1 **Fiscal Implications:** The Department of Health (“Department”) requests that this measure be  
2 considered so long as it does not supplant the priorities and requests outlined in the Governor’s  
3 executive budget request.

4 **Department Position:** The Department supports SB3320 SD1 HD1.

5 **Department Testimony:** The Environmental Health Services Division, Food and Drug Branch  
6 (“EHSD-FDB”) provides the following testimony on behalf of the Department:

7 SB3320 SD1 HD1 strengthens the Hawai’i Food and Product Innovation Network  
8 (“FPIN”) through adopting statutes to refine governance and integration among key state  
9 agencies, sets forth key performance indicators, and increases market access, branding  
10 alignment, and growth opportunities for Hawai’i businesses. SB3320 SD1 HD1 builds upon the  
11 framework established by Act 237, Session Laws of Hawaii (“SLH”) 2025.

12 The mission of the Department is to protect and improve the health and environment  
13 for all people in Hawai’i. Investing in the FPIN, which will increase access to local, safe, and  
14 nutritious foods, supports the Department’s mission. Access to safe and nutritious food is a  
15 social determinant of health and the Department notes that both physical and mental health

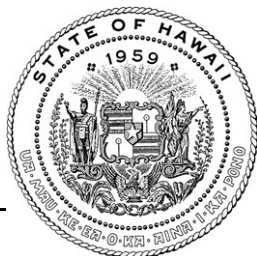
1 outcomes improve when healthy food options are readily available to the public for  
2 consumption.

3 The Department appreciates the continued opportunity to participate in the FPIN,  
4 primarily through its food regulatory programs. By working together with sister agencies, the  
5 Department has been able to educate local manufacturers on food safety regulations up front.  
6 Continued coordination will be critical as the industry evolves and new technologies emerge.

7 The Department defers to the Agribusiness Development Corporation (“ADC”) as to the  
8 implementation and substantive matters of this measure. However, the Department is ready  
9 and willing to partner with ADC and other agencies identified in this measure to incorporate a  
10 coordinated food safety and regulatory framework to ensure that food products developed  
11 through the FPIN are safe and comply with the Department’s food safety and food  
12 manufacturing regulations.

13 **Offered Amendments:** None.

Chair Todd, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism (DBEDT) **strongly supports** SB3320, SD1, HD1.

This measure proposes to strengthen the statutory framework for the Food and Product Innovation Network (FPIN) by enhancing performance accountability, integrating regulatory systems, improving market access, and expanding data-driven decision-making.

Hawaii's economy remains highly concentrated and vulnerable to external shocks. DBEDT's statewide strategy calls for a structural shift toward value-added manufacturing, export-oriented growth, workforce alignment, and regional production hubs that reduce import dependence and increase economic resilience.

SB3320, SD1, HD1 provides the operational structure needed to move FPIN from a set of facilities into a coordinated statewide economic system.

DBEDT's framework for economic resilience integrates four core pillars:

- 1) Curriculum-to-career pathways
- 2) Infrastructure and facilities
- 3) Policy alignment, and
- 4) Layered incentives.

SB3320, SD1, HD1 directly advances all four.

### 1. Infrastructure & Facilities → From Pilot to Commercial Scale

DBEDT's strategy identifies a major gap between early-stage production and commercial-scale manufacturing, the "valley of death" where businesses fail due to lack of compliant facilities, equipment, and support systems. FPIN sites are designed to bridge this gap.

SB3320, SD1, HD1 strengthens this role by requiring:

- Integrated food safety and regulatory frameworks
- Technical assistance for labeling, testing, and certification
- Coordination with DOH, CTAHR, and regulatory agencies

This ensures FPIN facilities are not just kitchens, but industry-ready commercialization platforms.

### 2. Workforce Alignment - Embedding Compliance and Industry Skills

DBEDT's resilience model connects education, training, and industry through cradle-to-career pathways. SB3320, SD1, HD1 embeds regulatory compliance and food safety education into workforce programs offered through the network.

