Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill.¹ The Campaign Spending Commission (“Commission”) supports this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to enhance Hawaii’s partial public financing program by increasing the maximum amount of public funds available for all offices by 50%² (except for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (“OHA”) which will be significantly enhanced by over 1,000%) to qualified candidates. It also makes a downward adjustment of the minimum qualifying contributions for certain offices because it appears that publicly financed candidates for those offices were having a difficult time raising the minimum qualifying contributions. Respectfully, the Commission is submitting this bill as an attempt to boost an existing program that is mandated by the State Constitution which has not changed and whose maximum dollar amounts have not changed since 1995.

This bill amends Hawaii Revised Statutes (“HRS”) sections as follows:

- 1) Increases the expenditure limits for elected offices by 20%,

- 2) HRS §11-425 by increasing the maximum amount of public funds available for all offices (except for the offices of the Mayor of the County of Kauai, Mayor of the County of Maui, and OHA trustee) by 50%. The bill also increases the maximum amount available for candidates for Mayor of the counties of Kauai and Maui by 125% by moving those offices from subsection (a) to subsection (b) and increasing the maximum amount of public funds available for a candidate for trustee of OHA from \$1,500 for the election period to 7.5% of the expenditure limit for each election established in HRS §11-423(d).
- 3) HRS §11-429(a) by increasing the amount of qualifying contributions required for a candidate for trustee of OHA from more than \$1,500 in the aggregate to more than \$5,500 in the aggregate.
- 4) HRS §11-429(a) by providing a downward adjustment of the minimum amounts of qualifying contributions for the office of prosecuting attorney for the city and county of Honolulu (from \$30,000 to \$25,000), and counties of Hawaii (from \$10,000 to \$5,000) and Kauai (from \$5,000 to \$3,000), and for the office of county council for the county of Maui (from \$5,000 to \$4,000).
- 5) HRS §11-429(b) by increasing matching fund payments from \$1 for each \$1 of qualifying contributions in excess of the minimum qualifying contribution amounts to \$2 for each \$1 of excess qualifying contributions.

For illustration, here is a comparison of the present partial public funding program in contrast to the enhanced partial public funding program set forth in this bill. For a qualified Senate candidate running opposed in District 1 in the 2026 election, the maximum amount of public funds available is \$7,269 in the primary election and another \$7,269 in the general election. In contrast, under this bill, this same candidate would receive \$10,903 in the primary election and another \$10,903 in the general election. For a qualified House candidate running opposed in District 1 in the 2026 election, the maximum amount of public funds available is \$3,562 in the primary election and another \$3,562 in the general election. In contrast, under this bill, this same candidate would receive \$5,343 in the primary election and \$5,343 in the general election.

For a qualified candidate running opposed for Kauai Mayor in the 2026 election, the maximum amount of public funds available is \$9,635 in the primary election and another \$9,635 in the general election. In contrast, under this bill, this same candidate would receive \$21,679 in the primary election and \$21,679 in the general election. For a qualified candidate running opposed for Maui Mayor in the 2026 election, the maximum amount of public funds available is \$23,002 in the primary election and another \$23,002 in the general election. In contrast, under this bill, this same candidate would receive \$51,754 in the primary election and \$51,754 in the general election. Lastly, for a qualified OHA candidate running opposed in the 2026 election,

the maximum amount of public funds available is \$1,500 for the election period. In contrast, under this bill, this same candidate would receive \$15,496 in the primary election and \$15,496 in the general election.

Under the bill, assuming one qualified candidate for each elective office³ in the state, the maximum amount of public financing available would be \$2,339,652 in the 2026 primary election and another \$2,339,652 in the 2026 general election. As of June 30, 2025, the Hawaii Election Campaign Fund (“HECF”) balance was \$2,412,282.94. A general fund appropriation into the HECF is necessary if this bill is passed.

The Commission requests that this committee pass this bill.

