increased cost to the state; it enables Hawai‘i to compete for projects that otherwise will not come here at all.

Hawai‘i has the talent, infrastructure, and global appeal to be a premier production hub, but without modernized incentives, those advantages are increasingly irrelevant. SB2580 acknowledges today’s industry realities and positions Hawai‘i to participate meaningfully in tomorrow’s economy.

Mahalo for the opportunity to testify in **strong support** of *Senate Bill 2580* and *Senate Bill 2796*, legislation designed to expand and improve Hawai‘i’s film production tax incentives. As a working actor who has had the privilege of performing in multiple Hawai‘i-based productions — including **Hawai‘i Five-0**, **LOST**, and the feature film **Battleship** — I have experienced firsthand the tangible economic and community impact the film and television industry brings to our islands.

Productions like these do far more than capture Hawai‘i’s natural beauty on screen; they employ **local union crews, vendors, hospitality staff, and support workers**, and they deliver **real dollars into our local economy**. When I worked on these shows, the infusion of production spending supported **hotel stays, equipment rentals, catering services, transportation, wardrobe, and experienced union professionals** — reinforcing jobs that sustain Hawai‘i’s middle class.

However, Hawai‘i’s film industry is at a critical juncture. In 2024, the state issued **an estimated \$24.5 million in film tax credits** to 28 productions. These projects generated only about **\$20 million in state tax revenue**, a drastic downturn from previous years.

While comprehensive up-to-date independent figures are still being compiled, past economic assessments have shown that Hawai‘i’s production spending once climbed from about **\$128.2 million in 2007** to over **\$355.6 million by 2019**, illustrating how impactful this industry can be when supported.

Yet more recently the industry’s on-location activity has declined — even for projects tied to our local culture and stories — largely because other regions can *stretch production dollars further*. This decline directly affects middle-class **union workers, technicians, local small business owners, tourism operators, and service providers** who depend on predictable film-related work.

While Hawai‘i currently offers a refundable tax credit of **22% on O‘ahu and 27% on Neighbor Islands** for qualified production costs, those rates are **now comparatively low against other states and international incentives**.

By contrast, places like **New Zealand** offer incentives that exceed Hawai'i's base credit structure, including:

- A **20 % baseline cash rebate** on qualifying production expenditure for international productions, with **an additional 5 % uplift** available for projects that demonstrate broader economic benefits to the country's creative sector.

In real terms, this means New Zealand can return a **larger share of qualifying spend directly to production budgets — often as a cash rebate — boosting the economic efficiency of filming there**. As a result, productions that are *narratively set in Hawai'i*, but are seeking the most financially advantageous shooting locations, have increasingly chosen New Zealand. Productions like **God of War** and **The Wrecking Crew** chose to shoot the majority of their footage in New Zealand even though Actor and Producer Jason Momoa is a native Hawaiian born in the islands — a clear signal of how incentive structures influence filming decisions.

Historically, the film tax credit has helped drive economic growth: statewide production spending increased from roughly **\$128.2 million in 2007 to over \$355.6 million by 2019**, growing much faster than the broader economy and diversifying Hawai'i's economic base.

But more recently, Hawai'i's film industry has softened: national reporting indicates that average production spending in Hawai'i has dropped from around **\$400 million annually to approximately \$200 million**, in part due to non-competitive credits and caps on available incentives.

SB 2580 and **SB 2796** represent thoughtful, pragmatic strategies to preserve and expand creative industry jobs — **not only actors but crew members, technicians, hospitality workers, and small businesses that benefit from the ripple effects of production dollars**. These bills would help ensure that our state remains attractive to productions large and small, protecting union jobs in a high-cost environment where reliable work is essential to sustaining local households and diversifying Hawai'i's economy beyond tourism dollars.

For our state to retain its legacy as a world-class production destination — and for working families whose livelihoods depend on these opportunities — I respectfully urge your **support and passage of SB 2580 and SB 2796**.

Dear Chair DeCoite, Vice Chair Wakai and Members of the Senate Committee on Economic Development and Tourism:

My name is William G. Meyer III and I hereby express my strong support of SB 2580.

I have been practicing law in Honolulu since 1979 with a focus on entertainment and intellectual property law and have represented both local and national motion picture and television industry stakeholders in connection with intellectual property and tax matters.

Over the years Hawai'i's film tax incentive program has brought significant production work to the state which has led to the development of a crew base that is second to none throughout the country and has provided numerous opportunities for Hawai'i's creative talent to flourish. However, as a result of certain DoTax missteps and the state's failure to remain competitive with its incentive structure the past few years has seen a precipitous decline in production activity. In fact, last year saw virtually no production work come to Hawai'i.

Most other states with thriving film production industry have incentives structures above 30%. With Hawai'i's high cost of living and uncompetitive incentives, we have been passed over recently because it simply does not pencil out to do business here.

This measure addresses major concerns for the industry by increasing the overall base percentages, allowing larger projects to have a larger per-production cap, increasing the over all yearly cap and extending the sunset date.

