Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this bill. The Campaign Spending Commission (“Commission”) supports this bill (with one amendment) which we believe will prevent the corruption, or at least the appearance of corruption, of elected officials as well as represents a crucial step towards transparency and accountability in government spending. In this respect, this bill will help improve public confidence in government and the electoral process.

This bill amends Hawaii Revised Statutes (“HRS”) §11-355 by extending the ban on contributions from state and county contractors to the officers of the contractor and their immediate family for the duration of a contract of \$100,000 or more for goods and services and \$250,000 or more for a construction contract. The Commission believes that it is common for contractors to get around the ban by having those persons connected to the contractor make political contributions. A few of these situations also involved false name contributions where the contributors were reimbursed for their contributions. The bill also extends the ban to HRS Chapter 42F grantees of the state and grantees of the counties via county charter or code, and the officers of the grantee and their immediate family for the duration of a grant of more than \$100,000. Grantees, like contractors, receive state and local funds and thus should be treated similarly in the context of political contributions.

The Commission notes that this bill limits the scope of individuals prohibited from making contributions for the duration of the contract or grant to “compensated” officers. While the Commission supports narrowing the scope of individuals prohibited from making contributions, it is concerned that uncompensated officers can influence legislation to benefit the company and/or organization and recommends removing “compensated” from the bill.

The bill provides that a state or county contractor or grantee shall disclose to the Commission the names of any compensated officer and the officer’s immediate family at the time of execution of the contract or grant. The bill further provides that the Commission shall make the information available to candidate and noncandidate committees on a password-protected section on the Commission’s website. The Commission requests an appropriation to build a password-protected section in its electronic filing system as well as to account for training, and administrative support for the Commission to implement this part.

With respect to any constitutional concerns regarding the scope of this bill, the Commission defers to the Department of the Attorney General but believes that there are other jurisdictions including Connecticut that have extended the campaign contributions ban to state contractors’ principals and family members and withstood challenge on First Amendment grounds.

The Commission respectfully request that this Committee pass this bill.

SENATE BILL 2530, SD1  
RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on Senate Bill 2530, SD1. The State Procurement Office (SPO) appreciates the intent of this measure to enhance transparency and public trust by expanding campaign contribution prohibitions and disclosure requirements for state and county contractors and grantees. Preventing both the appearance and reality of "pay-to-play" practices is a critical policy objective, particularly where public funds are involved.

To promote consistency, the SPO respectfully recommends revised language to **Section 2, Page 4, lines 8-14**:

"(b) It shall be unlawful for any compensated officer, or the officer's immediate family, of any state or county contractor under subsection (a) that is awarded a state or county contract [~~of \$100,000 or more for goods or services, or \$250,000 or more for construction~~] exceeding the small purchase threshold pursuant to chapter 103D-305, at any time between the execution of the contract through the completion of the contract pursuant to subsection (h), to:"

This approach would align campaign contributions restrictions with procurement and eliminate the need for future statutory amendments solely to update the dollar amounts.

SPO further recommends revising **Section 2, Page 7, lines 1-3**, so (g) will read as follows:

"(g) ~~[At the time of execution of a]~~ Within 30 days of a fully executed contract or grant subject to this section that meets the applicable thresholds described in subsections (b) or (c), a state or county contractor or grantee shall disclose to the commission a list of the names of any compensated officers and the officer's immediate family. The commission shall make the disclosed information available to candidate and noncandidate committees in a database that is on a password-protected section of the commission's website; provided that the name of the contractor or grantee and any officers may also be made available to the public."

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, and Members of the Committee on Ways and Means,

Hawai'i Alliance for Progressive Action supports SB 2530, SD1, relating to campaign contributions by state and county contractors and grantees.

Existing law prohibits contractors from making political contributions while holding state contracts. But the prohibition has not gone far enough. The compensated officers and immediate family members of those contractors remain free to make substantial contributions during the same period, creating exactly the appearance of pay-to-play politics the law was designed to prevent. Grantees, who similarly receive public funds and have a direct financial interest in government decisions, face no contribution restrictions at all.

SB 2530 closes those gaps. It extends the prohibition to cover compensated officers and their immediate family members of contractors and grantees above certain thresholds, and requires disclosure of their names to the Campaign Spending Commission. That information will be made available to candidates and committees through a secure database so they can ensure compliance.