TESTIMONY

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports SB2528, which would increase the expenditure limit and the amount of partial public campaign financing available for all elective offices; adjust the minimum amount of qualifying contributions certain candidates must receive to participate in the program; increase the matching fund payments for excess qualifying contributions; and appropriate funds for the program. We also offer a suggestion for your consideration.

The League of Women Voters of the US believes that methods of financing political campaigns should enable candidates to compete equitably for public office and ensure that candidates have sufficient funds to communicate their messages to the public. Although a comprehensive public funding program, such as proposed by SB2313, would be the best way to meet these goals, the enhancement to Hawaii's Partial Public Funding Program (PPFP) proposed by SB2528 offers an important step to move toward those goals.

The amount available through the PPFP to publicly funded candidates has not changed in over two decades. Inflation in media prices, postage, and labor costs make the current amounts far less than competitive. The current amounts available to qualified candidates for public funding are far below the amounts spent by privately funded candidates who won election to the same office. Not surprisingly, the number of candidates using the PPFP has decreased every year since at least 2016. The increases proposed in SB2528 unquestionably offer an improvement on the status quo.

In addition, SB2528 cuts the number of qualifying contributions required to access public funding for several offices, making the program easier to access.

Finally, recognizing the increased costs for these changes, and for the intended increase in the number of qualifying candidates, SB2528 provides for increased funding for Hawaii election campaign fund (HECF). This is important because under the definition of the PFPF, if the HECF runs out of money before all qualified candidates have received the anticipated payments, the program will stop making the payments, thus eroding both candidates' trust and willingness to use the program and citizens' appreciation of the PFPF.

Suggestion: Recognizing the CSC staff demands of adjusting to these changes and to the intended increase in the number of candidates initiating use of the PFPF, we suggest funding an added staff position to the CSC, which is already overloaded with important requirements for its small staff.

POSITION: SUPPORT

Imua Alliance supports SB 2528, relating to partial public financing of elections, which increases the expenditure limit and the amount of partial public campaign financing available for all elective offices; adjusts the minimum amount of qualifying contributions certain candidates must receive to participate in the program; and increases the matching fund payments for excess qualifying contributions.

Imua Alliance is a Hawai'i-based organization dedicated to ending all forms of exploitation, including corporate abuse of our democracy. Government should work for the public interest, not special interests.

Hawai'i has had partial public campaign financing in place for decades, rooted in the 1978 Constitutional Convention's direction to establish a campaign fund for partial public financing. Few candidates participate, however, because the current partial funding model fails to provide sufficient resources to run competitive campaigns.

Hawai'i's electoral environment is comparatively uncompetitive. An average of about 90% of incumbents were reelected over the past decade and challengers face structural disadvantages in establishing fundraising networks and building name recognition. Strengthening the match and availability of public funds, as this bill proposes, helps give participating candidates a realistic chance to keep pace with private financing.

Public financing programs are also associated with broader and more diverse participation in democracy, particularly when they amplify small contributions. For example, analysis of New York City's matching system found it increased both the number and diversity of residents who participate as donors, shifting candidate incentives toward engaging everyday constituents instead of concentrating time on large donors. Importantly for Hawai'i, this policy conversation is not abstract:

Hawai'i has confronted repeated corruption scandals in recent years, and a UHERO policy brief explicitly situates public campaign financing as one reform to reduce reliance on wealthy donors and corporate interests.

Buttressing public campaign financing also has indirect, but important benefits for Hawai'i's clean economy and climate action goals. Hawai'i has some of the most ambitious climate targets in the nation—codifying 50% greenhouse gas reductions by 2030 and a carbon-neutral economy by 2045—but achieving these goals depends on responsive, accountable governance, and public trust in policy decisions that affect energy, transportation, land use, and economic incentives.

Research on public financing systems finds that when candidates rely less on large special-interest money and more on broad public support, they are encouraged to engage more directly with voters and prioritize community-wide concerns over narrow donor agendas, including long-term challenges like climate resilience and clean energy transitions.

