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Chair Dela Cruz, Chair Kim, and members of the Committees:

The State Public Charter School Commission (“Commission”) appreciates this opportunity to submit this testimony on its proposed budget for the Supplemental FY 2026-2027 for EDN 600 and EDN612. Section 1 of this testimony will focus on EDN 600-Charter Schools and Section 2 will cover EDN 612-Charter Schools Commission and Administration. As the sole authorizer of charter schools in the state, the Commission oversees the executive budgetary process for itself (program ID- EDN 612), and for all 38 operating public charter schools (program ID- EDN 600).

We appreciate your continuing support of Hawai‘i’s 40 public charter schools and over 13,300 students.

## **SECTION 1- EDN 600: CHARTER SCHOOLS**

### **OVERVIEW**

#### **A. Mission Statement**

Charter schools provide parents and students within the State of Hawai‘i an alternative to the traditional public school experience. Charter schools, while subject to the same State accountability requirements as all other public schools, serve as incubators of innovative approaches to educational, governance, financing, administration, curricula, technology, instructional and assessment strategies.

40 public charter schools currently operate in the State of Hawaii: Kauai (6), Maui (1), Molokai (1), Hawaii (14) and Oahu (18). The newest charter school, Namahana School in the Kīlauea area on the island of Kaua‘i, opened in August 2025 with a focus on ‘āina and community-based education. Additionally, two Pre-K only charter schools opened on O‘ahu, Parkway Village Preschool and Waikiki Community Preschool, as a part of the Ready Keiki Initiative.

Public charter school enrollment for the 2025-2026 fiscal year is **13,313 students**, which represents an increase of about 2% from the previous year’s enrollment of 13,054 (259 students). These enrollment numbers are based on the official enrollment count on October 15, 2025 which determines per pupil charter school funding.

#### **Strategic Objectives, Goals, and Performance Metrics**

All public charter schools operate on individualized charter contracts that establish Academic, Organizational, and Financial Performance expectations, with the understanding that failure to meet those expectations and/or performance measures, may result in non-renewal of the charter contract and school closure.

As a part of the current charter contract (Contract 4.0), all charter schools are required to articulate their practice around measuring their charter school’s alignment to their school mission. All charter schools on contract 4.0 have designed and implemented mission aligned measures and report to the Commission annually on their progress. This ensures that charter schools are meeting the needs of their communities through their unique charter approved missions as stated in their contract.

At this time, the Commission is preparing for the renewal of thirteen charter schools; performance reports, which evaluate the schools under the Performance Framework upon which the charter contract is based, are available here. These performance reports provide the basis and charter school performance data upon which the Commission will make renewal decisions.

## **B. Current Statewide Conditions**

The statewide condition of charter schools remains positive. Charter schools continue to offer a school model of choice by demand as evidenced by the continued enrollment growth, including waitlists.

Academic proficiency across the charter school portfolio demonstrates varied performance when benchmarked against state averages. In 2024-25, eight out of 35 charter schools (22.9%) exceeded state proficiency rates in all three areas tested (ELA, Math, and Science) on the Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA). Overall, 13 of 35 schools (37.1%) exceeded the state in at least one area. These figures represent a decline from 2020-2021, when 26.9% (7 of 26 schools) exceeded the state in all three subjects and 57.7% (15 of 26 schools) exceeded the state in at least one area.

When examined by individual subjects, 30.6% (11 of 36 schools) exceeded the state proficiency rate in ELA, 27.8% (10 of 36 schools) exceeded the state rate in mathematics, and 30.6% (11 of 36 schools) exceeded the state rate in Science. Over the five-year contract period, the percentage of charter schools exceeding state performance has remained relatively stable in ELA (ranging from 30.6% to 37.1%) and mathematics (26.5% to 29.4%), while science has declined notably from 51.9% (14 of 27 schools) in 2020-2021 to 30.6% (11 of 36 schools) in 2024-2025.

