
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL
EFFECTS OF MANDATORY HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR
BIOMARKER TESTING.

1 WHEREAS, biomarker testing is an invaluable tool in the
2 diagnosis, treatment, appropriate managements, and ongoing
3 monitoring of diseases or conditions; and
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5 WHEREAS, biomarker testing is the analysis of a patient's
6 tissue, blood, or other biospecimen for the presence of a
7 biomarker, a type of precision medicine that looks for genes,
8 proteins, and other substances that can provide information
9 about a patient's chronic condition; and
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11 WHEREAS, biomarker testing allows for a more precise and
12 personalized approach to medical care by identifying specific
13 genetic, molecular, or biochemical markers associated with an
14 individual's disease; and
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16 WHEREAS, biomarker testing enables health care providers to
17 tailor treatments based on the unique characteristics of
18 a patient's condition, leading to more effective and targeted
19 interventions; and
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21 WHEREAS, despite the fact that biomarker testing is
22 essential to high-quality, personalized care to treat serious
23 illness and enhance patients' quality of life, patients cannot
24 easily access it; and
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26 WHEREAS, House Bill No. 1971, introduced in the Regular
27 Session of 2026, requires insurers, mutual benefit societies,
28 health maintenance organizations, and health plans under the
29 State's Medicaid managed care program to provide coverage for
30 medically necessary biomarker testing for the purposes of



1 diagnosis, treatment, appropriate management, or ongoing
2 monitoring of a person's disease or condition to guide treatment
3 decisions when supported by medical and scientific evidence; and
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5 WHEREAS, pursuant to section 23-51, Hawaii Revised
6 Statutes, "before any legislative measure that mandates health
7 insurance coverage for specific health services, specific
8 diseases, or certain providers of health care services as part
9 of individual or group health insurance policies, can be
10 considered, concurrent resolutions shall be passed that
11 designate a specific legislative bill for the Auditor to review
12 and prepare a report for submission to the Legislature that
13 assesses both the social and financial effects of the proposed
14 mandated coverage" under that legislative bill; and
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16 WHEREAS, section 23-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, further
17 specifies the minimum information required for assessing the
18 social and financial impact of the proposed health coverage
19 mandate in the State Auditor's report; now, therefore,
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21 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
22 Thirty-third Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
23 of 2026, the Senate concurring, that the Auditor is requested to
24 assess, in accordance with sections 23-51 and 23-52, Hawaii
25 Revised Statutes, the social and financial effects of mandating
26 health insurance coverage for medically necessary biomarker
27 testing for the purposes of diagnosis, treatment, appropriate
28 management, or ongoing monitoring of a person's disease or
29 condition, or to guide treatment decisions when supported by
30 medical and scientific evidence, as provided in House Bill No.
31 1971, Regular Session of 2026; and
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33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to
34 submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including
35 any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than
36 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of
37 2027; and
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
39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