Reinforced public financing can help ensure that elected leaders are empowered to advance policies—such as investments in renewable energy, equitable EV infrastructure, and climate adaptation funding—that reflect broad public support rather than industry influence. By making Hawai'i's democratic process more transparent and competitive, This bill supports governance that is better aligned with the state's clean economy and climate commitments.

Strengthening partial public financing is a pragmatic democracy reform: it can make elections more competitive, expand the role of small donors, and reduce candidates' dependency on narrow funding networks, while building on recent good government reforms to diminish the corrupting role of corporate money in local politics.

Chair Rhoads, Vice Chair Gabbard, and all Committee members,

Mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony before you today. On behalf of Our Hawai'i's over 38,000 members and supporters across the pae 'āina, we write in strong support of Senate Bill 2528, which updates the state's Partial Public Financing Program into the 21st century — to reduce the influence of big money in politics and make elections more accessible to everyday people.

In the historic 1978 Hawai'i Constitutional Convention, the public financing of elections was established as a key part of our constitution, stating that a public campaign fund could dilute “the effective influence of money and large contributors” and “equalize opportunity for all to participate meaningfully in the political process.”

In the years that followed, public funding of elections played a meaningful role in major races up and down the ballot in Hawaii's local elections. But in recent decades, with rising costs, and the flood of unlimited political spending unleashed by the US Supreme Court's Citizens United decision in 2009, our public financing programs have not kept up with the reality of modern political campaigns. In fact, we have not made adjustments to our public campaign finance system since 1995 — before most people were using personal computers or cell phones.


The result of this is that we have seen an increase in big money in politics, and a declining use of our public financing system. **Why? Primarily because the campaign spending cap you must abide by when you opt in to taking public funds is too low to run and win an average campaign.**

Critically, this new legislation introduced by the Campaign Spending Commission this year addresses that fundamental problem by increasing the expenditure limit for most campaigns to bring it into a range that is comparable to what is needed, on average, for candidates to be able to compete and win while still opting in to public funding.

For example, the **current average expenditure limit for the upcoming 2026 election for a State House race is \$23,632**, for the primary or the general election. That means if you want to receive public funds, you have to agree to spend less than \$23,632 on your election.

However, the median amount spent by State House primary winners in 2024 was **\$31,311.60**, and the average amount spent in winning primary races was **\$37,473.95**. That means **currently, if you are a State House candidate who wants to do the right thing by opting into our public financing system, you have to agree to run on less than what it takes on average to win a race.**

SB2528 makes progress towards addressing this by increasing expenditure caps by 20% across the board, while also increasing the maximum amount of matching funds available to candidates to support them to run competitive races without having to be over reliant on private funds.



While campaign finance reform progress has been made in recent years, it is not enough. On April 17th, 2024 the New York Times dropped a [bombshell exposé on the front page of the New York Times](#), exposing to the world the deep culture of pay-to-play corruption that has existed at high levels of Hawai'i political leadership. With just days left in the legislative session, Hawaii Lawmakers did not act to correct these real problems of corruption or the crisis of public trust they have exacerbated, then they failed to act again, and now the looming specter of the the “\$35,000-in-a-paper-bag” scandal hangs over the legislature’s head.

SB 2528 builds on Hawai'i’s existing Partial Public Financing Program by increasing the amount of public funds available to candidates, raising expenditure limits, and improving the match ratio. These changes will make it a real alternative to relying on wealthy donors and special interests to fund campaigns.

Expanding public financing will allow more grassroots candidates—those without deep-pocketed backers—to run competitive campaigns. It will free elected officials from the constant pressure of fundraising and instead allow them to focus on what truly matters: delivering for their constituents.

This bill does not radically upend our system; instead, it improves an existing, underutilized program. Incumbents will still be able to compete, and the overall partisan makeup of the legislature will not significantly shift. What will change is who has influence—moving power away from big donors and lobbyists and back to the people.

My name is Nanea Lo, and I am submitting testimony in **strong support of SB2528**, part of the Campaign Spending Commission’s legislative package to strengthen Hawai‘i’s public campaign financing system.