However, when measuring growth data, 93.6% of charter schools (29 of 31 schools) in ELA met or exceeded the state's growth benchmark and made at least one year's worth of academic growth. In Math, 87.1% of charter schools (27 of 31 schools) met or exceeded the benchmark and 100% of charter schools met or exceeded the growth benchmark in at least one subject area for ELA and Math. When examining the gap data between high needs students (Special Education, English Language, Economically Disadvantaged) and non-high needs students, 75% of charter schools (24 of 32 schools) outperformed the State in ELA and 87.5% (28 of 32 schools) addressed the gap in Math. Combined, 70% of charter schools closed the gap in both subject areas. (Note: Kaiapuni schools and/or schools with suppressed data due to small n size were not part of the growth and gap data analysis.)

The Specific and individual school performance data for the portfolio of charter schools on these measures can be found in the Commission's annual report.

## **C. Federal Funds**

In Hawai'i, the Department of Education (DOE) serves as both the State Educational Agency (SEA) and the Local Educational Agency (LEA) and is the sole recipient of most federal educational funding in the state. Public charter schools receive federal funding from the DOE for the major federal education programs such as Title I, Part A; Title II, Part A; Title III; and IDEA, Part B. This past fiscal year, approximately **\$9.8 million** was distributed to public charter schools for federally funded educational programs. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) from the Commission's Annual Audit for FY 2024-2025 can be found in the Commission's annual report.

At this time, the status and continued funding for major federal education programs remains uncertain though funding for the current fiscal year has been provided. The actions of the federal government to abolish the federal Department of Education have contributed to the uncertainty and concerns that these programs (and the funding associated with them) will be significantly modified or discontinued entirely.

#### **D. Non-general Funds**

EDN 600 (Charter Schools) does not have any non-general funds to report.

The chart above provides the biennium allocations for EDN 600 (Charter Schools) as provided in the biennium budget for fiscal years 2026 and 2027.

For the upcoming supplemental year, FY 2026-2027, the following budget adjustment has been proposed in the Executive Budget:

- Per Pupil Adjustment Placeholder
  - Decrease in general (Per Pupil) funding: **(-\$1,818,240)** for FY2026-2027.  
Purpose of request: Statutory adjustment made to equalize per-pupil funding due to proposed adjustments to major DOE program IDs (EDN 100, EDN 200, EDN 300, and EDN 400).

Funding for public charter schools are determined by the operating appropriation to the Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE) program IDs (EDN 100, EDN 200, EDN 300, and EDN 400) and the schools' pro rata enrollment compared to the total public education enrollment.

#### **F. Budget Adjustments**

The budget adjustments/requests provided in the Executive Biennium budget result from the adjustments/additions to the DOE budget, pursuant to the charter school funding methodology provided in §302D-28, HRS.

Adjustments of the DOE budget affect the charter school per pupil amount, which is a lump sum funding allocation.

## **SECTION 2- EDN 612: CHARTER SCHOOL COMMISSION AND ADMINISTRATION**

### **OVERVIEW**

#### **A. Mission Statement**

The statutory mission of the Commission is “to authorize high-quality public charter schools throughout the State.” (HRS 302D-3(b)). The Commission’s strategic vision for the chartering of these high-quality schools is that they provide excellent and diverse educational options for Hawai‘i’s families, prepare our students for future academic or career success, and contribute meaningfully to the continued improvement of Hawai‘i’s public education system as a whole.

Section 302D-3, HRS, establishes the Commission as an agency administratively attached to the Department of Education (DOE) that is empowered with statewide chartering jurisdiction and authority. As the charter school authorizer, the Commission:

1. Serves as the point of contact between the DOE and public charter schools;
2. Ensures the compliance of public charter schools with all applicable state and federal laws;
3. Serves as the pass-through for the distribution of federal funds provided to the DOE and allocated to public charter schools; and
4. Serves as the pass-through for the distribution of per-pupil funding received from the State and allocated to public charter schools.

#### **Strategic Objectives, Goals, and Performance Metrics**

This past year, the Commission implemented Budgetary Measures of Effectiveness for both itself and charter schools. These measures were developed to align with and complement the revisions to the Commission’s strategic plan that has taken place over the past few years. In this first year, the Commission has found that some of these performance measures for EDN 600 and EDN 612 will need adjustment due to restrictions with data collection and disaggregation.