The fiscal implications of this bill are minimal. The disclosure and database requirements can be implemented within the Campaign Spending Commission's existing administrative framework. The cost of not acting, however, is continued erosion of public confidence in whether state contracts and grants are awarded on merit or on the basis of political relationships.

We respectfully urge support for SB 2530, SD1.

Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwake, and Committee Members:

**The League of Women Voters of Hawaii supports SB2530 SD1, which** prohibits state or county contractor's compensated officers and any officer's immediate family, with contracts of \$100,000 or more for goods or services or \$250,000 or more for construction from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the contract; prohibits grantees, grantees' compensated officers and grantees' officer's immediate family, with grants of more than \$100,000, from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the grant; requires any unlawful contribution to be returned to the contributor or it will escheat to the Hawaii election campaign fund (HECF).

To save time for readers already familiar with the analysis of Hawaii Campaign Spending Commission (CSC) data published in the New York Times (NYT) in 2024\*, we refer readers to the NYT article (link on p.2 below) for more detailed data. The article's sobering conclusion cries out for the changes described in SB2530.

Our support is based on the following:

- 1) The same considerations of pay-to-play apply to grantees as to contractors.
- 2) Between 2006 - the year the pay-to-play law (HRS 11-355) was implemented – and 2024, people tied to government contractors gave state and local Hawaii politicians more than \$24 million: **about one-fifth of all donations** made. Most often, these donations were given to politicians with the most power to determine contract awards.

HRS 11-355 is undermined by contributions from officers, employees, and their families. SB2530 SD1 would restore the intent of HRS 11-355.

3) Returning illegal contributions to the contributor within 30 days, or, failing that, escheating the money to the appropriate state agency, is standard practice across campaign finance regulations. The money added to HECF funds will help sustain the Partial Public Financing Program.

One weakness in implementation of HRS 11-355 is that CSC staff often don't know the identities of a contractor's officers and their immediate families. SB2530 SD1 corrects this problem by requiring compensated officers of contractors & grantees to provide the names of their immediate families to the CSC. Reasonably, it also requires the Campaign Spending Commission to make available to candidate and noncandidate committees the disclosed names in a password-protected database.

Imua Alliance supports SB 2530 SD1, relating to campaign contributions, which prohibits state or county contractor's officers and any officer's immediate family, with contracts of \$100,000 or more for goods or services or \$250,000 or more for construction, from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the contract; prohibits grantees, grantees' officers and grantees' officer's immediate family, with grants of more than \$100,000, from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the grant; and requires any unlawful contribution to be returned to the contributor or it will escheat to the Hawai'i election campaign fund.

Imua Alliance is a Hawai'i-based organization dedicated to ending all forms of exploitation, including corporate interference in our democracy. **Note: we prefer this measure to HB 1519, since this proposal sets lower contract thresholds and applies to all officers and their immediate family.**

Our democracy belongs to we, the people.

At a time when our nation is experiencing extreme political turmoil and basic civil liberties are under assault, we must take steps in Hawai'i to safeguard democratic participation. In the 2024 primary election, for example, our state experienced its lowest turnout in 65 years, with only 32.1 percent of registered voters filling out a ballot. This is, in part, a reflection of the public's deep cynicism with our electoral processes.

Hawai'i continues to be embroiled in public corruption scandals, following the bribery allegations that were levied against former Senate Majority Leader Kalani English and former State Representative Ty Cullen. Legal clouds surrounding a \$35,000 alleged bribery scandal are swirling around the legislature, to the detriment of public confidence, with the Hawai'i

Attorney General opening an investigation into the potential offenses and the State House adopting a measure to begin this session calling for a thorough and hasty enquiry into the matter.

Other public officials, such as employees at local permitting offices, have also recently been ensnared in bribery scandals, in some cases with connections to Milton Choy, the lobbyist who was responsible for coordinating the bribery scheme that Sen. English and Rep. Cullen became a part of. These cases show that we have a moral crisis in our public institutions and must do all we can to restore integrity to government.

In 2024, a Civil Beat/New York Times investigation unveiled just how deeply pay-to-play culture is ingrained in local politics. After reviewing hundreds of thousands of campaign contributions and more than 70,000 government contracts, reporters found that nearly \$1 out of every \$5 donated to politicians came from people tied to companies doing business with state and local governments.

As Civil Beat reported at the time, when some companies were on the cusp of winning major government contracts, people connected to them donated large amounts of campaign funds to influential public officials who were in positions to sway the awards.