This links FPIN to:

- CTE programs
- Community college pathways
- Industry-recognized credentials, and
- Strengthens workforce readiness in value-added food manufacturing – a priority sector for diversification.

### 3. Export & Market Access – Shifting Hawai'i Toward Value-Add Growth

DBEDT's strategy emphasizes that future growth must come from export-oriented value-added sectors, not just local consumption.

SB3320, SD1, HD1 requires ADC to develop a coordinated market access strategy with:

- Transportation
- Tourism
- Airlines and harbors

- Logistics providers

This connects production to distribution, tourism channels, and international markets – turning Hawai'i-made food products into economic drivers beyond our shores.

#### 4. Policy Alignment & Branding – Maximizing Hawai'i's Competitive Advantage

The bill aligns and harmonizes “Hawai'i Made” and “Hawai'i Grown” branding initiatives. DBEDT's economic framework highlights Hawai'i's brand as a core export advantage; fragmentation weakens its value.

Brand alignment:

- Reduces duplication
- Improves market clarity
- Increases producer returns, and
- Supports the State's mandate to grow value-added production and exports.

#### 5. Performance Accountability – Results-Based Governance

SB3320, SD1, HD1 establishes measurable performance indicators including:

- Businesses graduating to commercial operations
- Growth in value-added output
- Export expansion
- Workforce credentials
- Growth in revenue and market access for small-scale producers through shared-use processing, branding, and distribution infrastructure
- Contributions to food security
- Leveraged private and federal funds

DBEDT recognizes the intent to incorporate measurable outcomes, including those focused on small-scale producers and shared-use infrastructure, and notes that implementation will require alignment of data collection, reporting capacity, and program resources.

This mirrors DBEDT's shift toward data-driven, outcome-based economic development, ensuring FPIN delivers measurable economic impact.

#### 6. Incentives Layering – Enterprise Zones

The measure includes provisions requiring coordination with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and DBEDT to collect and analyze economic data, including data on Native Hawaiian and indigenous businesses.

DBEDT acknowledges the intent to improve data-driven policymaking and reporting. Implementation of these provisions will require coordination across agencies, clarity on data governance, and consideration of existing statutory and confidentiality requirements.

Chair Todd, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 3320 SD1 HD1 that requires the Food and Product Innovation Network to integrate a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework. Requires the Agribusiness Development Corporation to establish key performance indicators for the Food and Product Innovation Network, develop a market access strategy, align and harmonize state branding initiatives, and report certain data to the Legislature. Requires the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to evaluate or adapt enterprise zone incentives in all counties to better support the Food and Product Innovation Network. Appropriates funds. The Department of Agriculture and Biosecurity (Department) supports the bill and offers comments.

The Department supports the strengthening of the Hawaii Food and Product Innovation Network (FPIN) provided by SB3320 SD1 HD1 to include as a key performance indicator for the FPIN the growth in revenue and market access for small-scale producers through the utilization of shared-use processing, branding, and distribution infrastructure and keeping intact the adopting of statutes to incorporate a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework among primary and partner members, establish key performance indicators, develop and implement a coordinated strategy to expand market access, coordinate, align and harmonize state branding programs, collect and leverage economic data alignment, evaluate growth opportunities.

The Department appreciates that the adoption of these statutes provides a roadmap for the agriculture raw products of the state to be transformed into a value-

added product that has been manufactured, assembled, fabricated or produced within the state.

The Department appreciates that the bill acknowledges alignment with applicable federal and state food safety laws, regulations, rules and food codes, coordination with state and private section assets to expand market access and facilitate entry into national and international markets, alignment and harmonization with state branding programs in domestic and international markets, and participation in data collection.

The purpose of the bill is to strengthen the FPIN in alignment with existing law and the State's food security and economic diversification goals. The Department respectfully comments that food safety, food security, and economic diversification goals such as expanding domestic and international market access are part of the programs of the Department and we look forward to collaborating with the partner agencies to establish the statutes that integrate and coordinate a framework for the FPINs.