#### **B. Current Statewide Conditions**

The Commission recently opened three new charter schools: Namahana in Kilauea, Kau‘i and two PreK Only Charters on O‘ahu, Parkway Village in Kapolei, and Waikīkī Community Preschool. For SY25-26, three prospective organizations submitted an application to open a charter school as part of our annual application process. Application results will be announced in late spring.

The Commission is exercising its statutory duties as the authorizer by keeping charter schools accountable. While challenging, closing Kamalani Academy in Wahiawa, O‘ahu was the correct

action after many years of contract conditions that did not improve over time. As difficult as it was to close a school, the Commission implemented closure protocols and worked closely with school staff to ensure a smooth transition for families as they registered their children in nearby schools.

Other perennial challenges are facilities funding, collective bargaining, and statewide initiatives that benefit charter school students. Without dedicated facilities funding, per pupil monies are diverted from staffing, educational programs and materials, and allocated towards building rent or other land costs. As public schools, all staff are part of a collective bargaining unit (BU5, BU6, UPW, etc) which must be addressed annually. A separate Program ID besides EDN 600 will expedite the process and provide payment to the appropriate employee versus distributing the funds as a per pupil amount. Other challenges that impact statewide conditions is recognizing that charters as public schools so that charter students benefit from the same opportunities as their counterpart Department students, such as Hawaii Keiki health programs, dual credit or early college options.

#### Charter School Early Learning Program

In SY 2025-2026, the Commission, with the support of our state legislature, added 15 more pre-K classrooms for a total of 33 classrooms in 13 charter schools statewide. Today, charter schools can serve up to 608 pre-K students. This added 239 more slots, creating life-changing opportunities for more three- and four-year-olds across the state of Hawai'i, contributing to the Ready Keiki Initiative. This expansion included two pre-K-only charter schools in its portfolio – Parkway Villages Preschool in Kapolei, and Waikīkī Community Preschool.

These pre-K-only charter schools have the opportunity to offer a mixed-delivery system with their associated non-profit by providing before- and/or after-care for working families. The challenge, though, is that these stand-alone pre-K-only charter schools are funded at the same level as other pre-K programs in charter schools that serve K-12 students, at \$171,000 per classroom. The initial implementation of the Pre-K only charter schools have found funding challenges associated with this new model of early learning. These Pre-K only schools pay rent, have associated facility maintenance costs, and must develop and hire an administrative level of school leadership which has resulted in budgetary shortfalls. These pre-K-only charter schools are required to seek private donations to make up this difference, which is not sustainable. While the commission understands that these are challenging fiscal times, the sustainability of these critically important pre-K-only charter schools serving Hawai'i's families is at risk.

#### C. Federal Funds

For the 2024-2025 fiscal year, the Commission received and administered approximately **\$10.3 million** in federal educational funds. Of those total federal funds, the Commission expended **\$517,795** or approximately five percent, of the funds received. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) from the Commission's Annual Audit for FY2024-2025 will be posted on the Commission's annual report.

The Commission receives federal funding through the DOE for the major federal education programs such as Title I, Part A; Title II, Part A; Title III; and IDEA, Part B. These funds, specifically Title I funds, are used to provide direct support to schools identified for comprehensive support and improvement (CSI) and targeted support and achievement (TSI). This past fiscal year, the Commission continued programs intended to assist in academic growth and achievement, including the alignment of mission and vision in curriculum and instructional methodology.

As previously discussed, the status and continued funding for major federal education programs remains uncertain due to the efforts to dismantle the federal Department of Education.

#### **D. Non-general Funds**

EDN 612 (Charter School Commission and Administration) does not have any non-general funds to report.

The general funding allocations for EDN 612 in the executive biennium budget request contains two distinct components- the operating funds for the Commission and the operating funds for the Early Education Learning program in charter schools.

The executive biennium budget provides **\$9,130,000** in general funds for the Early Education Learning program in charter schools for both years of the biennium. This funding in FY25 allows for the operation of 48 Pre-kindergarten classrooms.

Also included in the funding of the Commission is **\$1,510,610** in general funds for the Hawaii Keiki program which will provide health and tele-health services to charter schools.

For the upcoming supplemental FY 2026-2027, there are no budget requests proposed in the Executive Budget for EDN 612.

#### **F. Budget Adjustments**

There are no proposed budget adjustments for EDN 612 for fiscal year 2026-2027.