Perhaps the most telling part of the report is encapsulated in the following excerpt from the special investigation: Even though those contributors generally didn't acknowledge their connections to the companies, they were not violating Hawai'i law, which only prohibits donations directly from the firms. "Everyone gets very upset with pay-to-play, but it's legal," said Kristin Izumi-Nitao, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Campaign Spending Commission."

It might be legal today, but it shouldn't be any longer if we care about our future. Government should work for the public interest, not special interests. It is in that spirit that we support this and other reforms to restore integrity to our state's electoral and governmental processes.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide my written testimony in support of SB2530. As a Lahaina resident and member of Indivisible Hawai'i, I respectfully urge you to pass SB2530 to address the issue of pay-to-play political spending by contractors, permitting unfettered influence of our State elections.

The Supreme Court's 2010 decision in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission*,<sup>[1]</sup> opened the floodgates of independent election spending, allowing outside actors to pour exorbitant sums of money into political campaigns across the country, undermining our "bedrock principles like 'one person, one vote' and 'government of, by, and for the people'["<sup>[2]</sup>Hawai'i is not exempt from the corruption *Citizens United* has ushered in.<sup>[3]</sup>

Not surprisingly, the *Citizens United* decision is wildly unpopular, with the majority of Americans disapproving of it,<sup>[4]</sup> and voters opposing it by a nearly 3-1 margin.<sup>[5]</sup> Despite this, Congress has failed to act to institute any post-*Citizens* reforms or implement a Constitutional amendment, even though in 2014, a majority of the U.S. Senate debated and voted in favor of S.J. Resolution 19, the "Democracy for All Amendment" to the Constitution, but did not achieve the 67 votes required to pass the Senate.<sup>[6]</sup> Significantly, 842 local government resolutions calling for a Constitutional amendment have been passed, 22 States – including Hawai'i – and Washington D.C. have called for a Constitutional amendment, and 121 members of Congress are co-sponsoring legislation to overturn *Citizens United*.<sup>[7]</sup>

We in Hawai'i are lucky to have representatives and officials who take into account and respect the sentiment of their constituents in maintaining fair and transparent elections. Here, you can restore our citizens' faith in the system and act in furtherance and protection of our fragile democratic constitutional republic. Unchecked corporate political spending is an absolute threat to our democracy, permitting corporations to buy policies antithetical to the common good.<sup>[8]</sup>

Accordingly, it is imperative that you act now on SB2530, tackling the issue of corruption in government contracting. Please do your part in keeping our elections as fair and transparent as possible, and fostering public trust by preventing State and county contractors, grantees, and their families from making political contributions while their contracts or grants are active.

Thank you for your time and commitment to our democracy.

As a Lahaina resident and member of Indivisible Hawai'i, I respectfully urge you to pass SB2530 to address the issue of pay-to-play political spending by contractors, permitting unfettered influence of our Stateelections.

The Supreme Court's 2010 decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission, opened the floodgates of independent election spending, allowing outside actors to pour exorbitant sums of money into political campaigns across the country, undermining our "bedrock principles like 'one person, one vote' and 'government of, by, and for the people' []."Hawai'i is not exempt from the corruption Citizens United has ushered in.

Not surprisingly, the Citizens United decision is wildly unpopular, with the majority of Americans disapproving of it, and voters opposing it by a nearly 3-1 margin. Despite this, Congress has failed to act to institute any post-Citizens reforms or implement a Constitutional amendment, even though in 2014, a majority of the U.S. Senate debated and voted in favor of S.J. Resolution 19, the "Democracy for All Amendment" to the Constitution, but did not achieve the 67 votes required to pass the Senate. Significantly, 842 local government resolutions calling for a Constitutional amendment have been passed, 22 States – including Hawai'i – and Washington D.C. have called for a Constitutional amendment, and 121 members of Congress are co-sponsoring legislation to overturn Citizens United.

We in Hawai'i are lucky to have representatives and officials who take into account and respect the sentiment of their constituents in maintaining fair and transparent elections. Here, you can restore our citizens' faith in the system and act in furtherance and protection of our fragile

democratic constitutional republic. Unchecked corporate political spending is an absolute threat to our democracy, permitting corporations to buy policies antithetical to the common good.