Chairperson Todd, Vice Chairperson Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee. The Hawai'i Community Development Authority (HCDA) **supports SB 3320, SD1, HD1**, which requires the Food and Product Innovation Network to implement a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework; directs the Agribusiness Development Corporation to establish performance metrics, develop a market access strategy, align state branding efforts, and report data to the Legislature; and requires the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to evaluate or expand enterprise zone initiatives statewide.

This measure clarifies that the Food and Product Innovation Network shall provide technical assistance to ensure compliance with testing, validation, and certification requirements. This is particularly critical for the High-Pressure Processing Facility at the Central Oahu Agriculture and Food Hub, as it serves as a cornerstone for advancing food safety, extending shelf life, and supporting local producers in meeting compliance standards.

Chairperson Todd, Vice Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

The Agribusiness Development Corporation (ADC) supports SB3320, SD1, HD1, and the appropriation of an unspecified amount to advance the Food and Product Innovation Network (FPIN).

This measure strengthens ADC's statutory role in supporting a coordinated food system by:

- (1) Requiring the Food and Product Innovation Network to integrate a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework;
- (2) Requiring the Agribusiness Development Corporation to establish key performance indicators for the Food and Product Innovation Network, develop a market access strategy, align and harmonize state branding initiatives, and report certain data to the Legislature;
- (3) Requiring the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to evaluate or adapt enterprise zone incentives in all counties to better support the Food and Product Innovation Network; and
- (4) Appropriating funds for the operations of the Food and Product Innovation Network.

Collectively, these provisions advance an integrated approach to food system development by aligning regulatory processes, improving market access, and supporting value-added agricultural production. Coordination across agencies is critical to ensure that producers can meet applicable food safety requirements while efficiently bringing products to market.

ADC supports the integration of a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework across FPIN participants, which will ensure alignment with applicable federal and state laws, regulations, rules, and food codes while reducing barriers to participation for producers and manufacturers.

ADC also supports establishing clear, measurable performance indicators for FPIN, particularly those tied to revenue generation, market access, and the growth of small-scale producers through shared-use processing, branding, and distribution infrastructure. These metrics will help ensure that public investments are outcomes-driven and directly support local businesses in scaling production and accessing institutional, retail, and export markets.

In addition, the development of a coordinated market access strategy, combined with the alignment and harmonization of state branding initiatives, will strengthen Hawai'i's competitive position in both domestic and international markets. The evaluation and potential adaptation of enterprise zone incentives by the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism further supports this effort by aligning economic development tools with the operational needs of food manufacturing and value-added production across all counties.

By improving regulatory coordination, strengthening food safety compliance, expanding market opportunities, and providing dedicated operational funding, this measure supports a more resilient, efficient, and competitive local food system.

For these reasons, favorable consideration of SB3320, SD1, HD1, and its appropriation is respectfully requested.

This testimony may be further amended or refined following review by the Agribusiness Development Corporation Board at its April meeting.

Aloha Chair Todd, Vice-Chair Takenouchi, and Members of the Committee:

I am Brian Miyamoto, Executive Director of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate, and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

**The Hawai'i Farm Bureau supports SB 3320, SD2, HD1**, which strengthens and expands the Food and Product Innovation Network (FPIN) within the Agribusiness Development Corporation to better support agricultural producers and food businesses through coordinated workforce development, regulatory navigation, value-added processing, market access, and performance accountability.

The Hawai'i Farm Bureau has been a strong and consistent supporter of the Food and Product Innovation Network and its role in helping farmers, producers, and food businesses move beyond raw production into value-added processing, manufacturing, and expanded market opportunities. FPIN reflects years of collaborative work among ADC, educational institutions, industry partners, and State agencies to strengthen Hawai'i's food system and diversify the agricultural economy.

SB 3320, SD2, HD1 builds on that foundation by improving coordination, accountability, and statewide integration of FPIN activities. The bill's emphasis on workforce development, regulatory navigation, market access, branding alignment, and performance measurement will help ensure that FPIN continues to provide practical, results-oriented support to farmers and food businesses seeking to scale up and enter new markets.