Increasing the base rate to 27%/32% is critical to bringing mainland production spending into our economy. Hawai'i as a location is almost always ruled out because of its current low 22% base rate.

Allowing productions that spend more than 60 million to exceed the per-production cap is essential to bringing larger and long-term productions here. Television series and big-budget

studio features will be able to shoot exclusively in Hawai'i rather than the current situation whereby shows will shoot some exteriors in Hawai'i for a couple of weeks but then revert to other more affordable locations that pose for Hawai'i. This is a bummer.

The current overall \$50 million cap has not increased in several years. Raising it to \$60 million is a modest increase that is in line with inflation.

And extending the sunset date of our incentives sends a message to producers and studios that Hawai'i is a committed investment partner. TV series have been the primary stimulus in building the states' film industry and series producers need to know that they can rely on a stable business structure in bringing multi-year productions to Hawai'i.

Collectively, this measure, along with other film industry bills introduced this session, will bring mainland production money here and distribute it to local vendors and workers by sending a strong message that Hawai'i is, once again, a film-friendly state.

As an actor based in Hawaii, it was sad to see the Diamond Head Film studio empty. For over a decade, the film studio provided work for many of crew members on projects such as: *Hawaii 5-0*, *Magnum P.I.*, and *NCIS: HI*. However, with production costs rising and with no incentives to film in Hawai'i, the work was outsourced elsewhere. The Apple TV series *Chief of War*, a historical story about Hawaiians, by Hawaiians, for Hawaiians filmed in Aotearoa due to cheaper production costs. Although we are grateful for our Polynesian cousins welcoming us to their lands, there should have been no reason that a story, involving Kamehameha the Great no-less, could not have been filmed in Hawai'i. The mo'olelo, and the mana carried within those historical places, is ingrained within the 'āina upon which those actions took place.

In addition, I believe it prudent that Hawai'i begins to evolve from a singular economy dependent on tourism to a multi-faceted economy that is prepared for the future. Given the current administration in charge at the White House and their actions towards immigration, the United States has faced heavy losses with the tourism business. The World Travel & Tourism Council estimates that US tourism lost about \$12.5 billion dollars in foreign visitor spending. My name is Kimee Balmilero. I am a professional actor born and raised in Hawai'i. After years of working on the continent, I was able to return home thanks to opportunities created by Hawai'i's film and television industry. Being able to live and work here has allowed me to build a career while staying close to my family, including my parents, as they get older. I support SB 2580.

When film and television productions are not happening here, Hawai'i does not save money. We lose it. We lose jobs. We lose workers. We lose residents who want to stay but cannot afford to when the work disappears.

We are already seeing this happen. Shows and films that are rooted in Hawai'i are being filmed elsewhere. *Chief of War* was filmed in New Zealand. The live-action *Moana* was filmed in Atlanta, Georgia. When projects like these leave Hawai'i, local crews are not hired, local vendors are not paid, and local families lose income.

Film and television production brings outside money into Hawai'i and spends it locally. Productions pay wages, rent housing, hire transportation, and purchase goods and services across the state. When those productions go somewhere else, all of that money goes with them.

SB 2580 helps prevent this. By increasing the production tax credit, raising the annual cap, and updating the program to include streaming platforms, this bill makes Hawai'i competitive in an industry with many options. It gives productions a reason to choose Hawai'i rather than cross us off the list.

The film industry is project-based. Stability matters. SB 2580 helps create more consistent work so people like me can continue living and working in Hawai'i and supporting our families.

Choosing not to invest in this industry does not protect Hawai'i's economy. It pushes jobs and money out of the state. SB 2580 is about keeping that economic activity here.

Aloha,

I strongly urge the passing of SB2580. Hawaii has seen the rapid deterioration of the film industry here. Currently, revenues from film production has decreased to approx \$55M; down by 80% from pre-pandemic levels. That means less taxes and less jobs

Increasing the annual credit caps to \$60M is a good start, but still puts Hawaii at the lower end of states with credit caps. Given many theatrical releases are in the \$10-\$20M range, meaning we could quickly exhaust the annual credit caps early in the year. Removing the per project caps for \$60M+ productions is also a plus, but there are very few blockbuster productions. I'd prefer to see a temporary no credit cap until we see a resurgence of film production to Hawaii

Including streaming platforms is wonderful, a long overdue inclusion, but again, the budgets for streaming platforms will meet the per project cap, but will quickly exhaust the annual credit caps.

The logistics and cost of living in Hawaii is a hindrance in bringing film production back to Hawaii, putting us at a huge disadvantage against states with higher (or no) credit caps that attract blockbuster-level productions, or more medium level budgets

We appreciate the attention paid to the new problem of film production in Hawaii. Film production has always been a fluid business, but we have currently boxed ourselves in with a low annual credit cap that can be quickly exhausted. Without other financial incentives, we need to make it as easy and accommodating as we can to bring film production, and all of the jobs that benefit from them, back to Hawaii

Aloha ladies and gentlemen of the Committee,

My name is Jack Kamby and I am writing in support of SB2580. I work in the film industry primarily as the warehouse manager for Hawai'i Media Inc. (HMI), the largest film and TV vendor in Hawai'i. Working for HMI has also granted me the opportunity to work on some bigger sets doing large commercials and movies.

