A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that average salaries for
2 teachers in Hawaii generally fall in the middle of national
3 rankings of teachers' pay. However, once the salaries of
4 teachers in the State are adjusted for the cost of living, they
5 are the lowest-paid in the nation. The national average salary
6 for all teachers stands at approximately \$30,086, when cost of
7 living is considered. However, the average starting salary for
8 teachers in Hawaii is \$24,409, when adjusted for cost of living.

9 Furthermore, the legislature finds that close to half of
10 teachers in Hawaii are leaving the profession or the State
11 altogether within five years of starting, posing a significant
12 problem for students. Slightly more than nine hundred teachers
13 were hired in 2013, but as of 2018, fewer than four hundred
14 seventy of them remained in the classroom. Within the last five
15 years, the number of teachers leaving Hawaii has increased to
16 seventy-one per cent. Only fifty-one per cent of teachers hired
17 during the 2013-2014 school year were still teaching in Hawaii



1 five years later, a decrease from fifty-four per cent during the
2 previous year. As the State continues to address matters of
3 teacher recruitment and retention, it is crucial to support
4 current teachers now.

5 The purpose of this Act is to provide automatic step
6 increases in teacher salaries for each year of satisfactory
7 service completed, subject to funds appropriated by the
8 legislature.

9 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
11 and to read as follows:

12 "§302A- Salary increases; annual, longevity. (a)

13 Teachers who have completed one year of satisfactory service and
14 complied with the requirements of sections 302A-601.5 through
15 302A-642 and section 302A-701, as applicable, shall be entitled
16 to an annual increment if negotiated into a collective
17 bargaining agreement under section 89-9, subject to subsection
18 (c).

19 (b) Teachers who have served satisfactorily for three
20 years in their maximum increment step or in any longevity step
21 pursuant to section 302A-624 and have complied with the other



1 requirements of sections 302A-601.5 through 302A-642 and section
2 302A-701, as applicable, shall be entitled to longevity step
3 increases if negotiated into a collective bargaining agreement
4 under section 89-9, subject to subsection (c).

5 (c) Any collective bargaining agreement negotiated
6 pursuant to section 89-9 that provides for annual increments or
7 longevity step increases under this section and requires the
8 expenditure of public funds shall be subject to funding by a
9 specific appropriation enacted by the legislature. The
10 collective bargaining agreement shall not be effective or
11 enforceable unless the legislature appropriates sufficient funds
12 for its implementation. The legislature may reject the
13 collective bargaining agreement in whole by declining to
14 appropriate the funds necessary to implement it."

15 SECTION 3. Chapter 302D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
17 and to read as follows:

18 "§302D- Salary increases; annual, longevity. (a)
19 Teachers who have completed one year of satisfactory service and
20 complied with the requirements of this chapter that pertain to
21 the employment conditions and compensation for teachers, as



1 deemed applicable by their employing public charter school,
2 shall be entitled to an annual increment if negotiated into a
3 collective bargaining agreement under section 89-9, subject to
4 subsection (c).

5 (b) Teachers who have served satisfactorily for three
6 years in their maximum increment step or in any longevity step,
7 if any, and have complied with the requirements of this chapter
8 that pertain to the employment conditions and compensation for
9 teachers, as deemed applicable by their employing public charter
10 school, shall be entitled to longevity step increases if
11 negotiated into a collective bargaining agreement under section
12 89-9, subject to subsection (c).

13 (c) Any collective bargaining agreement negotiated
14 pursuant to section 89-9 that provides for annual increments or
15 longevity step increases under this section and requires the
16 expenditure of public funds shall be subject to funding by a
17 specific appropriation enacted by the legislature. The
18 collective bargaining agreement shall not be effective or
19 enforceable unless the legislature appropriates sufficient funds
20 for its implementation. The legislature may reject the



1 collective bargaining agreement in whole by declining to
2 appropriate the funds necessary to implement it."

3 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.

4 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2026.

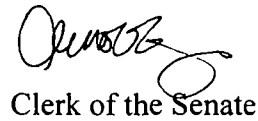