We also support efforts to integrate food safety education and technical assistance into FPIN. Food safety compliance is often one of the most significant barriers preventing farmers and processors from expanding their operations or accessing institutional and

export markets. Providing coordinated guidance and readiness support can help reduce confusion and improve compliance outcomes.

At the same time, it is important to clarify that ADC's role in food safety should remain one of coordination, education, and technical assistance, rather than regulatory oversight or auditing. Regulatory authority and enforcement appropriately reside with existing state, federal, and third-party entities. In addition, food safety requirements vary significantly depending on the type of crop or product, and implementation should remain flexible and risk-based so that small, diversified, and value-added producers are not unintentionally burdened by requirements that do not apply to their operations.

SB 3320, SD2, HD1 represents an important opportunity to strengthen FPIN as a statewide resource that connects agricultural production to processing, compliance, branding, and markets. With thoughtful implementation and continued coordination with industry stakeholders, the measure can further support local food production, economic diversification, and food system resilience.

**SUBJECT: Support for SB3320 SD1 HD1** – Relating to the Food and Product Innovation Network

Chair and Members of the Committee:

Aloha Independent Living Hawaii (AILH) is a cross-disability, community-based Center for Independent Living that supports disabled people statewide to live and work in the communities of their choice. While SB3320 SD1 HD1 is not a disability-specific bill, many disabled entrepreneurs and family members rely on small-scale food and value-added product businesses—especially in rural areas—as accessible pathways to income, community participation, and economic self-sufficiency.

SB3320 SD1 HD1 strengthens the statewide Food and Product Innovation Network within the Agribusiness Development Corporation by integrating a coordinated food safety and regulatory framework, establishing key performance indicators, developing a market access strategy, aligning state “Hawaii made” and related branding initiatives, and improving economic data on small-scale producers, including indigenous and Native Hawaiian businesses. The bill also directs the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to evaluate enterprise zone incentives to better support the network and appropriates funds for its operations.

Aloha,

Hawai'i Food+ Policy **supports** SB3320 SD1 HD1 to build a more coordinated and strategic statewide food and product innovation network (FPIN).

International examples show that successful food innovation ecosystems require dedicated and continuous funding, clear governance structures, and cross-sector coordination. We acknowledge that SB3320 SD1 HD1 added placeholder language to appropriate funds. We urge that these funds for FPIN implementation in fiscal years 2025–2026 and 2026–2027 support two full-time equivalent positions. As SB3320 SD1 HD1 institutionalizes FPIN's role, we respectfully encourage the Legislature to consider how these efforts will be sustained beyond the current appropriation period. In particular, we suggest that SB3320 SD1 include placeholder appropriation for FTE positions going into FY 2027-2028, signaling legislative intent to support continued staffing and implementation capacity in future fiscal years.

We also request clarification regarding implementation details referenced in SB3320 SD1 HD1 to develop a "food safety and regulatory framework across all primary and partner members." Clarifying whether food safety inspections and certifications will be administered directly by the State or coordinated through contracted entities would help ensure efficiency and avoid duplication. Additionally, clarification on whether the framework is intended to meet state regulatory requirements, market-driven standards, or both would support smoother implementation for producers and entrepreneurs.

SB3320 SD1 HD1 presents an opportunity to further align FPIN with existing food and product entrepreneurship cohorts out of the [Wahiawā Value-Added Product Development Center](#). We applaud that the KPI of "growth in revenue and market access for small-scale producers through the utilization of shared-use processing, branding, and distribution infrastructure" has been added. Clarifying how programs fit within FPIN's coordination and strategies could strengthen outcomes for farmers, food businesses, and local supply chains.

Hawai'i Food+ Policy respectfully urges the Committee to pass SB3320 SD1 HD1 with amendments that signal clear legislative intent to sustain implementation capacity, clarify food safety and regulatory roles, and support coordination with existing innovation and entrepreneurship programs. Doing so will better position the Food and Product Innovation Network to deliver lasting benefits for Hawai'i's communities and economy.