However, in the past couple of years, the work has dried up due to productions deciding to head for locations with better incentives and low payroll tax rates. I have watched this hurt people from the top to bottom of this industry. From having to turn away UH students seeking internships, to seeing legendary filmmakers with 25+ years of experience turn to driving Uber and making sandwiches at the grocery store deli counter just to make ends meet.

The financial impacts of the film industry stretch far beyond the workers on-set. These include local restaurants getting a bump in revenue from catering orders, lumber and hardware sales, and local vendors renting and selling their equipment. These things create jobs that are not often included in the financial impact report when it comes to looking at productions.

For example, when we still had Magnum PI and NCIS shooting on island, Hawai'i Media Inc. had over twenty full-time employees. Today, we have seven. That is hundreds of thousands of dollars in wages per year that has disappeared from the local economy. Unfortunately, there are countless stories like this among our local vendors.

In addition, film and TV in Hawai'i directly impacts the tourism industry. I have talked to friends at TS Restaurants (controls Duke's, Hula Grill, etc) and they say sales are down this year and last. I have also talked to friends in the hotels and they say the same, 10-20% decline across the board. Could this be because people aren't seeing Hawai'i on their television screens on a weekly basis? Certainly seems there could be a correlation.

The rise of vertical productions (formatted to watch on mobile phone) over the past few years has been staggering, especially in Asia. As we know, we have not seen Asian tourism return to Hawai'i in full force since COVID. A Hawai'i based vertical production targeted at the Korean or Japanese market could be a key driver in getting those dollars to return.

Mahalo to the committee for taking the time to read my testimony. Please pass SB2580 so we can take the first step in getting everyone back to work in an industry where the benefits for the state far outweigh the negatives.

I support Bill SB 2580 because I believe the entertainment industry benefits Hawai'i in unique ways. Increasing the tax credit is a rare opportunity to invest in Hawaii's economic future. Strengthening the third pillar of Hawaii's economic support structure would build economic resilience for residents in addition to the military industry and tourism industry.

This tax credit is in corporate welfare; it's an incentive. It's not giving away tax dollars with no expectation of reimbursement; it's agreeing to give big spenders a discount for choosing Hawai'i over the competition.

Movies, including those set in or about Hawaii, will get made whether you want them to or not. The tax credit incentivizes those movies to be made here with local talent from actors to crew members consisting of electricians, location scouts, drivers, caterers, the list could go on for days.

Every competing location offers incentives. The entertainment industry has proven they will always choose the best deal. The 80% drop in production proves that Hawaii does not have what it takes by itself to compete. That's the cold hard numbers. Numbers don't care about employing our community, they only care about numbers and facts over feelings.

I know first hand for a fact that the entertainment industry plays a huge role in employment for thousands of us residents. We spend our paychecks locally and visitors due to. One large production can pump 60 million into Hawaii's economy. Or zero when they film elsewhere.

White lotus was filmed in Maui and contributed to about 12.9 million in direct spending to Maui's local economy during the height of the pandemic. They hire local crew and background actors and supported local businesses. According to Expedia there was a 300% increase in tourism in the 90 days following its premiere. White lotus season 1 is credited with popularizing "set-jetting" and the 1 billion dollars in visitor spending to the state in 2022.

We had the potential to have that happen again for season 3 but instead we got ZERO WHOLE DOLLARS.

Taxpayers in Vista about or more than \$550,000 which is a whopping return on investment with such quick turnaround too. Can tourism do that alone? Clearly not. Another positive point about

a tax credit is that it is risk-free. As in no money is paid upfront. Performance-based credits are only given if production has quotas and requirements, spending that money first.

White lotus season 3 was filmed in Thailand who offered a 30% cash rebate saving production \$4.4 million of the \$35 million in cost. Thailand benefited greatly while we made \$0. Tylan understands that you need to spend money to make money and I hope you'll consider doing the same. In this case, however, we don't even have to spend money- production does. It's simply a matter of making a little bit less which is still a lot more than zero.

Hypothetically speaking, if white lotus went back to the original setting in Maui, as the storyline allowed if it's so chose, Hawaii would have made bank. Hawaii missed out on the \$35 to 70 million on direct spending, hundreds of jobs, the millions in GET on paychecks and production expenses, spending on lodging, food, living expenses, vendors etc at local places and upwards of 300% spike in set jetting tourism who are usually "high value/ high spenders." People who can afford to spend a week in Maui at the drop of a dime know how to spend some coin. Let them spend it here. Let them spend money on a restaurants, shops, supply stores, and more. Let them employ hundreds of our community members. Let them spend money and let us collect taxes.

Please vote yes on incentivizing productions to film in Hawaii and bring back a well-loved and very missed industry.

Please let them help support the economy and positive ways- we are counting on you.