Accordingly, it is imperative that you act now on SB2530, tackling the issue of corruption in government contracting. Please do your part in keeping our elections as fair and transparent as possible, and fostering public trust by preventing State and county contractors, grantees, and their families from making political contributions while their contracts or grants are active.

**TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 2530, SD1 - RELATING TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS.**

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Moriwaki, Senator Hashimoto for my district, Senator DeCoite for Upcountry Maui, and Members of the Committee,

My name is Christine Andrews. I am a long-time resident of Wailuku, Maui and an attorney licensed in Hawai'i for over 25 years. I write to you today in **support of SB 2530, SD1**, Relating to Campaign Contributions, which prohibits state or county contractor's compensated officers and any officer's immediate family, with contracts of \$100,000 or more for goods or services or \$250,000 or more for construction, from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the contract. Senate Bill 2530, SD1 also prohibits grantees, grantees' compensated officers and grantees' officer's immediate family, with grants of more than \$100,000, from contributing to candidate or noncandidate committees, candidates, or any person for any political purpose for the duration of the grant. The bill also requires any unlawful contribution to be returned to the contributor or it will escheat to the Hawai'i election campaign fund; requires the disclosure of names of any compensated officers and immediate family members of a state or county contractor or grantee for contracts or grants exceeding a certain amount, and requires the Campaign Spending Commission to make available to candidate and noncandidate committees the disclosed names in a password-protected database.

Between 2006 - the year the pay-to-play law (HRS 11-355) was implemented – and 2024, **people tied to government contractors gave state and local Hawaii politicians more than \$24 million: about one-fifth of all donations made.** Most often, these donations were given to politicians with the most power to determine contract awards. HRS 11-355 is undermined by contributions from contractor's officers, employees, and their families. Preventing contractors and grantees from donating to political campaigns reduces the risk of undue influence or favoritism in government decisions and in the awarding of contracts and grants.

I am sure the members of the Committee are aware of the New York Times article, "Inside the Late-Night Parties Where Hawaii Politicians Raked In Money," published in January, 2024, with the tagline, "[a]fter the state passed a law barring government contractors from donating to politicians, fund-raising parties showed just how completely the reform effort failed"<sup>1</sup>. As a resident of Maui, at a time when my Lahaina neighbors were depending on the kindness of donations pouring in from around the world to help with recovery from the wildfire, an article highlighting apparent corruption in Hawaii to a national audience is something that needs remedy.

Aloha Chair and Members of the Committee,

My name is Jasmine Steiner. I am a daughter of the Puna 'āina, born and raised, and I run community grassroots organization KahuPuna. I also am the daughter of the pro se filer of the 2024 Hawai'i Geothermal Injunction (which is currently active in the intermediate court of appeals in Hawaii), on behalf of the Puna community. I stand in **strong support of SB2530**.

Puna has been oppressed for 40 years because the laws allow those who profit from our land to fund the politicians who regulate them.

We see this conflict in District 4, where Representative **Ashley Kierkiewicz** acts as a bridge for PGV's "community benefits" and studies, her previous career being Hastings and Pleadwell (PGV's Lawyer firm) , **even as the community sues for fraud, and begs her for any help or even a shred of decency via community engagement for years.** When developers, grantees, and their immediate families are allowed to pour money into campaign coffers, the voices of the people are silenced. SB2530 is a necessary check on the "quid pro quo" culture that has allowed geothermal expansion to bypass environmental justice. **Pass SB2530.**

### **Closing the Loophole on Corruption**

For 40 years, the Puna community has been a "sacrifice zone" for geothermal experimentation. We have watched as millions in state and federal grants are poured into projects that desecrate our sacred lands and poison our air. This has been allowed to happen because of a massive loophole in our campaign finance laws—a loophole that **SB2530** finally seeks to close.

- **The Problem:** Currently, while direct "contractors" are barred from donating to political campaigns, "grantees" and the family members of these developers are free to funnel money to the very politicians who approve their funding.
- **The Puna Reality: We see "quid pro quo" corruption in action every time a new geothermal grant is issued while our community's reports of health harms and scientific fraud are ignored. Money buys silence, and it buys "fast-track" bills like SB2834.**

## Restoring Public Trust

The Puna community is currently in the Intermediate Court of Appeals proving that the Puna Geothermal Venture (PGV) is operating under a **fraudulent Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)**. Public trust in our state agencies and the legislative process is at an all-time low because we know that "grants" often follow "donations."

- **SB2530** levels the playing field by prohibiting compensated officers and their immediate family members from contributing to candidate committees for the duration of a grant.
- It ensures that when \$15 million or \$30 million is appropriated for "geothermal exploration," that money isn't being recycled back into the re-election campaigns of the people who signed the check.

## Conclusion

Aloha Chairperson Rhoads and Members of the Committee on Judiciary,

My name is Christopher Egbo, and I am a concerned citizen of Honolulu writing in strong support of SB2530, which would close a significant loophole in our campaign finance laws by prohibiting officers of state and county contractors and their immediate family members from making political contributions.

Our state has witnessed too many corruption scandals in recent years. From the federal convictions of former legislators J. Kalani English and Ty Cullen to the conspiracy cases involving high-profile figures like Louis and Katherine Kealoha, the message is clear: Hawai'i's pay-to-play culture has eroded public trust in our government . We cannot allow the perception—or the reality—that government contracts can be influenced by campaign donations.

The statistics are staggering. A Civil Beat/New York Times investigation found that nearly one out of every five dollars donated to Hawai'i politicians since 2006 came from people tied to companies doing business with state and local governments . Currently, only the contracting firms themselves are prohibited from making contributions—a loophole that allows owners, officers, and family members to donate freely, creating an obvious path for influence . SB2530 closes this loophole.

This bill has been requested by the Campaign Spending Commission for several years and has broad public support, with zero opposition at its recent Judiciary Committee hearing . It represents a commonsense reform: if a company is receiving taxpayer dollars through a government contract, its leadership and their families should not be writing checks to the very officials who approve those contracts . This is not about restricting political speech—it is about ensuring that government decisions are made based on merit, not campaign contributions.

The 2005 law banning contractor contributions was a good start, but the exemptions for officers and family members created a glaring weakness . As the Connecticut court noted in upholding similar restrictions, leaving these loopholes open would "invite the very circumvention that the General Assembly was trying to prevent" . SB2530 simply finishes the job.

Some have raised concerns about privacy and implementation, but these are manageable. The Campaign Spending Commission has proposed reasonable solutions, including a non-public database for compliance purposes . The more important question is this: can we afford to leave this loophole open any longer?

Every session that passes without closing this gap is another session where the public wonders whose interests are truly being served at the Capitol. I urge you to pass SB2530 and send a clear message that Hawai'i is serious about restoring integrity to our government.

**SB2530 SD1 – Relating to Campaign Contributions**

Chair, Vice Chair, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Dr. Inam Rahman, MD, a resident of Honolulu and a small business owner who has worked closely with both public and private systems in Hawaii. I submit this testimony in support of SB2530 SD1, with respectful recommendations to strengthen the bill and ensure its long-term effectiveness.

**Strong Support for the Bill’s Intent**

SB2530 SD1 addresses a legitimate public concern: the perception or reality of “pay-to-play” practices in government contracting. In a small state like Hawaii, where economic networks are interconnected and procurement decisions carry substantial financial impact, safeguarding public trust is essential.

By restricting political contributions from state and county contractors and grantees during the duration of a contract or grant, the bill:

- Reduces perceived conflicts of interest
- Protects elected officials from undue influence
- Enhances transparency in procurement
- Reinforces confidence in the Campaign Spending Commission

Public trust is foundational to democratic governance. This bill moves Hawaii in the right direction.

### Recommended Amendments to Strengthen the Measure

While I strongly support the objective, I respectfully suggest the following refinements to ensure constitutional durability, clarity, and fairness:

#### 1. Narrow the Definition of “Immediate Family”

The prohibition on contributions from immediate family members may raise constitutional concerns if applied too broadly.

Suggested amendment:

Limit application to:

- Spouses or domestic partners, and
- Officers with direct decision-making authority over the contract

This maintains integrity while reducing legal vulnerability.

#### 2. Clarify Scope of “Any Political Purpose”

The phrase “any political purpose” is broad and could create confusion.

Suggested amendment:

Clarify that the prohibition applies only to:

- State and county candidate committees
- State and county noncandidate committees

Excluding federal races and unrelated ballot issues would avoid overbreadth.

### 3. Consider a De Minimis Exception

To avoid penalizing minor civic participation:

Good governance requires not only integrity, but also balance. SB2530 SD1, with thoughtful amendments, can serve both principles.
